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





# ETF provides N200 million for procurement of learning materials for the blind

visually impaired children worth N200 million were acquired by UBEC for distribution to the State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB).

The procurement of these materials which include Braille machines, talking calculators, Braille writing slates, sign language books, speech trainers and plastic alphabet sets were made possible with funding from the Education Trust Fund (ETF).

Speaking at the handing over ceremony to the beneficiaries, the Executive Secretary, UBEC, Dr. Ahmed Modibbo Mohammed, said the N200 million grant from the ETF was set aside for Schools for Children with special needs and after exhaustive meetings it was decided that materials worth N5

million should procured for each state. The Honourable Minister of State for Education, Hajiya Aishatu Dukku, who presented the materials to SUBEB Chairmen in Abuja, said that it had become important that Government at all levels take initiatives to provide as a matter of priority all the necessary support needed for the education of those with special needs.

"Along this line, the Minister said government recognizes that special education requires specialized methodology and is putting in place, the necessary policy and functional framework for actualizing its policy thrust in this direction" she said.

According to the information made available to us the North-West zone made up of Jigawa, Kaduna, Katsina, Kebbi, Sokoto, and

Zamfara states received 28 Braille machines, 420 talking calculators, 240 Braille writing slates, 462 sign books, seven speech trainers and 700 plastic alphabet sets while the South-East zone made up of Abia, Anambra, Ebonyi, Enugu and Imo states received 20 Braille machines, 300 talking machines, 300 Braille writing slates, 330 sign language books, five search mainers and 500 plastic alphabet sets.

Similarly the oth st zone made up of Adama, Borno, Gombe, Tar an Yobe States got 24 Braile machines, 360 talking calculators, 360 Braille writing slates, 396 sign language books, 6 speech trainers and 600 plastic alphabet sets while the SouthWest zone made up of Ekiti, Lagos, Ogun, Ondo, Osun and Oyo states got 24 Braille machines, 360 talking calculators, 360 Braille machines, 360 talking calculators, 360 braille writing slates, 396 sign language books, 6 speech trainers and 600 plastic alphabet sets.

The North-Central zone which consist of Benue, Kogi, Kwara, Niger, Nasarawa and Plateau including the Federal Capital Territory (FCT), got 28 Braille machines 420 talking calculators, 420 Braille writing slates 462 sign language books, 7 speech trainers and 700 plastic alphabet sets while the South-South zone mane of Akwa-ibom, Bayelsa, Cross River, Delta, Edo and Rivers States received 24 Braille machines, 360 talking calculators, 360 Braille writing slates, 396 sign language books, 6 speech trainers and 600 plastic alphabet sets.

# ETF Approves N3 Billion For Research Fund

In a bid to address the issue of dearth of Research in the country, the Education Trust Fund (ETF), has earmarked the sum of N3 billion to boost the conduct of Research activities in universities and other tertiary institutions across the country.

The Chairman, Board of Trustees, ETF, Dr. Musa Babayo, during an interactive session with stakeholders working on the blueprint for the disbursement of the fund, said, that the money was complementary to other allocations made to tertiary institutions.

This Research fund, he said, which was approved by President Umaru Musa Yar'adua as a special intervention fund to complement ETF's high impact projects in tertiary institutions as isarmed at providing the driving force towards the actualization of the Vision 20:2020. According to him, "The funds are expected to facilitate Research on activities that will impact positively on the competitiveness of the country and build up a capacity of Nigerian Researchers to contribute to the national development efforts as well as tackle global challenges".

It is against this backdrop he said, that the ETF decided to interact with institution managers to produce a policy document that would spell out the administrative

procedures, framework and guidelines for accessing this Research Fund.

Also speaking at the occasion, the Executive

Secretary of the Fund, Prof. Mahmood Yakubu, said the gathering was necessitated by the fact that for any neaningful national development to be achieved in Nigeria, there must be a deliberate policy on ground to stimulate Research activities in our tertiary institutions. The ETF, he continued, has a mandate, to intervene in areas such as work centres and prototype development, and the procurement and maintenance of research equipment, but these cannot translate into better educational system that could produce a world-class manpower needed for national development and global competitiveness, as well as stimulate the realization of the vision 20:2020. Provision of these facilities alone cannot make us succeed in our quest for national development without a substantial commitment to a research", "Serious research, he said requires serious researchers and serious funding", And ETF is ready to support researchers on the quest to break new barriers in the global age of knowledge.


