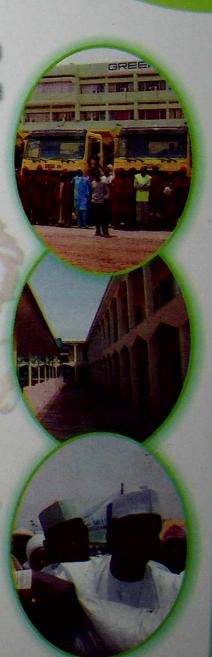

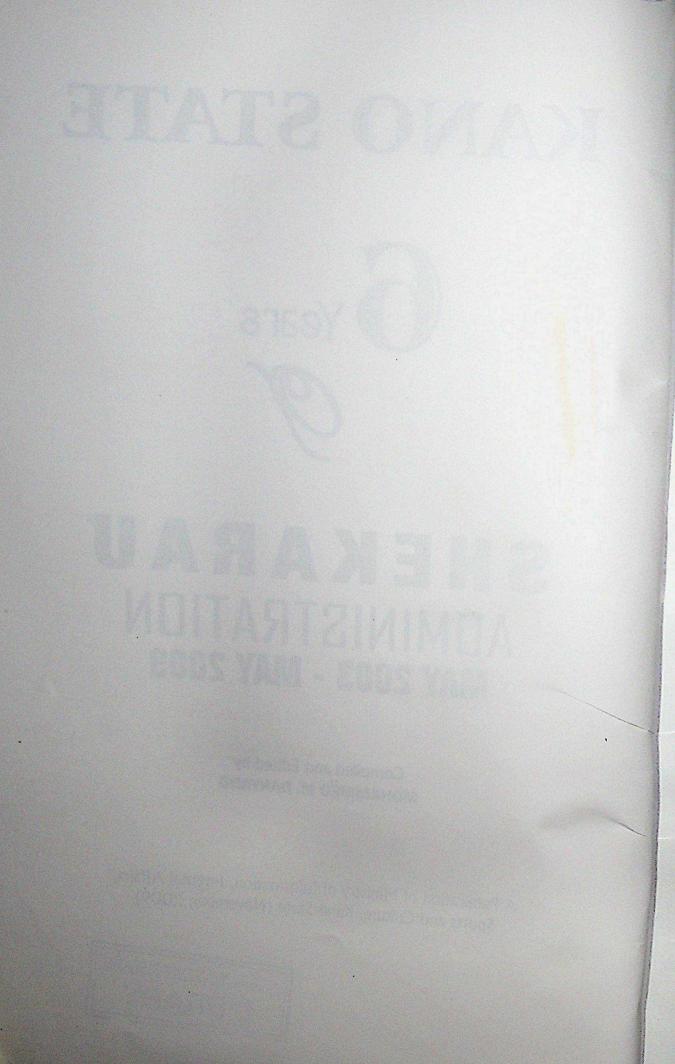

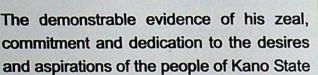

of the 18 Ministries in the State service including the Cabinet Office, the Deputy Governor's Office and the Office of the Head of Civil Service.

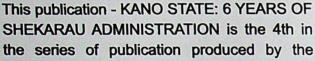

#### KANO STATE IN BRIEF

#### INTRODUCTION

ano State with an area of 20,877 square kilometers estimated and an population of about 10 million is undoubtedly one of Nigeria's most dynamic states. It is the biggest in population, one of the most ancient, the most political active economically vibrant state among the 36 states in the country. Its rich historical past and a glorious culture coupled with its level of cosmopolitanism, an industrious, accommodating and highly receptive populace has made it one of the strategic and important states in Nigeria.

From time immemorial, Kano had always occupied a unique and a special place in the scheme of things of Nigeria, Africa's most populous nation. Kano is to Nigeria what Nigeria is to Black race, creations' own gift to Nigeria. The word Kano mean a lot of things to different people. It could be taken to mean the present modern Kano State or the Kano of the old of Hausa states, Kasar Kano (Kano country of the famed Sokooto caliphate) or even still the Kano Privince of the colonial Nigeria.

So forward looking and dynamic was Kano in the olden days that earned it the enviable sobriquet "JALLA BABBAR HAUSA, YARO KO DA ME KA ZO AN FIKA" which literary means (Kano is not just as town and it is sophistication and splendors are unbeatable and whatsoever yoou come to Kano with, you will certainly be outmatched).

#### Modern Kano State

Kano State has always occupied a unique and special place in the scheme of things As Nigeria's most in the country. populous and vibrant economic and industrial cetnre, Kano state also prides itself as a major agricultural centre and has the potential of becaring the "Food bu the whole Basket" not only of Niger its fertile West African Sub-Region VE lace and soil, active and industrious 00. sources a highly sophisticated was and irrigation facilities.

In political, economic, social and cultural sphere and most recently in sports and educational development efforts, Kano state has justifiably been described variously as a "PACESTER" "TRAILBLAZER", or "CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE".

History

Kano State was created on 29th May, 1967, and formally came into being on April 1, 1968. Before its creation, Kano's history as one of the seven Hausa states and later during colonial time as Kano Province, had been relatively stable. As a Hausa kingdom, Kano's existence started from AD 999 when Bagauda, the Granson of Bayajidda, founder of the Hausa Dynasty became its first king.

Since early days, Kano's potentials as a commercial, industrial and political power house has manifested itself through its

unparalleled attraction to immigrants due to its stable and organized political arrangement, the accommodating and the open mindedness of the people and the liberal tradition of the founders.

Geography

Kano State falls mostly within the Sudan vegetation Zone bordering on the South, the guinea Vegetation. It is semi-arid region. Kano, the capital of the state and seat of government, is about 840 kilometers from the edge of the Sahara lying 472.5 metres above sea level. Two prominent hills and Goron Dutse rise to the house of 453.67 and 517.59 meters respectively above sea level.

square kilometers, while the minimum and maximum temperature range from 33°C and 15.85°C and falls as low as 10°C during harmattan.

People and Culture

Kano State is predominantly peopled by Hausa and Fulani Ethnic groups otherwise referred to as Hausa/Fulani due to the indistinguishable features they bear, arising out of cultural inter-mingling and inter-marriages. Other predominant ethnic groups include Nupe, Yoruba and lbo, (the two accounting for the large segment of non-indigenous population), Tiv, idoma, Igala, and numerous other races from far and wide. Kano's cosmopolitanism and heterogenous character owe its existence to the prevalent peaceful and mutually beneficial co-existence, in addition to deliberate liberal tradition of tolerance

and accommodation of the people which spanned many centuries. It is no wonder that Kano became a melting pot of various cultures from early times and these circumstances have significantly influenced successive governments of modern Kano State to develop policies and orientations which facilitated the integration, accommodation and absorption of settlers from diverse backgrounds.

As a centre of commerce and industry, famous for its weaving, gold and blacksmithing, dyeing and other handcraft industries. Kano became a natural attraction to settlers and scholars from far and wide who not only come, but settled This degree of permanently. accommodation in Kano reached the extent that immigrants were given full respect, privileges and honours. Fortune seekers, traders and other enterprising tribes trooped in to make Kano their permanent abode. This is amply demonstrated by the emergence of several settlements in the heart of Kano bearing names with distinct connotations, like Tudun Nupawa for Nupe, Zangon Bare-Bari for Kanuri, Unguwar Ayagi for Yoruba. Many non indigenes were appointed bonafide members of Kano Emirate Council, while a number serve as N.A. clerks, judicial officers and religious teachers. were not and are still not discriminated against, nor do they feel in any way different from any other person of Kano State origin.

In Kano today, all the tribal groups, notably the Yorubas, Ibos, Nupes, Igbirra, Igala etc., have their recognized leaders turbaned and given official instruments of office by the Emir of Kano. There is no doubt, that Kano's steady and unprecedented rate of growth and development in various spheres of human endeavour is attributable to the warmth, accommodation and liberal attitude of the people to non-indigenous people. No other people in the whole country are as detribalized and broad minded as the Kano people.

Language

Although Hausa is the predominant language spoken in Kano by both indigenes and non indigenes in all forms of business and social interactions, English to some extent, is the official language in government as well as in some business transactions. English also predominates in imparting education especially at post primary and tertiary levels of western based education. In addition to Hausa, Fulfulde and Arabic, Pidgin English and other major languages such as Yoruba, Igbo, Kanuri, Igbirra are extensively used by 'settlers' groups.

#### Culture

As one of the most prominent Hausa states and the greatest of the Trans Saharan trade entrepots, Kano has a rich and glorious cultural past, which the people have jealously guarded since 14th Century. Kano's rich historical past had remained the envy of sister Hausa states. Aside from the social life characterized by

festivities, cultural entertainments, local boxing and wrestling as well as the famous Durbar, Kano's cultural pride emanates primarily from the ingenuity of its craftsmen, blacksmiths, cloths makers, creative artists, poets and scholars. In addition, there are the famous leather workers, the dyers and calabash carvers, not the least, the mud architects.

The mud architectural ruc ires, the sur ounds the defense wall (Ganuwa) th Il eflection old city with its 16 gates ar he eople in of the architectural skills 1e handize the Hausa Kingdom. crafting such as elephant ne arvings, locally woven cloths, the rich and colourful embroidered cloths and beautifully decorated gourds and calabashes which are still found in abundance in markets and selected shopping areas in the city are refreshing reminder of the beauty and respectability of peoples' industrious and enterprising disposition.

Also, modern structures are gradually replacing the age old local architectural edifice. Mud houses (sometimes plastered with cement), which are the traditional dwelling places, are still predominant and they make impressive scenery to all visitors coming from far and wide.

In acknowledgement of the special importance, the people attached to their cultural past, successive governments have evolved various policies to preserve and promote the cultural values. The History and Culture Bureau apart from cultural promotion and arts development,

has been engaged towards the intellectual development of the state through historical researches and documentation of all positive aspects of the state's cultural heritage.

These include harnessing, projecting and improving the artistic talents of the people: research in traditional craft and technology as well as promotion of cultural activities such as indigenous music, songs, dance, drama and traditional sports.

#### Political Strature

Kano State has been operating a sound Local Sovement Administration which preduces the lonial times. As early as A.D. Kano was founded, a ue admissirative, judicial and social arrangement was in existence until the times of the Hausa States in 14th Century when earlier efforts were further consolidated. At the time of colonial intrusion in late 19th Century, Kano, along with other Hausa states was enjoying a sound enviable indigenous administrative arrangement, which facilitated the evolution of indirect rule. When Kano State took-off in 1968, the state comprised the then Kano Province with 4 constituent Emirates of Kano, Hadejia, Kazaure and Gumel all of which were largely administered by the then Native Authority. In 1968 the then government of Audu Bako introduced a new arrangement which entailed the creation of of 8 Administrative Areas, with 5 in Kano Emirate made up of Kano Metropolitan with Kano City as headquarters; Kano

Central, with headquarters at Dambatta, Kano North with headquarters at Gwarzo, Kano South east with headquarters at Birnin Kudu and Kano South with headquarters at Rano. The other emirates, (all of which are now in Jigawa) of Gumel, Kazaure and Hadejia, constitute the remaining administrative units.

With the introduction of Local Government Reforms by the Federal Government in 1976, the 8 Administrative area Councils in Kano were split into 20 Local Governments with Kano Emirate taking the lion share of 16 Local Governments while Hadejia took 2, Gumel and Kazaure constituting 1 Local Government each. In furtherance of Government efforts to ensure speedy development and enable the people participate in the running of their affairs, the civilian administration in 1979 created 9 additional Local Governments thus bringing the total to 29. The 9 new Local governments were later abolished by the Buhari Administration in 1984. 1989, the Babangida Administration created 26 additional local governments. When Kano as a single political entity was broken to create Jigawa State in August, 1991, the new Kano State had a total of 34 Local Governments, while Jigawa was made up of 21 Local Governments.

Today, Kano has a total of 44 Local Governments, the highest in the country which reflects its huge population. The population breakdown of the Local Governments according to the 2006 Census are as follows:

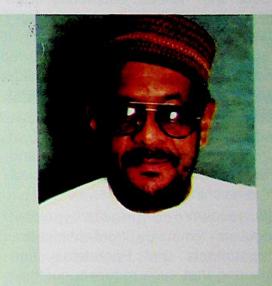

#### **CABINET OFFICE**

The Cabinet Office is the major clearance house and the hub of all government activities. It coordinates all Government policies and liaises with ministries and parastatals and other extra-Ministerial departments to ensure the efficiency and effectiveness of such policies. It also prepares and record minutes of Executive Council meetings.

In spite of being oldest establishment of government charged with the responsibility of policy coordination, the function of cabinet office, otherwise referred to sthe office of the Secretary to the State However, at various times. However, at various times governments have initiated and adopted various policy measures in accordance with existing realities to reorganize or restructure the office of the Secretary to the State Government with the aim of enhancing greater effectiveness and efficiency in running the affairs of the government.

Since the creation of the state, the cabinet Office has played the role of fine tuning all government activities in a most planned manner to achieve the desired objectives. In most cases, the cabinet Office is the brain behind the formulation of all government policies and coordination. In its statutory role of providing appropriate guidance and direction to the State Government, the Cabinet Office is presently composed of five directorates, each headed by a Permanent Secretary as follows:

# MAJOR FUNCTIONS /ACTIVITIES /ACHIEVEMENT OF ADMIN & GENERAL SERVICES CABINET OFFICE, KANO. (MAY 2003 DATE)

The Administration and General Services Directorate (AGS) is one of the 5 main Administrative organs under the Office of the Secretary to the State Government. The Directorate is headed by a Permanent Secretary, which is subordinated by a Director, Principal Officers and retinue of other supporting staff. Its activities are organized in such a

way that officers are specifically assigned to deal with issues emanating from particular Government Organizations and other Agencies.

- Follow-up and Clarification on policy implementation by Ministries and other State Organizations;
- ii. Advise on the implementation of programmes between the State and Federal Government Agencies whenever the need arises:
- iii. Evaluate/recommend special requests for funds from Ministries, Departments and Parastatals and ensuring that such requests conform with approved estimates;
- iv. Periodic appraisal and monitoring the general performance of Government Agencies to ensure that they work in harmony and to the expectation of the general public;
- v. Provide coordination and guidance on Inter-Ministerial and Inter-Departmental issues towards ensuring efficient implementation of Government programmes;
- vi. Process recommendations /disbursement of grants and donations to Government and Non-Governmental Organizations;
- vii. Process request for Medical and Educational assistance within and outside the country;
- viii. Process procurement of vehicles for distribution to designated allotters;
- ix. Entertain petitions, complaints and reports from individuals and organizations;
- x. The Directorate is also charged with general coordination of contingency projects in the light of granting assistance to the citizenry to attend to medical and other social matters.

- xi. Partake in conducting Annual Retreat for Executive Council Members and Special Advisers as well as other retreats;
- xii. Participate in articulations and implementation of policies on specialized programmes such as economic reforms, economic road map on rice and Agricultural policies;
- xiii.Represents the Office of the Secretary to the State Government on activities of the Sharia Commission;
- to the State Go er ment on Committee of Staff development in the Office of the Head of Civil Sovice.

## ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE ADMINISTRATION AND GENERAL SERVICES DIRECTORATE (AGS)

During the period under review the Directorate coordinated and sustained an elaborate system of various forms of assistance in line with the Government's framework for human development.

In an effort to supplement Government policy on education, the Directorate in conjunction with the State Scholarship Board facilitated Educational assistance to State indigenes pursuing various courses within and outside the Country.

The Directorate Strengthened harmonious working relationship between all arms of the State Administrative machineries, Other States, Federal Agencies and Private Sector.

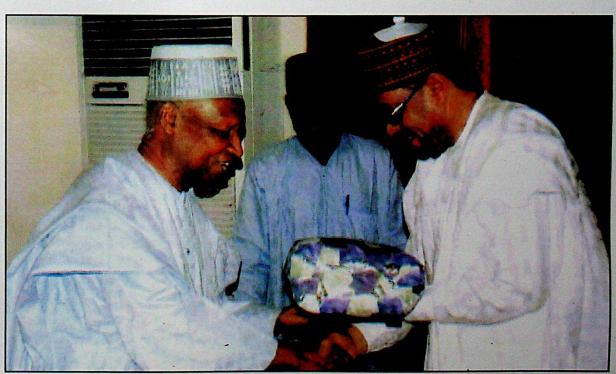
The AGS Directorate has contributed tremendously towards facilitating compliance with Budget provision and implementation by ministries and other statutory bodies.

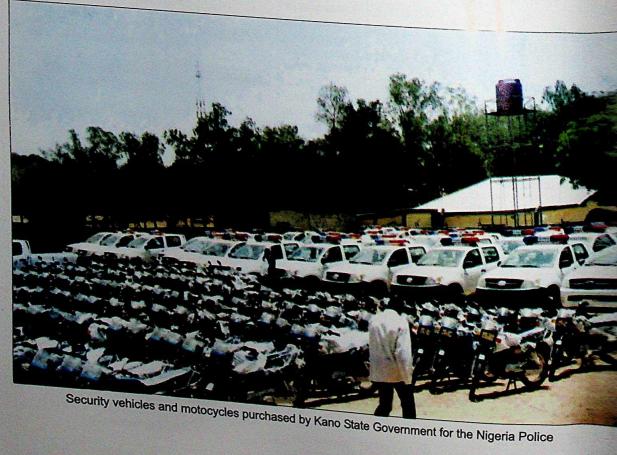

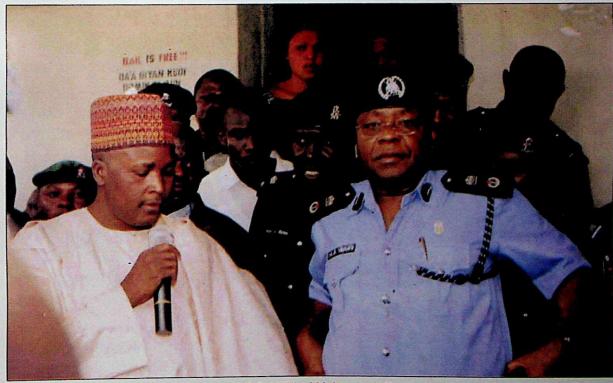

# MAJOR FUNCTIONS/ACTIVITIES/ACHIEVEMENTS OF REPA DIRECTORATE CABINET OFFICE, KANO. (MAY 2003 TO DATE)

#### Introduction

The directorate of Research, Evaluation and political Affairs REPA is one of the policy arms of the office of the Secretary to the State Government Cabinet Office. The Directorate's responsibilities were designed to, effectively and efficiently, address policy issues and orientation in addition to political and policy coordination. The coordination, which involved research and evaluation of unfolding chain of government programmes and policy initiatives, is textured against the background of the administrations perceived policy goals and objectives.

In fine tuning these objectives and set targets, contemporary political issues, among others, were monitored and appraised in the form of policy options for consideration by Government. As usual, Committees and Commissions were at various levels, standing or adhoc, have their activities and operational schedules monitored and moderated. Their respective inputs, against the background of their respective schedules of duties, were aggregated and coordinated according to the dictates of government policy direction.

From May 2003 to date, and informed by the cardinal principles of Shariah and human development policies, the Directorate has sustained, continually and consistently, the observance of this responsibility for the overwhelming and

The office of His Excellency, the Deputy Governor is composed of two major Departments, i.e Administration and General Services, Planning, Research and Statistics

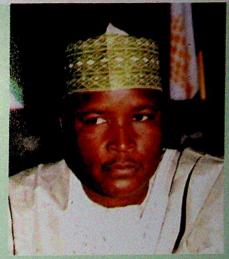
In addition trace is Special Duties Division which consider of Press, Protocol and Special Duties Units.

#### **Accomplishments Since May 2003**

The office apart of its traditional/constitutional responsibility, of deputizing for His Excellency the Executive Governor, has successfully initias of coordinated the activities of State Committees which address of the vital issues of the resuscitation of Industrial and Economic activities under the distinguished Chairmanships of Alhaji Kasim Musa (OON) (Special Adviser to the **Executive Governor on Economic Affairs** and Private Sector Development) and Alhaji Isyaku Umar Tofa (OON), A seasoned Enterpreneur/Industrialist. These committees addressed the issues of Independent Power Plant (IPP), Free Trade Zone at Panisau and Inland Containaer Depot at Zawachiki.

The other Committee was that of African Development Foundation (ADF) a joint collaborative effort between the State Government and United States of America.

The office has also initiated and addressed the problems of the occupants

of the owner occupier scheme of Danladi Nasidi Housing Estate who are mostly Civil Servants.

It is on the recommendation of the office that His Excellency, the Executive Governor approved further constitution of high powered State Committees under the Chairmanships of Honourable Commissioners Ministries of Works and Housing as well as Commerce and Industy to actualize the take-off of the major projects made up of the Independent Power Plant (IPP), Inland Container Depot at Zawachiki and Free Trade Zone at Panisau which are vital to the socio-economic development of the State. This led to the convening of the Kano economic summit under the Chairmanship of Honourable Commissioner of Commerce and Industries with Alhaji A.B. Mahmous

(SAN) as its Secretary. The idea is both private and public as an NGO Kano State Peace and Development Initiative (KAPEDI) joint hands with the State Government, via the Ministry of Commerce, to organize and convene, the first ever Kano Economic Summit.

At present, the office of the Deputy Governor has two major Parastatals under its supervision i.e. State Emergency Relief and Rehabilitation Agency (SERERA) and Guidance and Counselling Board (GCB).

It is important, however, to note that the incumbent Deputy Governor, Engineer Abdullahi T. Muhammad Gwarzo is holding the portfolio of the Commissioner for Water Resources. This is Government's response to the intractable problem of water supply in the State and the way to quickly solve it.

The office of the Deputy Governor was established after the successful transition from military rule to civilian administration in 1999. although an attempt was made during the military era of General Sani Abacha when Office of Civilian Deputy Governors were established to assist military administrators. That system was short-lived until the full transition in 1999.

