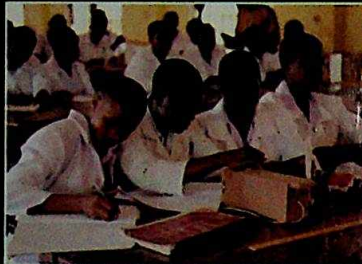
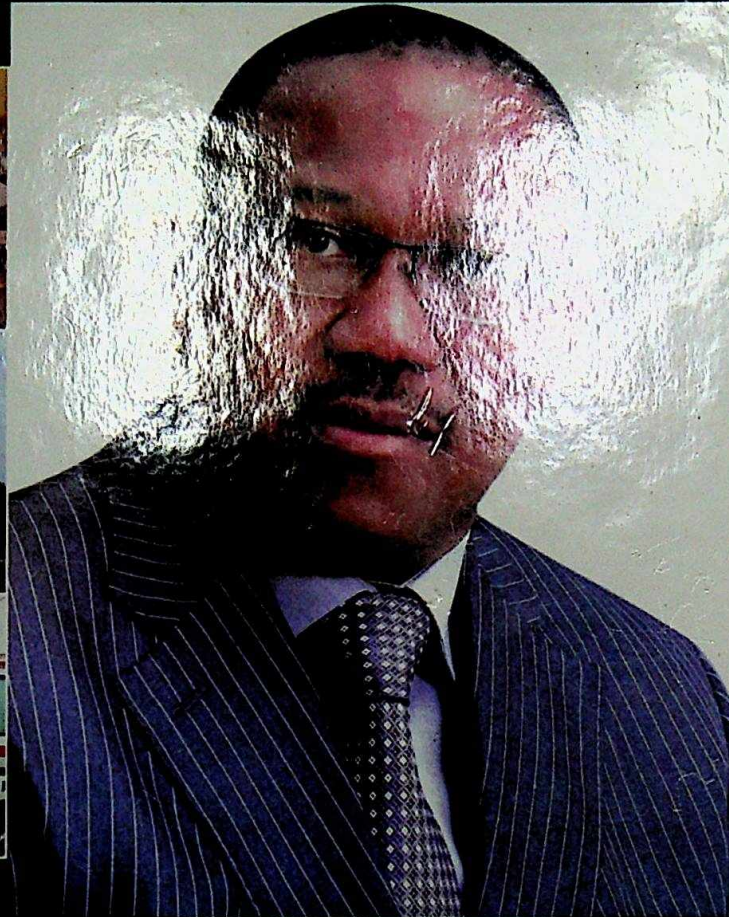

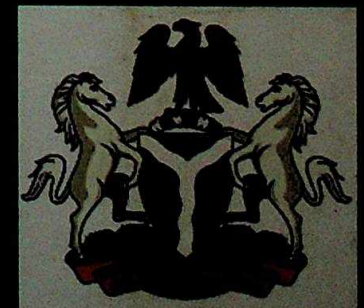

# FORWARD

## ANAMBRA 20 YEARS AFTER: THE LIGHT SHINES

**T**wenty years ago, on August 27 1991, a new state full of hope and bright prospects was born. Inhabited by one of the most industrious and entrepreneurial people in Nigeria, Anambra State derived its name from one of the major rivers of the state.

At inception the state was briefly administered from August 27, 1991 to December of same year by Joseph Abulu, a Navy Captain. He was succeeded by an elected civilian governor, Dr. Chukwue-meka Ezeife who governed from January 2, 1992 to November 18, 1993 when his government was truncated by a military takeover. Consequently Colonel Mike Attah mounted the saddle as military administrator from December 13, 1993 to August 20, 1996. He was succeeded by another military officer, Group Captain Rufai'D Garba, who ruled from August 21, 1996 to August 9 1998 when he made way for the last military governor in the person of Wing Commander Emmanuel Ukaegbu who ruled from August 10, 1998 to May 29, 1999.

It was at this time that Nigeria transited once more to democratic rule with Dr. Chinwoke Mbadinuju becoming the State's first elected governor in the fourth republic. His regime lasted from May 29, 1999 to May 28, 2003.

Then came what was supposed to be another bold step in the country's democratic journey when elections were held throughout the country to elect another set of civilian leaders. At this point it was clear to everybody that something had gone wrong. Anambra State was lagging behind most states in the performance indices of good governance and development. That was when I decided to come out from the secure and organised private sector to delve into the murky waters of politics with all its uncertainties. Driven by a burning zeal for a corrective mission after my experience at Kellogg Graduate School, North Western University, USA and what sadly seemed a return to the barbaric nature which I encountered in Anambra state, I could neither say no to myself nor to the desire of the people for change.

I contested election for the position of governor on the platform of the All Progressives Grand Alliance (APGA). Following an extensive issue-based campaign that was acclaimed as unprecedented, I was overwhelmingly endorsed by the electorate to govern the State. Regrettably, that unflinching verdict of the people was thwarted by anti-democratic elements who declared another candidate the winner of that election.

Rather than give up and surrender to fate or resort to violence, I saw the anomaly as part of my *raison d'être* for being in politics and therefore a challenge to be confronted. I initiated proceedings at the Election Petition Tribunal where I eventually reclaimed my stolen mandate after three grueling years of political and forensic

battles. The verdict of the Election Petition Tribunal was subsequently affirmed by the Court of Appeal. **IT WAS THE FIRST TIME A SITTING GOVERNOR WOULD BE REMOVED FROM OFFICE BY A LITIGANT.**

However, I was barely seven months into office when the same anti-democratic forces again struck and illegally impeached me. Part of the reasons adduced for my illegal impeachment was that I was frugal in pruning the cost of governance by reducing the previously inflated cost for the rebuilding of the Government House and Governor's Lodge burnt by the same undemocratic forces! Interestingly, reducing cost of governance and efficient management of resources, which contributed to my jungle impeachment, formed the need for my involvement in politics. Was it then time to say enough and pack my things and go?

**AGAIN I RETURNED TO THE COURT AND MADE ANOTHER HISTORY AS THE FIRST GOVERNOR TO UPTURN AN IMPEACHMENT.** Incidentally, the State had suffered another setback in its development journey as the midnight impeachment came just as I was fashioning out a blue print for the restructuring of the state.

Having come back from the illegal impeachment, I was confronted by yet another obstacle. This time, Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), the body charged with conducting elections in Nigeria, wrongly ordered the conduct of gubernatorial election in Anambra State despite the constitutional provision that the person first elected as governor has a four-year tenure, which begins from the day he took the Oaths of Allegiance and Oaths of office.

Worse still, I was even excluded from contesting for this new and controversial election for fear I would win. Eventually, somebody was declared winner, forcing me to vacate office on May 29, 2007.

I once more returned to the courts and doggedly pursued the case from the High Court to the Supreme Court, against public opinion. **THIS CASE CHANGED THE TIMETABLE FOR THE CONDUCT OF GUBERNATORIAL ELECTIONS, AS I WAS REINSTATED ON JUNE 15, 17 DAYS AFTER I WAS FORCED OUT OF OFFICE.** This judgment opened the doors for some other governors to benefit from similar situations. Such governors include: Adams Oshiomhole, Olusegun Mimiko, Rauf Aregbesola, Kayode Fayemi, Liyel Imoke, among others.

However, despite returning to office, my troubles were far from being over, with a State House of Assembly that was 100% PDP. By the time I was able to make them see reason and key into my programmes designed essentially for the good of the people, 2007 had already gone. Suffice to say that while I was sworn in on the 17th of March, 2006, my actual service to the State started in 2008. The 2008 budget was thus

the first budget that I presented to the House of Assembly as Governor. It was based on the vision of achieving the Millennium Development Goals by the year 2015 as stipulated by the United Nations during the Millennium Development Summit in 2000. The strategy for achieving this was christened Anambra Integrated Development Strategy (ANIDS), which is a process for planning, budgeting and implementation of all sectors of the Millennium Development Goals simultaneously. Hence the budget of 2008 was tagged 'Budget of Integrated Development', which was principally anchored on the need to turn Anambra State around and commence visible and sustainable development that would permeate all sectors. Thus, today it has transformed Anambra State and made it a destination for donor agencies/development partners.


As part of our strategy, we turned our planning/budgeting and implementation from being supply-driven to being demand-driven, by involving all stakeholders in the planning, budgeting and implementation processes. A good case in point is the incorporation of the Presidents-General of town unions in the process of governance as experimental 4th tier of Government, an innovation that is fast gaining popular acceptance. It is noteworthy that ANIDS and the sectoral programmes which it contains were borne out of the felt needs of all stakeholders expressed during a 2007 budget preparation and implementation workshop sponsored by the European Union. Since then the state has never been the same again as it turned from its pariah status to a state everybody and group want to associate with.

