STATE GOVERNORS' BOLD MEASURES TO CURB INSECURITY

Mainstreaming Security...

Scorched by widespread insecurity negatively impacting both governance and the foundational structures of growth, state governors are speaking out and acting up to change the regressive narrative.

In different specific actions and action plans, the subnational leaders are synergising and actualising measures to curb kidnap-for-ransom, terrorism, banditry, insurgency, ritual killings and others by resolute non-state actors.

From stepping up partnership with federal security agencies, birthing state vigilante groups to pitching for state police, the fight against insecurity has become significantly mainstreamed in development discourse in the subnational space.

Across the states, the same concerns are being confronted. As Governor Dauda Lawal of Zamfara set up a 2,645-strong Community Protection Guards (CPG or Askarawa Zamfara), Governor of Gombe State, Muhammadu Inuwa Yahaya, also Chairman of the Northern States Governors' Forum (NSGF), has put forward a fresh strategy targeting insecurity in the region tagged "4D."

Governor Uba Sani, Kaduna; Governor Abba Yusuf, Kano; Governor Lucky Aiyedatiwa, Ondo; Governor Peter Mbah, Enugu; Governor Bala Mohammed, Bauchi; Governor Caleb Mutfwang, Plateau; and many others are keying in. Our cover story captures this critical ferment.

Governor AbdulRahman AbdulRazaq, also Chairman of the Nigeria Governors' Forum, NGF, recently strongly condemned the killing of a traditional ruler in Kwara State, Peter Aremu, the Onikoro of Koro-Ekiti, by kidnappers, as "reckless, shocking, and abominable."



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UNICEF EMPOWERS 285,000



285,000 beneficiaries in Borno and Yobe states. The initiative is thanks to funding from the Partnership for Learning for All in Nigeria project by the Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development Office, in collaboration with Education Cannot

The beneficiaries include 270,500 children aged 6 to 17 years, comprising 45% boys and 55% girls, along with 7,200 educators and facilitators, 1,035 government officials, and 2,235 school and center-based management committee members.

Speaking to journalist during a field mission to UNICEF-supported schools in Jere and Maiduguri metropolis to commemorate International Education Day, Mr. Ian Attfield, the Senior Education Adviser at the British High Commission, said that the four-year programme aims to enhance access to safe, inclusive, and high-quality learning, particularly focusing on children affected by conflict, especially girls and those with disabilities.

Attfield noted that the Partnership for Learning for All in Nigeria, an Education Emergency Program (PLANE-EIE), is a four-year £16 million grant initiative initiated in December 2021, expected to conclude in December

He added that it is being implemented in Borno and Yobe states, with UNICEF as the consortium lead $\,$ alongside Plan International as a consortium partner.



The programme is in its third year of implementation, contributing significantly to the education sector's recovery in conflict affected areas

The implementation areas include Maiduguri, Jere, and Konduga local government areas in Borno State, as well as Damaturu, Nguru, and Potiskum local government areas in Yobe

"The programme is in its third year of implementation, contributing significantly to the education sector's recovery in conflict affected areas. This initiative underscores a comprehensive approach to addressing the educational challenges posed by conflict, specifically emphasising inclusivity and quality learning for vulnerable children," Mr Attfield said.

UNICEF Education Officer in Maiduguri, Mustapha Shehu,

said that the funders visited schools to inspect their investments, adding that Plan International supported teachers' training in

Shehu explained that Plan International supported 140 schools, provided them with learning materials, and conducted training for teachers on Kanuri arithmetic and reading intervention.

"Teachers received Teaching at the Right Time training, were trained on components such as psychosocial support, safe school declaration, and operationalization.

"The schools were also equipped with wash facilities, including boreholes. The team from \overrightarrow{FCDO} is here for the annual review and assessment of interests with partners to see the teaching and learning and what they have invested in Borno State," said Shehu.





States partner FG to build additional 9,300 PHCs in 4 Years



he State governments, in collaboration with Federal government and development partners, have unveiled plans to build additional 9,300 Primary Healthcare Centres (PHCs) over the next four years.