With the successful completion of handing over powers to civilian administration, the Office of the Deputy Governor was fully established and commenced operations in line with the constitutional provision that empowers it.

#### **Functions:**

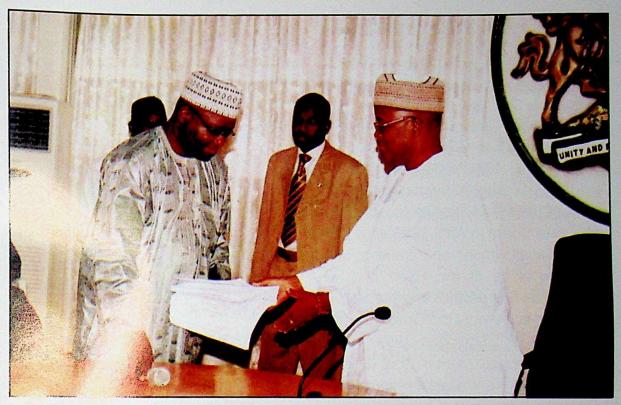
The office of the Deputy Governor derives its powers from the constitution and performs such powers like, deputizing the Executive Governor in those areas specified in the constitution as well as act as the State Chief Executive whenever the Governor is away for other important engagements. These powers allowed the Acting Governor to approve policy matters, chair the Executive Council meetings as well as State Security meetings in addition to approvals various expenditures. The Office renders various educational and med assistance to individuals and groups the overall well being of the citizenry.

In addition to the Executive powers the Office of the Deputy Governor performs other adhoc assignments including supervision of the following Government establishments:

#### a. Guidance and Counseling Board:

The Office of the Deputy Governor was mandated with the responsibility of overseeing the activities of the Guidance and Counseling Board in all matters affecting its operations which includes recommending or approving its fund usage to assist institution including military and paramilitary schools.

The board through the Office of the Deputy Governor also ensures that Quota allocated to the State by the Federal Government establishments are rightly filled by the State indigenes.

It is also responsible for the issuance of State indigenes Certificate to bonafide Kano indigenes.

## b. State Emergency Relief and Rehabilitation Agency

This Office is also supervised by the Deputy Governor, like Guidance Board, the activities of SERERA is supervised by the Deputy Governor and these includes recommendation/approval for the release of funds to assist victims of various disasters as well as feed and maintain rehabilitation centres across the State.

#### **Achievements**

The Office of the Deputy Governor although not involved in executing capital

projects has indeed recorded successes in the areas of relief assistance to victims of various fire and flood disasters as hundreds of millions were approved and disbursed to the victims of these unfortunate disasters. This Office has also through the Guidance Board, assisted the State indigenes in securing both new jobs at the Federal Government establishments and admissions into military and other tertiary institutions across the nation.

The office of the Deputy Governor has on its own rendered various forms of assistance to the citizenry in the areas of mosques/Islamiyya schools rehabilitation, medical assistance, educational assistance and other forms of assistance to groups and individuals for

the overall socio-economic development of the State.

#### GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING BOARD

The Guidance and Counseling Board started as a unit in 1979, up-graded to a department in 1984 under the office of Deputy Governor/Commissioner for Special Duties and later to the present status of a Board in April 1996 as a fullpledged employment and training unit under the office of the Head of Civil Service. The law establishing the Board was signed into law by the Governor with effect from 1st December, 1999. various changes which the Board witnessed was Kano state's response to the perennial scourge of unemployment and its allied socio-economic consequences which in turn influenced Government's policies at Local, state and Federal level. The gradual up-grading of the status of the organization was the state Government's dynamic efforts to further widen the scope of providing more job opportunities for both skilled and unskilled indigenes. The organization, since its establishment has served as a weapon which the state Government fights unemployment and poverty problems.

#### **Functions of the Board**

The Board of Guidance and Counseling is charged with the responsibility of among other things to:

a) Generate employment on behalf of all interested job seekers (Graduate, non-graduates/skilled or unskilled persons;

- b) Liaise with Federal Civil Service
  Commission, Federal
  Organizations and National
  Directorate of Employment (NDE)
  in all matters related to
  employment, direct or transfer;
- Routine and general census of unemployment specialists and generalists.
- d) Guidance and counseling tour for secondary schools and other post-primary institutions of caller prospects.
- e) Recruit or admission of K o ate indigenes into services and training institutions of the Armed Forces, Police and Paramilitary organizations.
- f) Authentication of indigene-ship, printing and attestation of relevant certificates.
- g) Securing aid and contact with Foreign bodies/organizations, including embassies with a view to secure business and educational opportunities of Kano state indigenes.
- h) Providing financial assistance to recruited indigenes in the security and para-military services so as to make them fairly comfortable to concentrate and remain there.

## Major Success Recorded By the Board:

From the inception of this administration to 2009, the major success recorded by this Board includes among others the

followings:

- 1. It catered for a total of 16,354 Kano indigenes in terms of personnel recruitment into private and Government employment as well as admission into various military, para-military and other institutions of higher learning;
- The number also included 3,100 indigenes who were offered indigenes certificates. In addition the Board spent a total of

N138,401,260.98 for recruitment exercises, assistance to Kano indigenes in various institutions, purchase and distribution of application forms for recruitment and admissions as well as other welfare packages all aimed at encouraging Kano indigenes to fill their quota in federal organizations. The breakdown of activities are given below:-

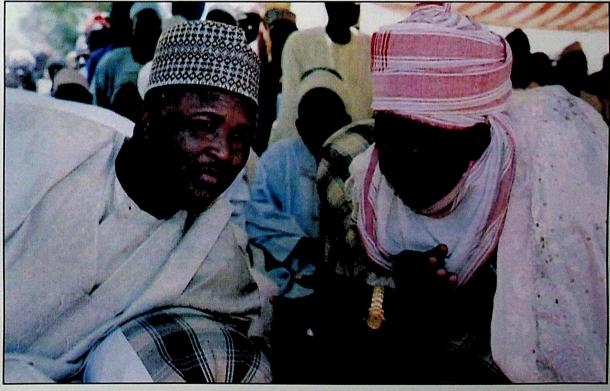

## KANO STATE RELIEF AND REHABILITATION AGENCY (SARERA)

The Kano State Relief and Rehabilitation Agency was established under the Edict No. 7 of 1986, Edict No. 3 of 1981 with the following functions:

- i. Collection of relief supply from sources approved by the Government;
- ii. Distribution of emergency relief supply to the disaster affected victims.
- iii. The determination of the priority of all emergency relief operations.
- iv. To promote the welfare and rehabilitation of the disabled persons in the state.

- To encourage the disabled persons after learning necessary trades and crafts with a view to making them selfemployed.
- vi. To find markets for the goods and products produced by the disabled persons while in training and after training.
- vii. To embark on vigorous campaign and enlightenment on the collective responsibility of the society, to maintain the untrained disabled persons in the State by providing them with reception centres at the appropriate location in the state, to receive and keep such disabled persons where their welfare needs will be adequately taken care of.

To perform its day to day duties, Kano State Relief and Rehabilitation Agency For administrative conveniences is divided into 3 Departments viz:

- a) Relief Department;
- b) Rehabilitation Department;
- c) Administration and General Services.

Below is the detailed function of the department and their actual performance during the last 6 years.

#### RELIEF DEPARTMENT:

The Department was established in 1987 as a Relief Committee under Social Welfare Ministry, for the sole aim of distributing relief assistance (mainly materials) to victims of various disasters in the State. The Committee transformed into an agency at the Establishment of the National Emergency Relief Agency.

#### **FUNCTIONS:**

Included in the functions of the Department are:-

- Collection of relief materials from sources approved by the state Government;
- Distribution of emergency relief assistance to victims of various disasters such as political/religious or communal disturbances, epidemic, fire, flood, windstorm, accidents and similar misfortunes;
- 3. Coordinating all the state Local Government Emergency Relief Committees:

- Liaison with the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and other similar humanitarian Agencies;
- 5. Coordinate activities of self-help group and voluntary organizations engaged in emergency operation;
- Adviser to the Executive Governor on Emergency preparedness and response.

#### SOURCE OF FUNDS:

The Department depends on the fina size grants receive from the State Government for realization of relief assistance materials. Donations are sometimes received from members of the public and humanitarian bodies. Federal and other Government may sometime donate funds or materials through the State Government to the Department for onward distribution to victims of various disasters.

For the purpose of efficiency and effective distribution of relief assistance, the State is divided into six zones manned by Zonal Officers. And the zones are further classified into four coordinating areas each headed by a Zonal Coordinator.

The Agency between the year 2003 and 2009 recorded the following achievements broken down on Departmental basis.

#### 1. General Administration

During the period under review the Agency has employed Forty two (42) staff, promoted One Hundred and Thirty Eight (138) senior and junior staff and

renovated/expanded its relief stores and office accommodation to boost the morale of staff for effective and efficient

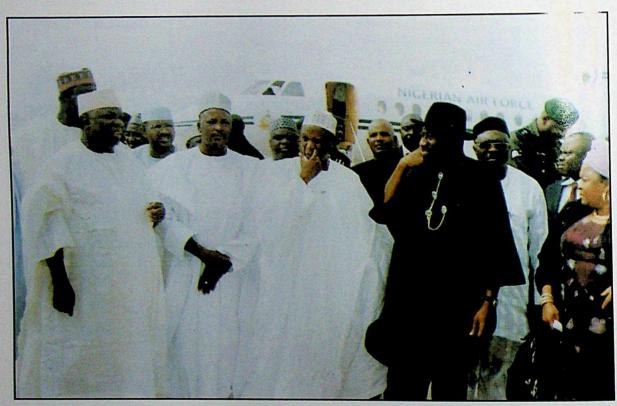

#### 3. Rehabilitation of Disabled Persons:

The Agency handles the affairs of Persons with disabilities (PWD) as well as Lunatics and mentally retarded persons.

During the period under review, Government has provided through this Agency, Sallah gesture to the Disabled Chiefs, Disabled Associations and Mentally retarded patients in the 14No. Rehabilitation Centres Located at different parts of the State.

During the period under review two rehabilitation centres for the disabled located at Gaya and Sumaila towns were fully renovated.

Also the Agency has fully embarked on annual evacuation of street lunatics after obtaining Government approval and funding. During the exercises, lunatics are evacuated from the nooks and crannies of the metropolitan streets and other local government areas with a view to catering for them with food and shelter in rehabilitation centres. At certain times, those rehabilitated are taken back to their states of origin. During the period under review capital releases made to the Agency include the following:

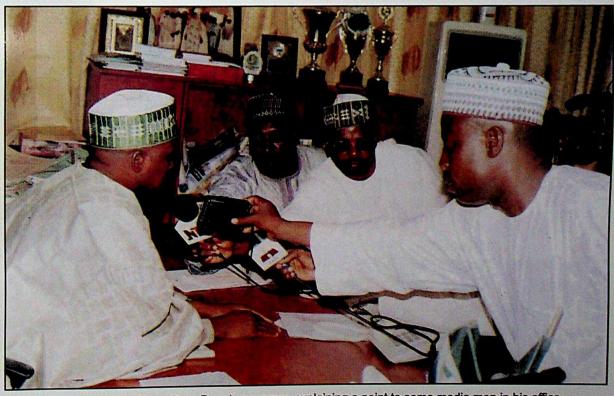

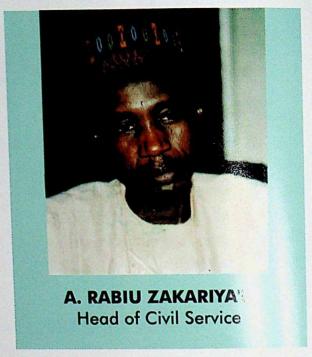

### OFFICE OF THE HEAD OF CIVIL SERVICE

The Office of the Head of Civil Service is a principal organ of government charged with the responsibility of providing guidance, leadership and direction to categories of public officers. It enunciates policies and innovations in management with a view to boost the morale of civil servants and enable them discharge their duties more efficiently.

In broad terms, the duties of the office of the Head of Civil Service include:-

- Providing leadership and direction to the civil service by
- maintaining high morale, espirit de corps and good image of the service.
- Fostering Professionalism among civil servants.
- Advise the Governor on appointment And deployment of permanent secretaries.
- Promote good relationships between commissioners and other political office holders on one hand and permanent secretaries on the other
- Career development of civil servants, including training schemes
- Establishment matters of the civil service.
- Provide management services to civil service.
- Personnel records and statistics of the civil service
- Civil Service Pension scheme.
- Staff salaries wages and allowances



- Civil service training institutions
- Represent the civil service at the State Executive Council meeting.
- Coordinate industrial relationships and provide secretariat for the public service negotiating councils and the national council on establishment

The office of the Head of Civil Service, as it is presently constituted was reestablished in 1998 in accordance with the approved recommendation in the AYIDA REPORT after about 15 years break. It is composed of the Manpower, Establishment and Special Duties Directorates with each headed by a permanent secretary, Directors and Deputy Directors.

Since its re-establishment and especially under the present civilian administration, the office, under the innovative, meticulous and versatile civil servant in

the person of Alhaji Rabi'u Zakariya'u, has done creditably well to improve the welfare, professionalism and credibility of civil servants. The Head of Civil Service has exhibited exemplary and transparent leadership, sincerity of purpose and tenacity to principles on improved image and quality of service rendered by civil servants.

As one of the strategic centers for the state policy implementation and staff control, the office of the Head of Civil Service relates with all government organizations, maintains high staff morale, espirit de corps and good image of the service, in addition to providing impeccable guidance on establishment matters as accedures

The Manpower Development Directorate came into existence over 20 years as a department under a Director until its upgrading to the status of a Directorate under permanent secretary in June 2001.

To help develop an efficient, highly skilled and well motivated workforce for the civil service

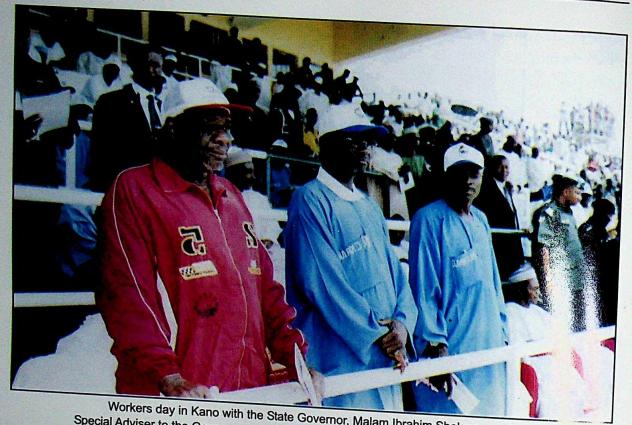
# THE MAIN FUNCTIONS OF MANPOWER DIRECTORATE

In specific terms the main responsibilities include:

- initiating and reviewing policy matters related to manpower and planning as well as advising the government on same
- identifying the training needs of the service and addressing them
- Coordination and compilation of personnel budget of the state
- Boding of medical students
- Representation on various councils and committees
- Processing of subvention for Kano University of Science and Technology.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS 2003 2009**

In keeping faith with its statutory function of handling staff training matters, the manpower directorate on 12th February, 2004 reconstituted the Kano state training committee which was established in 5/2/2002 to the status of state staff Development and manpower Training committee. The reconstitution of the committee made up of 7 permanent secretaries from the office of Head of Civil Service, Cabinet Office, Ministries of

Finance, Budget and Planning, Education as well as Local Government in addition to other Directors in the office of Head of Civil Service and Administration and General service, was informed by the need to strengthen and refocus the committee to make it capable of meeting the staff development needs of the service effectively. Furthermore, it was upgraded by expanding its membership to include some permanent secretaries and all the Directors in the Office of the Head of Civil Service and representatives from outside the office of the Head of Service. The committee's responsibilities included the regulation of all issues pertaining to staff development and training in the civil service, as well as advising the government on such matters.

In line with its mandate of advising the

government on numerous matters pertaining to service, particularly those associated with staff development and training; enhancing professionalism, the promotion of efficient service delivery and prudence, as well as nurturing the development of a result-oriented civil service; the committee met regularly and treated numerous manpower issues.

Also in pursuance of its main functions, the Directorate carried out various activities related to the following:-

- Retreat
- Local training
- in service training
- Staff recruitment
- Overseas training
- Personal emoluments, budget assessment and defense

#### RETREAT

During the last 6 years alone May 2004 May 2009, the Directorate carried out separate retreats for permanent secretaries, heads of parastatals and chief executives of government owned companies and extra-ministerial departments and for Directors and Registrar of tertiary institutions and judiciary from May 7th 9th May 2004 and 3rd to 5th December 2004 respectively at Zaranda Hotel, Bauchi and Kongo Conference Latel, Zaria.

During the 2 Retreats, management and over service matters were extended discussed, the service x-ray problems highlighted and the way forward for the civil service was charted. While much knowledge was imparted, the participants were fully motivated and communiqués and resolutions made to guide individual official conduct with a view to reposition the service, move it forward and make it result and service-oriented.

To ensure that the benefits of the 2 retreats were properly assimilated and by all, a follow up retreat in February 2006 was organized for all categories of senior civil servants, including permanent secretaries, chief executives of parastatals, and directors in all sectors of the public service at Kongo Conference Hall, Zaria. Similarly, the third retreat for permanent secretaries and chief executives of Parastatals was organized in June, 2008 at Bauchi.

### LOCAL TRAINING

Training and re-training as one of the key

responsibilities of the Directorate was pursued with great vigour during the period under review. The aim was to carefully x-ray the civil service and identify key areas and cadres that needed further training and re-training. The trainings were organized to address observed deficiencies, introduce the participants to new skills, new approaches, methods, concepts, policies and better ways in their fields, so that staff capabilities and capacities could be upgraded and enhanced for greater productivity and efficiency. This was in addition to keeping the staff fully motivated.

All trainings were organized with clear and achievable objectives, which were measured at the end of each exercise. The relevance of the trainings and retrainings conducted could be discerned from their objectives, course contents, course reports and communiqués released at the end of the training sessions. Also modest achievements have been recorded in this area of endeavour. The large size of the civil service and inadequacy of funds had greatly hampered the attainment of envisaged target.

#### **FOREIGN TRAINING**

Foreign training of civil servants which constitutes another important segment at enhancing the quality and performance of the service through training/retraining and to keep civil servants abreast with new developments going on in their fields of endeavour in other parts of the world; has been pursued with great vigour. The partial lifting of the embargo of foreign training which existed for over ten years

before the inception of the present Administration was to ensure that civil servants are not permanently denied the chance of improving their skills in specialized courses with proven benefit to the state and their organizations and which are not available in any Nigerian institution. The ban which was lifted on 23rd April 2004, spell out clearly the

conditions and guidelines to be considered for all applications for foreign study.

Since the relaxation of the embargo on foreign training many applications were received and assessed by the staff development and manpower training committees.

# IN SERVICE TRAINING

Aside from organizing local courses for particular cadres and groups, the Directorate within the last 6 years, sponsored many civil servants, from different ministries and other governmental organizations to undergo further training on in-service in institutions of higher learning in the country. This was done by sending training forms/formats along with dget circulars advising ministries organizations to submit to the Directate their training proposals for the in ang budget years. These were colla assessed and incorporated in the ectorate's budget.

in the pursuit of these responsibilities, the Directorate recorded the following achievements:-

- 10,210 officers of various cadre were sponsored for local and overseas training workshops, seminars and conferences within the last 6 years
- The sum of N539,103,253.4 was committed to training programmes for civil servants during the last 6 years

#### **REVIEW OF ALLOWANCES**

To encourage all staff undergoing local and in-service courses various allowances, including 1st and 2nd week's allowances, monthly allowances, research and project allowances were reviewed upwards.

The upward review was in graduated scale in accordance with the grade level of the officer as well as the type of course he/she is attending as indicated below:-

- 1- 1st fourteen day allowances was reviewed from N5 per day to N500 per day for GI.01-03 while the highest upward review for officers on GI. 15 and above was from N25.00 to N2, 500.00
- 2- Monthly local course allowance upward review was in the range of N50.00 to N1, 000.00 per month for officers on G1.15 and above Formerly enjoying N120.00 per month now enjoy N5, 000.00 per month when schools are in session
- Books allowance upward review was in the range of N120.00 for certificate courses which was raised to N10, 000.00 while the highest for those on PhD courses formerly fixed at N50, 000.00 is now raised to N250, 000.00.
- Project allowances which was formerly pegged at N200.00 has now been raised to N10,000.00 while the highest for Ph.D courses formally fixed at N50,000 is now N250,000.00.

# TOTAL No. OF STAFF EMPL (12) 25,550 BONDING OF MEDICAL STUDENTS

Bonding of medical students of Kano State origin who reached levels 4 and 5 of their professional training in the university was another area which is now handled by Manpower Directorate. The bonding of category of students aimed at providing adequate financial support to them during their critical period of training, especially taking cognizance of the financial costs involved and to guarantee the regular absorption of indigenous doctors into the state service.

Given the dearth of indigenous doctors in the employment of the state and growing need of their services due to the high population growth rate in the state, bonding of medical students would help a great deal in their subsequent retention in the service for the benefit of the public. It was in consideration of this reality and the need to properly control and adhere to rules and regulations that state government in the year 2003, transferred to Manpower directorate, from Hospital Management Board, the bonding of medical students.