Some of the results of this vision can today be seen in the well articulated and strategized road construction programme that has made Anambra one of the states with the best road network in the country. It can be seen in the revitalization of such critical sectors as health, education, commerce and industry, institutions of government, sports, to mention but a few.

It was also in tandem with such vision that for the first time structure plans were produced for Awka, Oritsha and Nnewi by the **UN-HABITAT** for the all-round development of the state by my administration.

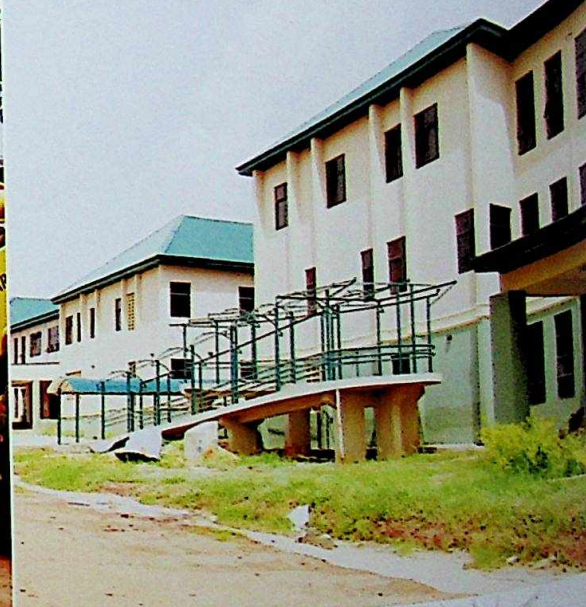
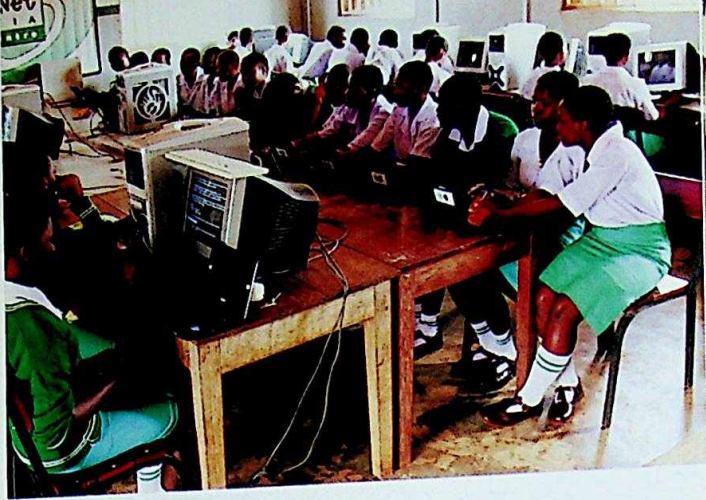

## **FOUND: THE STATE, ITS VISION AND NT STRATEGY**

### **and its Chief Executive**

South-East geopolitical zone of Nigeria the Anambra Igbo who are undoubtedly entrepreneurial group of people in Sub-Saharan Africa. Anambra State today is under the demerit of Mr Peter Obi who was elected in 2006 and re-elected in 2010 for a second term, thus becoming the only Governor of Nigeria to ever serve two terms.

Mr Obi's academic preparation at a variety of Ivy League institutions, complemented by a vast business/entrepreneurial experience garnered from positions as Chairman of a number of quoted companies, made him well prepared for the job. Before becoming Governor, his quest for knowledge had taken him to various universities in Nigeria; Lagos Business School, Harvard Business School, USA; London School of Business, UK; Columbia Business School, USA; Kellogg School of Management, USA; Institute of Management Development, Switzerland etc. Much of his business and financial experience came from positions as former Chairman of Fidelity Bank, New Securities Ltd and Paymaster Nigeria. Mr Obi's role as former Director in Guardian Express and Chams Nigeria Ltd. Mr Peter Obi's success in the business world has also been enhanced by his membership of a number of reputable professional associations: Fellow, Nigerian Institute of Management; Member, Nigerian Economic Summit Group; Member, Health Business Council; British Institute of Management. Happily married and a father of two teenagers, the 50 year-old Governor Obi undoubtedly has the academic, professional and social stability to undertake the arduous task of governing Anambra State.

### **Our Strategy**

Anambra State under the Peter Obi Administration is committed to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). From all indications, Anambra State is one of the very few sub-national governments in Africa that have adopted the MDGs as their Vision in their development to the development of their societies. The strategy for achieving this vision is a unique approach called the Anambra Integrated Development Strategy (AIDS) in which all targets of the MDGs are being pursued simultaneously. The beauty of ANIDS lies in its holistic development of all sectors.

Basically a strategy that allows the State to plan carefully, budget properly, implement, monitor the implementation, ensure the plan and encourage participation and involvement from the communities and stakeholders for various ANIDS projects are being executed.

stages of the project cycle – from planning and budgeting to implementation. With ANIDS, the State has moved its planning and budgeting from being supply-driven to being demand-driven. This is necessary in order to maximize the benefits from very scarce resources because Anambra, not being an oil-producing state, is a relatively poor state.

Because it is anchored on careful planning and budgeting, ANIDS enables the Government to identify budgetary gaps, some of which the State needs to fill with the support of its development partners. Thus, in view of the meagre resources of Anambra State, collaboration with development partners (national & inter-national) is of utmost importance. Unlike the situation in the past before the Peter Obi Administration when Anambra was a pariah state and a no-go area for international development partners, a number of them are operating in Anambra State today, notably the UNDP, the EU and UNICEF.

## **2. HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT: STRIVING HARD, ACHIEVING RESULTS**

ANIDS is the driving force behind the rapid development that is taking place in Anambra State in recent years, with landmark achievements in every sector of the economy. Appreciating Anambra's efforts, the Senior Special Assistant to the President on Millennium Development Goals (Hajiya Amina Az-Zubair) said, "Anambra State has made remarkable success in the implementation of the MDGs Programme." The following examples will illustrate the efforts and some achievements in a few sectors:

### **2.1 Fighting Poverty and Hunger**

As a pro-poor, grassroots-oriented Government, one of the first steps taken by the Peter Obi Administration in its fight against poverty was to do a Poverty Mapping of the State to establish its poverty profile. Having thus identified the poorest Local Government Areas (LGAs), the Government is making concerted efforts to eradicate extreme poverty in the State, particularly in these poor LGAs. Consequently, Anambra State government has consistently churned out pro-poor policies and programmes as the basis for poverty eradication in the State.

In this regard, the FADAMA III Programme has been a major avenue for providing capital and equipment support to hundreds of rural dwellers engaged in agro-related activities; capital support has also been given to thousands of the less privileged, particularly women, widows, the physically challenged, as well as caregivers of orphans and vulnerable children to enable them either expand their trade or start petty trading or small-scale farming. Revolving loans have been made available to hundreds of women co-operative groups to establish small-scale agro-based businesses such as poultry farms, fish ponds and pig farms. Sundry equipment (including palm oil processing machines, palm kernel cracking machines, food processing machines,

groups to establish cottage industries. A variety of skill acquisition training sessions have been organized for the unemployed (especially the indigent, physically challenged, women and youths) who have been subsequently empowered with micro-enterprises equipment like computers, generators, hair dryers, sewing machines, shoe-making machines, welding machines, vulcanizing machines, motorcycles, wood work/benchetry tools, barber's shop tools, ovens, cookers, etc. to make them self-reliant through self-employment.

Poverty reduction is also being pursued through massive expansion of rural roads, especially in remote food producing areas, thus opening up such strategic areas of the state with good access roads. This enables the Government to send much needed agricultural inputs to such remote rural areas; it also enables rural farmers to evacuate food items and other agricultural produce to urban markets for better profits and to feed the people. Today, Anambra State is reputed to have the best network of roads in Nigeria, especially in rural areas.

Creation of jobs, especially for young people, is another major weapon in the fight against poverty. The Government's aggressive efforts to create an enabling environment for local and foreign investors are yielding fruits and will create thousands of jobs. The establishment of a neem-based organic fertilizer plant to produce fertilizer will boost the huge capacity of the agricultural sector to generate employment. The ongoing construction of a giant facility in Onitsha by South African Breweries (SABMiller) is expected to create hundreds of jobs. The construction of the 1st and 2nd Business Parks in Onitsha is boosting commercial activities (the 1st has been completed and put to use while work on the 2nd has reached 90% completion). The Government is collaborating with Innoson Vehicle Manufacturing Company in Nnewi (the first indigenous vehicle manufacturing outfit in the country) and also revitalizing/resuscitating abandoned and comatose industries including Omor Rice Mill etc.

Commending poverty reduction efforts by Anambra State, Dr Magnus Kpakol, Coordinator of National Poverty Eradication Programme (NAPEP) said: "Governor Obi was the first governor to visit my office to discuss how to fight poverty in his state and remain determined and dogged by initiating effective economic empowerment programmes."