This initiative aimed at increasing PHCs from 8,300 to 17, 600 nationwide and will be complemented with the training of 120,000 Frontline Health Workers, expected to be flagged off soon as part of the Renewed Hope Agenda of President Bola Ahmed Tinubu.

Coordinating minister for Health and Social Welfare, Prof Ali Pate disclosed this in his Keynote Address at the 2-day Meeting of North East Forum of Honourable Commissioners of Health in Maiduguri.

Pate, who was represented by the Executive Director of National Primary Healthcare Development Agency (NPHCDA), Dr Muyi Aina, said the three pronged strategic approach adopted by the Agency include Institutional Strengthening and effective coordination of all Primary Healthcare services, efficient, equitable, quality and trust worthy services, and strong collaboration

The North East like much of Nigeria, he regretted, still has unacceptably poor health indicies which calls for strong collaboration rather than fragmentation of efforts at national and Subnational levels.

The minister said" the Nigerian Health Sector Renewal Investment Programme which encapsulates our strategic vision for the sector" was geared towards cohesive common goal to save lives, reduce both physical and financial pains and produce health for all Nigerians."

In his opening remarks, the executive governor of Borno state, Prof Baba Gana Umara Zulum called on the World Health Organisation (WHO) to fulfill its promises to state as regards enhanced TB reduction and management, provision of DNA Machines for Gender Based Violence management, construction of hospitals in Biu and Munguno LGAs.

of high maternal and child mortality in the state, Governor Buni constructed the ambitious 375-bed capacity Maternity and Child care health complex which is unarguably Nigeria's largest maternity and child care clinic.

The structure is made up of seven blocks of one-storey complex with patient-friendly spaces in accordance with the global best practice in modern maternal, Newborn and Paediatric health care as obtained in advanced countries. The architectural masterpiece would satisfactorily take care of expectant/nursing mothers, their newborn babies as well as children in general.

The Obstetrics and Gynaecology wing of the Complex has 64 Open cubicles, five call duty rooms, five satellite pharmacies, one side laboratory and four Nurses' stations. The Special Baby Care Unit (SCBU) has three adjoining generously spacious and nicely done wards that is 28 baby cots wards for newborn babies suspected of sepsis, 10 newborn cots wards for out-born babies, and 10 newborn baby cots wards for In-born babies, four Nurses' stations, 10-bedspace room/unit for their nursing mothers.

In addition, there is a 10-bed space room for nursing mothers to breastfeed their newborn babies, five Doctor's rest/Call duty rooms, five nurses' rest/change rooms, five offices for the unit Matron in charge, four additional offices for health information management/ documentation, seminar room, a library, Kitchen and stores.

The Labour ward and obstetrics theatre units have four operation suites (including attached sterilization and scrubbing area, six recovery rooms, additional offices for anaesthetics perioperative nurses, other theatre support staff, male and female change rooms, common room for staff on duty, seminar and computer rooms.

The Paediatric medical ward has 40 cubicles, four call rooms, four side labs and a satellite Pharmacy.

Similarly, the Emergency Paediatrics Unit has 32 bed space cubicles (including a resuscitation cubicle), 2 doctor's call duty room, a side laboratory, nurses' station, change room, satellite pharmacy and eight staff offices.

UN commends efforts

In line with Governor Buni's policy of providing standard and functional health facilities at all levels, state-of-the-art equipment are installed at the centre to provide the necessary healthcare services to mother and child, to curb the menace of maternal and child mortality in the state.

Commissioning the complex in January 2023, former President Muhammadu Buhari, said the complex can provide maternity and

child care services to all the states in the North Eastern Sub-region. This position was further corroborated by the United Nations Resident Representative in Nigeria, Mohamed Yahya, who led a high-powered delegation to the state recently.

The Bill and Melinda recognition

The State Contributory Healthcare Scheme, established four years ago, has provided effective and efficient healthcare Impressed with the programme, the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation awarded a prize of N30 Million to Yobe state government for being the best performing state in the Northeast sub-region. The award provided YOCHMA with an opportunity to enrol civil servants and vulnerable persons into the programme to have access to effective and efficient medical services.