Sequei to this, the bonding policy was reviewed and bonding monitoring committee was setup under the Manpower Directorate, with members drawn from Establishment Directorate. With the bonding policy was reviewed and bonding committee in place, the change paid to students were increased from GI 05 to GI 07 and

book allowances were increased, while an additional incentive project allowance was introduced

The review of bonding policy and the setting up of the monitoring committee as well as increase in allowances and the introduction of new ones have gone along way to serve as incentives for more medical students to enter the bonding agreement, while the students on their part find it easier to finance their studies, researches and project

The Establishment Directorate in the Office of the Head of Civil Service is charged with the following responsibilities:

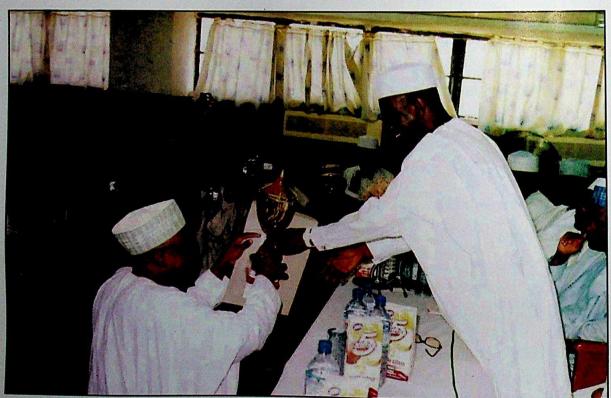

## MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

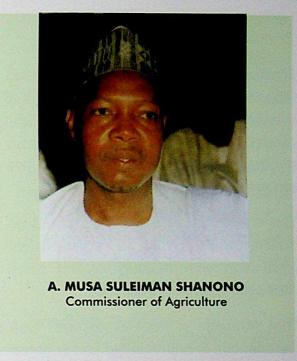
#### INTRODUCTION

The setting up of a Transition Committee by the present administration set the ball rolling for series of Development Projects and Programmes to take-off in both sectors of the economy, including Agriculture. The Agriculture sub committee was given a nine-point policy as terms of reference for the preparation of a blue print for agricultural development with particular emphasis on Food Security and Sufficiency.

The sub committee made mendations to government on how to be the stated nine-point as a second with the stated nine-point recorded, it is very clear that the intention of the administration towards ensuring Food Security and Sufficiency has been translated into action.

As a major employer of labor, (being the main stay of the State's populace economic activity) and source of income generation to, as well as its immense potentials in reducing poverty, the present administration has since its inception in May, 2003 accorded agriculture a priority and the sector remained a focal area for investment by the Government.

The launching and continued implementation of the state's Mass Food Production Programme is a clear testimony of this noble objective. Farmers were formed into groups with the provision of all the necessary production inputs including seeds, chemicals,



fertilizers and extension services. This translated into increase in total food production over the previous years.

The provision of adequate assorted fertilizers to farmers as a principal production input, as well as other vital services in other agricultural production endeavors, such as the Special Mass Food Production Programme, vigorously pursued by the State Agricultural and Rural Development Agency (KNARDA), Veterinary Services, Livestock and Poultry Development, Agricultural Mechanization, fisheries Development as well as Youth and Alarammomi empowerment packages has over years improved level of agricultural productivity of the state.

Livestock health and Development has received attention through re-stocking of Livestock Development Centres.

Improvement of Grazing Reserves, Stock routes, Conservation of Fodders, Livestock Markets and the Veterinary Services across the State.

Enhancement of Agricultural Mechanization through procurement of tractors, repairs of the existing ones and other harvesting equipment is also another area where Government has performed.

The main stay of the State's populace economic activity is agricultural production with majority of the State citizens employed in the sector.

The farmers in the State are well experienced in both rain fed and irrigated agricultural production. Essentially, Agriculture in the state is characterised by the following::

Rain fed agricultural production is supported with irrigated production widely practiced in Fadama areas, small and large irrigation schemes. The availability of these resources has increased cropping intensity for over 3 decades.

Crop production is widely under taken by almost every household at small holder level, with large scale farming practiced in the southern fringes of the state. The state has over 1.4 million hectares of cultivable land.

Dominant crops produced include:-Cereals (Sorghum, Millet, Maize and Rice); Legumes (Groundnut, Cowpea and Soya bean) and Vegetables

(Tomatoes, Peppers and Onions).

Livestock production is predominantly pastoral. Cattle are mainly owned and reared by nomadic Fulani while, settled Fulani and Hausa farmers rear sheep and goats with modern poultry farming gaining prominence among house holds in the State. The presence of large and small water bodies in the State has made fish production an important source of livelihood.

#### THE MINISTRY:

The Ministry of Agriculture and stead Resources is one of the first german Ministries set-up in 1967 when at a came into being in the Federation. It coordinates and implements Agricultural policies of the Government. The Ministry does this through six (6) Departments, Namely:

- i. Administration and General Services
- ii. Planning, Research and Statistics
- iii. Livestock and Poultry Services
- iv. Agricultural Engineering Services
- v. Veterinary Services
- vi. Agricultural Services, Produce Inspection and Fisheries.

There are also three (3) Parastatals operating under the supervision of the Ministry, these are:

- i) Kano State Agricultural Supply Company (KASCO).
- ii) Kano State Agricultural and Rural Development Authority (KNARDA).

iii) Kano State Zoological and Wildlife Management Agency.

# BRIEF ON STRUCTURE AND FUNCTIONS OF DEPARTMENTS & PARASTATALS

Administration and General Services

The Department has five (5) sections of: Establishment, Accounts, Internal Audit, External Audit and Stores. It is responsible for advice on personnel and policy issues. It is also in charge of Finance Management; ensure maintenance of proper accounting systems and records. In addition, the machine welfare such as recruitment, accounts, training, discipline etc.

Planning, Research and Statistics

The Department has nine (9) units of Planning, Budget, Monitoring and Evaluation, Research and Library Services, Agricultural Statistics, Building Maintenance, Building Construction, Computer and Information and Publicity.

It is responsible for coordinating activities of other Departments in Project Preparation, Monitoring and Evaluation. Supervision of Ministerial Buildings and Procurement of Agricultural journals, Books, Magazines and Newspapers.

**Livestock and Poultry Services** 

The Department has two (2) Divisions of Livestock and Poultry. The Livestock Division is responsible for Livestock improvement through Cross breeding and

improved Management Practices. The Poultry Division is responsible for both Production and Extension services.

Agricultural Engineering Services

The Department has three (3) Divisions of Agricultural Mechanization, Vehicles Maintenance and Applied Research and Fabrication. It is responsible for reducing human labour and production cost, through the use of Tractors, Combine Harvesters etc. The Department also design and fabricate simple tools as well as repairs and maintenance of Vehicles and Electric Generators.

**Veterinary Services** 

The Department has five (5) sections of Disease Control, Curative and Epidemiology, Stock Route and Livestock Markets, Hides and Skin improvement and Veterinary Public Health and Meat Inspection. It is responsible for the control of Livestock Disease through Mass Animal Vaccination Campaigns, Provision of efficient Livestock Health Care, Control of Livestock Movement and ensure quality control of Hides and Skin for Export.

Agricultural Services, Pest Control, Produce Inspection and fisheries

The Department has three (3) Divisions of Agricultural Services, Produce Inspection and Pest Control and that of Fisheries. It is responsible for Mass Multiplication and Production of Improved Seeds, Protection of both stored and field produce, inspection and grading of farm

produce, Developing of Irrigation project areas under the Ministry and Production of different Fish Species.

# Kano Agricultural Supply Company (KASCO)

The Company was established and incorporated as a Limited liability in October 1981 and started its operation in 1982. It has five (5) Departments of Finance, Accounts, Commercial, Personnel and Production. It has the Primary Objective of ensuring the provision of appropriate Agricultural inputs in sufficient quantities to the farmers in the State, through its retail outlets spread all over the State.

# Kano State Agricultural and Rural Development Authority (KNARDA)

KNARDA was established in 1982, with the primary aim of revamping Agriculture and boosting food and cash crop production along with infrastructural and Rural Development. It is also responsible for Agricultural Extension Delivery in the State. The Authority sources improved agricultural technologies from National and International Research Institutes, which are validated before being disseminated to the teeming farmers of the State for adoption.

#### SHEKARAU ADMINISTRATION

#### INTRODUCTION

As a major employer of labour for over 80% of Kano State populace and source of income generating activity, as well as its immense potentials in reducing poverty, the Kano State Government under the leadership of His Excellency, Mallam (Dr) Ibrahim Shekarau has since inception on May 29, 2003 accorded agriculture a major priority with a lot of emphasis on stimulating sustainable increase in production and the sector remained a focal area for investment by the Government.

known fact that, within these six v the present democratically elected ment of Excellency, the state has recorded remarkable achievement towards the journey of improving the livelihood of the good people of Kano State, more especially in the field of Agriculture. The State Government carefully designed and introduced a number of interventions for the sector under various programmes such as the Special Mass Food Production; Accelerated Industrial Crops Production; Commercial Agriculture Development and the Kano State Rice Development among others. These are geared towards accelerating sustainable growth and increased food production, alleviating poverty, increasing farmers' income and making raw materials available to Agroindustries.

In the course of developing the sector, this

administration has collaborated with many National and International Organizations to bring in new ideas. production technologies and additional human, financial and material resources. So far, the new rice development programme consisting of extensive rice production and rehabilitation/expansion of irrigation lands of 13 dams has already started with MARDITECH Corporation of Malaysia to carry out technical studies that will enable the State harness its abundant water and land resources for the benefit of the people. It is expected that these studies will provide sufficient data that will allow for the rehabilitation of the dams and for expansion of the irrigation infrastructure. When completed, there will be more than 9, 000 hectares of irrigated land available, largely dedicated to paddy rice production and the present production level of about 300, 000 metric tons for paddy, will also reach 1 million metric tons per annum.

In addition the State Government has accepted to participate in the National Programme for Food Security, Fadama III and Commercial Agriculture Development Project. In fact, the State Government has already paid its counterpart fund to finance the World Bank Programmes. These among others are laudable activities with huge economic benefits that will translate into increased income, provision of gainful employment and reduced poverty of the populace which is in line with the State Government's vision for a "comprehensive agricultural"

development that seeks to exploit the State abundant land, water, human and other resources for an all year round agricultural production integrated with agro-processing and value addition that will contribute significantly to the economic growth of the State".

# Brief on Project/Programmes Executed (MAY, 2003 MAY 2009)

The following are a comprehensive brief on some programmes executed by the administration since inception on 29, May 2003.

# Agricultural Mechanization Programme:

The Programme aimed at increased mechanization to support integrated agriculture by encouraging the development of improved land tillage technologies; promote increased use of improved traction technology packages; improve the former tractor ratio as well as support small, medium and large scale farmers to own tractors and other farm machinery.

The sum of N892, 624, 570.80 was expended in achieving the followings:

i. The sum of N825, 048, 426 was expended for the procurement and distribution of 243 new tractors with their complementary implements to each of the 44 LGA's, KNARDA, KUT, Large Scale Farmers/Farmer Co-operative groups as well as the Tractor Hiring Services of the Ministry.

ii. Repair and Refurbishing of 22 tractors at the cost of N11, 580, 048.00

- iii. Procurement of 10 tractor implements (Harrows) at the cost of N4, 500, 000.00
- iv. Repairs, Refurbishing of Plant/Equipment, Vehicles and Supply of Workshop materials at the cost of N31, 496,096.00
- v. Purchase of 6 new service vehicles at the cost of N20million

Grazing Reserves, Cattle Dams and Fodder Conservation: The project is aimed at rehabilitating and maintaining cattle grazing reserves, cattle route and livestock watering facilities and project is of supplementary feeds as well as door conservation for efficient utilization cresidue and reduced pastoralist macconflicts.

The sum of N18, 261, 300 was expended in achieving the following:

Demarcation of 25 grazing reserves located in Wailare (Makoda LGA); Dunawa (D/Tofa LGA); Godiya (Kabo LGA); Kwandawa (Tsanyawa LGA); Fulatan (Rogo LGA); Tsaidawa (Kiru LGA); Dausayi (Gezawa LGA); Achika (Wudil LGA); Nariya (Kibiya LGA); Santolo (D/Kudu LGA); Toranke (Ajingi LGA); Yanoko (Tofa LGA); Jigawa (Ungogo LGA); Sumaila (Sumaila LGA); Bunkure (Bunkure LGA); Marke (Minjibir LGA) Yan Ganau (Tsanyawa LGA); JOBE (Gaya LGA); Kira Kira (Garko LGA); Sakalmawa (Ajingi LGA); Kanawa (Sumaila LGA); Kera/Indabo (Wudil LGA); Lamirawa (Takai LGA); Danbare (Kumbotso LGA) and Imawa (Warawa LGA.).

- ii. Procurement of supplementary feeds for sale to farmers:
  - a. Wheat offals 1,200 bags
  - b. Cotton seed cake 400 bags
  - c. Mineral salt lick 400 blocks
  - iii. Production of 15, 000 bales of rice straw and grass for sale to livestock farmers.
  - iv. Rehabilitation of 4 earth dams at Gandun-Bichi (Bichi LGA); Kode (D/Kudu); Achika (Wudil LGA) and Yar Maraya (T/wada LGA) for livestock watering.

ogramme is aimed at improving nous livestock through crossing with exotic breeds in order to example and meat production.

The sum of N26, 774, 200 was expanded in achieving the following:

- Restocking with 8 Friesian Service Bulls; 2 Drought Master Bulls; 55 Sokoto red Goats; 34 Rahaji Heifers; 2 Rahaji Bulls; 215 Yankasa Ewe for the 8 Livestock Development Centers of Bagauda, Tiga, Rano, Dangora, Gaya, Danbatta, Kadawa and Bunkure.
- ii. Procurement of supplementary feeds and drugs for the 8 Livestock Development Centers of Bagauda, Tiga, Rano, Dangora, Gaya, Danbatta, Kadawa and Bunkure.

### Artificial Insemination:

The project is aimed at the production of improved livestock by upgrading the local breeds using Artificial Insemination

techniques.

The sum of N10, 869, 280 was expended in achieving the followings:

- i. Procurement of 2 Friesian Bulls for semen collection
- ii. ii. Procurement of frozen semen, Liquid Nitrogen and other Al equipment.
- iii. Relocation of center from Hotoro to Bagauda and repairs of Al center infrastructure.
- iv. One hundred and twenty (120) cows belonging to government and private farmers were inseminated.

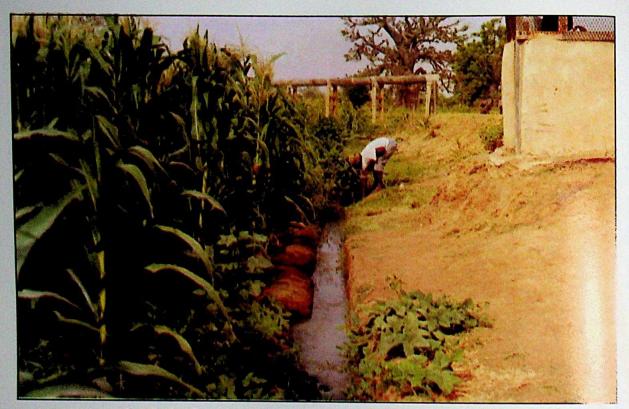
#### Poultry production

The programme is aimed at increasing the availability of day-old chicks/point of lay pullets for small holder poultry farmers for an increased income generation.

The sum of N29, 000, 000 was expended in achieving the followings:

- Upgrading of the old hatchery incubator by converting it to digital operating system.
- ii. Procurement of layer parent stock, day-old chicks, feeds drugs and equipment.
- iii. 10, 000 commercial layer day-old chicks hatched and sold to small holder poultry farmers.
- iv. 3, 000 point of lay pullets sold to small holder farmers.
- v. 2, 000 exotic cock reared and sold to house holds for upgrading local chickens.

Disease controls and Eradication:

The Programme is aimed at sustaining a healthy livestock population across the State and, prevent the spread of major livestock disease especially CBPP; PPR and Rabies through the conduct of mass vaccinations.

The sum of N14, 000, 000 was expended in achieving the followings:

- i. 973, 476 heads of cattle were vaccinated against CBPP through annual cattle vaccination exercises.
- ii. 442, 831 heads of Sheep and Goats were vaccinated against PPR disease; 4, 066 dogs vaccinated against rabies and canine distemper.
- iii. Over 2 million poultry were vaccinated against three major diseases.
- iv. Avian influenza:

- a. The 2006/2007 A.I. outbreak was successfully controlled by depopulating 98/54 farms respectively.
- Payment of about N40.9 million to A.I. affected poultry farmers as assistance by the State government.

# Stock routes and Livestock Markets:

The primary objective of this programme is disease surveillance and preventing the spread of trans-boundary animal diseases. To ensure this, a friendly environment with improved sanitation standards is provided in the livestock markets and control posts. The following were achieved:

 i. Construction of loading ramps at Wudil Cattle Market at the cost of N703, 400.00

- ii. Drilling of Mechanized borehole also at Wudil Cattle Market at the cost of N4,314,500
- iii. Hides and skin quality improvement: the project is aimed at ensuring good quality hides and skins are available for both local industries and exports.

#### The following were achieved:

- a. 16 No. concrete, salt treatment slabs were constructed wrategically
- b. 10 model using cradles were constructed distributed to some electronses at the cost of
  - Constant of 4 salting slabs at Falgors Gura, Takai and Badume as well as Lapply of Hides/Skin tools and equipment at the cost of N239, 000.00
- v. Supply of 12 Motorcycles at the cost of N640, 000.00
- vi. 42 foot tradle were purchased and distributed to butchers for easier and hygienic inflation of slaughtered animals prior to flaying.
- vii. The following slaughter figures were also recorded during the period under review:
  - a. Cattle 490,750
  - b. Sheep 3,519,889
  - c. Goats, 2, 855, 507
  - d. Camels 29,509

### Veterinary Hospitals:

- i. A total of 1, 883, 800 animals cases were treated during the period.
- ii. 2,411 different samples were handled by the laboratory for various

- investigation and diagnosis.
- iii. Over 400 students from ABU, BUK, UDUS, UNIMAID, ATBU, ABCOA, SRCOE, FCE, KUT, and COA/Umuduke were received by the department for SIWES practical attachment.

# Meat Inspection and Veterinary Public Health

A total of 476, 093 cattle; 1, 553, 421 Sheep; 1, 220, 384 Goats and 212, 517 Camels were slaughtered and inspected at the various registered slaughter premises of the State. During the course of inspection, 3 whole carcasses; 121, 924 foetuses and organs were condemned for not being fit for human consumption.

### Purchase of Grains for Buffer Stock

The Programme is aimed at protecting farmers' slump during harvest period and protect consumers from price escalation during lean period.

#### The following were achieved:

Procurement and sales of 25, 576 metric tons (or 255, 765 bags) of assorted grains (comprising mainly maize, millet and sorghum) worth N1, 124, 588, 320 to public at subsidy during lean, Ramadan and or emergency periods.

Field Crops Protection:

The project is aimed at reduction in crop losses due to pest and disease, post-harvest, as well as ensure improvement in the availability of wholesome food to consumers.

The sum N5, 000, 000 was expanded in achieving the following:

- Procurement of crops protection chemicals and equipment
- ii. Establishment of an office at the Dawanau International Grains market.

# Kano State Government/Leventis Foundation Nigeria Agricultural Training Institute, Panda

The project is aimed at training of youth on efficient farm management practices to enable utilization of agriculture as a means of empowerment.

The sum of N63, 820, 000.00 was expended in achieving the following as State counterpart fund for running the School:

- i. Provision of infrastructures (dining hall, hostel expansion, mosque, clinic, staff houses, water supply toilets etc)
- ii. Training 635 youths from 44LGAs on

modern farming techniques at the school.

Fish Seed Multiplication

The project is aimed at increasing fish seed production for economic development and enhanced nutritional status of the populace.

The sum of N13, 000,000 was expended in achieving the following:

- i. Rehabilitation work on indoor and outdoor hatchery complex of the Bagauda Fish Farm.
- ii. Completion of two production and de-silting of nine ponds.
- iii. Supply of fish fingerling to 25 p. ate
- iv. Rehabilitation work on Chalawa ish
- v. Improvement of community fish ponds.

### Fertilizer Procurement and Distribution:

The programme is aimed at ensuring timely supply of subsidized production inputs, especially fertilizers to farmers for increased food production.

The following achieved:

Procurement and sales of 253 099.85 tons (or 5, 061,997) bags of assorted fertilizers worth over N12.0 Billion were to farmers across the state at the subsidized price of N1, 000/bag.

## <u>Crop (Industrial Crops) Rehabilitation</u> <u>Programme:</u>

The programme is aimed at promoting and supporting an increased production of industrial crops especially cotton, groundnuts and maize for enhanced industrial development of the State.

The following were achieved:

- Provision of support to over 6, 600 farmers in form of subsidized inputs (seeds, fertilizer, pesticides) worth N29, 726, 470.00 to promote production of groundnut, cotton and maize for improve availability of raw materials for agro-allied industries.
- ii. Subsequent production of 11, 081.70 tons of cotton; 1, 360.75 tons of groundnut and 11, 303.5 tons of maize at porth N1, 115, 133, 500.00 by femores which were supported by government.

### Rehabilitation of grain Stores:

A total of 16 grains/fertilizer stores were rehabilitated at a total cost of N4, 000, 000.00. The Stores are located at Farm Center, Makole, Dangora, Minjibir, Maganda, Mariri, and Gwarzo.

## Youth Empowerment:

 Support to 202 Young Farmers Clubs in 44LGA's with farm inputs (seeds, seedlings, garden tools, fertilizer, insecticide, herbicide, day-old chicks, rabbits, goats, livestock/poultry feed) worth N6, 373, 880.00.

Office renovation in the headquarters were carried out at a total cost of

N11,160,207.45 in 2008 and a new office structure is been constructed at the cost of N5,583,883.00.