Prof. Yakubu continued that there was no way there would be experts without expertise and specialization without specialists, adding that Professors and expertise all over the world are committed to research that are expected to translate into national development.

The Co-Chairman of the ETF Research Fund, Dr. Emmanuel Denenu, on his part said that the drive towards achieving the vision 20:2020 goals without effective and functional Research was "like building a vehicle without an engine". This brainstorming session, he continued, would afford the nation the opportunity of tackling the problem of research in Nigeria thereby paving the way for her to be in a competitive 21st Century.

# ETF Workshops On Accumulated, Unaccessed Funds Take Off

Technical Workshops on accumulated and unaccessed funds and project implementation in the six geo-political zones of the country as follows: Lagos for the South West Zone, Enugu for south East Zone, Port-Harcourt for South South Zoner, Minna for North Central Zone, Bauchi for North East Zone and Kaduna for North West Zone.

The Executive Secretary, Education Trust Fund, Professor Mahmood Yakubu speaking during the workshops stated that the workshops were organized because some ETF benefiting institutions were yet to access over N23.672 billion intervention fund.

The idea of leaving the funds unaccessed, he said, would

defeat the purpose for which ETF was established. Prof. Yakubu further stated that the interactive workshops provided a forum for key officials driving ETF intervention projects at all levels in the country to assess the level of their institutions' compliance in accessing their outstanding allocations and review the performance of on-going ETF intervention projects.

The Fund, he continued, had in 2008 unveiled a regime of enhanced education tax allocations by more than 100 per cent for all benefiting institutions which is the first of its kind in the 10 years history of the Fund and lamented the seeming lack of seriousness of some beneficiaries to take advantage of this encouraging move.

He said: "While the Fund

has been discharging its obligations to beneficiaries consistently over the years", it is regrettable that, "some of these beneficiaries have not been fully accessing their annual allocations for the purpose of rehabilitation, restoration and consolidation of educational infrastructures facilities, and other learning resources" in their Institutions.

By the first quarter of 200, he continued, the volume of unaccessed funds grew with to a staggering sum of Nal. 672 hi ion, development, which he sa wa unacceptable. This develop at d not go down well with the orn Minister of Education, I Sa Egwu, who immediately pro d a drastic measure initial d by he Education Trust Fund. This there ore informed the publication of the names of beneficiaries with such huge outstanding amount' in the newspaper "with a date-line of 31st December 2009 to utilize or forfeit" their allocations.

While acknowledging that some State Ministries of Education (MOEs) and Universal Basic Education Boards (SUBEBs) had substantially took steps to access their outstanding allocations, the Executive Secretary said some others had outstanding funds running into several millions of naira to pick-up.

Speaking during the interaction, the Director of Operations of the Fund, Mr. Emmanuel Manasa presented a comprehensive list of both performing and non-performing MOEs and SUBEBs, who had two more months to access or forfeit their allocations.

Similar workshops were held with universities, polytechnics and monotechnics to address the same issue.

The Executive Secretary of the Education Tax Fund (ETF), Professor Mahmood Yakubu has said that the ETF does not determine the projects priorities for the institutions that the Fund caters for.

He stated this recently when the United State Agency for International Development (USAID) led by Dr. Sandy Olesky-Ojikutu paid him a working visit in his office recently.



Reacting to the request to partner directly with the USAID the Executive Secretary said that ETF does not partner directly with Non-Governmental Organisations (NGO'S) but added that it could only complement the efforts of such organisations.

He said, "Our laws is right now being amended so that we exit basic and secondary education, we want to exit from the level, so, we will not fund Basic and Secondary education for the simple reason that the ETF was never originally conceived to fund every level of education. It was originally conceived to fund tertiary education. But for the past 11 years, ETF has not had an abandoned project."

On the efforts being made by the ETF to improve learning, he said the organisation has funded the training of over 1600 teachers within the last six months both inside and outside Nigeria.

"Over 207 lecturers are studying abroad, most of them for their doctorate and master's degrees in



various disciplines. We made provision to sponsor the candidates for certain duration of their programmes and make funds available for them so that they will be sure that the resources are there for them until they complete the programme, so nobody comes back on account of lack of funding", he said.

According to him, it was the hope of the management of ETF to be able to add value to what USAID is doing. "We have been speaking with the PTDF to know if we could work together. We may not directly relate with you as you want but help to strengthen your activities with the NCCE which usually is handicapped by funding. They will find us useful in this aspect".