The state-of-the-art machines upgraded at the State-owned Teaching Hospital have continued to attract patients from neighbouring and far states on medical tourism to Yobe State as confessed by Malam Adamu, a retired Permanent Secretary in

Adamus's son was referred to Egypt for surgery but was advised by his neighbour to go to Yobe State which he heeded, and had a successful surgery at a cost far less than the cost of the flight ticket from Nigeria to Egypt.

Similarly, Yobe state government has distinguished itself as next to none with an exemplary record of free dialysis treatment for kidney patients in the state. This has attracted patients from other parts of the country, enjoying the free dialysis treatment.

The government provided 80 customised tricycle ambulances to health facilities in areas with difficult terrain to convey expectant mothers and sick persons to the headrest health centres.

Further to this, the administration returned the Yobe State Emergency Medical Ambulance Service and Yobe State Healthcare and Health-Related Facilities Inspection and Monitoring Agency. This move is to enhance service delivery in matters relating to domestic and road traffic accidents, and monitoring of healthcare facilities to provide the best standard practice.

Besides, the initiative provides the opportunity for first aid treatment to victims from the scene of accidents before reaching medical facilities while the Health Facility Inspection and Monitoring Agency empowers health authorities to ensure healthcare delivery is not compromised at any level in the state.

The foreign dimension

Last year, Governor Buni took the fight against kidney disease to the United Kingdom to partner with reputable Research institutes with renowned researchers, to establish the causative agents of kidney disease on the banks of River Yobe.

The governor, in a meeting with renowned epidemiologists, said the state lost many people living on the banks of River Yobe to kidney failure, and many more, now patients of the disease.

"The figure of people dying and others as patients is very worrisome and that calls for quick action to save the communities. I am equally worried that a large number of the productive population are getting more affected.

I am optimistic that you would partner with us to find a solution to the disease to save our people and others in the neighbouring states also lined up along the banks of the river" the governor had said.

Speaking at a meeting with the governor, Neil Peace, the internationally celebrated Professor of Epidemiology at the London School of Hygiene, had said the data generated would be used to establish the causative agents which would push for finding a solution.

Also at another meeting, Ben Caplin, a Professor of Nephrology at the University College London, who specializes in populationbased clinical and laboratory studies said, it is important to establish the causes of the disease.

He commended Buni for his interest in finding a solution to this problem facing the communities.

"The only solution to this problem is to find out the possible causes and mitigate the causes as a solution to the disease to save this population and indeed the future generation," Ben had said.

Malaria continues to be a significant public health challenge in Nigeria, with millions of cases reported annually. It is an acute fever illness caused by Plasmodium parasites, which are spread to people through the bites of infected female Anopheles mosquitoes. Though it can be a cause of death, it is preventable and curable.

espite various efforts to combat the disease, including the distribution of insecticide-treated bed nets and the administration of antimalarial drugs, Nigeria still grapples with high morbidity and mortality rates related to malaria.

One critical factor in effectively tackling this disease is the presence of strong political will and sustained commitment from government authorities, policymakers,

This strategy serves as a technical guide for achieving the corresponding Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Alarmingly, the deceleration in the reduction of malaria incidence and mortality has been evident since 2015, with numerous countries worldwide reporting spikes in cases.

Notably, between 2016 and 2017, all 10 African countries, including Nigeria with the highest malaria burden experienced an increase in cases.

This trend raises significant concerns, necessitating

immediate action to realign the response efforts.

However, on Friday, Jan. 12, 2024, the World Health Organisation (WHO) certified Cape Verde as being malaria-free, hailing it as a significant milestone in the fight against the disease.

Cape Verde, an archipelago of 10 islands in the central Atlantic Ocean, faced severe epidemics in densely populated areas before it implemented targeted interventions.

Tt gives us hope that with existing tools, as well as new ones including vaccines, we can dare to dream of a malaria-free world," WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said in a statement.