### **2.2 Education**

ANIDS achievements in the Education sector are truly heart-warming. Before Governor Peter Obi's Administration, not one single public secondary school in the State had a properly equipped functional science laboratory. The scenario was no better in the area of computer literacy: in this age of Information Technology, computers were virtually unheard of in public schools. Today the situation has changed dramatically in terms of science laboratories, electricity, water supply etc: ab-

◀ 150 schools have benefited from the laboratory rehabilitation and equipment programme of the Government; more than 120 schools have been supplied with computer sets – each school receives 10 desktops with full accessories; Microsoft Academies have been established in 120 schools with 50 laptops each; school buses have been provided for more than 100 secondary schools – the first time ever in the history of the State; Technical Colleges have been renovated and fully equipped; electricity generating sets and water boreholes have been provided for schools etc.

Unprecedented progress has also been made in the provision of infrastructure in primary and secondary schools. When Mr Peter Obi assumed office as Governor, there was no single public primary school classroom block that was not leaking; none without cracked walls, so much so that many of them constituted death traps to school children and teachers alike. The situation was the same for secondary schools, where trees were found to have grown in some classrooms! Today, the Government's achievements in all education sub-sectors have been truly astonishing: construction of new classroom blocks and renovation of existing ones in numerous primary and secondary schools across the 21 Local Government Areas of the State (new prototype 5-room classroom blocks are simultaneously being provided for all the 177 communities in the State, at 3 blocks per community); construction and renovation of numerous buildings including students' hostel complexes. The ultimate result has been the creation of a conducive environment for learning at all levels of education.

### 2.3 Health

Achievements in the Health sector have equally been impressive, as our health indicators have continued to improve. Under the Peter Obi Administration, there has been remarkable improvement in the provision of infrastructure for primary health centres, general hospitals and tertiary health facilities, as exemplified by the astounding transformation going on at the Teaching Hospital of the State University.

With special focus on maternal, child and reproductive health services, the State Government has given unprecedented support to the improvement of primary healthcare services through the provision of new infrastructure and upgrading of existing ones: at least 5 Primary Healthcare Centres (PHCs) have been rehabilitated in each of the 21 LGAs and numerous new PHCs and general hospitals constructed across the State; essential drugs, medical equipment, furniture, potable water, electricity generating sets etc have equally been provided for these health facilities.

Commendable efforts have also been made to build the capacity of existing and in-coming health providers: capacity-training for hundreds of doctors, nurses and other health workers; securing accreditation for the State's Schools of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Technology through provision of a multiplica-

tion of infrastructure and facilities including lecture rooms, computer rooms, libraries, IT equipment, audio-visual/teaching aids, furniture, office blocks and equipment, students' hostels etc.

A remarkable innovation in the provision of healthcare in Anambra State today is Government's support to voluntary agency/mission hospitals and training institutions (previous governments had ignored such health facilities, as all attention was focused on government-owned health facilities). Today, the Peter Obi Administration has provided much-needed facilities to secure accreditation for mission hospitals, giving regular financial support (Grants-in-aid) to such hospitals and mission Schools of Nursing and Midwifery across the State, providing them with logistics support by donating buses and ambulances, supplying them with drugs, and generally extending a life-saving hand of friendship/cooperation to them.

### 2.4 Environment

Achieving the goal of ensuring environmental sustainability depends on the prevention of loss of environmental resources, provision of sustainable access to safe drinking water and basic sanitation, drastic reduction of the proportion of urban populations living in slums etc. The Peter Obi Administration has recorded remarkable achievements in this regard and, although a lot still needs to be done, its ongoing efforts and what it plans to do in the next three years, give a clear indication that this Goal 7 of the MDGs is achievable by the State.

The problem of access to safe water and sanitation, which remained intractable before the Peter Obi Administration, is now being effectively tackled by the State on its own as well as in collaboration with its development partners. Some of the results include: provision of hundreds of boreholes all over the State in schools, health facilities and communities generally in both urban and rural areas; scaling up from boreholes to medium and large-scale water schemes, especially through the resuscitation of water projects, most of which were abandoned many years ago (ongoing work at more than 15 major water schemes will on completion provide access to safe water for hundreds of thousands of people in various parts of the State); construction of hundreds of toilets (VIP, pour flush, sunplat etc) across the State particularly in schools, health facilities and public places; provision of sanitation/clean-up equipment, including payloaders, dumpsters, receptacles etc; massive clean-up of the 3 major cities, particularly the commercial city of Onitsha etc.

To combat environmental degradation and loss of environmental resources, the Government is battling erosion menace in virtually every part of the State (with up to 1,000 active erosion sites across the State, Anambra is one of the worst hit areas in Sub-Sahara Africa); a number of flood control measures are also being adopted, including effective designing and construction of roads with proper drainages, massive de-silting of

flooding that is threatening to submerge this giant city that has been identified by UN-Habitat as one of the fastest growing cities in the world.

Concerned about the unplanned and uncoordinated growth of cities all over the developing world, resulting in slums in most major cities, the Peter Obi Administration has taken steps to forestall this in Anambra State; with the assistance of UN-Habitat, Anambra became the first state in Nigeria to produce Master/Structure Plans for its 3 major cities (the Administrative/State Capital, Awka; the commercial city of Onitsha and Nnewi, the industrial hub)

### 3. CONCLUSION: THE NEED FOR PARTNERSHIP

The Government of Anambra State today is working round the clock to achieve its Vision of achieving the Millennium Development Goals. With a clear vision and a well articulated and innovative strategy to achieve it, Governor Peter Obi and his team are ready to confront the State's numerous development problems. The greatest problem is funding to fill budgetary gaps, in view of the State's poor revenue base.

Consequently, a lot of funding support is required, particularly from international development partners and well meaning corporate organisations and individuals. Secondly, such assistance should be demand-driven by supporting already planned and ongoing projects that meet local needs and ultimately help to achieve the Millennium Development Goals.

Anambra State has already acquired a reputation for accountability and faithfulness in the use of development partnership funds, as attested to by a good number of heart-warming outcomes of international development partnerships in the State: rated best overall state in the implementation of the EU-WSSSR Programme and consequently one of only 3 states in Nigeria currently benefiting from the EU/UNICEF additional funding for good performance to provide water and sanitation facilities. Anambra is now rated the best in the implementation of the World Bank FADAMA III Programme, although it was the last state to join the programme. As a sign of its commitment, the State has been the first to sign the Programme Implementation Agreement with UNICEF for 3 consecutive years since 2009. To the delight of UNICEF and other child-friendly groups and individuals, Anambra State pioneered the Children's Town Hall Meeting with the Governor to involve children in the participatory democracy in the State by giving them a voice in governance (the Children's Town Hall Meeting is now an annual event, with the 2010 edition attracting more than 3,000 children who presented close to 300 questions and requests to the Governor as part of the interaction); regularly playing host to very many national and international dignitaries who can now visit the State because of the peace and decency in governance that now reign here.

Indeed, Anambra State has created a conducive environment for investment and development