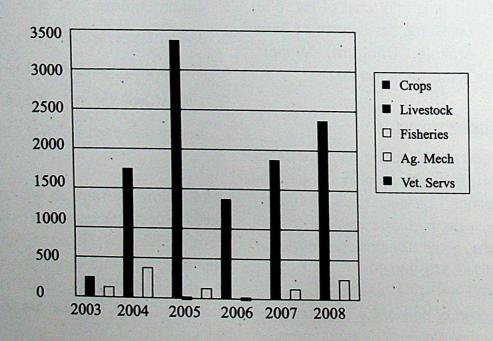

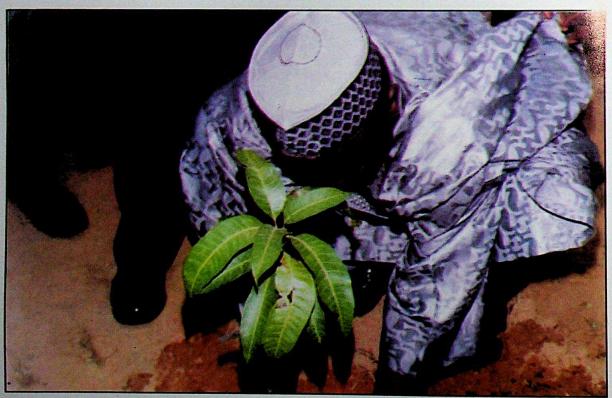

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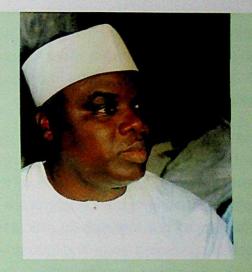

### MINISTRY OF COMMERCE, INDUSTRY, COOPERATIVES AND TOURISM

Commerce, Industry and Agriculture are the main-stay of the economy of Kano State. Kano State's pre-eminence as a commercial and Industrial centre spans so many centuries back, before the creation of the state in the late sixties. The area referred to as Kano today was an ancient terminus of the famous trans-Saharan trade routes that flourished for aturies, attracting merchants, men and scholars from North Africa, bian Peninsula and the European ries that bordered the ranean Sea. The area excelled in the fields of commerce, handicrafts, metal works, leather works, weaving, tanning enculture. This ancient solid economic base paved the way for the present commercial and industrial vibrancy of the state.

In Kano state today, the task of promoting commercial, industrial and cooperative and Tourism activities falls within the schedule of the Ministry of commerce, industry and cooperatives and Tourism. The ministry is essentially serviceoriented, charged principally with the responsibility of initiating, motivating, promoting and executing Government Policies as they principally affect the commercial, industrial cooperatives and tourism activities within and outside the state for the purpose of achieving an accelerated economic growth and development as well as promoting the economic well being of the people. Without doubt, the Ministry is the major

instrument to achieving economic growth through implementing policies related to the commerce, industry cooperatives and tourism sub-sectors for the purpose of energizing and reinvigorating the economy to be on a sound footing. To perform its day to day activities, the Ministry is divided into five (5) departments, namely:-

- (a) Administration and general services
- (b) Industry
- (c) Commerce
- (d) Cooperatives
- (e) Tourism

In addition to these departments, the ministry performs its duties by effectively supervising/coordinating the activities of Abubakar Rimi Market, Daula Hotel and Kano State Tourism Board.

#### **ROLE OF GOVERNMENT**

Owing to the strategic importance of

commerce and industrial activities in the life of the ordinary Kano man, successive Governments in the state have endeavoured to create, improve and sustain an enabling environment to boost and enhance all forms of economic activities.

The aim is not for Government to get directly involved in trading and commercial activities (since most of the industrial and commercial concerns are in private hands) but to carefully articulate policies of promoting trade and industries as well as giving out industrial and commercial loans and the provision and maintenance of modern infrastructures with a view to advance economic activities and enhance the general economic climate.

Through the articulation and adoption of various liberal packages of incentives, successive governments have established industrial estates most notably at Bompai, Sharada, Chalawa, Hadejia road, Katsina road, Zaria road etc. with modern infrastructures while new industries are given, among other things, free consultancy and feasibility services in addition to financial loans and tax holidays.

Through the instrumentality of Government, various studies on the industrial and commercial potentials of the state, coupled with the establishment of Kano state Investment Properties Ltd have greatly advanced economic activities leading to spectacular

achievements even during the period when the economy has not being doing particularly well.

Apart from assisting private investors, the Government itself on some rare occasions ventured directly in the establishment of industries in the 70's and 80's, the most notable of which are the Kano State cotton ginnery, Northern Nigeria floor mills and Kano State Textile Printers Ltd. Although all of these industries have either been fully privatized or leased out, the have significantly improved the industrial profile of the state.

In the commerce sub-sector, successive governments have been forth coming with new initiatives and innovations such as the establishment of specialized markets which are aimed at decongesting the existing multi-products markets. The most notable of these markets include the Dawanau Market (grains), Naibawa (fruits), Yan kaba (vegetable), Kwanar singer (provision/food), Kwari (Textile); Sabongari (General merchandising). Owing to these innovations and the general infrastructural development and maintenance of these markets undertaken by Government, Commercial activities have continued to grow in leaps and bounds.

### **SHEKARAU ADMINISTRATION**

The advent of SHEKARAU administration in May 2003 coincided with period of intense activities in the ministry of commerce, industry and cooperative

especially in the area of reinvigorating commercial and industrial activities.

In specific terms, the Ministry within the last 6 years has recorded tremendous achievements as indicated sectorally below:

#### COMMERCE

Promotion of made in Kano products through the provision of product show cases displaying the products in a most splendid and gorgeous manner to attract sister as well as market the products.

Creati of conducive atmosphere in our mark to facilitate commercial activities. The following markets were rehabilitated:

- (a) Danbatta Cattle Market was uplifted by provision of off-loading facility and construction of 5 gates at a cost of N2.5 Million.
- (b) Wudil Cattle Market upliftment through the provision of off-loading facility costing N2.5 Million.
- (c) K/Wambai Market rehabilitation and construction of drainages costing N6,059,613.49;
- (d) Galadima Road Market rehabilitation, construction of 5 gates, drainages and access road at a cost of N1,300,000.00;
- (e) Muhammadu Abubakar Rimi Market outstanding liabilities have been settled and appreciable level of physical development recorded

as a result of austere and charismatic leadership of the ministry. Inuwa Mai Mai Road reconstruction with interlocking and culverts and improving environmental sanitization of the market, Commercial activities now flourish in conducive atmosphere;

- (f) Wapa Bureau De Change rehabilitation and slabbing of drainage N2.2 Million. In the last 6 years, this administration has introduced new initiative, and innovations to promote commerce and industry such as:
- (a) Moral support & other contributions to the successful setting up of Abuja Securities and Commodities Exchange Commission at the premises of Kano Cooperative Federation. The commission assists farmers in the State to get realistic and better price for their farm products;
- (b) Promotion of Export of product from the State to increase earning potentials of farmers and export merchants thereby increasing foreign exchange earnings. This move led to the setting up of Export Production Village at Kura which is about to start operations;
- (c) The State Government lends support to the actualization of 3 gigantic projects aimed at revitalizing commercial and industrial activities as well as

reversing the economic decline of the State. The projects are:

- I. Inland Dry Port at Zawachiki
- II. International Modern Market along
  Zaria Road
- III. Kano Free Trade Zone at Panisau

In addition, this administration facilitated the movement of African Groundnut Council from Lagos to Kano. This is viewed as a blessing to the people of the State since entire agricultural sector and especially revival of groundnut production in the State was made possible.

- (d) During the period being review, the ministry has introduced measures aimed at resuscitating commercial and industrial activities. They include:
- i. Setting up and institutionalization of former Commissioners forum which meet periodically to discuss issues militating against the revival of commercial and industrial activities in the State.
- ii. The Ministry also organized the hosting of State's economic summit during which cross-section of business community and industrialists brain storm and cross-fertilize ideas to reverse the economic misfortunes of the State.
- iii. Similarly, the Ministry set-up local organizing committee that recently hosted Nigeria's economic summit for North-West & North East geopolitical zones. The conference

dealt extensively on health, education and economic issues with a view to improving the human capital resource through alleviation of poverty, provision of qualitative health care and education, both formal and informal;

- iv. Reconstitution of consumer Protection Council Committee by the State Government which has swung into action and recode some success in the seizu dangerous drugs & fake or ut standard products in our markets;
- v. In line with the State Government's philosophy of assisting victims of disasters, the Ministry has conducted survey and compiled reports based on which the State Government rendered assistance to victims of armed robberies and fire disasters at the following markets:
  - a. Kwari Market
  - b. Hajj Camp Market
  - c. Muhammadu Abubakar Rimi
  - d. Yan Katako (Kofar Ruwa)
  - e. Wapa etc.
- vi. Financial support to micro business. Disbursement of enterprise support facility loans by the State Government has continued to increase for its major role in providing financial support to petty traders. Through it, significant numbers of people are



Ahmed Yakasai and District head of Kura, Alhaji Tijjani Abubakar

being assisted to utilize their entrepreneur abilities and establish micro business. In the period under review the sum of N30 Million has been disbursed to 450 beneficiaries while N10 Million is being processed for assisting 180 micro businesses;

Vii. Private sector has been encouraged by the State Government to participate in the socio-economic development of the State. To this end, the Ministry has established good working relationship with Kano Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Mines and Agriculture (KACCIMA) and its Kaduna, Abuja and Enugu

counterparts which results in the State's participation in all trade faris organized by these chambers to promote and market Kano goods. Also good rapport have been established by the Ministry with the National Association of Small Scale Industries (NASSI) and Kano State Traders Union (KASTU). As a result of this effort, platform for public private partnership was established to address issues militating against smooth conduct of economic activities;

Interactive session was held between the State Government and private sector comprising

viii.

Banks and multi-national corporations where the need was emphasized for the private sector in the State to honor their corporate social responsibility by contributing in the socio-economic development of the State. Fruitful results has been witnessed in our education institutions where the private sector provided facilities such as computers and libraries among other assistance;

- ix. Bilateral Cooperation: The Ministry hosted the Malian Ambassador recently. During the 3 days visit, diplomatic talks in areas of reviving long standing historic and economic ties between Mali and Kano were held. The State Government had completed arrangements to reciprocate the visit by sending trade mission to Mali which was done;
- x. New International Market Project:
  Arrangements have reached
  advanced stage for the
  commencement of construction
  work of N18 Billion Ultra Modern
  Market (KANAWA
  INTERNATIONAL MARKET).

Already compensation to the tune of N412 Million has been settled and clearing of the site and road setting are in progress. The project is a partnership with private developer Messrs IDIS Limited and is based on Build Operate & Transfer (BOT) meaning; the developer will build it,

operate for 25 years and transfer to the people of the State.

When completed, the market will provide a befitting centre of commercial activities and decongest centres of commercial activities and decongest human and traffic menace in our urban markets.

Renovation of Daula Hotel The Hotel was taken over by the State Government in September, 2003 and immediately transformed and given a befitting our ook to complete with any Hotel in the State in terms of conducive release on environment.

- i. The Ministry expended the sum of N20 Million in upgrading the structure, facilities as well as off-setting outstanding staff benefits;
- ii. Other settlements by the State Government include PHCN Bill amounting to N4 Million, outstanding amount of N183,152,902.84 to the Hotel and liquidated outstanding debts to utility organizations as well as debts mounting to N24 Million to a Bank;
  - iii. In addition, the Hotel rooms were increased from 35 to 86;
  - iv. Renovation of the Hotel's Mosque and construction of a new one for females;
  - v. The Hotel laundry machines

and kitchen equipments were also upgraded along with other facilities.

Under the commerce department various measures to revanup commercial activities have been initiated with corresponding successes.

Owing to the adjustments in terms of functions, the commerce department has recorded some notable achievements as indicated below:

### Fundamens:

- mation and facilitation of export promotion wittees to enhance the acceleration of export activities in the state.
- ii. Coordinating the activities of federal parastatals on trade promotion in the state.
- iii. Coordinating the trade relationship with out side world.
- iv. Promotion and development of export activities in the state.

- vi. Facilitation the actualization of Inland Dry & Export Production Village.

#### **Internal Trades:**

The major activities/function under this division includes

- Coordination and participation at Kaduna and Abuja international trade fairs.
- ii. Coordinating and participating at Kano International Trade Fair.
- iii. Rehabilitation and development

- of major market of the State.
- iv. Establishment of new market
- v. Enterprise support facility loan.
- vi. Registration of business premises
- vii. Petroleum License Registration.

### **Business Services:**

This division runs the following functions:

- i. Public enlightenment programme.
- ii. Consumer protection activities under the consumer protection unit
- iii. Registration of business premises
- iv. Petroleum licenses registration

### **Major Achievements:**

The export Production Village in Kura will be commissioned in 2009 for commencement of full operation; this followed the release of funds in the sum of N9, 981,953.73 in 2008 fiscal year for the completion of the renovation of the site. Already 8 Offices, 4 Toilets, Conference Hall, a Workshop, Reception, Wall fencing, Mini-market have been provided.

The State Committee on EPV is working hand in hand with Nigeria Export Promotion Council to equip the offices with the required facilities. Similarly, within the year, the committee had undertaken a familiarization visit to Accra. Ghana had excelled in EPV projects.

The committee had in conjunction with NEPC undertaken a sensitization workshop in Kura to enlighten the grassroots farmers in Kura on the operations of EPV'S. Also a sensitization workshop on Moringa production and Marketing was held on 20 October under the auspices of the committee.

The State Export Promotion Committee had been dormant for 2 years. The main problem of the Committee is funding, which is only getting N100,000 subvention from NEPC. In order to rectify the situation, the Ministry had forwarded a memo to Office of the Secretary to the State Government to consider the Committee as a State Standing Committee and by extension to finance its operation. The outcome is still being a waited. The main function of the Committee as provided in Nigerian Export Promotion Council Decree No 41 section 9 of 1988 is to enlighten the Business Community on procedures and documentary of export trade.

The Kano Inland Dry Port in Zawachiki is a Federal Government Project which the State Government is facilitating through the Ministry of Commerce. The project is to be developed by a concessionaire The Dala Inland Dry Port. In order to ensure efficient and effective take up and running of the projects, state Government had consented to an invitation in the equity by taking 20%, while Mearsline will have 51% and Dala Inland Dry Port 29%.

Within the year, the certificate of occupancy of the site had been handed over to the concessionaire by the Nigerian Shippers Council. Similarly, the three equity parties have met severally to fashion out how to execute the project with clear responsibility for each. At the moral concessionaire is putting final touches of documentations with the

Nigerian Customs Service on Bonded Container after which they will mobilized to site. Already the C of O of the site had been presented to the concessionaire by His Excellency the Governor of Kano State in December 2008. There is a State Committee that facilitates the project's actualization.

### Kano Free Trade Zone:

The Kano Free Trade Zone at Panisau is yet another project of the edecal Government. Initially, the oie t experienced a snail speed in view ZE O Budgetary Allocation by the m r administration of Chief Oli Q 1 Obasanjo. However, with the effor ff a State Committee and Kano Free Zone supervised by the Honourable Commissioner of Commerce in undertaking visits to Abuja frequently, work on the project has continued appreciably. Based on series of complaints by Kano State Government on the project, the Federal House of Representative Committee on Commerce has paid an inspection visit to the site in April 2008 in order to make assessment based on the Budget Allocation to the project. The committee was totally dissatisfied with the work and therefore assured the State Government their determination to make adequate budgetary Allocation for the completion of the project.

The year 2008 was very eventful to the Ministry if one considers the number of Foreign Ambassadors that visited Kano State for Business and Investment

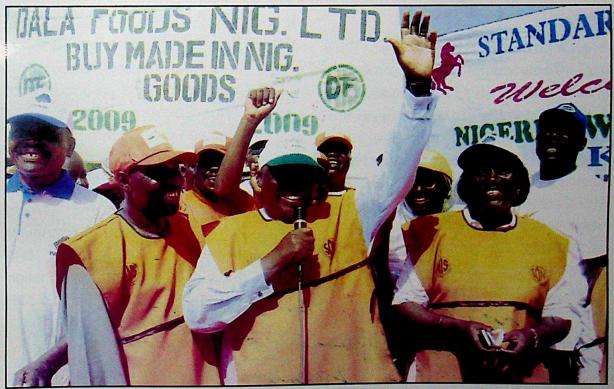
purposes. Such Ambassadors were those of Argentina, China, Iran, Australia, Tunisia and Pakistan as well as the Presidents of the Republic of Germany and that of the Republic of Netherlands, in which the Ministry had participated actively in the bilateral meetings with Business Committees of Kano and the visiting delegation. The African Groundnut council (AGC) had for the last 3 years settled in Kano on their ecretariat located at Gwarzo Road. Government had already settled another rent fees of 3 years each on the residence the Executive Secretary and their Office The Ministry had also facilitated the allocation of additional hectares of farmlands to the Council at Gaya for and research purposes. The sum of N2 million had been approved by the Government.

Although the Council is experiencing financial hardship arising from non-payment of contribution by member countries, Kano State. is making effort to assist the Secretariat with some funds for appointment purposes.

#### **Internal Trade:**

Market Development: Under Market Development, the following achievement was realized during the year 2006/2008:

a. Kofar Wambai Market: Drainage and Culverts were constructed at Kofar Wambai Sani Buhari road at a cost of N2.2 Million and Minjibir Road at the Cost of N6, 059,613.00.

- b. Construction of Gates at Galadima Market: Construction works for Gates and access road at Galadima Road Market was undertaken at the cost of N1.3 million
- c. Establishment of KANAWA International Market: Kano State Government had entered into partnership with private developer for the construction of ultra modern market at Dangwauro Area. The government has committed to N479.4m.
- d. Development of Wudil and Danbbata Cattle Markets:
  Similarly, the period under review the Ministry disbursed the sum N5 million for the construction of off and on loading of cattle stand at these markets.
- e. Product Showcase: The Department has successfully established a magnificent structure in the Headquarters of the Ministry, purposely for exhibiting made in Kano product ranging from manufactures, agric commodities and solid minerals. This initiative was facilitated by the State Government through the provision of N9992,000.00
- f. Consumer Protection: A State Committee was constituted in the year 2005. The essence of setting up the committee was to create awareness to the ultimate

- consumers on their rights as well as to fight against the attitude of adulterators of edible products. The committee had conducted series of operations in the metropolitan and confiscated contaminated and expired goods.
- g. Wapa bureau de change: Kano State Government has released the sum of N2,243,592.000 for the rehabilitation of WAPA Bureau de Change in the year 2006.
- h. New Fish Market Projection in the Ministry in the year 20 was view to decongest the Galdinal Road fish market and establish a model market. The project took off with the fence and 2 gate houses at Unguwa uku motor park with the release of N9, 894,500.00 by the State Government.
- i. Kano International Trade Fairs: Coordination and participation of State Government and some selected Local Government Areas at Kano Trade Fairs (2006-2008) with allocation of N4,882,500.00
- j. Kaduna International Trade
  Fairs: The State Government
  disbursed the sum of N4,
  868,500.00 for the participation
  and coordination of (2006-2008)
  Kano State at Kaduna
  International Trade Fair.
- k. Abuja International Trade

Fair/Exhibition: The State participated in the 3<sup>rd</sup> edition of Abuja International Trade Fair with the release of N698, 500.00. The State won the award of outstanding Exhibition in the year 2006.

### I. Business Services

- m. Radio and Television
  Programme: The Ministry is

  Government released the sum of
  N6,351,590.00 within the last 2
  years alone
- n. Registration of Business Premises: This is another key reasonability of the Ministry which generated a token revenue for the State.
- o. Enterprise Support Facility Loan Scheme: Under this initiative to support petty traders the State Government disbursed the sum of N30 million to 450 traders as soft loan.
- p. Petroleum License Registration: The Petroleum license registration is one of the

- revenue generating unit. The sum of N100, 000.00 was collected as revenue for processing of application. The low percentage of the collection is based on the deregulation of the down stream sector of the industry.
- q. Daula Hotel: In an effort to bail out the hotel from the burden of a loan facility offered by the defunct Bank of the North 1996/1997, which skyrocketed to N27 million. The State Government appealed for a waiver, which was granted. Thus, the sum of N9.7 million was paid in November 2007, but ironically, the C of O the Hotel which stands as collateral the, is yet to be returned by the Bank, despite frantic effort by the Ministry. The case is now forwarded to Ministry of Justice for appropriate action.

The Ministry having witnessed a gradual dilapidation of the Hotel in 2008, arising from inept management appointed, a senior officer in the Ministry as Sole Administrator in October 2008, Within 3 month of his stewardship, the new management made a remarkable achievements in sanitizing the workers motivation through prompt payment of salary and service charge as at when due. The management had also renovated 110 Rooms, painted, the reception, restaurant, the Banquet Hall and the outer premises. The electricity. water supply and telecomm facilities are now readily available. The restaurant and

coffee shop have resumed their normal service. Above all the physical environment of the Hotel has improved.

Consequently, efforts are now geared towards restoring the lost glory of the Hotel through a partnership between Kano State Government and a private Developer. Arrangements have reached an advanced stage to enter an agreement for the development of Daula Hotel to a five star status with additional 10 storey edifice.

### CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

A. The Ministry had also initiated the formation and constitution of a State standing Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility which was inaugurated by the Acting. Secretary to the state Government on February 2008. This is one of the efforts of the Ministry in the realization of Public Private Partnership (PPP) on the economic development of Kano State. The programme had succeeded in wooing the private sector particularly Banks notably in Education and Health Sectors.

- B. Conflict Resolution: Under Conflict Resolution, the Ministry had in the year under review intervened in resolving conflict and misunderstanding between the following:
- i. A tussle between Tanners Council and Hides and Skin Traders in February/March 2008 on supply and pricing of raw skin;
- ii. Taobat Pharmaceuticals and

Kwari Market Traders Association on breach of transaction on purchase of empty bottles;

- iii. Kantin Kwari Market on blockage of access road near Kandara Hotel:
- iv. Lee Group of Companies and the Workers Union.
- C. Investment Climate: On investment climate, the Ministry had been a principal partner and in ated facilitator of programm by the DFID and World ik. ano 4 oilot State, being one of t ! in states, has actively part al the entire programme, gs 96 and workshops hoste he VC World Bank in Abuja and Kano.