Worldwide, some 43 countries have been certified malaria-free by the WHO, which requires showing that the domestic chain of transmission has been broken for at least three consecutive years.

According to Severe Malaria Observatory, Statistics and Facts of Malaria in Nigeria, malaria is a pervasive health issue in the country, affecting 97 per cent of the population.

It says the predominant malaria species was Plasmodium falciparum, transmitted by Anopheles mosquitoes. In 2021, the country reported the highest global malaria cases and deaths.

It says efforts to combat malaria include the High Burden High Impact approach, the 2021-2025 National Malaria Strategic Plan, and securing \$364 million from multilateral banks. Severe malaria treatment shifted to injectable artesunate.

It also notes that malaria in pregnancy faces challenges in sulfadoxinepyrimethamine uptake, slightly decreased insecticide-treated net ownership, as well as seasonal malaria chemoprevention in the Sahel region aimed to cover 35 million children.

It highlights the healthcare sector and efforts on malaria control, elimination and prevention.

"Healthcare tiers range from federal to local levels.

"The public health care system covers tertiary, secondary, and primary care. Nigeria receives funding from various sources for malaria control, with Seasonal malaria chemoprevention (SMC), programmes implemented in specific states.

"Populations with low access to treatment include those in North Eastern Nigeria due to insurgencies, rural communities, and nomadic

Meanwhile, the WHO regional director for Africa, Dr Moeti Moshido, commends Nigeria at the launch of the 2022 Nigeria Malaria Report in Abuja for a significant 55 per cent reduction in malaria deaths, from 2.1 to 0.9 per

cent of global malaria cases, progress has been made, with a 26 per cent decline in malaria incidence since 2000.

"The Report on Malaria in Nigeria 2022 is an excellent model from which to use data to prioritize health interventions.

"Using data, we can prioritize and target interventions, optimize the allocation of resources and facilitate the monitoring of performance at federal and state levels.

"This report is a result of the collaboration between the Nigeria Malaria Elimination Programme, the WHO Regional Office for Africa, and the Global Malaria Programme," she says.

She emphasizes the importance of maintaining essential health services, particularly in populations affected by humanitarian emergencies. Environmental factors like climate change and certain practices may increase transmission.

To also show the will to eliminate malaria, efforts by the federal government to eliminate malaria are emphasized in the 2024 budget where there is an allocation of N57.392 billion without details.

This sum of money is for a new project titled "Immunization plus and malaria progress by accelerating coverage and transforming services (impact) – immunization (multilateral/bilateral project tied loan)."

Considering the huge sum of N57.392 billion, experts say a breakdown of the amount should have been provided.

"It would have been better if a little more detail were provided.

"There is a need for the country to foster a multi-sectoral approach, to build and sustain the political will to eliminate malaria within its borders," they say.

Proffering some ways forward, Mr Odinaka Kingsley Obeta, a Biomedical Scientist and Executive Director of Block Malaria Africa, stresses the need for sustained political commitment in the country's fight against malaria, citing Algeria's success after over 20 years of dedication.

He also emphasizes the need for increased youth engagement in the fight against malaria considering that youths make up over 60-70 per cent of the Nigerian population.

According to him, this strategy has already been adopted in Kenya, Zambia, Eswatini, and several countries in Africa with outstanding contributions already being made by young people in these countries towards achieving zero malaria.

Obeta says some factors impede efforts at eliminating malaria of which some are the evolving challenges, including antimalarial drug resistance, fake antimalarials, and new threats such as climate change and the emergence and spread of Anopheles stephensi across

He criticizes the country's inconsistency in commitment, noting a decline in external funding due to insufficient domestic

He highlights the country's limited involvement in the clinical trials and production process of the recently approved malaria vaccines, expressing concern about the nation's seriousness in tackling the global burden of the disease despite being a highburden country.

"The low funding support for the Nigeria National Malaria Elimination Programme raises questions about the government's commitment to malaria eradication," he says.