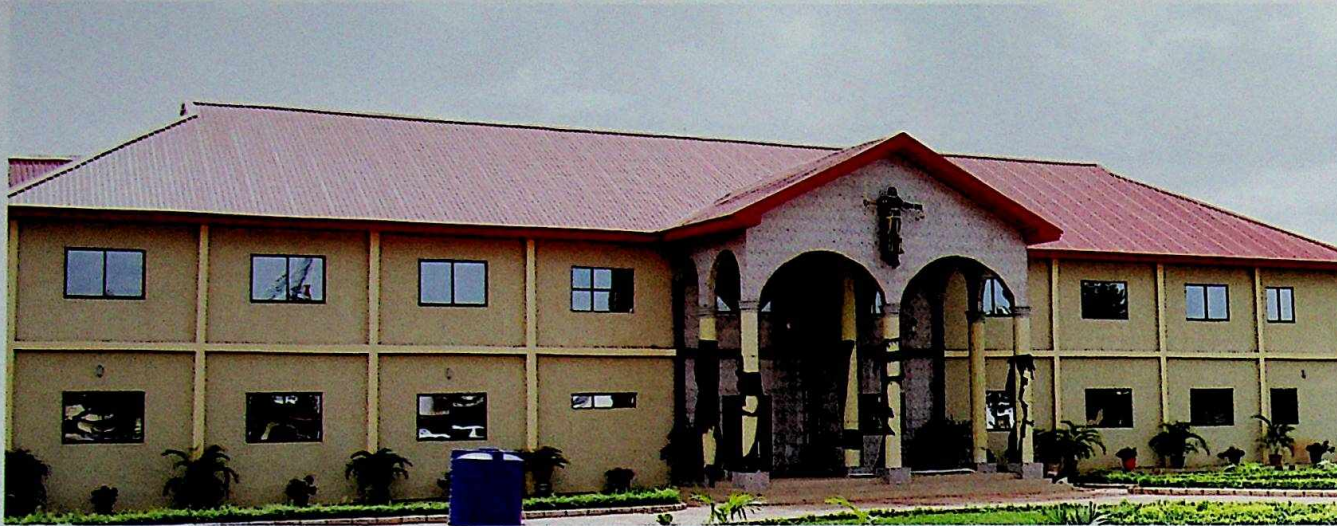

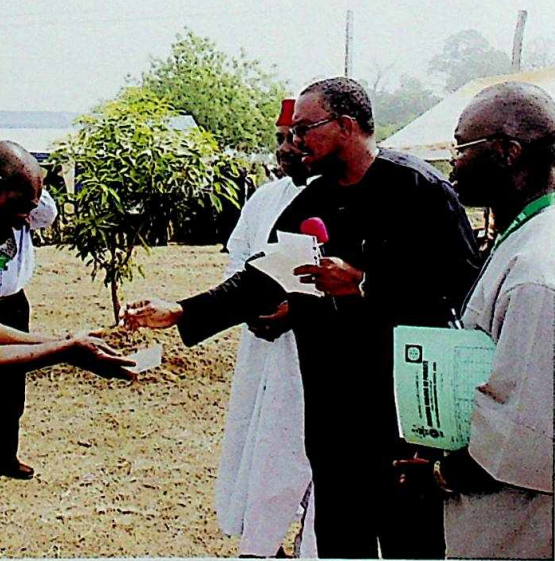

# Poverty Alleviation Programmes: Doing Very Well in FADAMA III

...the MDGs on poverty reduction, the Governor Peter Obi administration entered into several strategic partnership agreements including, the Anambra/Access Bank N1 billion agriculture partnership project as well as other multi-million naira agriculture development facilities. Anambra State today is the only State that has made huge strides in the development and funding of the FADAMA programme. The State has adopted four key vehicles to deliver on its poverty alleviation programmes: Anambra State Poverty Eradication Programme (ASEPEP); Anambra State Micro Finance (MP-MF) Loan Scheme; Anambra State Micro Finance Scheme; and Anambra State Micro Finance Fund for Economic Empowerment (WOFEE).

**BREAKDOWN**

The State Government made available revolving loans worth over N330 million to 670 cooperative groups in the State.

Between 2007 and 2010, a total of N49 million was given out as cash grants to 10,559 less privileged women and widows to enable them either expand their trade or start petty trading or farming.

Between 2007 and 2010, a total of N40 million was given out as cash grants to 1,162 skilled physically challenged persons and maternal support to 10,620 orphans and vulnerable children (OVC).

The Government made available, processing machines, palm kernel cracking machines, garri processing machines, soap making machines to cooperative groups in the state.

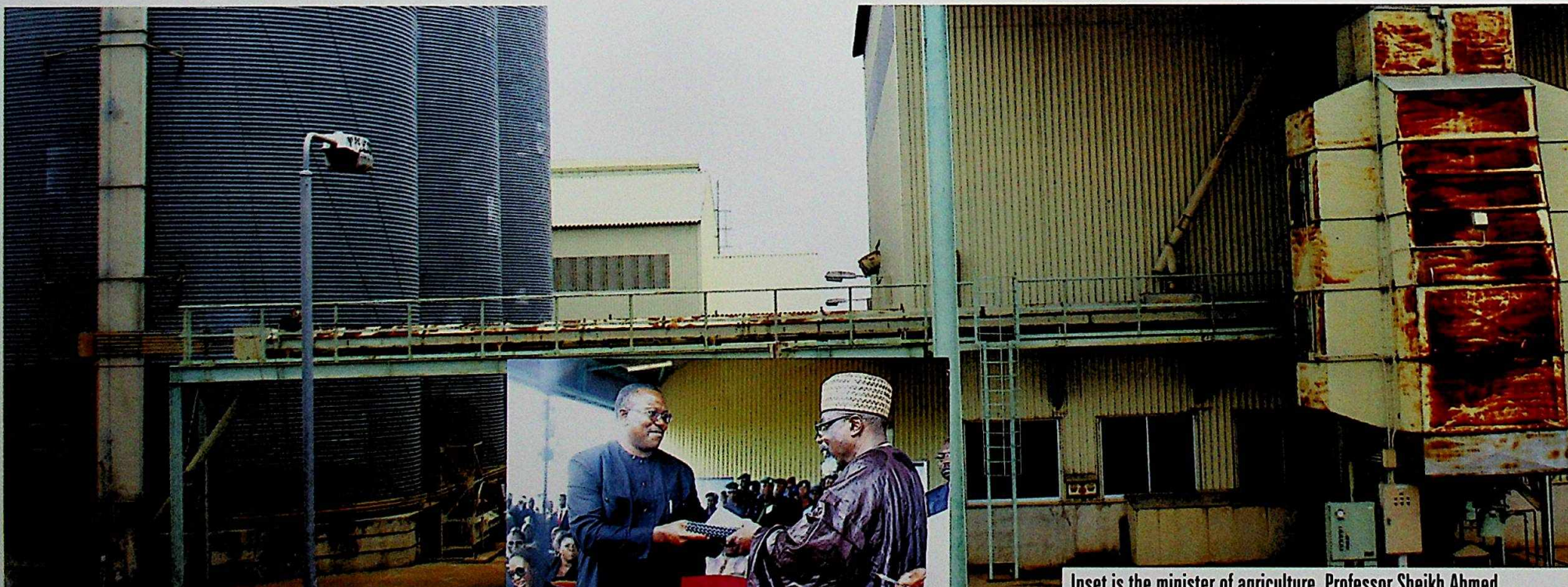

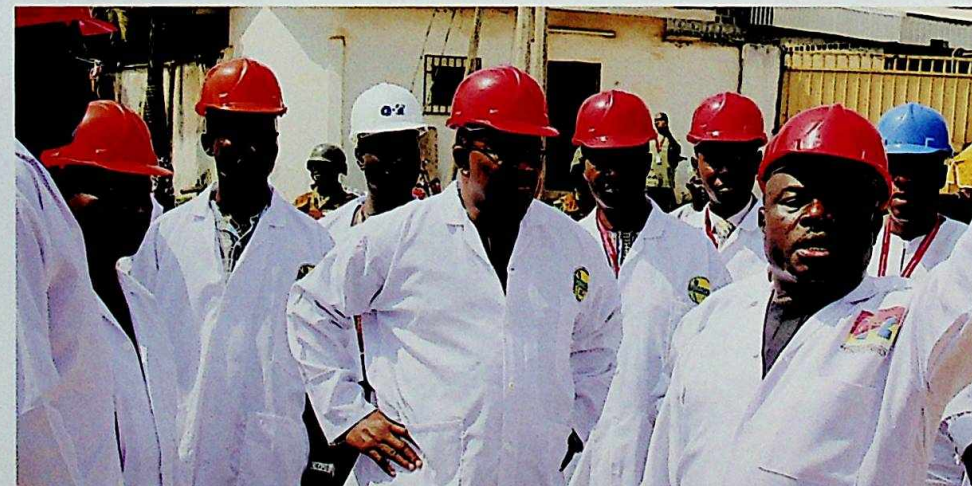

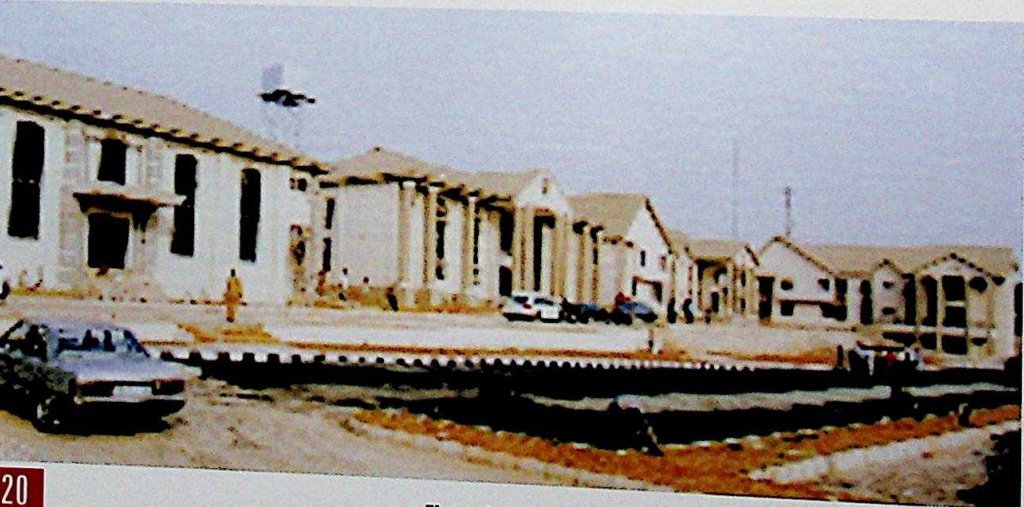

A cross section of forty (40) vehicles for TRACAS bought by Governor Peter Obi, the first of its kind since the State was created