Already, the State Committee on investment climate had swung into action with a lot of progress being achieved in the land reform programme which took most in the 2008. However, in 2009, effort will be done to address the problems of multiplicity of taxes along with publicity aspects. In 2008, the sum of N500,000.00 was released by government on ICP.

### **INDUSTRY**

This department is saddled with responsibilities of providing favorable climate for establishing of large, medium and small scale industries in the State. It also ensures regular survey on the activities of industries as well as geological surveys on solid mineral resources in the State.

Like other departments, the activities of this department have received a boost during the period under review owing to the discussion by this administration to include industry in the 5 core areas to focus its attention.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

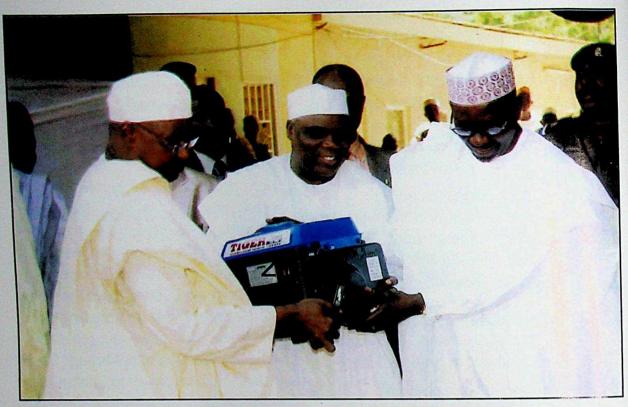
- A. As a step towards establishing
  i. industries in rural and semi-urban
  areas, this administration in its
  investment policy objectives provide
  accentives as follows:
  - ii. Industrial plots in such areas
  - Land for housing estate for strial workers in rural and semiturban areas
  - iv. Five (5) years tax holding for new constries insuch places
- B. The State Government also collaborates with Small and Medium Enterprise Development Agency (SMEDAN) for establishing of a business development through provision of business development facilities and information. The construction of the centre is in progress at Sharada Small Scale Industrial Estate.
- C. Also, the present administration in the State has partnered with the United Nations Industrial development Organization (UNIDO) to establish a common facility centre which will process foot wears, leather products and assist in training youths to develop skills and talents in leather works.

- Already land has been acquired at Club Road for the project while agreement has been reached between the State Government, UNIDO, Federal Ministry of Commerce, and NEPC on the running of the centre.
- D. Potentials for SMEs Being mostly agro and agro-allied based industrial establishments in the State, e.g. tanneries, textiles, oil mills and confectioneries, prompted the State Government to provide farmers in the state with agricultural inputs to boost production of raw materials for the industries. This effort has resulted in increase in Small and Medium Scale Industries ability to maximize productions.
- E. Provision of additional small scale Industrial Estate is in the pipeline as the current ones are exhausted. This is manifested in the development of Rice Milling Cluster at Dalili Village in Kura Local Government Area. The project intends to cluster all the scattered rice processors, par boilers and merchants within Kura for assessing their progress and development.

Similarly, Small Scale Industrial Estate at Kwanar Dawaki in Dawakin Kudu Local Government Area will soon take off while infrastructural facilities such as road networks; drainages and wall fencing have been provided.

- G. Creation of Favorable Investment Climate The Ministry set up technical steering committee to work with UK's Department of International Development (DFID) for conducting investment survey that will induce investments both domestic and international, reduce costs of doing business and ensure economic growth. In order to have good investment climate that provides opportunities and incentives to micro firms and multinationals, the committee recommended concrete measures including reduction in multiple taxes, speedy signing of C of O and expedite action by courts in the treatment of commercial cases, among others.
- H. Investment Policy Objective and Incentives to ensure a balanced distribution of industrial establishments in rural areas a package incentive has been outlined by State Government to attract prospective investors in rural and semi urban area.

The aim of the policy objectives are:

- To bring about rapid development of the industrial sector with the emphasis on utilization of local raw materials;
- ii. Promotion of Small and Medium Scale Industrial projects demanding I o w capital investment, labor intensive and simple technology;
- iii. Encourage the establishment and development of Agro-Allied ventures.

Solid Minerals Development: During the period under the report, the Ministry has been able to consolidate all relevant information on solid minerals which led it to establish a data bank to serve as reference point for investors.

Geological and mineral resource survey of the (44) L.G.As was conducted as phase I, II and III. Solid minerals were discovered in abundance and twenty minerals were discovered in abundance twenty (20) Local Government Areas. Also feasibility studies has identified targets in some Local Government Areas having solid minerals in commercial matrities that could be used in accelerating industrial development.

The following locations are such areas

- i. Location Type
- a. R/Gado Feldspar, Quartz, Beryl, Granite (86.2 million tones)
- b. Sumaila Marl, Metal, Feldspar, Iron Ore, Colcite, Gold
- c. Rogo There is geology mineral prospects in this area. Two types of granite were observed the medium grained biolite grancie and fine grained leucogranite.

### **INDUSTRIAL SURVEY**

For the first time in more than a decade the Department have successfully undertaken and completed the survey of all the manufacturing sector of the economy, with a view to finding factors militating against their growths and ways of resuscitating them.

Already some of the machineries have been set-up to ensure their resuscitation.

#### **ASSISTANCE**

- a. The Department has assisted Rima Foam Products Ltd, to get a Waiver from State Government worth Five Hundred and Seventy Two Thousand Naira Only (N572,000.00).
- b. The Department has also assisted Gaskiya Textile Mills Limited with Ten Million Naira (N10,00,000.00) from Government to recover from the damages sustained by wind storm during the rainy season.
- c. The Department has also assisted National Truck Manufacturers (NTM) that got Waiver from the State Government worth Thirty Three Million Naira (N33,000,000.00).

#### VISITATION

- a. A visit by the Honourable members of the Upper and Lower Legislative House Committees on commerce to industrial estate to avail themselves with the problems facing the industrial sector of the state aimed at taking a legislative approach in tackling the problems.
- b. Also a similar visit by the Honourable Minister of State overseeing the affairs of Ministry of Commerce and Industry Dr. Idi Hong to the industries have added value to the way forward for industrial resuscitation.

#### INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES

a. The department have assisted in restoring normalcy and understanding arising from the disputes between tanneries.

Under the umbrella of Nigerian

Tanners Councils and the National Association of Hides and Skins Dealers Association (Kano Chapter) in collaboration with Ministry of Agricultural and Natural Resources.

b. The Department is currently making a head way in finding a lasting solution on the industrial dispute between the Labour Union and the Management of Asia Plastics and Footwear Company Limited Kano.

### **ADDITIONAL INDUSTRIAL ESTATE**

- a. The Department was able to spearhead the establishment and development of Kwanar Dawaki International Cattle Market into small-scale industrial estate (works had already commenced at the site).
- b. Also a proposed Bagadawa Small-Scale Industrial Estate is on the pipeline to satisfy the yearning and aspiration of our teeming entrepreneurs.

# SMALL-SCALE INDUSTRIAL LOAN SCHEMES

- a. The Department has made a historic achievement in the Small Scale Loan recovery to the tune of about Eight Million Naira (N8,000,000.00)
- b. The Department has compiled a comprehensive list of all beneficiaries of Small Scale Industrial Loan Scheme from January to December, 2008 including those have that liquidated their loan.

#### **COOPERATIVE DEPARTMENT**

The department is mandated to register cooperative societies in the state in order

to enable the state government achieve its objectives of improving the socioeconomic condition of lower classes of its citizens. Through registration, the activities of the cooperative societies can better be regulated and loans given to them properly audited.

Over the years remarkable progress has been recorded by the Ministry in cooperative activities which prompted the state government to increase functing of the department.

The following are some of the reachievements between may 2003 at 2009:

 Total number of registered farmers and artisan cooperative societies have increased from 3000 to 25, 000.

#### **SUPERVISION**

As partners in progress Government stepped up its Supervisory role by providing the sum of N3 million for Cooperative enlightenment campaigns. Under the programme over 2000 Cooperative Union/Societies Managers were trained with a view to improving their performance and Managerial skills. To this end, Members' shares and savings have increased to almost N700 million with N46.7 million recorded surpluses to Match by June, 2009. as disclosed by the Cooperative Internal Audit Reports.

As a result of these deliberate Government policies, the department has recorded tremendous progress in revenue generation since the inception of the administration.

# PARASS ALLEVIATION

- i. See the programme aimed at creating as amongst the women and youths the State. Government funded the scheme with N65 million interest free loan which was distributed to over 700 cooperative societies spread across the state with benefits to over 20,000 families.
- ii. Rice Processing Cooperative's Loan Scheme: The programme is aimed at improving the quality and value of rice through improved processing. Government distributed improved rice processing equipment with N5 million to 50 women Rice Processing Cooperative Societies spread across rice producing areas in the state.

### **CAPITAL PROJECTS**

In line with the present administrations resolve to provide conducive environment for work, in 2007 Government released the sum of N5 million for the construction of additional office block at Rimi Cooperative Office. The project has been

completed and occupied. Similarly, in the same year Government released the sum of N1.2 million for the purchase of Motorcycles and also provided the Department with a 10 seater bus to ease transportation problems hitherto experienced by the Department.

# COOPERATIVE REVITALIZATION PROGRAMME

This is one of the Federal Government's policy Measures for addressing the various challenges bedeviling agricultural development in the country, especially among the small farmer groups. The programmes aimed at improving small farmer access to finance, procure inputs and Marketing of his produce.

The department has registered three (3) specialized cooperative societies in each of the 44 local government areas in the following sectors:

- i. Micro-finance
- ii. Tractor Hire Service
- iii. Agro-input

In order to achieve maximum output, 400 managers of the specialized cooperative societies were trained in Kaduna under FG support programme.

In the same vein, 14 no of tractor hire service cooperative societies have subscribed the 10% equity in the sum of N9.173 Million of the Public Private Partnership Scheme under the MANR, Kano State and awaiting directives to remit same to designated bank.

COOPERATIVE INTEGRATED

### SERVICE CENTRE

As a pre-requisite to the sustainability of the Cooperative Revitalization Programme, the FG has approved the construction of Integrated Cooperative Service centers in each state of the federation. Request for provision of suitable land for this project has been forwarded to the Coordinating Committee on Federal Government Agricultural Programme (MANR) for implementation. Work on the project is in progress at Nassarawa Local Government.

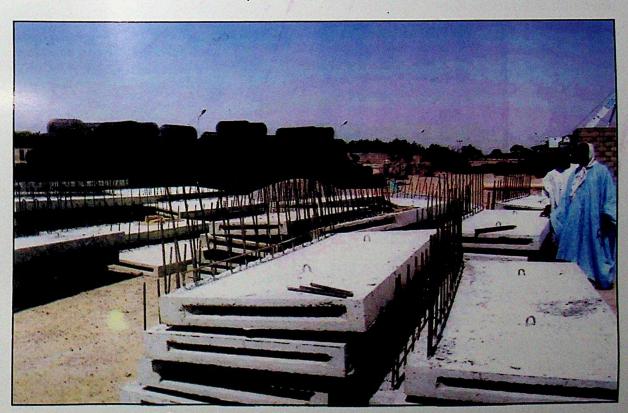
Kano Cooperative Federation Ltd hosted the Northern Cooperative

Ministry of Transport and Tourism.

The main focus of the department is to develop Kano State as a decent and vibrant tourism destination capable of attracting visitors and Tourists within and outside the country whose activities will substantially contribute to the socioeconomic development of the State particularly in the area of job creation and revenue generation.

The ministry had already provided the motor boat and jetties at Watari Dam 2009 (N14, 010,150.00)

### **TOURISM MICRO-CREDIT**

Similarly, in the period under review, the Ministry disbursed the sum of N2 million Naira in the 1<sup>st</sup> phase of the Tourism Micro-Credit Scheme. 40 artisan souvenir producers benefited from the revolving loan scheme. Kano state is the pioneer in kick starting this programme in the country (2008) amount N2,000,000.00

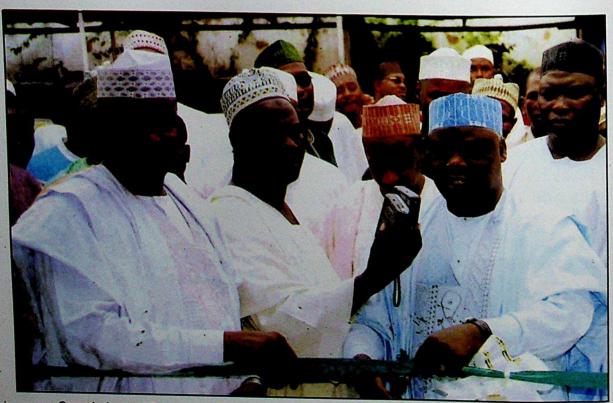

# PROGRESS REPRT FROM 29<sup>™</sup> MAY, 2003 TO DATE

Muhd Abubakar Rimi is regarded as one of the largest and most import markets

not only in Nigeria but also within the entire West African sub- Region. The market serves the commercial needs of neighbouring states of Kaduna, Bauchi, yobe, Plateau, Jigawa and Adamawa. It also serves some of the West African Countries like Cameroon, Niger, Chad, Burkina Faso and Central African Republic.

The market was until recently administered by the defunct Kano Municipal Local Government. This Local Government was later split into three separate local Government who jointly continue to administer the market up to the end of 1994 when the market management Board was established.

The market stalls were initially constructed of timber and zinc; and there were no defined roads, as such any fire out break tends to be a very serious, destroying property worth millions of Naira.

Modern design of the market was initiated during the Third Republic (1979-83) after series of fire disasters destroyed large part of the market. However, implementation of the plan took off in the Military Administration of Air Commodore Hamza Abdullahi in 1985.

The central objective of establishing the market is to reconstruct and modernize the market to give it befitting stall structure that will stand the test of time. Other objectives include safety and sanitary standard, promotion of the market to make it more competitive as well as support the promotion of commercial

status of the entire state. There has been tremendous achievement with regards to these objectives, particularly market development. The economic value of the market has been greatly enhanced through steady development of market stalls by both the market company and private developers.

The following achievements were recorded by the market from May 2003 to date:

# Prompt settlement of power holding Company of Nigeria (NEPA) monthly bills.

The management was able to settle all the inherited NEPA bills amounting to N=1-6 million Naira in July, 2006 and has since then ensured prompt payment of subsequent bills.

# Settlement/Liquidation of one million (N1,000,000.00) standing overdraft

This is an overdraft loan facility (of 1 Million Naira) incurred by the previous management. The facility was intended to facilitate balancing up-of any short fall especially in a situation where the lodgment is not adequate to meet the expenditure. This loan facility is also been liquidated in March, 2007.

# Interlocking/Construction of Drainage at Inuwa Mai-Mai Road

During the period under review the market company was able to rehabilitate the above mentioned street through the provision of inter-locking at the cost of 9.2 million Naira. Similarly a 404 meter length drainage was also constructed at the cost of 7.1 million Naira. The projects were already commissioned by His Excellency,

the Executive Governor of Kano State Mal. Ibrahim Shekarau on 15<sup>th</sup> February, 2008.

### Renovation of the Market Head Office, Mosques/Conference Hall

The management was also able to renovate, fence and furnish the hitherto dilapidated mosques at the head office. The Market conference hall has also been renovated by way of painting, and provision of new see of furniture December, 2008.

### Interlocking of Mahmud ye o Road

The market company as able to rehabilitate the above motioned street through the provision of interlocking pavers at the cost of 9.2 million Naira. Similarly the 3070 square meter length drainage adjacent to the street has also been renovated and cleared. The project has been completed in June, 2009 but not yet commissioned.

# ADDITIONAL NEW TRANSFORMER FROM M.R.C.D

The market management has also in an effort to ensure steady power supply liaised with (MRCD) Ministry of Rural and Community Development and secure the release of brand new transformers to supplement the existing one currently in use.

### REHABILITATION OF 15 ACCESS ROAD

The market company has also been able to rehabilitate 15 access road inside the market by way of filling them with laterite and stone dust in September, 2008.

### PROVISION OF SECURITY GADGETS, SIEN AND SOLAR ENERGY SOURCE

The market company has in an effort to enhance its security system entered into a agreement with Major Tech. Nigeria Ltd on the provisions of the gadgets in the market (on going)

# CONSTRUCTION OF BOREHOLE AT ABACHAMOSQUE

The project is intended to provide additional water supply to the market community and to eventually reduce the hardship encountered by the traders whenever they are in need of water. This project has been completed but not yet commissioned.

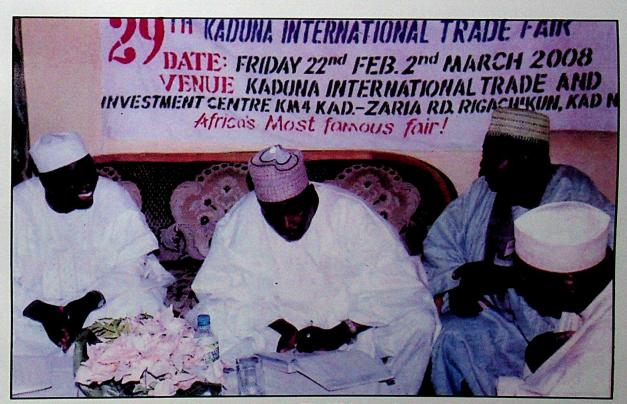
The Kano state Tourism Board is charged with the responsibility for planning, complement, marketing and promotion of Tourism potentials for the purpose of

- Provision of giant portraits at strategic location within the tourist Camp

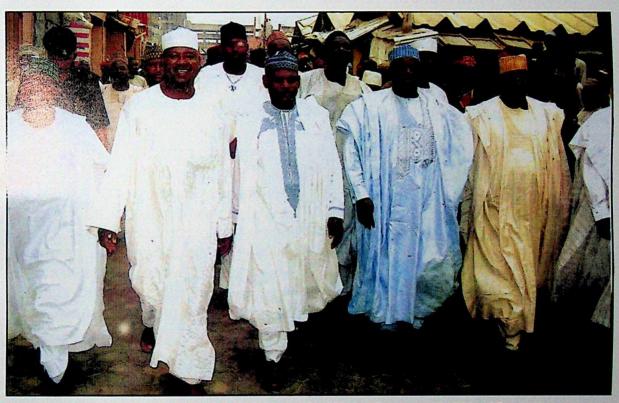

### MINISTRY OF EDUCATION

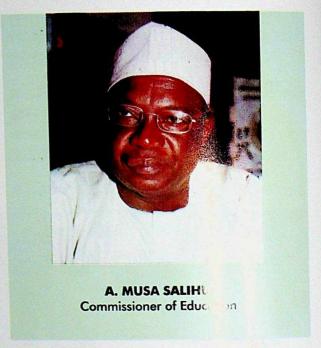
Education is the key to progress. It is the pre-requisite and bedrock for every developmental effort and the advancement of the life of the people.

In realization of this fact, successive Governments in Kano state have invested human and material resources in the education sector with a view to creating an enabling environment for the transformation of the society. All the past 16 Military and Civilian Governors who held the rein of power in Kano state from the Late Alhaji Audu Bako to the present civilian Governor, Malam Ibrahim Shekarau, have contributed in no small measure in changing the educational face of Kano state, which until recently, was regarded as educationally backward. With determination and the adoption of viable, realistic and meaningful policies, they have reversed for good the fortunes of Kano state educationally.

#### **MANAGING EDUCATION**

The task of formulating and executing policies on all aspects of education falls under the schedule of the Ministry of Education. In collaboration with its parastatals, the Ministry has been up to doing in the discharge of its responsibilities, especially under the present administration.

To complement the effort of the Ministry of Education in the discharge of this onerous responsibilities are parastatals which are overseen by the Ministry. They include Universal Education Board, Kano State Library Board, Kano State Education Resource Department, Science and Technical Schools Board.



### KANO STATE EDUCATION POLICY

The Kano State Educational Policy is anchored on the need to provide qualitative and functional education so that the school products can become self-reliant. Emphasis has been geared on closing the gap between the state and the more educationally advanced states of the Federation as well as emphasizing the women and adult education.

In specific terms, the Education policy objectives being pursued by the Ministry of Education encompass the following:-

- Increasing access to education by bringing all schools age children within the fold of formal schooling;
- Strengthening the academic component of school operation to improve students academic output.
- 3) Increasing transition rate from Primary to Secondary school especially for female students

- whose opportunities are presently much more limited.
- Involvement of Local Communities in funding education and running school administration within a given school area.
- 5) Strengthening tertiary education so as to produce capable manpower to run Government bureaucracy and other special needs.

#### STATE OF EDUCATION TODAY

As at time of its creation in 1967, Kano state had only 241 primary schools with 1374 classrooms and an enrolment figures of 49,580. During the same period, only 16 post primary schools classrooms and 4,099 With regard to tertiary institutions. Kano had none at the time of its inception except for the Federal owned Advanced Teachers College (now FCE and Abdullahi Bayero College, now Bayero University Kano). It was only in the mid-seventies that the nucleus of higher education took off in Kano state. Kano state as at 1991, (before the creation of Jigawa state) had a total of 3,079 primary schools with 16,312 classrooms and an enrolment of over 1 million. As at February, 2006, Kano state has 3,724 primary schools with an enrolment of 1,509,336 pupils and a total of 34,566 primary school teachers.

Similarly as at March 2005, Kano state had 408 Government Junior and Senior Secondary schools spread in 44 Local Governments in the Kano state with a total of 3,625 classrooms and an enrolment of over 230,000. This does not include the 11 Science and Vocational Secondary

Schools directly under the Science and Technical Schools Board with a total enrolment of 6426 students. In the same vein. Kano state has total of 322 registered private Nursery and Primary Schools with a combined enrolment of over 120,000 and 153 secondary schools with 3601 and 1901 teachers respectively. Other post secondary schools (computer institutions) voluntarily owned include 8 schools with a student population of 2,022 and 247 teachers. To further indicate the level of progress made in the tertiary education sector, the Kano state Polytechnic made up of School of Management Studies, School Technology, School of Environmental Studies, Gwarzo and School of Rural and Social Development Rano, offer a total of 86 courses with an enrolment exceeding 11,000 students as at the end of 2004. The Kano state College of Education Kumbotso on its part has a student enrolment of 11,017 as at the end of December, 2005.