Prof. Oyewale Tomori, a Virologist, advocates that the country studies the successful malaria eradication strategies of countries like Cape Verde.

Tomori says the a need for a multifaceted approach involving reliable laboratory diagnosis, street-wise diagnosis, therapeutics, mosquito control, environmental sanitation, and vaccination.

He underscores the importance of coordinated efforts from individuals and governments, stating that both play crucial roles in ending malaria.

He calls for proper education to define specific responsibilities for all stakeholders, rejecting the idea that the government alone can achieve sustained malaria eradication. Instead, he emphasizes collective responsibility to address the malaria challenge.

Prof. Olugbenga Mokuolu, a Professor of Paediatrics at the University of Ilorin and Ilorin Teaching Hospital, Kwara, also says multifaceted approaches are needed to achieve the fight to end malaria.

"Nigeria is progressing steadily, but the malaria situation varies among countries, making comparisons challenging.

"To strengthen our gains, we must enhance intervention coverage, target them effectively, and pursue malaria vaccine access.

 $\hbox{``Insecticide resistance prompts the procurement'}\\$ of costlier nets, while deploying additional strategies like Indoor Residual Spray and Larva source management is crucial, especially in high-burden states," he says.

Mokuolu, who is also the former National Malaria Technical Director, says uptake of the malaria vaccine and ensuring continuous improvement in data quality are essential measures the country could use.

Meanwhile, Dr Charles Ugwuanyi, a Consultant Neurosurgeon and NMA-FCT, emphasizes the importance of developing and executing comprehensive public awareness campaigns in the country to educate citizens on malaria's devastating effects.

Ugwuanyi urges political leaders to publicly commit to ending malaria, allocating resources to maintain momentum and political will.

"Collaborating with civil society organizations, advocacy groups, and international partners can mobilize support and resources for malaria control.

"Establishing transparent monitoring and evaluation systems ensures accountability and effective resource utilization in the fight against malaria.

"Engaging local communities is crucial for grassroots support, sustaining political will through collective action, and advocating for improved access to prevention and treatment services.


"Supporting research and innovation in malaria control demonstrates the value of ongoing investment, providing evidence for policymakers to prioritize these efforts," he says.

He also recommends that the government establish dedicated funds and sustainable financing mechanisms for malaria control programs to ensure continuous support and resources.





Encouraging active state participation in Discos, administrative unbundling, and rural electrification, the Minister outlined additional collaborative measures. States were urged to assist in reducing ATC & Closses, appeal for right of way for transmission projects, and attract generation investments, emphasizing embedded generation and solar home systems.

Regarding the Implementation Plan, development is set to commence within a year, with draft policies expected in the second half of the year. The Minister announced further discussions on his visits to states.

The Chairman of NERC provided additional insights, urging states to submit schedules of projects and expedite regulatory valuation submissions. The National Council on Privatization (NCP) was tasked with formalizing and addressing equity issues.

Expressing concern about states' suspicion and fear, NERC emphasized a smooth transition, and an order for the unbundling of existing DISCOs was proposed. Collaboration with the Senate for the amendment of the Electricity Act to review multiple levies was also highlighted.

The Director of Rural Electrification stressed the importance of studying the Rural Electrification and Strategy Implementation Plan, highlighting its guidelines for state participation. The REA's Central Data Management System, mapping proposed projects, was emphasized. On the issue of Right of Way, states were urged to abolish intermediaries and work directly with the REA.

In conclusion, the meeting exemplified a collaborative effort between the NGF and the Minister of Power, addressing challenges and paving the way for a more effective and inclusive power sector transition.

Oyo Governor Reiterates Call for State Police

overnor Seyi Makinde of Oyo State has, again, called for the establishment of state police, noting that it has become imperative to surmount the insecurity challenges facing different parts of the country.

The governor, who maintained that the refusal of the Federal Government to approve South-West Governors' demand to establish state police a few years ago led to the establishment of the Western Nigeria Security Network Agency codenamed Amotekun, said it is important for the Federal Government to revisit the matter.