Earlier, the leader of the USAID team, Dr. Sandy Olesky-Ojikutu in her opening remark, briefed the Executive Secretary of the ETF on

efforts of the body in supporting the Education ministry's road map for the development of Nigerian education sector.

As part of its efforts, Ojikutu said that USAID was concentrating on teacher training colleges, noting that some of the colleges were overcrowded with students.

She also said that the USAID was focusing on basic education where programmes like the Northern Education Initiative in Sokoto and Bauchi State would benefit adding that the lessons learnt in the last 8 years in the education sector would be utilised in the new challenges.

Ojikutu said that the USAID was working in concert with two Nigerian Media broadcasting stations including the AIT and NTA to air a programme called Sesame Street Nigeria broadcast which will address the pre-school learning for the next five years.

# ETF Research Fund Submits Report

These six federal Universities are beneficiaries of the special intervention of the Federal Government through the ETF for the pilot phase. The project, according to the Executive Secretary of the Education Trust Fund, Professor Mahmood Yakubu is unique in that ETF is poised to reverse the old trends, whereby equipment worth millions of money were procured and never installed for a lot of factors. These equipment lay waste in many of the Universities because there was no long term planning and research conducted on the capacity of the institutions to sustain the equipment in terms of maintenance and application or usage. According to him, the new regime is to ensure a thorough research and collaboration not only with the institutions, but the manufacturers and vendors of this equipment to ensure what was required for a particular institution were actually procured.

Professor Mahmood Yakubu stated this during the two day workshop organized in Abuja by the Fund on the Review of the Project Proposal of Beneficiaries of the Special Intervention in Tertiary Institutions. In attendance were the representativeness of the beneficiaries, the International Foundation of Science (IFS), the PRISM Consortium, Foreign Experts on Science Equipment Procurement, installation and maintenance, as well as officials and technical staff of ETF.

While giving a brief on the concept and purpose of the ETF Central Research Laboratory, Professor Yakubu said there would be no room for failure and expert advice was therefore paramount if the public funds budgeted for these projects were to be maximally put

have several expectations on the basis of the submission from the institutions; we need international experts, consistent with our vision resolve to build world class facilities. The advice we want on the equipment is to ascertain the relevance or irrelevance of the equipment that these institutions have proposed. We want to establish a harmony between the equipment and the physical infrastructure, right from the on set, to avoid the mistakes of the past, where equipment becomes incongruent with the physical infrastructure housing them".

The second expectation is to get advice from experienced people who have been in the business around the world on how to source these equipment. "We prefer to deal with manufacturers instead of third parties, so that we

know what we are getting. We want to be absolutely sure before we commit public funds".

The third is not just a question of getting the right equipment and where to get them, we must also engage those who provide the equipment to install therein. "If you go round some Universities you will see equipment kept in containers for over a long period of time. We can't afford to do this in this project. There must be synergy between the right equipment we get, the procurement and installation of these equipment". Professor Yakubu further enthused that, these laboratories equipment must be maintained and sustained. There is no point spending a lot of money building a wonderful laboratory if that laboratory won't give maximum result because one expensive component is broken down. We want to make long term commitment to the sustainability of these wonderful machines and edifices that we are going to provide. We need advice on the kind of physical infrastructure that we need to build. We have to build structure that can stand the test of

often. We need advice on capacity building to build the capacity of our technologists, even if it means sourcing them from outside the country.

Professor Yakubu further stated that the ETF engaged the focal institutions chosen for the high impact on a technical session, so as to get their advice on what exactly to provide, what manner of central laboratory they need, what type of programme to upgrade, the type physical infrastructure they want us to provide, or the existing infrastructure they want to rehabilitate. Consequently the institutions submitted their proposals to the ETF and an Inter-Agency Planning Committee was set up for the special intervention, made up of the representatives of the Regulatory Agencies, and the ETF.

With the initial proposals submitted by the institutions, an institute visitation was also necessitated by the need to see these needs as a way of fast tracking these proposals. All the focal institutions according to Professor Yakubu were visited. Thus, "we have a long

list of qu ment and infrastructu when they need to rehabilitate. Javi achieved that, the ETF he said, met with the International Foundation for Science, to discuss the issues of procuring the equipment. Consistent stet our directive and our determination to provide these institutions with world class facilities the Executive Secretary said, we engaged the International Foundation of Science (IFS) so that we can look at the submissions from the institutions and get world class advise on exactly what we need to procure and how we intend to proceed prove the country with the type of facilities need.