# STATE UNIVERSAL EDUCATION BOARD (PRIMARY EDUCATION)

As the bedrock of all stages of learning, primary education has received the desired recognition and priority by successive Governments in Kano state. Until recently, the State Primary Education Board (SPEB) was the institution responsible for enunciating and executing policies as they pertain to the administration, promotion and growth of primary education. With only 214 primary schools made up of 1374 classrooms and an enrolment of only 47,580 pupils at the time of the creation of the state in 1967, primary education in Kano state grew in leaps and bounds following the launching

of Universal Primary Education (UPE) in 1976.

By 1978, the number of primary schools increased to 3,108 with a corresponding increase in enrolment of 796,226. By August 1991, when Jigawa state was carved out of Kano state, there were 3,361 primary schools with an enrolment of 1,300,000.00. With the introduction of Universal Education in the country, the state primary Education Board has metamorphosed into the state Universal Education Board with additional responsibilities. With the full take-off of the state Universal Educational Board under the Shekarau administration, the Board has carefully enunciated policies and

injected new life into primary education especially in the realm of rehabilitation of ailing infrastructures, and provision of additional ones where necessary, provision of teaching aids/materials, welfare, training and recruitments of new teachers.

The Shekarau administration is leaving no one in doubt about the resolve to accord special priority in revamping primary education, knowing fully well that it is the surest way of primary and ag Education development. As a man of since so, Kano state as at now has a topology and 347 primary schools with an enrollment of 1,958,654 and 34,566 teachers. The macher/pupil ratio is 49:1

To attain greater productivity, between 2003 to 2006 the State Universal Basis Education rehabilitated 2006 classrooms at the cost of N160,705,563,49, constructed additional 192 classrooms at the cost of N692,274,087.53, procured 28,299 sets of furniture for primary school teachers and pupils at a cost of N146,777,817.14 Similarly, instructional materials and boundary walls for primary schools were provided at the cost of N257,925,999.02 and N16,962,791.89 respectively. Other expenditures to improve teaching and learning atmosphere in primary schools include

construction of borehole for water at the cost of N38,502,500.00 and provision of N24,020,000.00 loan to over 1300 staff. On the whole the Board incurred expenditure to the tune of N1,337,168,927.80 in the improvement of educational infrastructure which include rehabilitation of classroom blocks and construction of new ones, provision of furniture instructional materials and text books.

#### **SHEKARAU ADMINISTRATION**

The Shekarau administration is leaving no one in doubt about its resolve to accord special priority in revamping primary Education, knowing fully well that it is the surest way of promoting educational

development. As mark of success of these efforts, Kano State as at May 2009 has a total enrolment of 1,958,645 pupils while the number of primary schools in the whole state stood at 4374. Between the year 2003 2008 a total of 958,645 pupils were enrolled and absorbed into various primary schools and the break down of the pupils are as follows:

- a. 972,850 males
- b. 985,795 females

At the moment the teacher/pupil ratio is 1:70. However, concerted efforts are being made to enhance teaching in schools. Within the last 6 years alone 51,361 teaching staff and 5751 non teaching staff were recruited and efforts are being made to formally take over the staff of Junior Secondary Schools in the state in fulfillment of the provision in both UBE law and SUS 2005.

To should always a courses in revitalizing primary education, the Shekarau administration introduced new policies and initiatives to achieve the desired objectives. These include among other, the signing into law of the State Universal Basic Education Board Edict No. 3 of 2005. The law provided for free and compulsory basic education for every school age child from primary one to six and from

JSS 1 to 3. The Board is responsible for the management of all primary, nomadic and Junior Secondary Schools in the state.

By the promulgation of the state Universal Basic Education Board law 2005, the Board is now made up of seven departments instead of the original four. The seven Department are:

- i. Planning, Research and Statistics;
- ii. Personal Management;
- iii. Finance and Supplies
- iv. Junior Secondary
- v. Social Mobilization
- vi. School Services
- vii. Nomadic Education.

The Basic Education sub-sector from May 2003 to May 2009 has received unprecendented attention from the Government especially in the area of infrastructural development, provision of instructional materials, staff development as well as general pupils enrolments as indicated below:

- A block containing 8 offices with toilets was constructed at the Board Headquarters to provide office accommodation.

# PROVISION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

For the smooth implementation of Basic Education instructional materials worth N403,299,211 was procured and distributed to schools.

### STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The Board has made remarkable achievements in its manpower development

- > 11,097 staff were recruited
- > 15,421 staff were promoted at Headquarters and LGEAs.
- > 306 cases of retirement/death were duly processed and paid.

- 81 staff received sum of N5,100.00 as vehicle and refurbishing loans.
- ▶ 5,253 staff received various forms of training at the cost of N307,733.16 in addition to the induction course given to JSS Principals.
- 229 primary school teachers were trained under the Special Training Program Centre Kumbotso to upgrade their qualification to the minimum NCE required by National Policy on Education.
- ▶ 1,704 teachers have completed training for Special Teachers upgrading Programe (STUP) by NTI in order to upgrade the semi-qualified teachers to the minimum standard of teaching.
- 1000 Federal Teacher Scheme (FTS) teachers who have completed their 2 years training have been absorbed by the State Government.
- > 100 FTS teachers are currently

undergoing training.

## PUPILS ENROLMENT AND STAFF STRENGTH

- From 2003-2008 958,645 pupils were enrolled and absorbed into various primary schools. Currently there are 1,958,645 pupils enrolled with 972,850 males and 985,795 females.
- Staff strength of 57,102 are spread across the State 51,361 teaching staff and 5,751 non teaching.
- ➤ Currently there are 4,347 primary schools across the State.
- > From 2003-2008 1,952 Qur'anic schools were integrated.
- Priorition was given to vulnerable and to reach nomads. The analysis and additional 58 awaiting formal registration.
- 3 additional girls primary schools were established at Kabo and Kano Municipal.
- 32 new Special Education schools have been established.

### STAFF SALARIES AND OTHER OBLIGATIONS

- The Board has fully computerized its salary process and Payroll Standing Committee has been established for transparency and accountability.
- Prompt payment of staff salaries and teachers salaries N7,800,000,000.00 was disbursed as salaries and allowances for teaching and nonteaching staff across the State.

The Board has concluded payment of 2003 contract liabilities inherited from previous administration.

### QUALITY CONTROL AND CO-CURRICULAR

- Conducted inspection of schools
  - Conducted annual primary schools competition
  - Conducted workshop for PHE teachers
  - ➤ Housawa Model emerged 2<sup>nd</sup> best winner in National Primary Science Competition
  - Sponsored Radio jingles, phone in programe on the need for private support for Basic Education and School Based Management Committee. School Based Management Committees are established in primary schools across the State while 294 project implementation committees have been established in some primary schools
  - The Board has established Monitoring and Evaluation Unit in all the LGAs in the State with a view to ensuring quality control
  - ➤ The State Government is among the only 2 States in the Federation that has implemented the TSS salary increase as approved by the Governors Forum.

### POST PRIMARY EDUCATION

In keeping with its comprehensive policy to provide a conducive atmosphere for teaching/learning in post-primary schools, the state Ministry of Education in collaboration with some of its relevant parastatals pursued with vigour the provision of infrastructure, instructional materials and adoption of various policies/measures for the achievement of desired objectives.

More than 521 new Junior Secondary Schools are established in 6 years while 145 Secondary Schools were upgrated to the status of SSS. The resultance of these measures was an improvement of transition rate from primary to JSS 1 which stood at 88% with 360, 472 pupils admitted into JSS within the period.

The summary of achievements are as follows:

- Introduction of free Girl Child education at Post Basic Education level
- Assorted teaching aids for special education school T/Maliki worth N12.4 million were provided.
- Transition rate from primary six (6) to JSS1; stands at 88%, thus 560,472 pupils have been admitted into JSS1.
- Establishment of 521 new Junior Secondary Schools during the period.
- Upgraded 145 JSS to SSS status.
- Government approved the Ministry of Education participation in the World Bank sponsored State Education Sector Project (SESP) to the tune of

\$25 million to address the following: access, Quality, and Gender Issues in basic education through School Development Scheme (SDS) Teacher Professional Development (TPD) Education Management Information System (EMIS) Textbooks and Inspectorate reform. The project is being supported by DFID.

- Established Education Management Information System (EMIS) at Ministry Headquarters which is radio linked with its parastatals.
- The sum of N6, 320,651,678.89 was expended to register 136,329 government sponsored candidates for N E C O, W A E C a n d S I S. TAHAFEEZ/TAJWEED Exams.
- A model secondary school has taken off in October 2008 at community Education Resource Center (CERC) at G/Albasa and achieved the following:
  - a. Training of students in furniture craft has taken off in Jan. 2009.
  - b. Ten (10) secondary schools that are lacking equipped science labs have benefited from the facilities at the Center (conduct Practical Lessons)
  - c. Fifty-two (52) students graduated in tailoring course.
  - d. The first set of remedial (34 in number) have performed excellently well in the 2008 WAEC/NECO examinations.
  - e. 14 students attended the Photography and Video coverage course.

- The sum of N6,32,651,678.89 was expanded for additional school infrastructure rehabilitation of the existing ones and provision of other related facilities.
- Provision of Science equipment and Home Economics working materials worth N500 million.
- Organized, administered and participated in Inter School Sports at State, National and International levels at the cost of N31,203,200.00

In addition to these efforts, the ministry between March 2009 to July 2009 awarded contract for the construction of 400 classrooms at the cost of N916,990,962.83 while the fabrication and distribution of 3 seater students desks and chairs at the cost of N129,600,000.00was also done to enhance learning in the state's post primary schools.

the same vein, the Ministry awarded a contract for the construction of charcoms, toilets, laboratories and see at 9 local government areas at secondary schools and 27 schools at the cost of 183, 108,512.00 under the supervision of the state education sector project. Similarly between January to June 2009, the following expenditures were incurred in the following:

- N15 Million Naira Renovation and construction of Mosques at various schools 2009
- Spends N238 million for textbooks and distributed to 9 selected local governments under SESP
- N55.4 million Construction of community centre at 'Yar mai shinkafi in Gwale Local Government
- N165 Million on WAEC, NECO, HIS examinations
- N1.2 billion for contract awarded for 18 junior secondary schools and 27 primary schools

- Introduces literacy by radio covering 44 local governments with enrolment of 2,200 students 1,675 males and 525 females
- Instructional materials under SESP to
  - 1. 849 JSS Schools and Primary at cost of N14,183,084.96
  - 2. Science equipment for 65 J.S.S at cost of N8,923,850

Thus between January to May 2009 alone, the sum of N3,926,516,409.80 was expended by the Ministry of Education to enhancing teaching and learning in schools.

On the whole, the state government executed projects between May 2003 to May 2009 to the tune of 8,018,158,613.85

# KANO STATE SECONDARY SCHOOLS MANAGEMENT BOARD

Kano State Teacher's Service Board was established by an Assembly Edict known as, 'Kano State Teachers Service Board Law' and it formally came into being in September, 2003 when the 1st Executive Secretary was appointed. The establishment of the board, which was initiated by the previous Government, was a great innovation and would go down as one of the greatest legacies of the Shekarau administration in the educational sector. It is to the credit of this administration, that all issues pertaining to teachers which were hitherto handled by the Ministry of Education is now to be handled by a special board to professionally handle the issues of

recruitment, promotion and discipline of teachers.

Functions of the Board
The law establishing the Board spelt out
its functions as follows:

- To be responsible for employment, promotion and discipline on the recommendation of the Ministry;
- Harmonization and payment of teachers salaries and allowances;
- Draw up and implement conditions of service for teachers;
- Maintain an up to date personal records for all teachers in its employment;
- Handle welfare and in-service training of staff under its jurisdiction;
- Prepare testimonials and certificates of service for teachers as at and when due:
- Perform such other functions as may be assigned to it through the supervising Ministry.

#### Structure:

To ensure the smooth attainment of these objectives, the board is made up of five (5) departments as follows:

- 1. Admin. & General Services;
- 2. Monitoring and Evaluation;
- 3. Recruitment and Training;
- 4. Planning Research and Statistics;
- 5. Promotion and Discipline.

Each of the department is headed by a Director who is answerable to the Executive Secretary. There is also a Board of Directors that decides on policy matters. As at March 2006, the Board is manned by 8,862 teaching staff.

Activities/Functions of the Departments
Administration and General Services
Department:- The primary functions of the
department are:

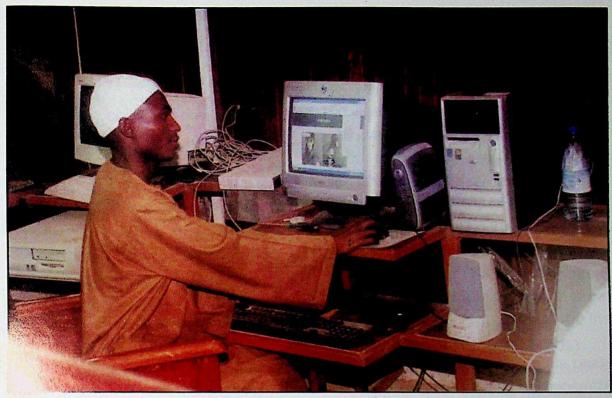
- General administration of the board finance:
- Handle all person all natters with a view to inculce no sense of services, discipline, cohesion, dedication and by any through enforcement of standards and procedures that are in conformity with civil service rules and regulations;
- To ensure the conducive working environment is provided and maintained.

**Recruitment and Training:** 

The department is responsible for recruitment of teachers on both permanent and pensionable basis as well as the training and re-training of staff.

To create an enabling environment for the operation of the Board, the state Government released the sum of N15 million take off grant for the renovation of existing structures, construction of mosques and the department of monitoring and evaluation.

With the receipt of another N17,909,374.35 from the Government, the Board embarked

on the construction of additional administrative block and the expansion of Board room, while the sum of N8 million granted in the year 2005/2006 was utilized in the procurement of equipment. With these unprecedented Government support the Board was able to achieve a lot as will be shown later.

#### **Promotion and Discipline:-**

The major function of the department is the promotion and discipline of all the staff of the Board. It processes promotion, advancement, change of cadre and disciplinary cases. The detail encompasses interview, issuance of notification letters, suspensions and dismissal.

### **Monitoring and Evaluation:**

The Department is particularly responsible for inspection, monitoring and evaluation of the activities of both teachers and school administrations. It monitors and evaluates their performances to ensure competency, efficiency and effectiveness in the discharge of their duties.

### Planning, Research & Statistics:

The department of planning, research and statistics is responsible for planning the board activities, conducting research on development activities, collection, collation of data, data storage, data analysis, identification of schools manpower needs etc.

### Impact Recorded:

As a result of the enumerated measures

taken to improve working condition of the Teachers Service Board since its inception, it is observed that:

- The complains by teachers on promotion has been reduced drastically.
- Improved performance of teachers as a result of various incentives given to them.
- Inflow of qualified teachers to the teaching industry as a result of the incentives.

### BRIEF HISTORY AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS (JUNE, 2003 TO JUNE 2008)

Kano state Senior Secondary Schools Management Board (KSSSSMB) came into being on 10th November, 2006 (20th Shawwal 1427 AH( upon the enactment of the Law, 'Kano State Senior Secondary Schools Management Board law 2006.

Before this development, Kano State Senior Secondary Schools Management Board was known as Kano State Teachers Service Board whose functions were limited to services rendered to only secondary school teachers.

Following this development, Kano State Senior Secondary Schools Management Board handles not only teachers welfare but also non-teaching staff and students.

From its inception to date the Board recorded the following achievements:

Recruited 9873 teaching staff

and 607non-teaching staff;

- Sponsored various workshops and seminars for the improvement of staff performance;
- Sponsored 707 teachers for inservice training in various institutions in the country;
- Promoted 10,893 teaching staff and 2083 non-teaching staff;
- Advancement/changer of cadre of 420 staff.
- Complied seniority listed up-dated data on schools profit statistics on teaching subjects, so que ification etc:
- Identified schools manow needs and placed teachers and LYSC to where their services are mostly required;
- Conducted regular schools inspection across the ten zonal education areas in the state;
- Mobilized and urged teachers to register with Teachers Registration Council of Nigeria (TRCN) and over 3,000 teachers have so far registered with the council, while application of others are being processed; Mobilized active participation of individuals, organizations, banks etc in constructing classrooms, dormitories etc.
- Commenced the payment teachers salary scale (TSS) in September 2008 (the month of agreement was signed).
- Provision of (60) Toyota Hiace motor vehicles to all boarding secondary

schools and 10 zonal offices, headquarters of the board, KERD, ANCOPPS etc.

# KANO STATE AGENCY FOR MASS EDUCATION

Kano State Agency for Mass Education is the first and largest non-formal education out-fit in Nigeria. It was set up in April 1980 and formally took off in 1981 with the aim of eradicating illiteracy among adults, developing their skills and knowledge for the betterment of the society.

agency over the years has described itself in its task and has proved its mettle in the making of its functions and objectives having won the UNESCO International Literacy Award (1990 and 1994) which is contested among all members of UNESCO in the world.

VISION: To produce literate and enlightened citizens.

MISSION: To create and sustain second chance of learning opportunities for youth and adults.

The main objectives of the Agency for Mass Education are:

- To serve as an instrument for the eradication of illiteracy among adult, drop-outs, youths and as a source of enlightenment among people in the state and for the provision of facilities for continuing education.
- 2. To develop in adult youths, the ability to use the skills acquired to enhance

their knowledge and understanding of their social and physical environment in order to improve their mode of living and their state of well-being.

- To develop in adult and youths alike, attitudes and commitments toward active participation in the transformation of their immediate locality and the nation at large.
  - 4. To prepare the adults and youths in the promotion of such activities, which the agency may deem purposeful and constructive in terms of the overall development of the state and the nation.
  - To serve as a localized resource centre with training facilities in artisan crafts.

To ensure the attainment of these objectives, the agency has designed most of the required literacy programme that are aimed at providing the required skills for the target population.

These programmes are well coordinated and the appropriated strategies required to ensure the successful implementation were put in place.

  - Male Vocational (Carpentry, Welding, Motor Mechanics, Electrical Installation, Plumbing, Building etc.
  - ii. Female Vocational (Seqing, Knitting, Cookery, Batik Tie and Dye, Soap Making, Pomade Making and other hand crafts)
  - h) News reporting, Photography and video coverage
    - i) Literacy by radio and T.V. (filin mu yaki jahilci)
    - j) reflect methodology programme.

As a result of this, the agency has recorded achievement in the following areas:

- Reduction of illiteracy rate in the state from 41.8% - 39.3
- Established computer and remedial education programme for women at Giginyu, Municipal, and Bichi LGAs.
- Established 1088 literacy centers for adults, 262 integrated Quaranic education centers and 262 centers for girl child
- Constructed three 3 model women centers at Albasu, Bagwai, and Giginyu in Nassarawa LGAs
- Provision of six (6) buses for monitoring agency's programme
- Established mass education committees at state and LGAs

- level which bring about increase in community participation in literacy programme
- Introduction of J.I.S., S.I.S. and H.I.S. for non-formal Islamiyya schools
- In collaboration with donor Agencies, the agency established literacy classes for Disable, Girlchild and Qur'anic basic education.

#### KANO STATE LIBRARY BOAF

Kano State Library started fund on g in 1968, following the creation of the tate in 1967. When the resources of the former regional library was shared among the six former Northern States, approximately 9,000 volumes of books and 2 thousand Government documents were made available to Kano state.

The Library was officially opened on 15th November, 1969 by the Military Governor, Alhaji Audu Bako.

Kano State Library was established with the following objectives:

- 1. To advise Government on Library policy.
- To provide library services of the state with other diverse educational, professional and vocational needs and interests.
- To oversee library development in the state with a view to assisting ministries, Local Governments and other organizations to establish their own libraries.
- To procure and preserve Government documents and other related sources of

information relevant to our historical and cultural heritage

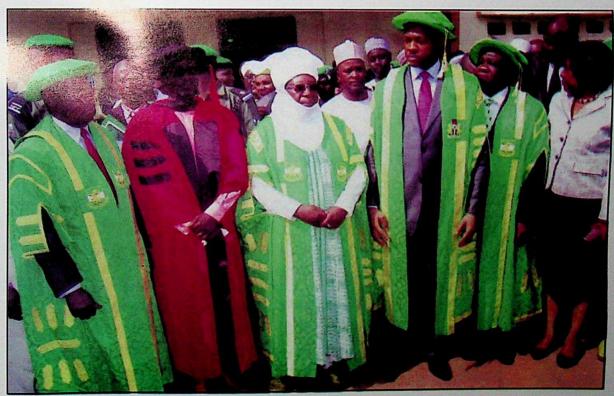
5. To coordinate the operation of school library services.

The opening of library in 1969 marked the beginning of the existence and establishment of Kano State Library. At the initial stage it was placed under the Ministry of Information, but in 1969 when it was formally opened, it was transferred to the Ministry of Education and bestowed with the responsibility of advising and implementing policy on library services in the state with the first Librarian named Mr. Hurrigton, a Canadian official.

At this stage of library function, the

entire stock of the library made up of 9,000 volumes of books and 2,000 Government documents inherited from Northern Nigerian Government were shared among the 3 library points viz Kano City, Fagge and Hadejia with Kano City branch keeping 8,000 volumes of books while those at Hadejia and Fagge were stocked with 500 volumes each.