Makinde stated this when he received the Conference of Speakers of State Legislators, South-West Chapter, led by its chairman and Speaker of Ekiti State House of Assembly, Rt. Hon. Adeoye Aribasove

The speakers paid a courtesy visit to the governor in his office in Ibadan, where he appreciated them for their condolences and words of support over the January 16 explosion in Bodija, Ibadan.

The governor maintained that there is a need for collaboration and cooperation between the executive arm of government and the legislators to deliver dividends of democracy and bring development to the people.

He said, "I want to observe that you need to all come together irrespective of the political party that brought you into office. This is a demonstration that the electioneering period is over and you need to have everybody pulling together to govern and deliver dividends of democracy to our people."

While speaking on the security challenges in the country, Governor Makinde maintained that the establishment of state police is an idea whose time has come and that the fears in some quarters that states would not be able to maintain state police are unfounded.

He cited the example of Oyo State where the payment of salaries and pensions has never been an issue despite the economic challenges in the country.

Makinde said, "A lot of people may not know that before we launched Amotekun in this state, some of us governors went to the Federal Government and we asked to be allowed to set up state police for our various states but we did not get that approval during the time of President Muhammadu Buhari.

"I disagreed at that particular time and still

disagree to date that the states are not in the position to maintain state police. I have never seen where the Federal Government went to a particular state and gave the police everything they needed. So, the states are already maintaining the police."

Makinde said the police are on the exclusive list, but if that responsibility is split and states have to run their police system, they should have access to resources from the federation account to meet the responsibility of maintaining the police.

"So, the issue of being unable to maintain state police will not arise

again. Give us the responsibility first and see if certain states will be able to maintain it or not.

"But since we could not get state police, we settled for Amotekun. All the state assemblies in the South West passed a common law for its establishment. So, we have to be pushing for state police, and you lawmakers have a role to play to make that a reality."

The Chairman of the Conference of Speakers of State Legislators, South-West, Rt. Hon. Aribasoye, in his remarks, described Makinde as a dynamic governor, while he also lauded his efforts in re-engineering the state through various developmental projects.

He commended the governor for his proactiveness and prompt response to the unfortunate incident at Bodija. He also expressed confidence that there would be continuous support and harmonious relationships between the legislative and the executive arms of government for better governance.

Significantly hobbled by a central-command constitutional architecture, unprecedented insecurity ravages the subnational space, pegging back meaningful governance but state governors are boldly speaking out and acting up on the way forward. LOUIS ACHI writes

Then the state is overrun by kidnappers, ritualists, bandits and terrorists, the foundational structures of growth will begin to collapse. School-age children will not be able to attend school.

Farmers cannot go to farms amidst escalating hunger and food inflation. Peoples' movement within the states will be restricted out of fear and people in business cannot honour engagements. In the circumstances, poverty will quadruple and it is only a matter of time before the economy completely crumbles.

Worse, folks would then be forced to resort to self-help and anarchy ensues. It is against this backdrop that new innovative approaches being evolved by state governors can be best appreciated.

At the tail end of January, a besieged Zamfara State seized the insecurity bull by the horns and launched its own security outfit. A determined Governor Dauda Lawal firmly stepped up his administration's war on insecurity in that bloodied subnational jurisdiction by formally unveiling the 2,645-strong Community Protection Guards (CPG or Askarawa Zamfara), designed to complement the efforts of the regular security forces.

Significantly, the ceremony at the Trade Fair complex in Gusau, the state capital, attracted the six other governors from the embattled North-West region of Jigawa, Kebbi, Kaduna, Kano, Katsina and Sokoto.

The government is utilising a multi-faceted and multidimensional approach to addressing security challenges in the state, the governor's spokesperson Sulaiman Bala Idris noted. "Last year, Governor Dauda Lawal approved the engagement of 5,200 guards across the 14 Local Government Areas. Today (January 31), 2,645 Community Protection Guards graduated in the first batch," Bala added.

According to Governor Dauda Lawal at the graduation ceremony of CPG, "My administration embarked on the arduous task with a commitment to gradual reforms across all sectors of state's economy, to instil sanity and accelerate development.