Professor Yakubu further said, "there are three major challenges of power, water and gas needed to power these edifices on c o m p l e t i o n, a d e q u a t e arrangements would be made by the Fund to sommount them.

Hopefully, as we scale down our commitment to these institutions, we will assume greater responsibility as we will take on additional institutions. This project is a continuous one which is expected to spread to other tertiary institutions across the country.

# **Executive Secretary ETF Meets With Committee Of Pro-Chancellors**

he Executive Secretary of the Education Trust Fund, Prof. Mahmood Yakubu in a recent briefing session in Abuja informed the Committee of Pro-Chancellors of Federal Universities that the ETF, which intervenes in 311 institutions in Nigeria has a record of not having any uncompleted project since its inception.

The ETF, according to him, has been repositioned in such a manner that it would only fund projects related to core academic areas. ETF would no longer accept situation where its beneficiaries used its interventions for provision of municipal services such as water, light, gates, security fence, etc. Beneficiaries of ETF funding have therefore been asked to reprioritise

their needs in line with the new direction of the Fund.

The Fund in line with its new thinking also sought and obtained approval from the Federal government for it to in good conscience vacate some earlier approvals by the previous Board of Trustees for projects which are not related to core academic activities. By this singular act the Fund was able to save the sum of N18 billion which would be ploughed into other critical areas of need by our institutions of learning.

Furthermore, he said the Fund has set up a stabilisation Fund of N10 billion which it hopes to top up yearly depending on the quantum of the collections in a given year. The Fund is meant to serve as a fall back in the event of dwindling collection of Education tax.

Similarly, the sum of N41.4 billion has been set aside by the Fund for the execution of high impact projects in some selected tertiary. institutions across the country namely; University of Maiduguri, Ahmadu Bello University Zaria, University of Benin, University of Ibadan, University of Unsukka, University of Ilorin. Kaduna Polytechnic, Yaba College of Technology, Akanu Ibiam Federal Polytechnic Uwana, Federal College of Education Kontogora, Federal College of Education (Technical) Omuku, Federal College of Education (Technical) Gombe and Nigerian Defence Academy Kaduna.

The fund, Prof Yakubu continued, would be used to provide Central Zonal Teaching/Research Laboratories in the six focal Universities for Programme upgrades and improvement of Teaching and Learning Environment in all the selected institutions. Each of the Universities he contended, would get N5.5 billion

while each of the Polytechnics and Colleges of Education would get N1.2billion and N1.1billion respectively. The Nigerian Defence Academy will get N1.5billion.

The universities according to Prof Yakubu recorded a 127% increase in their allocations by the Fund in the year 2008. Each of the universities got an allocation of the sum of N127million as intervention from the Fund with the breakdown as follows; N10million for Library Development, N67 for projects and N50million for Academic Staff Training within and outside the country.

The Fund he also said, has set up both a National Research Fund of N3 billion to boost the conduct of Research in Nigeria's tertiary institutions of learning and a Book Development Fund of N2 billion to revive and encourage the production and consumption of academic texts in tertiary institutions in the Country. Finally, Prof Yakubu informed the Committee that the Fund would soon exit the Funding of Basic and Secondary education and concentrate only on tertiary institutions if the Bill seeking to amend the Laws establishing the Fund, which has gone through 2nd reading in both the Senate and House of Representatives is passed.

The Chairman of the Committee Dr. Wale Babalakin thanked Prof. Yakubu for the briefing which he said had shed more light on the allocations from the Fund to their various institutions. Most of the Pro-Chancellors hitherto this briefing, he contended, have been in the dark as regards to the Funds coming from ETF. The committee therefore agreed that the ETF should make available to it all releases to the Universities to enable the Pro-Chancellors monitor utilization.

# ETF Task Poly On Intervention Fund

r. Hafiz Abubakar of the Education Trust Fund (ETF) has declared that the ETF was ready to give out massive intervention funds to the five Federal Polytechnics and Colleges of Education selected from the six geopolitical zones of the country for N9 billion support. He made the statement at the Yusuf Grillo Auditorium in Yaba, Lagos. He added that the institutions were expected to come up with projects that will upgrade their programmes as well as improve their learning facilities and environment. They are also expected to explain how the money will be implemented before the fund could be released to them.