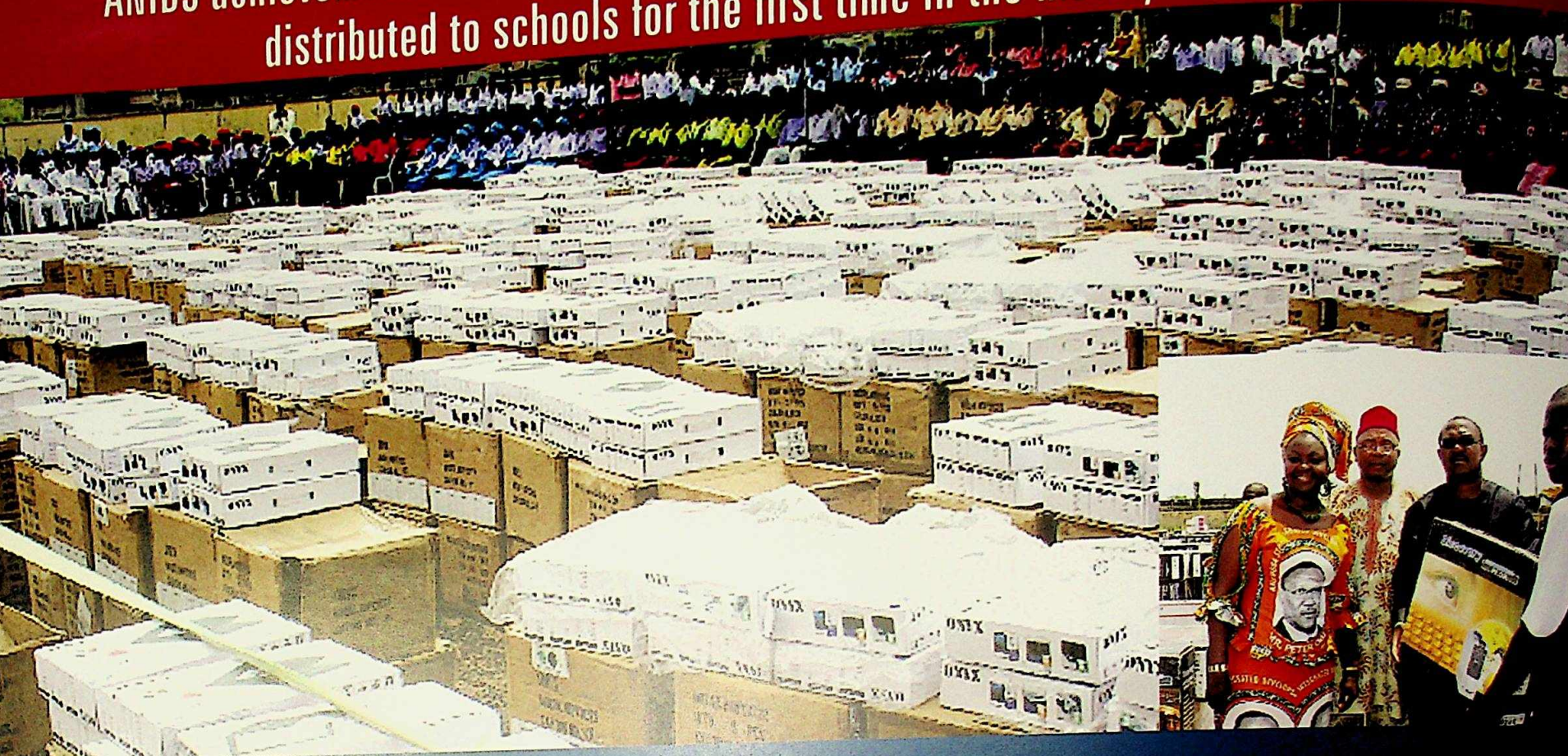
Before Governor Peter Obi's Administration, not one single public secondary school in the State had a properly equipped functional science laboratory. The scenario was no better in the area of computer literacy: in this age of Information Technology, computers were virtually unheard of in public schools. Today, the situation has changed dramatically in terms of ICT, science laboratories, water supply and more. Over 180 schools have benefited from the laboratory rehabilitation and equipment programme of the Government; more than 120 schools have been supplied with computer sets — each school received 50 desktops with full accessories. Microsoft Academies have been established in 120 schools with 50 laptops each. School buses have been provided for more than 120 secondary schools — the first time ever in the history of the State. Technical Colleges have been renovated and fully equipped; electricity generating sets and water boreholes have been provided for schools across the State.