"While we make these efforts, the lofty goals we set out to achieve will remain a mirage as long as the formidable challenge of insecurity remains unaddressed. This informed our decision to, among other things, establish the Community Protection Guards, known as Askarawa Zamfara.

"The steering committee for establishing the Community Protection Guards traversed the 14 Local Government Areas and screened eligible volunteers for enrolment into the outfit. We believe that the bulk of the challenges we face as a state and region are borne out of severe neglect in advancing public policy to serve the socio-economic expectations of our people.

"Today, therefore, the first batch of the Community Protection Guards, 2,645, are graduating. These young, energetic and vibrant personnel have undergone rigorous training, extensive drilling, and an understanding of the rules of engagement, amongst other skills.

"These w i 1 1 assist them in the due discharge of their responsibility of partnering, assisting and working with the security agencies to defend our The Katsina State Governor, Dr. Dikko Radda, chairman of the North-West Governors' Forum, NWGF, who attended the event firmly re-affirmed NWGF's decision not to engage in negotiations with bandits. According to Radda, "we have gathered here today with a common purpose: to unite against banditry and insecurity in the North-West." This bloodletting was immediately followed by a series of successful kidnap cases in Abuja, the Federal Capital Territory. This January 2024 alone, cases of kidnappings escalated, raising concern among citizens and residents.

Meanwhile, in Ondo State, to secure release of the six recently kidnapped schoolchildren, three teachers and their driver, the state security outfit, codenamed, Amotekun, deployed 100 of its personnel to Ekiti

According to Ondo State Amotekun Commander, Chief Adetunji Adeleye, "Governor Lucky Aiyedatiwa has ordered that we deploy Amotekun personnel to work with their counterparts in Ekiti to secure the release of the pupils and arrest killers of the monarchs.

"Some days ago, we had an unfortunate incident in Ekiti and the governor of Ondo State directed us to move in the interest of brotherliness to assist in the security situation in Ekiti State. We deployed 100

in the South-West is the establishment of state police.

2024 NATIONAL BUDGET: Weighing the Agricultural Sector



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he realignment of the national budget to January every year was a historic move by former President Muhammadu Buhari. The present regime of His Excellency, President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, has equally towed the same line.

The 2024 National Budget was presented to the National Assembly, early December.

The total amount budgeted for 2024 is N27.50trillion, out of which the South-West got N4.20trillion, South-South got N3.43trillion, North-West got N2.50trillion, South East N2.29trillion, North-Central N1.89trillion and the North-East N1.60trillion.

The agricultural sector was allocated N362.94 billion out of the N27.50trillion. With a national emergency on food security, and the change of nomenclature of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development to Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security, there was great joy and highly positive optimism that the lingering food insecurity will be a thing of the past.

The Malabo Declaration of which Nigeria is a signatory clearly stated that "All nations must commit 10% of their annual budget to the agricultural sector in order to boost food security".

The figure allocated to the nation's agricultural sector in the 2024 National Budget is far less than the commitment of the Malabo Declaration.

Similarly, with an all-time high food inflation rate at 31.5%, according to the NBS, and the lingering security challenges in the core food basket states, the hope to end food insecurity in Nigeria

has been dimmed.

The previous challenges of poor extension services delivery, lack of high yielding qualitative hybrid seeds, high cost of fertilizers, lack of functional tractors and other agricultural equipment in most states, the never ending farmers/pastoralists crisis, high post-harvest loses, lack of infrastructure for effective storage, marketing and transportation, and of course, kidnapping, maiming and killing of farmers on their farms are all very much around.

Navigating through such a myriad of perennial crises will be a very daunting task to the brand new Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security.

However, the year 2024 holds plenty of promise for the agricultural sector, as luckily the subsistence farmers will still be eking out a living on their small farm hectares with archaic and rudimentary tools.

The promise of the federal government in revamping the River Basin Development Authorities for dry season irrigation farming will certainly increase the total tonnage of food per year, if properly implemented and executed.