"That is why we came as a team to Yaba College of Technology (YABATECH), one of the selected institutions to look into the projects they plan to undertake" he said.

Abubakar, who was the leader of the team, explained that the agency was not imposing projects on the institutions concerned, rather it is using a participatory approach to make sure that the institutions involved will make judicious use of the fund.

"After the pronouncement made by the president, he asked the ETF to set aside the fund. The fund is already in the coffers of the ETF and the ETF has been mandated to make sure that the fund is well utilized. That is why we have been taking participatory approach. This team will be coming back to look at the proposal and determine the ones that will be carried out. "He said."

Also speaking at the forum, the Rector, YABATECH, Mr. Olubunmi Owoso, who spoke on what the institution intended to do with the N1.79 billion allocated to it, listed eight important areas that needs urgent attention in the college, with emphasis on provision of equipment, laboratories two for each of the science-based schools and one for other (art, design and printing, management and business administration). N100 million will be for the procurement and development of interactive teaching and learning platforms in 100 model lecture rooms in all the departments. Other proposed projects include refurbishment of student hostels (N40m), repairs, renovation of physical structure and fittings in classrooms and laboratories (120m) and construction of a 10-floor building to house the administrative unit, seminar rooms, staff offices, studios and lecture rooms at the cost of N725 million. He showed the

group a multimedia presentation of the proposed building designed by a lecturer in the college adding that such structure was needed considering that the 16.4 hectares the college occupies in the densely populated Yaba metropolis is now too small to comfortably accommodate its 18,000 students and 2000 members of staff.

# N3bn Grant: ETF Prepares Blueprint For Disbursement

he Education Trust Fund (ETF) met with stakeholders recently in Abuja to develop a workable blueprint for the disbursement of the N3billion special intervention fund for research findings in some selected tertiary institutions across the country.

The special fund has been earmarked for disbursement to universities, polytechnics and colleges of education, one from each geopolitical zone, as approved by former President Umaru Yar'Adua with a view to fast tracking the attainment of his vision of making Nigeria one of the largest 20 economies in the world in 2020.

Chairman, Board of Trustees of ETF, Dr. Musa Babayo, during an interactive session with stakeholders on the blueprint document for the disbursement of the fund, said the Fund's aim at building the capacity of researchers in the tertiary institutions, to enable them conduct research findings on the national development efforts of the present administration as well as the current global trends.

He stated that the meeting is geared towards drawing up a policy document that would clearly spell out the administrative procedures for accessing the research fund by the institutions.

He said: "In realization of the critical need for high quality manpower to drive the nation's economy towards the attainment of vision 2020 economic agenda, the federal government approved a special intervention to fund high impact projects on the core activities of tertiary institutions which are teaching, learning and research."

"The effort is to ensure the integration of research efforts to impact positively on the economy towards the realization of the vision 2020.

"The ETF, in order to achieve this goal has set up a research fund of N3billion as a complement to address the paucity of funds to conduct these

# NDApostgraduate School gets N1.3bn

he Education Trust Fund (ETF) said in Kaduna that it would provide N1.3billion towards the improvement of infrastructure at the Post-Graduate School, Nigerian Defence Academy (NDA), Kaduna.

Thiversity administrators last week, met with the management of the Education Trust Fund (ETF) to produce a blueprint on how best the N3 billion research funds for universities, set aside by the Fund could be utilized.

ETF's Chairman, Board of Trustees (BOT) Dr. Musa Babayo, said, at an interactive session, that the money was complementary to other allocations aimed at addressing the paucity of funds for the conduct of research projects in tertiary institutions.

This amount, he said, was approved by President Umaru Musa Yar'Adua as a special intervention fund for high impact projects on core activities of tertiary institutions as a driven force towards actualizing the Vision 20:2020. "The funds are expected to facilitate research on activities that will impact positively on the competitiveness of the country, and build up a capacity of Nigeria researchers to contribute to the national development efforts as well as tackle global challenges" he said.

He said it was against this backdrop that the ETF preferred a wider consultation with institution Leader of ETF Technical Committee, as saying that 16 months deadline had been given for the completion of the project.

It said the project would be executed speedily because money had been approved for its take-off, adding that ETF expected the project to be completed and put to use by December, 2010.

It quoted Abubakar as saying that NDA post graduate school was among the institutions benefiting from ETF funding.

The statement explained

that the oldest universities from each of the six geo-political zones were selected for the board's intervention.