As a step towards streamlining the activities of the library to meet with modern challenges, an edict establishing Kano State Library Board was enacted in 1981, while the Board of Directors made up of Chairman, 11 members including the Director of the Library was appointed. The main task of the Board as provided for in the edict establishing it, is to establish, control and maintain in the state, public library

Services, divisional libraries at Local Government areas as well as establish a book depot to purchase and sell books and other library materials. It also falls within the duty of Kano State Library Board to supervise and help organize library services in all post-primary institutions, Ministries and Departments of Government.

#### **RECORDED SUCCESS**

The Kano State Library Board, since its establishment has endeavoured to accomplish its objectives with varying degree of success. In its day to day activities, it provides services to its clientele which include loans to individuals and organizations, reference services, bookshop services and photocopying services. It also had provided a conducive ground for training and retaining of librarians from Government and non-Governmental organizations through seminars, workshops and refresher courses.

As a mark of success, the Library Board between 1968 to 1991 (when Jigawa state was carved out of Kano state) had established 22 Libraries and a total collection of 250,000 volumes of books. Its most active period of expansion in the eighties (80s) saw the construction of permanent Divisional Libraries and 2 pro-type libraries. The sum of N1.5 million was expended between 1987 to 1989 to establish 5 permanent divisional libraries and N1 million for the construction of 2 prototype libraries in

1991. As a consequence of the massive enlightenment and awareness among the people in the importance of library service, readership figures have continued to increase.

Between 1985 to 1986 alone at least 129,274 people availed themselves of the services at Main Library while service points in the Local Governments recorded 79,467 readers during the same period. Also between 1986 to 1991 as least 779,831 readers patronised to Boards services while 300 school libration at 30 ministerial libraries were re-original by the staff of the Board.

Perhaps the most far reaching so pitcen so far in the history of library development, was in the execution of Murtala Muhammad Library Complex which consumed N12.8 million between 1988 and 1999.

On readership increase, the Board has recorded a readership of 3.4 million readers while 1500 volumes of books have been procured for the Boards headquarters between 1993 to 1995. It was also the period when the 3 Divisional Libraries at Bichi, Karaye and Dambatta were established, additional branches in all the branches were created while additional 37,771 adult books and 18,666 children books were made available to all the library outlets in the state.

Other successes recorded by the Library Board between 1990 to 1995 towards improving its services, include training of 3,000 library assistants, 1800 library assistants from schools, ministries and o the r non-Governmental organizations, re-organizing 8 school libraries, 6 institutional libraries and loaning 8,000 volume of books as part of the Board loan services.

On the whole, the Kano State Library Board within its 41 years of existence has come a long way. Before the creation of Jigawa state in 1991, it was operating 22 service centres, with a volume of 250,000 books. By 1997, the Board has 15 centres and a total collection of 281,000 volumes of books, 200 video cassettes, 300 radio cassettes and maintained 4 titles of daily newspapers in its collections. It has catered for the needs of millions of read and other users and provided services to diverse essional, vocational and Governmental bodies.

- Enacting of a law establishing the Board called Library Board Law 1982.
- Establishment of Branches at Gaya, Sumaila, Dawakin Kudu, Bichi, Karaye, Shanono, Kurmawa, Dambatta, Rano, D/Tofa, Bagwai,
  - Minjibir and Gwarzo.
- 3. Introduction of Mobile Library Services in the state.

- 4. Completion of the Murtala Muhammad Library Complex.
- 5. Introduction of School Library services for Secondary Schools in the state.
- 6. Opening of Braille section to cater for the visually impaired persons.
- 7. Opening of American corner.
- 8. Acquisition and installation of V-sat gadgets and equipments for internet.
- 9. Construction of motorized borehole at the premises of the Murtala Muhd.
  - Library Board.
- Construction of drainage at the front of the Library Complex.
- Bulk purchase for Murtala Muhammad Library.
- 12. Bulk purchase of books and library materials from the Education Tax Funds intervention grants.
- 13. Establishment of bookshop to buy and sell at subsidized rates to the public.

- Launching of Kano State Book Week during which books worth N1.5 million were donated.
- Restoration of essential services including purchase of newspapers, magazines and periodicals.

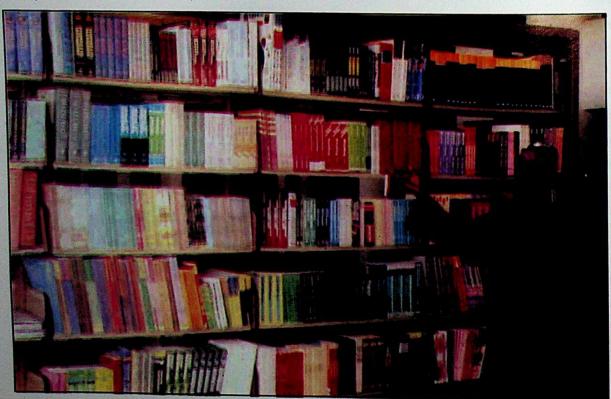

### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

# SCIENCE AND TECHNICAL SCHOOLS BOARD

The idea of Science Secondary Schools started in 1977 with the sole aim of producing qualified state indigenes in the science based subjects to fill up the state quota in the institutions of Higher learning in the state with a view to producing indigenous Doctors, Engineers, Pharmacists, etc to man our hospitals, water and civil works and other specialized areas in Government establishments.

Conscious of the strategic relevance of Science and Technical education to the overall development of modern Kano state, successive Governments have taken bold measures to tackle the acute shortage of qualified indigenous manpower at all levels in science based fields with a view to implement development programmes. The establishment of the Board came in 1982, some few years after the establishment of some science colleges. The aim was to ensure further boost in science related

studies in secondary schools culminating in the enactment of the law establishing the Kano state Science and Technical Schools Board in 1982.

The Board which started with only two Science Secondary Schools now has 12 institutions under its care, namely:-

### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

Since the establishment of Science and Technical Board it has recorded enormous successes especially in terms of preparing science students to gain admission into Higher Institutions. Transition rate from Science Secondary Schools to Higher Institutions is at its best. Between 1977 when the first Science Colleges were blished in Dawakin Kudu and Tofa and 1991 when the old Kara ate was broken into two (2) with tate excised out of it, a total of 5,800 dents graduated from Science Vocational Technical Schools in Kano state will be majority gaining admission into the state of Higher Institutions, while the been absorbed into the seek as craftsmen and artisans.

As further confirmation of the high performance of Kano state Science College, a candidate from Dawakin Tofa Science Secondary School in 1985 won the best WAEC Award and trophy of excellence in GCE 'O' Level. Similarly, out of the first Science Colleges at Dawakin Tofa and Dawakin Kudu, 900 of them got a minimum of 5 or more credits in GCE 'O' Level, which qualified them for admission into Nigerian Universities.

With the special attention accorded, Science and Technical Education in recent years by Government, there is the hope that more successes will be recorded.

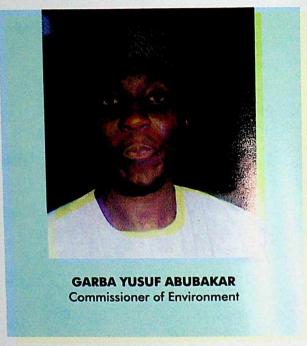
#### MINISTRY OF ENVIRONMENT

The Ministry of Environment was established on May 29, 1999 to among other things complement the Federal Ministry of Environment and to articulate its own policies on environmental management and development.

Since the inauguration of Malam Ibrahim Shekarau as the Governor, the Government has left no one in doubt on its intention to change the face of Kano especially as it pertains to perennial issues of refuse dump, general cleanliness and environmental sanitation.

The Government on take-off was confronted with the appalling situation of environmental sanitation, particularly in the metropolitan Kano. This problem was further compounded by lack of serviceable vehicles, poorly motivated workers, grossly inadequate evacuation equipment, as well as other needs for effective refuse management. Consequently, an immediate rehabilitation and repairs of existing vehicles and equipment were embarked upon at the cost of over N10 million. This facilitated the repairs of 16 sanitation vehicles as well as procurement of additional refuse disposal equipment and implements.

As a long term solution to the refuse disposal crisis which Kano state was facing, the Administration came with the initiative of establishing the State Refuse Management and Sanitation Board REMASAB.



### Objectives of Setting Up the Ministry

The Ministry of Environment was set up with the following objectives:-

- a. Environmental sanitation and refuse management
- Erosion, flood and desertification control
- c. Industrial waste and pollution control
- d. Management of refuse dumping sites
- e. Control of ponds, public sewage and drainages

- g. Environmental impact assessment
- h. Control of mining sites
- i. Environmental Laboratory Services

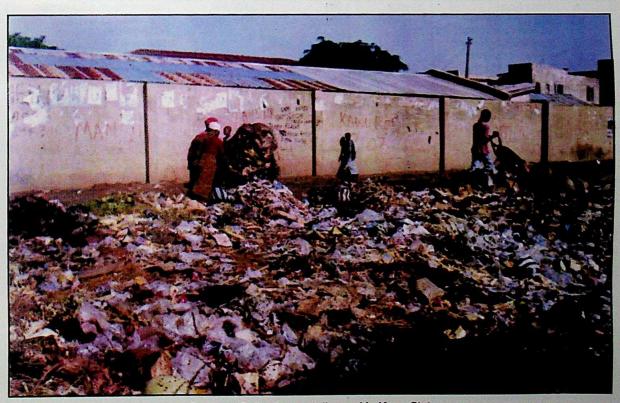

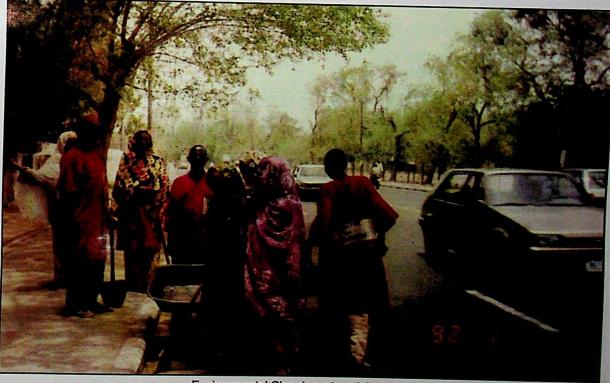

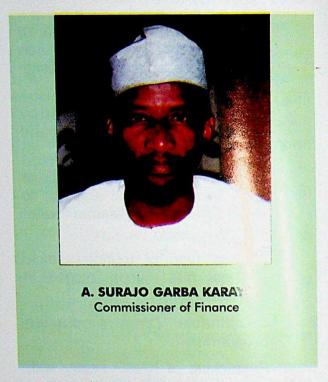
### MINISTRY OF FINANCE AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Ministry of Finance and Economic is essentially a service Ministry. It plays a significant role in the continuity of the activities of the ministries and Parastatals as well as those Democratic Institutions, Especially under a civilian regime.

### **FUNCTIONS OF THE MINISTRY**

Since Government business is about provision of services in various ways as in Education, Agriculture, Human development, Societal orientation etc. in order to meet their yearnings and aspirations, the Ministry in concert with other relevant Government agencies formulate laudable policies and programmes in concert with availability of funds. Without funds which the ministry disburses, government policies and programmes no matter how well articulated can not take off.

It is the duty of the ministry of finance to ensure at all times that the state government machinery is always fuelled and well lubricated through timely disbursement of funds so as not be grounded. It also represents the state government in Federation Accounts Allocation Committee (FAAC) monthly meeting and collects the state's share from the Federal Account as well



generates revenue.

When these funds are collected they are disbursed to ministries and Parastatals for the provision of essential services and payment of salaries and allied commitment. As the livewire of the government, the ministry of finance and economic development is responsible for managing, controlling government finances, receiving, collecting, keeping and disbursement of government funds, as well as financial and economic policies of the state government in line with existing regulations.

In discharging these responsibilities, the ministry uses the budget as a guide to its operations. As the custodian of the state government's coffers, it keeps an up to date all income and expenditure records. It also prepares the state's annual account for the consideration of the Auditor General. Other functions of the ministry, include granting of vehicle and housing loans to civil servants in addition to settling electricity and NITEL bills for public buildings.

Two Parastatals are under the supervision of the ministry viz:-

Board of Internal Revenue
Kano State Investment and
Properties Limited (KSIP)

### URE OF THE MINISTRY

To perform its statutory functions efficiently the ministry of finance and economic development is divided into six departments namely:-

- a. Administration and general services
- b. Planning, Research and Statistics
- c. Treasury
- d. Revenue, Monitoring and Evaluation
- e. Inspection and Training
- f. Final Accounts

### ACTIVITIES/ACHIEVEMENTS 2003 TO 2009

The Ministry under the period under review witnessed and upsurge in its activities more than ever before. There

was not only increase in receipts of monies from Federation Account and internally generated revenues but disbursements of funds to ministries for personnel, overhead and capital projects increased dramatically, thereby creating a more enabling environment for socio-economic development.

Owing to the philosophy of the present government to ensure probity, accountability and transparency in government business, the ministry has strived to inform the public through monthly press briefings on the receipts and disbursements of funds to ministries and Parastatals. In this way, the general public are kept abreast of how their financial resources are managed while rumour mongering and speculations are reduced to the barest minimum.

The volume of activities in the ministry could be appreciated when seen from sector achievements as recorded by the departments from May 2003 February 2006.

### DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING, RESEARCH AND STATISTICS

This is a new department, which was

created during the period under review. Its main functions is to ensure the custodianship of statistical data which is collected from authentic research sources for planning various aspects of the ministerial duties. Although a new department that is yet to fully take off, the planning department has been responsible for the promotion of government's investment in some vi le economic sectors. The wernment, through the Kano State investment Properties Limited has acquired or maintained investments in Banking Sector between May 2003 to December 2008 such as:

- a. N200 million shares of Jaiz (Islamic)
   Bank through KSIP
- b. The Ministry directly purchased shares of 4 commercial banks on the process of consolidation such as:-
  - Afribank Plc. 1.5 million shares at N10 million
  - Equity Bank Plc 6.7 million shares at N75 million
  - NAL Bank Plc 30 million shares at N75 million
  - Tropical Commercial Bank 312 million shares at N250 million
  - Total 350.2 million shares at N345 million

The investments in the 4 commercial banks are controlled and managed by the planning and research department on behalf of the ministry of finance incorporated (MOFI).

Though the efforts of planning, research and statistics, the 44 local governments also purchased 200 million shares at N50 million from NAL Bank Plc., and 250 Million shares of Tropical Commercial Bank Plc. at the sum of N200 Million.

In the same vein, the state local government pension board purchased 10 million shares of NAL Bank Plc. At N25 million and 62.5 million shares of Tropical Commercial Bank at N50 million.

It is to the credit of this department that government through its investment in JA'IZ bank is making enormous contribution to the noble cause of interest free Islamic system of banking while encouraging local governments to diversify review based away from sole dependence on the statutory allocation. The effort of Kano State Government in the banking investment is a way of sustaining Northern interests in the banking sector.

### **DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY**

The department of treasury is the hub of activities at the Ministry of Finance. It is headed by the Accountant General. Among other things the department is responsible for ensuring the entrenchment of accountability, transparency and prudence in the management of government finances. It also deploys all accounting and stores officer to ministries and departments, in addition to streamlining the treasury's operation by determining which commercial bank should keep government's monies.

### **BACKGROUND**

The Kano State Treasury Division (as it was then called) began operation in 1968 with only 74 treasury staff as opposed to the present figure of over 700 staff most of whom are indigenes of Kano State and employed and trained by government.

Since the creation of the state it has been shouldered with the responsibility of receiving and keeping in its custody all government's fund. In recent years it has been experiencing a boom in the receipt of generated revenue as well as Federal Government grants to the State Government. Owing to 1981 rampage which destroyed all Government Financial records from (1968—1981) relevant data of activities are not available. However, records have

indicated that from 1982 1997 State Government Federal Statutory allocations and, internally generated revenue and Federal Government grants increased from N362,665,098.65 N2,817,680,671.65 while disbursement to ministries and government departments for personnel, overhead and capital projects increased . 3 to from 366,546,0 2,855,021,721.82 in same е corresponding period. | the 1997, (up to March) to 1 of N862,228,401.26 were collected while disbursement totaling 811,709,376.90 were made in the same period.

In the year 1998, the sum of N2,364,874,180.50 was collected as statutory allocation, while total statutory allocations from May 1999, to May 2003 totaled N52,133,845,106.83. Out of this breakdown the sum of N1,037,480,368.29 and the sum of N6,451,197,291.75 (totaling N7,488,677,678.04) was from Ecological Funds and other receipts.

### **DEBT MANAGEMENT**

Consistent with Government's desire to keep track of foreign and domestic debts, reconcile and efficiently manage the state's debt portfolio, the ministry of finance has established a debt management unit under the planning, research and statistics. This was achieved with the support of the British Department of International Development State and Local Government programme (DFID SLGP) and the National Debt Management of DMO) Abuja.

dy, renovation, staffing and full sterization and training of officers has been done to ensure effective management of the office with the support of DFID SLAGP, the ministry has reached an advanced stage towards designing a standard computerized recording and reporting system as it pertains to the foreign and domestic debts. As ensitization seminar for stakeholders in the compilation of some components of domestic debts has been conducted.

Owing to these efforts by the department, the state government is now maintaining comprehensive records and producing efficient reports for sound management of the state debt portfolio while carrying out economic

and financial analysis and forecasts with a view to advising the government on review of debts policy and ways for new strategies.

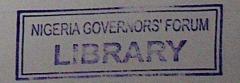

It is important to note that the State's Esteemed Executive Council at its sitting on 6<sup>th</sup> February 2008 has approved the Kano-Public Financial Management Reform Programme.

Since Ministry of Finance is primarily more involved with budget execution and financial reporting, it has left no stone on turned in monitoring the achievements and highlight the improvements achieved and further developments to be carried out in those areas only.

### Improvements achieved

- Model for MDAs to profile their budget executions at the proposal and the beginning of actual execution stages was generated.
- Cash forecasting model for the State Treasury which predicts cash resources on a monthly basis from Federation Account and IGR was generated.
- Cash disbursement procedure using the profiled budgets and cash forecasting as the basis was formulated.
- ➢ Bank Audit exercise carried out in February 2009 to determine the number and status of government

bank accounts which revealed 786 total number of accounts, out of which 615 as active and 171 as dormant. A review pointed to the fact that by any standard these numbers are too many for government to operate and this can also lead to total loss of control and inducement for manipulations and abuse.

- Review of existing documentation, processes and procedures Book Reconciliation returns from MD s which identified sistem weaknesses.
- ➤ The creation of an Excel formats, processes, procedures and controls, and then creation of an Excel model to automate Bank reconciliation process for use both at MoF and HQ and MDAs, which should provide checks and balances.
- Increased awareness on the impediments of poor debt management.
- Increased debt management institutional capacities and technical proficiency.
- Established documents records keeping as well as recording of loans, contractors'/suppliers'

liabilities, etc. Although the recording of contractors' and suppliers' liabilities remain incomplete due to non compliance of rendering returns and submission of inaccurate information by some MDAs.

- ➤ Debt service forecast for incorporation into the annual budget as well as providing base for cross checking the State's external debt data presented by the Debt Management Office, Abuja.
  - oduction of debt management was which 2006 report was between and approved by the State Executive Council on 5th March 2008, while those for 2007 and 2008 are now ready for onward submission to the Executive Council.
- ➤ Limited automation through simple Financial Management Information System (FMIS) accounting module which can interface with budget module at Ministry of Planning and Budget, so as to simplify the production of annual financial reports and interim management reports.

Further developments to be carried out in the areas of improvements

- Budget profile to be realistically fully implemented as designed.
- Cash forecasting to be fully realized and implemented for efficient cash disbursement plans.
- ➤ Roll out the Excel Model Bank reconciliation to MDAs.
- Close all dormant Bank accounts revealed through bank audit and other exercises undertaken.
- Streamline the number of banks, so that each MDA will eventually maintain one single bank account.
- Centralize all capital expenditure payments immediately and then later include all salary payments. This move is critically important to cash control, so as to address the issue of idle funds remaining at the MDAs level where as cash paucity persists at the treasury, thereby allowing releases for important priority cases remaining unattended.
- The move will also facilitate bank reconciliation and easy access to cash balances which will also make short term investments that can yield more disposable cash easier.

### UPDATE ON KANO-PUBLIC FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT REFORM PROGRAMME

### Introduction

Satisfying the needs of the public through effective service delivery is the primary objective of the electorates and financial resources are the most critical resources in satisfying those needs, however, their scarcity compared to the enomous variety of competing demands poses some serious management challenges.

Guided by the doctrine of Shari'a, the administration of HE Mallam Ibrahim Shekarau has since its first term embraced reforms as instruments for improving service delivery. As well as know, improved service delivery may not be achieved without good governance and good governance demands accountability, transparency and participation.

Therefore, in order to be efficient, accountable and transparent, government has to set priorities and those priorities should form the basis for realistic and implementable annual budget, and the annual budget becomes the legal instrument for revenue to be efficiently generated and expenditures for programmes, projects and other activities are to be incurred economically and effectively.

### DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The department of Revenue Monitoring and Evaluation like its research and planning counterpart is a new department

in the ministry.

Creation of the Department is one of the greatest achievement so far made, formally, it was a unit attached to the Treasury Department.

The department is responsible for monitoring of revenue collect on in the state. This is by vising of Ministries/Departments and has als including Sub-treasuries, cross the ling of revenue receipts, compariso of ank lodgment and actual receipts.

It is also responsible for procurement, printing and distribution of all revenue earning documents except those, which are under the control of the Board of Internal Revenue.

It also monitor safes supply strong rooms and location including care and maintenance (locks and keys)

The department also collates data and prepares monthly reports from the revenue return, which organizations render to the Account General. Similarly, quarterly/annual report of revenue collection drive from each organization including revenue received through Federation Account will be complied from the same data which will enable the department to identify specific areas of weakness which require the attention of the organization concerned to be drawn.