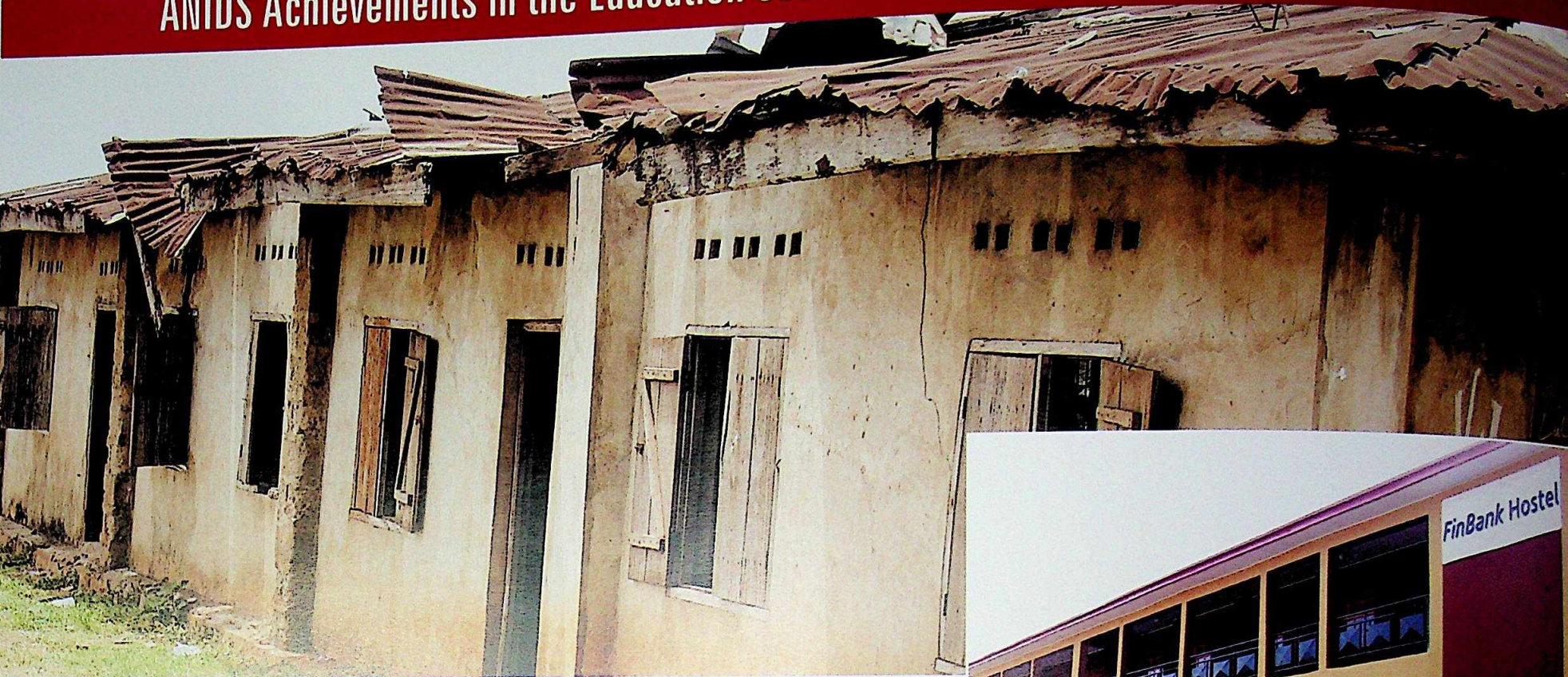

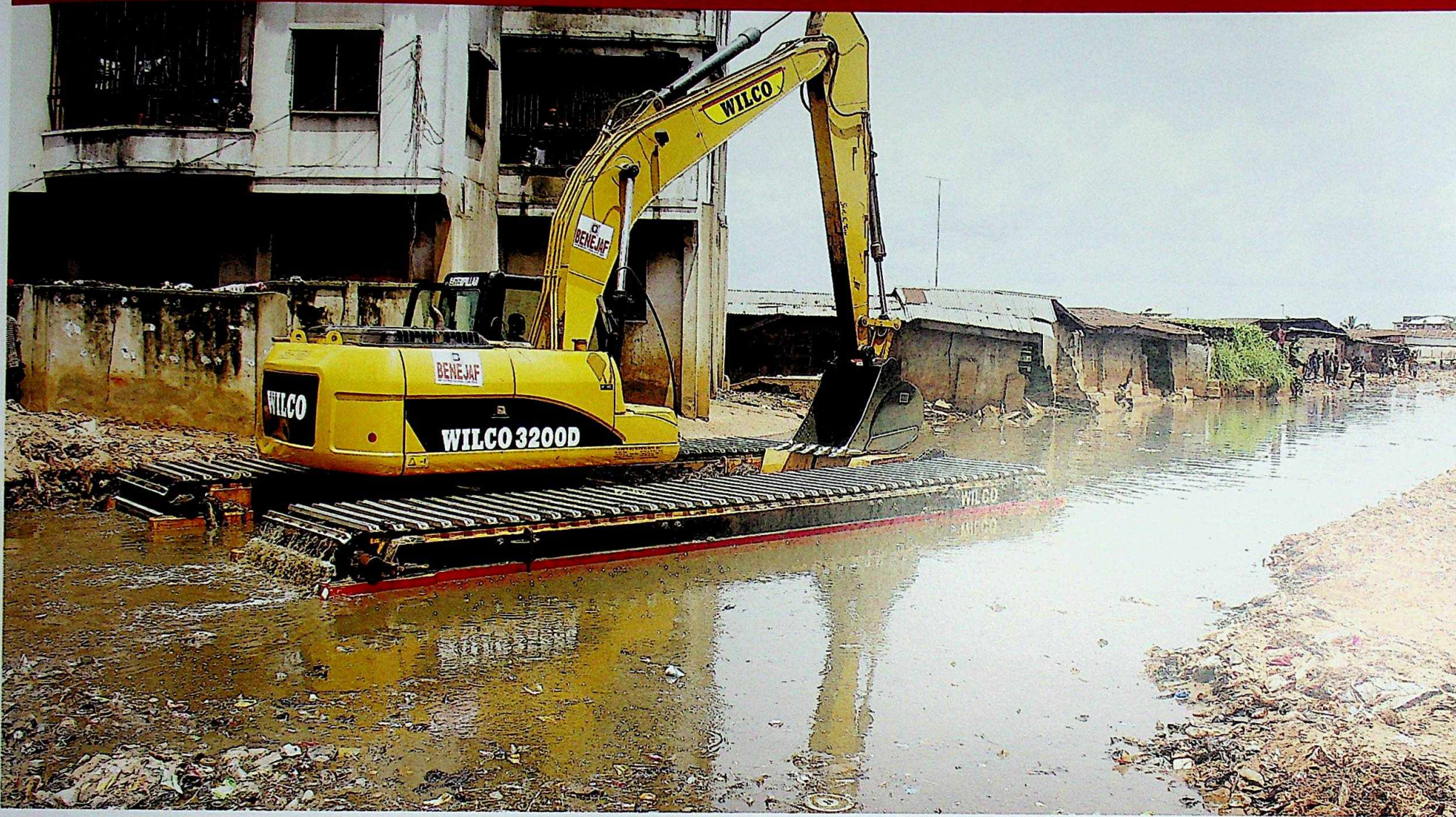

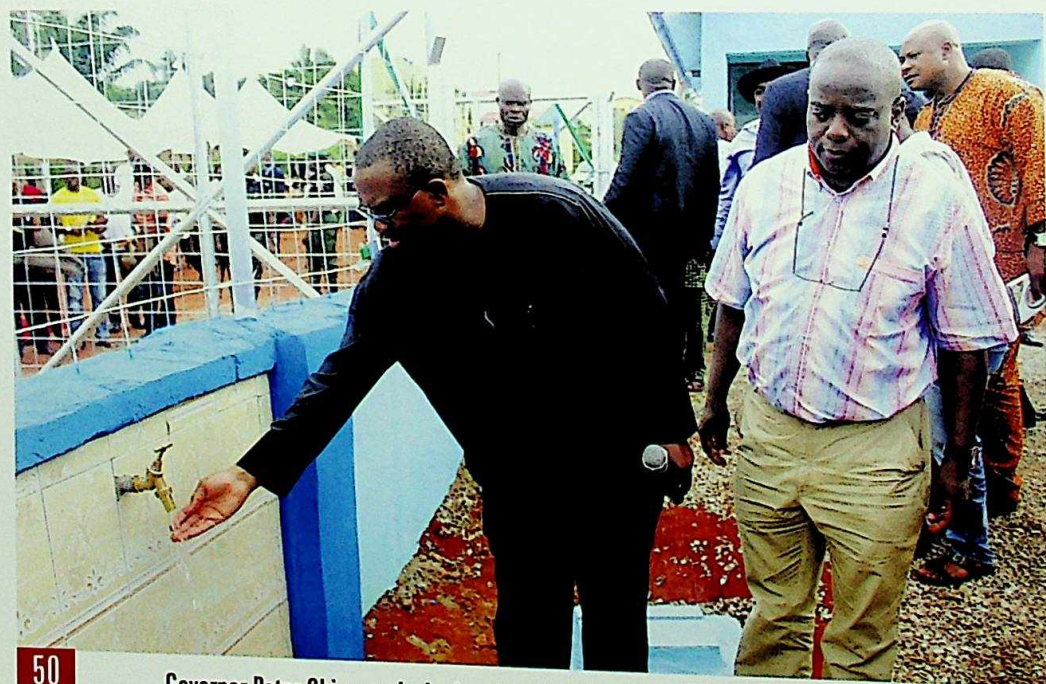

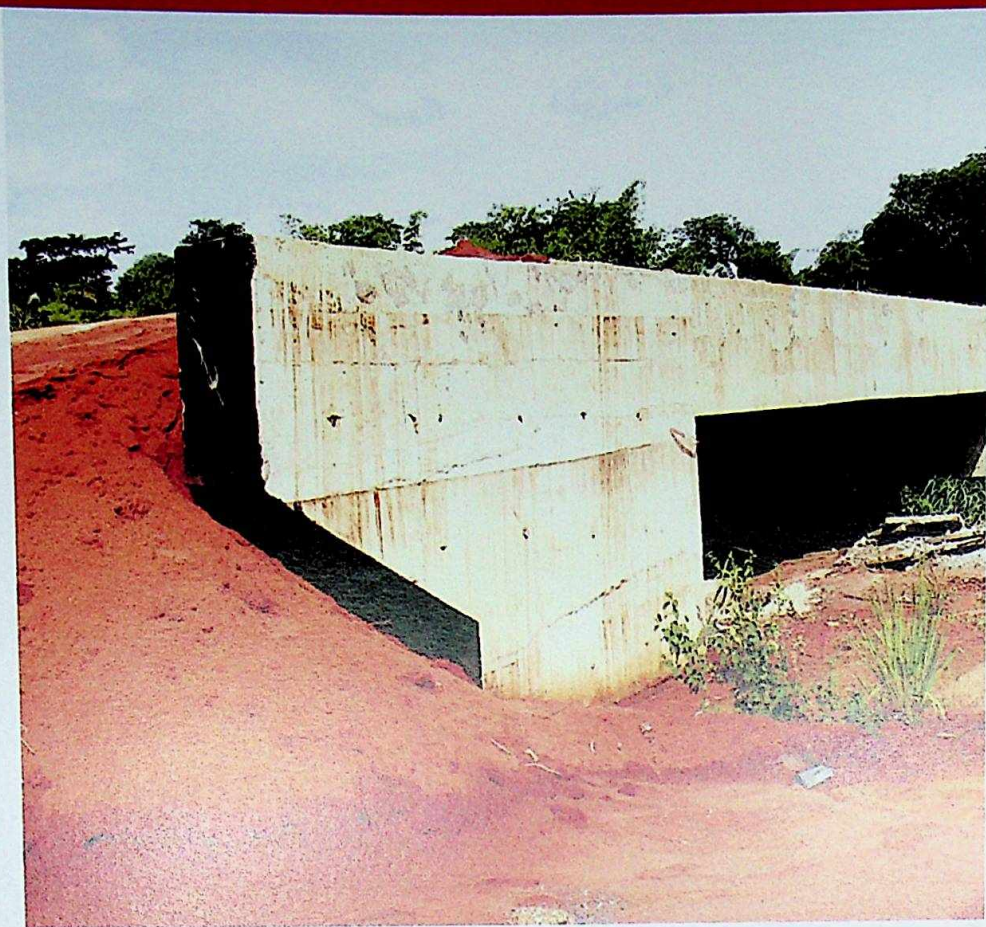

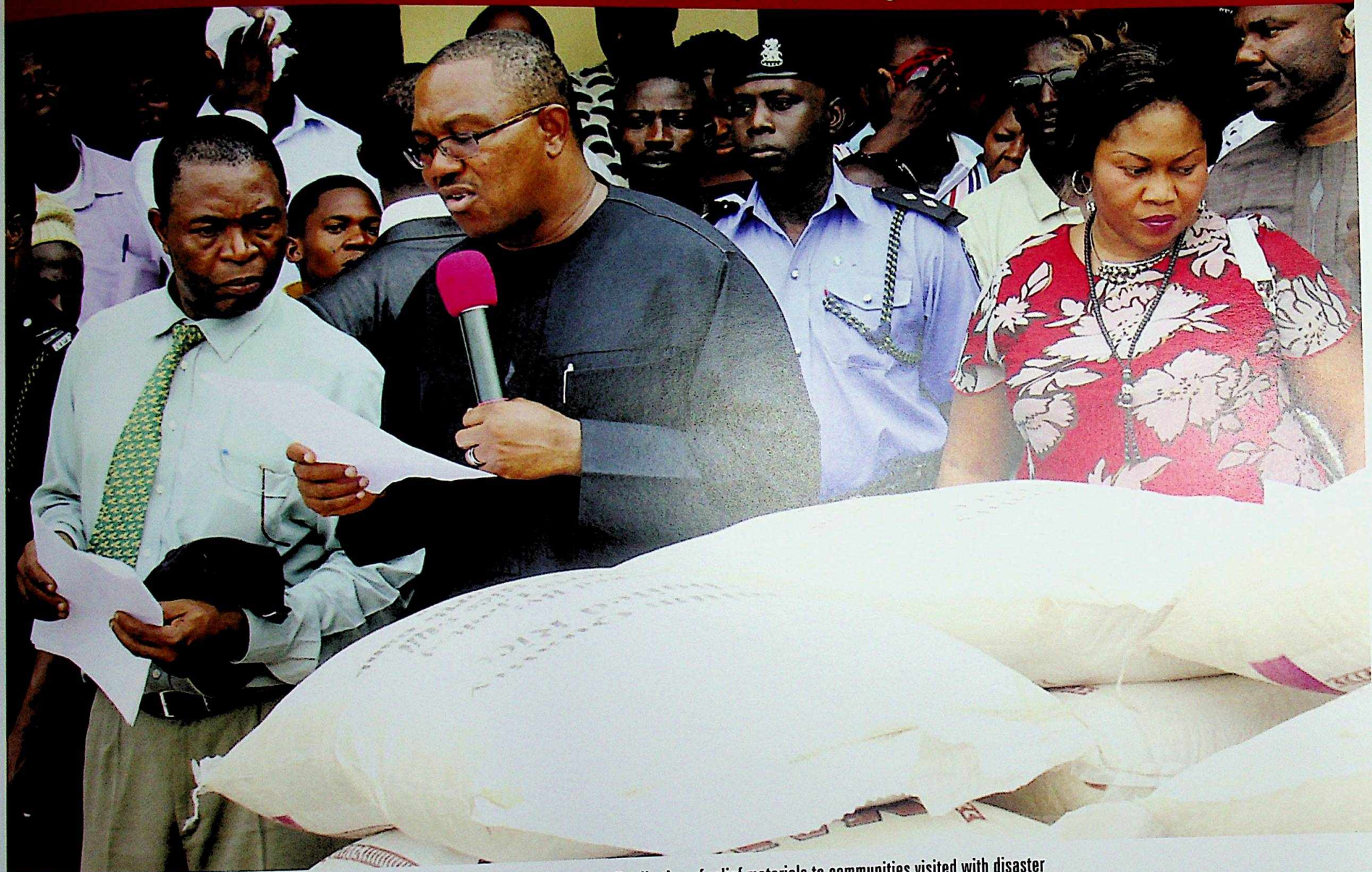