"NDA was chosen because it is the only postgraduate school that has its own campus and does not share its facilities or infrastructure with any other school," the statement said.

It quoted the team leader as saying that similar criteria was used in selecting polytechnics to benefit from ETF funding, adding that while each polytechnic would receive N1. billion, the analysisties we get N1 billion each.

He noted that science and technology innovations played a central role in research and development which the country could not afford to neglect, adding that brainstorming would afford the nation the opportunity of tackling the problems and paving the way for her to be in a competitive 21st century.





# ETF, academics devise strategies to revive book production, reading culture

Nigeria's respected professors, their colleagues from several tertiary institutions across the country, and senior officials of the education sector regulatory bodies, spoke with one voice, last week, against the dearth of locally produced academic textbooks and the prevalence of handouts in the academia.

Brushing protocols aside, with some sounding somewhat prophetic, they declared that constant indulgence in the production of handouts by some teachers across the universities, polytechnics and colleges of education was regrettable, demeaning and should be halted with immediate effect. Instead, they called on all academics to follow the path of honour and do what is expected of them: Produce credible books.

The statement formed part of the robust arguments that dominated an interactive meeting organized by the Education Trust Fund (ETF) in Abuja, for the Technical Advisory Group (TAG) on the Fund's Book Development Intervention Programme. The membership of this group was drawn from regulatory agencies and relevant stakeholders from the tertiary institutions.

According to Dr. Hafiz Abubakar, who chairs the ETF Book Development Committee, the meeting "is a collaboration of brains to chart strategic efforts and guidelines to address the issue of book development in Nigeria". Besides, he said the round table was designed to fine-tune the ETF Book

Development blueprint and generate intervention project types. An implementation and action plan "that will stimulate the advancement of book development programmes" in the country's tertiary institutions, was also expected.

Already, the Federal Government has allocated N2 billion for the initiative for the current year. However, if this allocation is not spent by December 31st, the ETF would be required to return it to the treasury. With this at the back of the participants mids, Abubakar observed that the meeting was expected to generate support and facilitate the resuscitation of journals and production of books in the tertiary institutions.

The assignment of the TAG, according to him, "is to interact, brainstorm and generate a strategic communique and blueprint".

Executive Secretary of the ETF, Prof. Mahmud Yakubu implored the participants to regard their

He observed that the latest initiative, unlike the previous ones, was designed to encourage the production and consumption of internally generated books and journals.

The blueprint prepared by the ETF's experts contains several assumptions. For instance, it declared that book scarcity had approached crisis proportions "which is reflected not only in the



quantity of books available, but also in the quality of locally produced books". It traced the country's book development crisis to the Structural Adjustment Programme (SAP) of the 80s. It noted that the overall underfunding of libraries robbed both lecturers and their students of the opportunity of following developments in their various disciplines. It declared that the very high cost of book production, due to the scarcity of book print as a conquence he near collapse of b ku li and Iwopin paper r ha ade things very so assumed that c ilt. reluctant to write le crs he absence of ise it lives that publishers to take the risk of w not w unsolicited plish manuscripts. Instructively, among the legion of other assumptions, the document also pointed to the growing decline in the absence of reading culture among Nigerians within and outside the school system.

The blueprint listed seven areas for possible intervention. It stated that a lack of indigenous authorship had been noticed and should be corrected. "An indigenous book industry is needed to provide opportunities for the nation's writers, thinkers and artists to express them," it declared.

The document identified the collapsed University Presses as one of the areas begging for attention. It stated: "Publishing houses have a vital role to play as preservers of national literature and heritage. University Press are supposed to facilitate the production of research findings, journals and specialized tertiary textbooks. Unfortunately, many of the Press have been closed down and those that manage to stay

alive have been reduced to publishing school textbooks or materials that have prospects of generating handsome profits."

Besides, the document underscored the shortage of writers and editors, for which a number of workshops, to be anchored by the ETF was proposed. Closely associated with this is the lack of personnel/training for electronic publishing with the blueprint suggesting that some training be organized. Absence of committed stakeholders, lack of funds for new titles and over dependence on foreign books were equally identified as areas needing attention.

After taking in the contents of the blueprint, the meeting established five syndicate groups to consider five themes: Literacy and the promotion of Reading Culture (Group A); Workshops (Group B); Production of Journals (Group C); Revitalizing University Presses (Group D); and Book Publishing (Group E).