Cut to the bone, the imperative of prioritising agricultural production is not merely feel-good wish but a fundamental necessity for civilised survival.

The governor who lauded the German government, the UK government, and the UNDP for supporting the state government's initiative assured that government of Borno State will not relent in providing necessities to its people.


He equally lauded the federal government for its commitment to addressing the security challenges faced in Borno State.

NGSF, UNICEF PARTNERS TO END FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION IN NIGERIA

he First Lady of Kwara state and chairperson of Nigeria Governors Spouses Forum led other first ladies in a virtual meeting with UNICEF aimed at addressing the scourge of female genital mutilation in Nigeria.

The highlight of the webinar was the presentation of the theme to commemorate the 2024 United Nations International Day of Zero Tolerance for female genital mutilation. In attendance were first ladies across the 36 states of Nigeria.

Ambassador Abdulrazaq in her address highlighted the commitment of the NGSF to addressing the key components of Female Genital Mutilation, Early Marriage, sexual and gender-based violence as well as birth registration which underscores the collective dedication towards ensuring the well-being and protection of women and children in their respective states.

Speaking further, the chairperson commended UNICEF for their unwavering support and guidance in achieving zero tolerance on Female Genital Mutilation as we approach the remaining seven years in the decade of action.

The UNICEF team led by Ms. Cristian in her presentation rolled out six areas of partnership compact which include the following;

Strengthening the enforcement of existing legislative and policy frameworks as well as additional interventions such as sensitization and locally appropriate accountability mechanism;

Advocating for scale-up in providing services in all states birth registration, prevention, and service delivery to address GBV and harmful practices;

Mobilizing local communities, and traditional and religious leaders to address negative social norms and foster movement building around the elimination of FGM, child marriage, and gender equality;

Strengthening partnership and capacity of women and girls to excersice their rights and mobilize as social change actors;

Invest in and use data and evidence to inform policy, programming and advocacy;

Advocating and mobilizing both public and private financial resources to address GBV and harmful practices.



rs. Mary-Maudline Nwifuru, the Wife of the Governor of Ebonyi State, has initiated a free Cervical Cancer Screening program benefiting 1,000 women within the state.

The launch took place during the inauguration of the Cervical Cancer Awareness Programme at Elinwovu General Hospital in Abakaliki Local Government Area (LGA).

Aligned with the objectives of the Nwifuru pet project, Better Health for Rural Women, Children, and Internally Displaced (BERWO) Foundation, the program was organized in collaboration with the Medical Women Association (MWA) and the Alex Ekwueme Federal University Teaching Hospital, Abakaliki (AE-FUTHA).

The theme for the 2024 Cervical Cancer Awareness Month is "Ending Cervical Cancer within a few Generations, with the Goal of raising Cervical Cancer and Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) Vaccination Awareness," with a focus on saving the lives of women.

Mrs. Nwifuru emphasized the prevalence of cervical cancer among women and underscored the importance of education, early detection, and proactive health measures in combating the disease.

She called upon medical practitioners, stakeholders, and traditional rulers to commit more to educating, advocating, and supporting women's health for preventive measures.

In her remarks, Mrs. Lilian Nwobashi, President of the Medical Women Association, highlighted that the program aimed to raise awareness about the dangers of cervical cancer, a leading cause of death in women.

The screening would initially target 200 to 300 women, with a collaborative effort from all partners involved.

Mr. Moses Ekuma, the Ebonyi Commissioner for Health, and Mr. Sunday Nwogba, Chairman of Abakaliki LGA, acknowledged the global prevalence of cervical cancer and urged women to take advantage of the opportunity for screenin

Mrs. Nkechi Echiegu, the Team Leader of BERWO, expressed concern over the increasing cases of cervical cancer and emphasized the need for proactive intervention.

She mentioned that Mrs. Nwifuru's office and MWA had joined forces to screen women for cervical cancer, providing health talks on general cancer issues along with other related health concerns.

The initiative targeted women from all 13 LGAs of the state within the reproductive age range of 25 to 65 years.