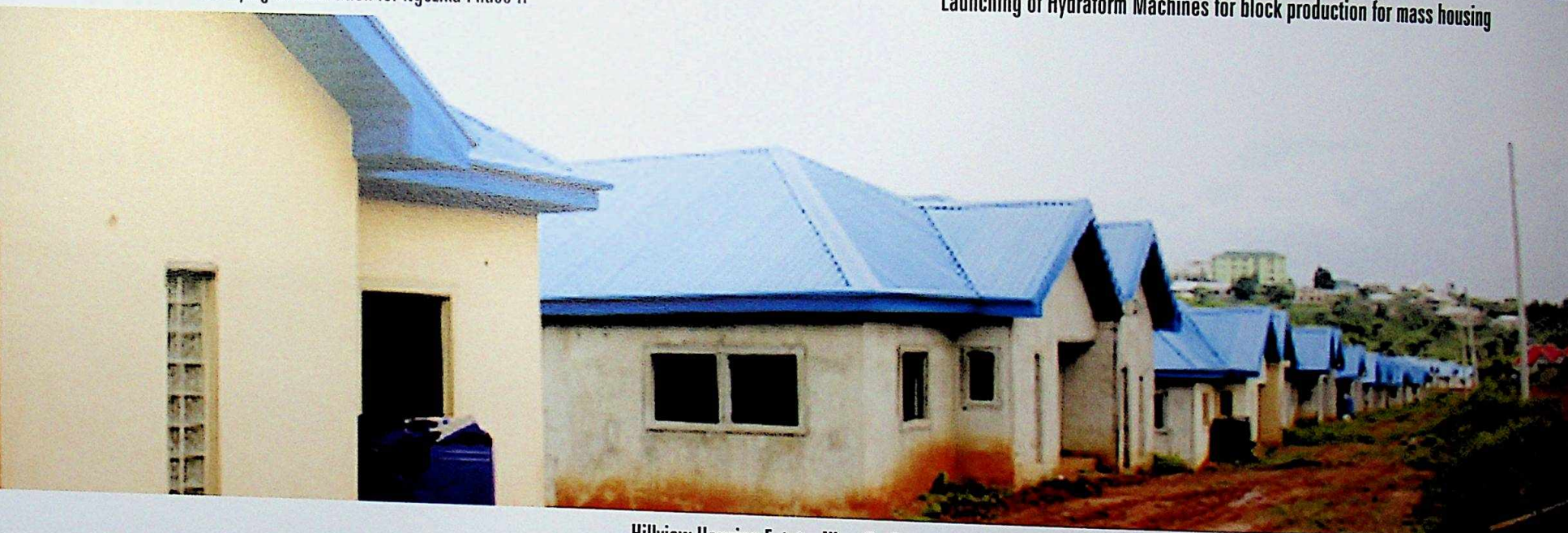

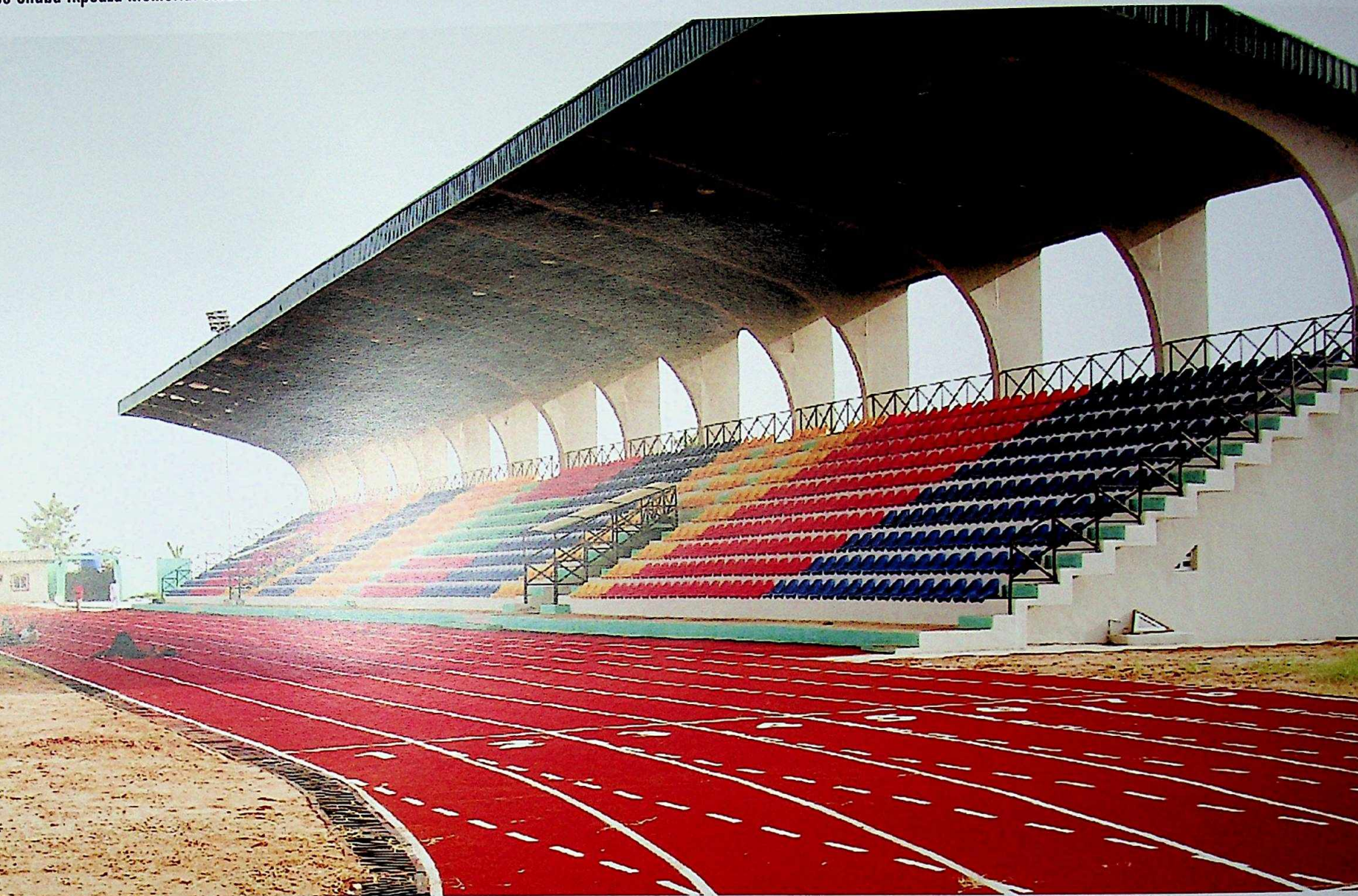

# Masterplan for Anambra State

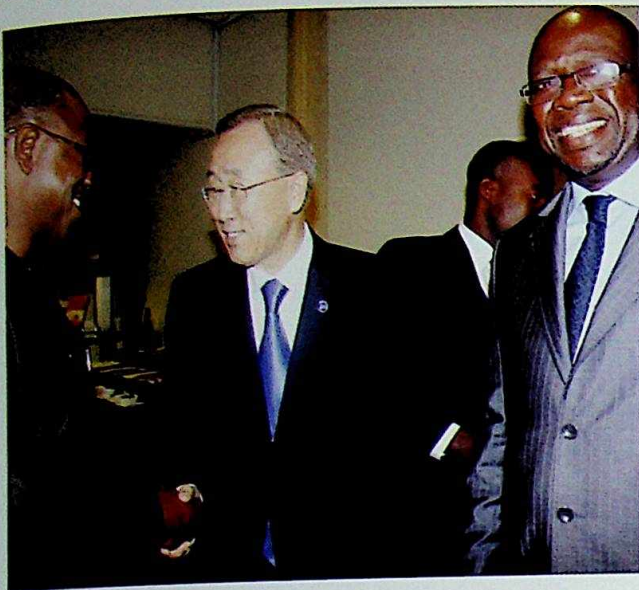