After putting their heads together, the groups came up with individual resolutions. Group A identified the paucity of reading materials as being primarily responsible for the poor reading culture in the country. It suggested continual campaign to encourage and nurture the culture among staff and students of tertiary institutions. Those who should constitute the target of such campaigns, according to the group, should be: in school youths, pretertiary education students, lecturers, parents, administrators and policy makers. It also suggested that the campaign be waged through the mass media, interpersonal communication, drama, town hall meetings, exhibition, focus groups, advocacy visits and reading competitions.

Group B suggested two

categories of workshops: interactive- for literary writers, professional and academic associations and capacity building workshops for writers.

Group C recommended that the ETF identifies professional journals in the country with the help of professional bodies and provide funds for such. To revive the University press, Group D suggested that state of the art equipment be purchased and installed; requisite skill for printing and publishing of academic text be developed and contemporary marketing strategies within and outside the country be acquired amongst others. But it also advised that such interventions should be phased.

Group E suggested that National Editorial Committees be set up in 10 broad areas: Medicine and Pharmacy; Engineering and Technology; Arts and Humanities; Social Sciences; Education. Others include: Agriculture; Physical Sciences; Life Sciences; Law and Veterinary Medicine. The textbooks to be produced should be useable in tertiary institutions. The mandate of the committees, according to the group, should cover survey for available materials across the institution in the respective area; needs assessment and identification of gaps; means of filling such gaps; peer review and assessment of manuscripts; and identification of foreign textbooks that are critical to the core areas for local adaptation.

Members of the TAG were also informed that they would be called upon regularly until the objectives of the intervention are completed.

Pro or Oladipo gave this in ress release made a blet day Tribune.

Old stressed further, "2007 eral Education Task Force Projection meant for the state have been duly mobilized and distributed to various contractors by the Osun State government, but they have refused to complete and deliver the projects in good time."

"Although, the 2007 ETF projects have been awarded prior to my appointment as the chairman of this board, if the projects are not delivered, we cannot retrieve the 2008 ETF fund from the Federal Government."

The release stated further that the contractors concerned have been given up till October 16, 2009 to deliver the jobs, while failure to do so would be considered "as an act of sabotaging the effort of the state government in providing a befitting educational environment for our children."

The Chairman disclosed further that the 2007 ETF Projects cost over N240 million, which was paid as grant by the Federal Government to the State Universal Basic Education Board, while the first and second tranche have been duly paid to the contractors.

On the recruitment of

teachers for the primary schools in the state, Oladipo said: "The state government has approved the employment of teachers to the primary schools and we will choose the best from each local government. We have to go for a competent and recognized consultant that will handle the

recruitment exercise in which two criteria, examination and geographical spread would be used".

# ETF projects: Cross River gives Contractors deadline

he Cross River State Government has given contractors handling Education Trust Fund (ETF) projects in the state till the end of this month to complete the jobs or be sanctioned.

The Commissioner of Education, Prof. Offiong Offiong, told the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) in Calabar recently that the contractors might also be prosecuted if they fail to deliver the projects.

He said that 12 projects were expected to be handed over to the government. "The delay in completing the jobs has made it impossible for the state to draw fresh funds from the ETF", he said.

"One of the major conditions for new funds from the ETF is for you to complete ongoing projects". Although the Commissioner did not disclose the value of the contracts, he said that two of them were direct jobs for the Ministry of Education while 10 others were for the State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB).

On the inability to draw about N3 billion from the Universal Basic Education Board (UBE), he regretted that the state had not met the conditions that would enable it to access the funds. He said the state had paid its counterpart funding for the scheme up to 2008, "but we still have the challenge of capacity building in terms of personnel at the SUBEB and it one basic condition that must be met".

Offiong, who expressed sadness over the issue, said: "This means a lot to us because some funds are lying out there to our credit but we cannot access them due to our own drawbacks".

"Before we can access the funds, we have to prove that we have capable and well-trained personnel at our SUBEB to handle the programme". He said the funds being held at the UBE Commission headquarters in Abuja were for 2007, 2008 and 2009.


He, however, stated that efforts were on to ensure that the issues were sorted out before the end of this year. "By next week, we will begin to award contracts for 2007. When we finish that, we will process 2008 and part of 2009," the Commissioner said.

"The contracts would be for training of teachers, procurement of textbooks and instructional materials, procurement of desks and teachers' tables and renovation of classrooms".

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