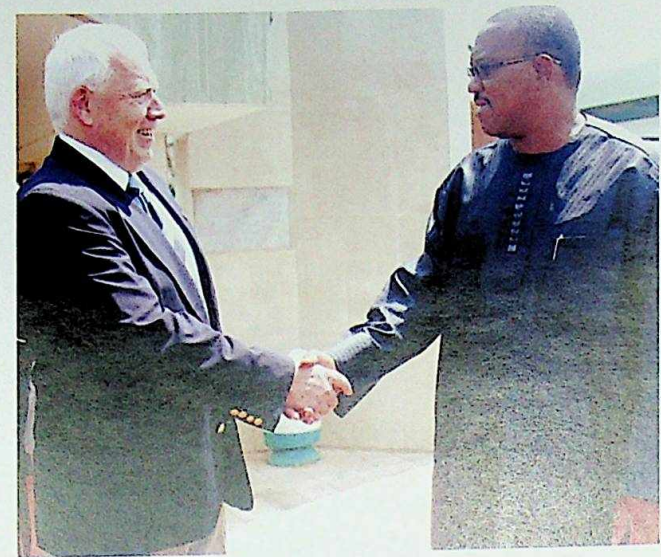

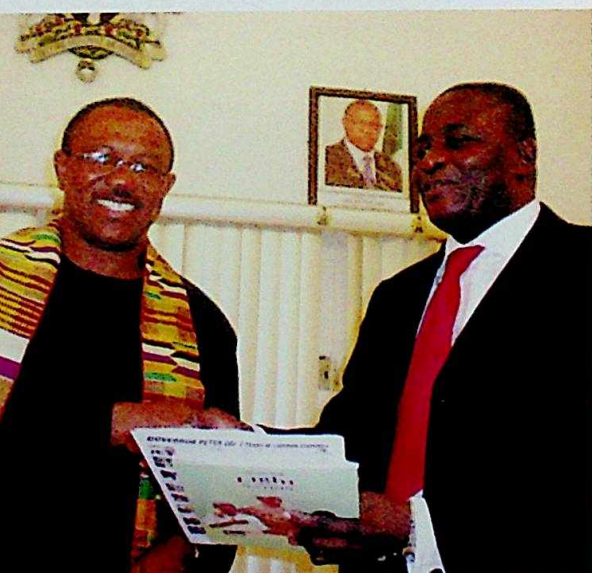

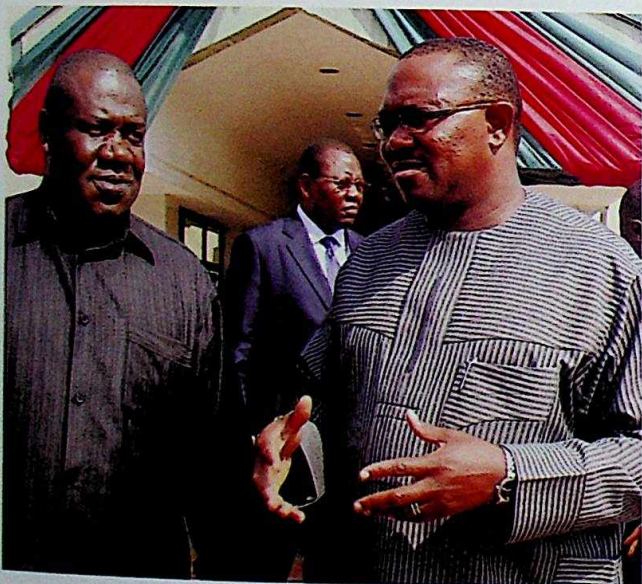

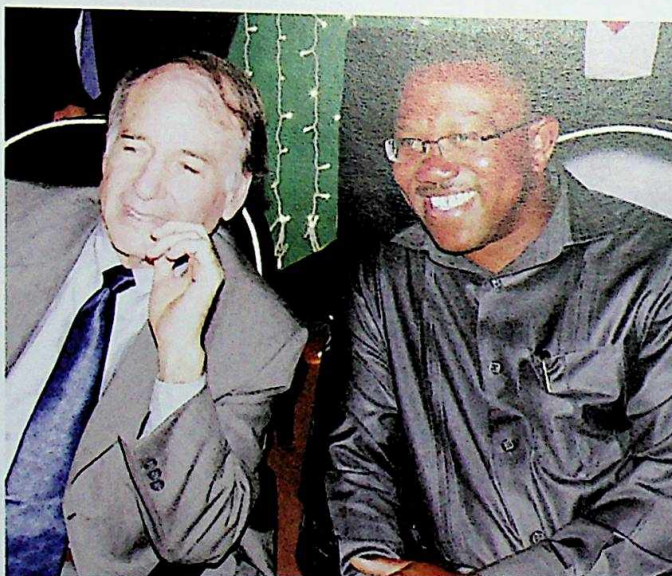

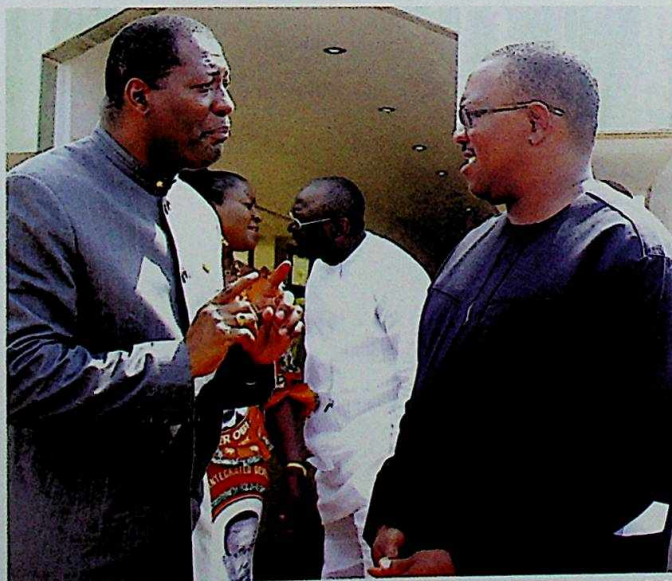