The department also analyze revenue

collection and advice on possible improvement and potential sourcing.

The total internally generated revenue from May 2003 to May 2009 is N32, 630, 503,377.03.

As indicated earlier, the revenue receipts in Kano State in recent years have increased astronomically. For example,

between 1998 to December 2005 the revenue internally generated increased from N 9 7 8, 0 2 2, 1 7 8.06 to N4,729,115,154.33. The following table indicate the total revenue collected by Kano State from January 2004 December 2008.

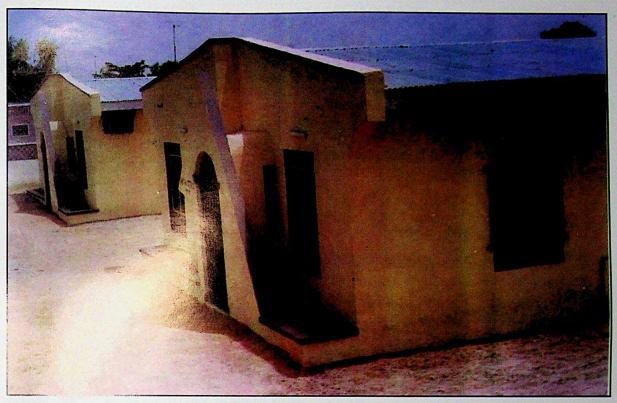
### DEPARTMENT OF INSPECTION AND TRAINING PROGRESS REPORT FROM MAY 2003 TO MAY 2009

From the records, they write report and send to Ministry or Department for onwards transmission to management.

During the period under review the Department received verified and processed inherited liabilities payment vouchers either through a committee appointed by the government or usual administrative memo from the various Ministries/Departments to the Government for the sum of N1,021,684,723.59 out of which the sum of N120,279,921.27 was incurred by the previous administration before 1999 and present administration i.e. N89,725,548.93 and N31,557,372.34 and the remaining balance of N900,407,802.32 was incurred by the immediate past administration.

Out of the total liabilities of N1,021,684,723.59 the following is the actual position of payment verified, and payment made by the government after series of verification of the contractors claims made:

In the year 2009 more training are proposed for computer training, new bank reconciliation format, new chart of account and budget classification. The sum of N4 million has already been approved for training in this year's budget.

### **DEPARTMENT OF FINAL ACCOUNTS**

This department was created in February 2003 with file aim of producing the state financial reports annually.

From May 2003 to May 2009 this department was able to produce 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007 state annual financial reports and reports from 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006, were forwarded to the state Auditor General for his Certification and comments, which later passed to House of Assembly and was deliberated and approved.

The financial annual reposition the years 2003, 2004, and that of 05 vere also published in one of 10 Newspaper and the Transpirof 10<sup>th</sup> December 2006. The annual accounts for the year 2008 has also rewhed an advanced stage.

The department was also able to achieve the new financial reporting standard and how to apply the newly introduced budget classification and chart of account which was introduced in 2007 under the public financial management reforms programme.

Also within the years under review the department was able to introduce an agreement forms for any Treasury Loans issued to any loans which organizations which state the terms and Conditions of how to repay back the loans which is interest free so as to prevent Governmental organizations from taking any form of loan from the commercial Banks.

Also within the period 2003 2009 the staff of the department benefited from different kinds of training on capacity building on the public financial management reforms, such as Excel Training, Bank reconciliation, automation of cashbook, coding system of the new budget classification.

### **BOARD OF INTERNAL REVENUE KANO STATE**

Brief on activities

### - oducion

Board was established under Kano State Ia 10.9 of 1982 (6th April) to be responsible for assessment, collection and accounting of Personal Income and Road Taxes. Issuance of a Tax Clearance Certificate to individuals (who satisfies the requirements) is also a major function of the Board. The Federal Government of Nigeria issued a nationwide tax law called PERSONAL INCOME TAX ACT (PITA) of 25th August 1993. It is a concurrent law that covers the whole country and supersedes all state laws.

### **Organizational Set-up**

The Board as presently constituted, comprises of 513 members of staff under an Executive Management committee comprising of an Executive Chairman and the Kano State House of Assembly's committee on Finance. The Directorates

are as follows:

- a. Administration and General Services
- b. Collection
- c. Planning, Research & Statistics
- d. Assessment
- e. P.A.Y.E.
- f. Withholding Tax
- g. Road Taxes.

In addition to the above, the Board maintains 28 Area Revenue offices throughout the State.

### **Staffing**

There are at present (May 2009) a total number of 513 staff on roll at BIR Kano.

### **Progress on performance**

### KANO STATE INVESTMENT AND PROPERTIES LIMITED ACHIEVEMENTS FROM 2003 TO 2009 AND TWO YEARS ACTION PLANS

### Achievements from 2003 to 2009

- 1. The authorized and paid up capital of KSIP Ltd at the inception of this administration (2003) were N20 million and N16 million respectively. In 2004 the authorized share capital was increased to N250 million with N216 million paid up. The gesture was two fold: firstly, to strengthen KSIP by enhancing its share capital. And secondly, to practically demonstrate the commitment of His Excellency towards implementation of Shari'a for the benefit of all Muslims nationwide through his contribution towards capitalization of an Islamic Bank in Nigeria. The N200 million share increase was with a specific directive to purchase the shares of Ja'iz International Bank.
  - In line with State Government Policy of promoting and upholding Shari'a in all its programmes and actions, the State Government through KSIP Ltd invested the additional sum of N250 million in Ja'iz Bank Plc in it's effort to actualize the promotion of an Islamic Banking in Nigeria. In the same vein the State Government and KSIP Ltd mobilized additional investment into the Ja'iz Bank from other institutions and indigenes of the amounting to N650 million. Thus making the investment from Kano State into the Bank to N1.1 billion or 25% of the Bank's local capital invested.

- 3. KSIP Ltd in 2004 with the support of the State Government had in addition to its existing investment of N13.6 million as at 2003 invested N225 million to recapitalized an indigenous insurance company i.e. Kapital Insurance Ltd. This action saved the company from the camellation of its operating license in at ear. The c rently a insurance company major player in the Instance Industry d. KSIP as Unity Capital Insura 4 million has a current holding wo h N238 shares in the Compan million
  - 4. The investment activities of KSIP Ltd achieved a tremendous progress during the last 6 years. The shareholding in 31 quoted companies was raised to 41. in the same vein the shareholding in 11 unquoted companies in 2003 was equally raised to 13. the shareholding in most of these companies have also increased in quantum and value through additional purchases and bonus issues. The investment cut across all sectors of the economy including petroleum marketing, banking, insurance, conglomerates, food and beverages etc.
    - 5. KSIP Ltd through the encouragement of the present administration, is now engaged actively in capital market trading activities. That is buying and selling of shares which geneates a good return. Although the world

- economic meltdown had its toll on shares and stocks trading throughout the year 2008 till date, KSIP has recently noticed some sign of revival. It is now hoped that KSIP would generate a handsome income in this area.
- 6. KSIP Ltd within the period under reference had concluded the long outstanding issues of Asset Sharing with Jigawa State Investment as it affects the assets of the Company. The outstanding shares due to Jigawa the Investment worth N42.8 million 1,875 shares of Nestle Plc and 349 shares of Ashaka Cement Plc accordingly handed over in a cereamony, witnessed by the Honourable Commissioner of Finance (Alh. Surajo Abubakar Karaye) in 2008.
- 7. The long outstanding legal tussle that existed between the State Government, the KSIP, and the private depositors of Danladi Nasidi Housing Project was concluded. In this regard therefore, the Government of Kano State, the State Attorney General, Kano State Investment and Proprieties Ltd and its Managing Director were all exonerated from the claims by the private depositors by the Federal High Court, Kano.
- 8. KSIP Ltd complied with the directive of the Kano State Government and released its block of six flat at Justice Dahiru Mustapha Road, Kano City Center for the emergence of e-

- passport office in Kano under the Nigerian Immigration Service. This gesture proved useful and eased the operation of the federal agency, which moved from its tight and obscure premises at Bello Dandago Road, Kano to a more conspicuous, bigger and easily accessible location at the city centre.
- 9. The KSIP's 11 Storey head office building is currently being used for the promotion of the ICT Park and the Ministry of Science and Technology. The history of this building can never be written without mentioning the pioneers work and the contribution made by KSIP.
- 10.KSIP Ltd made a comprehensive proposal to the State Government on the need to promote more microfinance banks in the State. This led to the earmarking of N200 million by the State Government to assist the promotion of more microfinance Bank in the State. A committee has been inaugurated by His Excellency to work out the modality of how to fast track the establishment of microfinance banks in Kano state. The secretariat of the sub-committee is located at KSIP and a desk officer has been assigned with this responsibility.
- 11. The Company's plots of land at Bompai Industrieal Estate Kano, City Centre Kano, and Kado Commercial Area Abuja, have been planned for immediate optimum utilization. DAAR Communication have agreed to take

the Bompai plot on a ten year lease to promote its business. The City Centre Plot will be developed along with a private developer to resettle petty traders and street hawkers a way from awkward locations. The Kado Plot will be converted into a befitting shopping mall to serve the residents of its neighborhood.

- 12. Arrangements are in top gear to promote a housing estate at Panisau near the free trade zone to provide accommodation and facilities the early takeoff of the zone. KSIP Ltd along with the Ministry of Land, KNUPDA, and a private developer are promoting a housing development project at the Panisau Export Processing Zone for which KSIP's application for land is currently being processed by the Government towards actualizing the projects.
  - 13.KSIP in October 2008 organized a 4 days business interactive session between the Kano business community and that of the six south western states of Nigeria. The visit of the entrepreneurs created business opportunities for both the visitors and the Kano community in industrial and commercial sectors. A return visit is to be carried out by the Kano business community.

### Two years action plan

The Management of KSIP Ltd in its efforts to redesign and reposition the operation of the company has conducted a

redevelopment of its staff based on their qualifications and experiences to vigorously pursue its two core business activities (Investment and Property Development). Indeed KSIP is searching of experienced and qualified staff to help in turning around the company in line with its repositioning objective and strategy. The company will therefore, pursue the following:

### 1. Investment Activi

- a. The current meltdov in a capital market caused KSI dersify its interment activities in giving more attention to other are a city its core activities i.e. commenced activities, LPO Financing, importation of fertilizer, insecticide and herbicide etc.
- The joint venture drive with corporate bodies, government agencies and individuals with also be pursued under Mudaraba and Murabaha system.
- c. The consultancy service unit which is engaged in investment and management advisory services will revitalized and reinvigorated for sustainable income to the company and assistance to the state indigenes/entrepreneurs.
- d. The company will be engaged in Agric commodity trading by way of domestic sales and export through proper utilization of Nigerian Export Promotion Council (NEPC) and registration with Abuja Securities and Commodity Exchange (ASCE)

### 2. Property Development activity

- a. Development of properties of commercial nature remains the central focus of KSIP Ltd. Ware houses, conference halls, banking halls, shopping malls are to be built for leasing under PPP (Public Private Partnership).
- b. Housing Estates/Residential apartment for middle and high class income earners will be provided for outright sales.
- c. Site and services, cottage and small scale industrial estates, assigned market areas will be activities.

- Trade Mission: KSIP would organize a return trade mission to the six south western states in continuation to enhance a business relationship between the entrepreneurs of the two side.

### MINISTRY OF HEALTH

Kano State Ministry of Health is a service oriented organization charged with the exclusive preserve of provision of Health care services to the teeming population of the state.

It is run mainly by a combination of health professionals with personnels ranging from Doctors, Pharmacists, Nurses and other Para-Medicals that take professional responsibilities on one side and the general administration on the other.

Apart from the provision of health care service to the populace, the Ministry since its creation in 1968, has been saddled with the enunciation and execution of policies pertaining to health care on behalf of the Government.

Since 1967, when Kano State was created, the Ministry had a total of 22 Commissioners, with the first Military Governor of Kano State, Police Commissioner, Alhaji Audu Bako serving as the first Commissioner to run the Ministry.

During the 40 years of its establishment, the Ministry has been up and doing in charting feasible and realistic measures to improve and promote healthcare to the socio-economic well-being of the people. Kano State has recorded so many monumental achievements in the health



sector. As a testimony of these successes, one need to take a look at the available facilities in 1967 and what obtains today.

At the Beginning

At its inception, Kano in 1968 could boost of 4 General Hospitals, one Infectious Diseases Hospital, one Dental Centre and 8 Clinics with a total bed capacity of 585 beds. It is presently covered by a chain of medical institutions totaling 1063 owned by Federal, State and Local Governments as well as private owned medical institutions.

In most Local Governments, medical facilities available include Primary Health Centres, Health Clinics, Dispensaries and Health Posts.

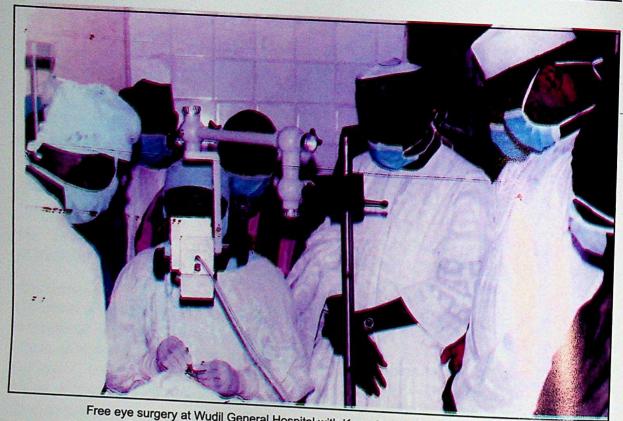

# PRIMARY HEALTH CARE AND DISEASE CONTROL (2003 MAY 2009)

This department is charged with the responsibility of coordinating, implementing, monitoring and evaluating Primary Health Care Programmes. It gives policy guidelines to Local Governments on Primary Health Care services and supervises the implementation of some specialized programmes e.g. HIV/Aids, TB, Control of epidemics, prevention of blindness, interated Management of Childhood Illness (IMC) and Immunization etc.

At the inception of this administration Prima: Health Care and Disease Control programes, which are the corner stone for the provision of health care to all population, were not receiving due attention from policy makers. The four year work plan developed for the department in 1999 was put under KIV and thus not implemented. Similarly, there is no adequate enabling environment for partner agencies to effectively contribute to the development of Primary Health Care in the state.

From 2003 to date a number of programmes and committees that were hitherto inactive or non-existent are now revitalized. They included Medical Field Unit (MFU) and Participatory Learning and Action for Community Ownership (PLACO), Emergency, Preparedness and Response (EPR) to Epidemics Committee and Donor Co-ordination Forum (DCF) all of which were established to co-ordinate and harmonize

the activities of partner agencies in the state.

#### **Functions**

In discharging its duty, the Department of Primary Health Care and Disease Control maintains three divisions and a number of units which plan, formulate, co-ordinate, monitor and supervise the implementation of PHC by Local Government Areas and other public and private providers of Healthcare.

#### **Achievements**

#### Programmes:

The department has various programmes that are being pursued and positive results have been recorded in the following areas:-

# A. FREE PROVISION OF TB AND LEPROSY CONTROL PROGRAMMES

Implementation of free TB services using the WHO recommended strategy of DOTS commenced in Kano State in 2003 in 5 hospitals spread in five Local Government Areas namely: Dambatta, Fagge, Gwarzo, Rano and Wudil. The implementation is a collaborative effort between the State Government and the Federal Government supported by partners particularly the WHO, Netherlands Leprosy Relief, USAID and Canadian International Development Agency CIDA.

Kano State Government in order to further strengthen the state TB and Leprosy

control services in 2003 signed a five year project agreement with the Netherlands Leprosy Relief (NLR). The project is meant to ensure that for the period of the agreement all people suffering from TB and leprosy in the state will receive free treatment. Kano State has so far paid over N3.5 million counter part funding as contained in the agreement. Since 2003 over 12,000 TB patients have been treated free of charge in the state.

In order to provide greater access for effective treatment to people suffering from TB additional strategies have been adopted, which include:-

- Expansion of the programme to as many Local Government Areas and health facilities as possible. From the 5 Centres in 2003 the programme has gradually expanded to 23 Local Government Areas of the state. TB services are now available in over 50 health centres spread all over the state.
- 2. Massive public enlightenment activities are another important strategy adopted by the state and its partners to address the problem of TB in Kano State.
- 3. The programme is targeting high risk groups and places. HIV/AIDS patients are especially prone to have TB, as a result of which the state TV and HIV control programmes are collaborating closely to ensure that TV service is offered to all HIV patents in the state.

- 4. Barracks settings is also a high risk place for TB as a result of over crowding of people. In addition. uniformed workers, including police and military, due to the nature of their work, have also been noted globally to have higher risk of developing HIV and by extension TB, because of the close association between the two It is because of these diseases. reasons that State TB roc amme of the Ministry is extering free TB services to the A Forces g∈ Police Specialist Hospital and Clinic in Kano throug ore sion of items and training st f from respective centres.
- 5. Commencement of Community Directly Observed Treatment (DOTS).

It is important to note that the successes achieved in the control of TB in Kano State would not have been possible without the massive support and assistance provided by stakeholders particularly the FMOH, NLT, PATHS, WHO and GHAIN.

B. HIV/AIDS CONTROL PROGRAMME:
The State Government in collaboration with National Action Committee on Aids (SACA), FMOH and USAID (through GHAIN Project) offers services to people living with HIV/AIDS. Currently, over 1,000 patients are receiving treatment at IDH and MMSH free of any financial cost. In addition, 13 hospitals including IDH and MMSH offer other range of

services such as Voluntary Counseling and Testing (VCT) and Prevention of Mother Child transmission (PMTCT). programme also saw the strengthening of 15 Local Government Action Committee on Aids (LACA) in collaboration with GHAIN project through provision of office equipment and training. strong and useful collaboration with TBL programe is attained which ense the Directly Observed Treament (S) for TB patients is entres providing HIV avail e ir services. Is because TB is the number or apportunistic infection affecting people living with HIV/AIDS.

There is an increased awareness about HIV/AIDS among the general public as indicated in the 2005 seroprevalence survey. The survey also shows that the prevalence rate has fallen from 4.1 to 3.4 which ranked Kano 27th among the 36 states including FCT.

Two additional General Hospitals (Gwarzo and Wudil) will soon start providing ARV drugs. Another hospital (Waziri Shehu Gidado) has been selected by Institute of Human Virology of Nigeria (IHVN) to provide PMTCT services.

Prior to the year 2003, the state has only 4 VCTs, 2 PMTCT and no treatment centre. The current status indicated that there are 16 VCTs, 5 PMTCT and 2 treatment centres, including treatment for children infected. It is also on record that Kano

State is the first in the North to commence HIV/AIDs treatment for children free of charge.

C. NATIONAL PROGRAMME ON IMMUNIZATION (NPI): This service is geared towards ensuring adequate coverage of all target groups with vaccines against all the childhood killer diseases The services are being provided in virtually all clinics and hospitals in the state in the form of routine immunizations. Other strategies include Polio Eradication Campaigns (House to house) and fixed post campaigns for epidemic prone diseases like Cerebro Spinal Meningitis (CSM) and Measles. The programme is run in collaboration with NPI, WHO, UNICEF and USAID (through COMPASS). Within the period under review several campaigns were conducted. These include 4 CSM campaigns, 4 measles campaigns and 19 rounds of polio eradication campaigns in form of National Immunization Days (NIDs) and the recently modified strategy of Immunization Plus Days (IPDs). 4 rounds were successfully implemented in the year 2006 and 3 Similarly. rounds this year (2007). the state has initiated Inter Local Government Area Assisted Child Health Initiative (ILACHI) as a strategy for accelerating routine immunization in the Local Government Areas of The programme was Kano State. implemented in 8 metropolitan Local

Government Areas for phase 1 and 44 Local Government Areas for phase 2 and 3. (see appendix III for all the IPDs coverage's).

However, CSM mass immunization was not conducted for 2006/2007 season due to global shortage of vaccines and evolving trend of serogroup of the microorganism causing the disease. This informed the decision to strengthen surveillance and laboratory investigation that will guide control and further development of vaccines.

Another important vaccine preventable disease receiving serious attention is Neonatal Tetanus (NT) where a cluster survey was conducted to assess the current NT mortality rates (NTMR) which were found to be very high in the 1990 survey as well as other related factors for control efforts. Outcome of the survey reveals 4.8 Neonatal Tetanus Deaths per 1000 live birth in 2006 against 25.5 per 1000 live birth in 1990. Coverage of TT2+ immunization among Women of Child Bearing Age (WCBA) was found to be 10.5% for those found with cards and 30.6% for those with cards and history. Considering these significant findings, WHO experts indicated that Kano State can embark on the last stage of NT elimination, which usually takes about 3 years.

In recognition of the urgent need to eradicate poliomyelitis within the next 24 months, His Excellency the Executive Governor of Kano State was invited to the

Urgent Stakeholders Consultation at Geneva, Switzerland, the World Health Organization Headquarters, with world leaders. The meeting acknowledged the tremendous achievements recorded in Kano State which is well ahead of the milestone expected based on which the state was highly commended. The meeting further indicated the funding gap for the eradication programme and call on Governments to make effects a filling the gap.

D. SCHOOL HEALTH SE VIC S: This programme was estab she with the aim of providing health se lices to post primary schools. Over be years the Ministry established model school clinics in ten (10) boarding schools. This was done in collaboration with the Ministries of Education, Local Government and Parents Teachers Associations (PTA). In addition to this, the Ministry extended the school health services to Qur'anic Schools. By this arrangement, the gur'anic Malams are empowered with skills of First Aid treatment and good personal hygiene. As a pilot scheme, 48 gur'anic schools within the 8 Metropolitan Local Government Areas have so far received training and first aid kits for their pupils. Additional 108 schools from the remaining 36 Local Government Areas were involved in this programme. Due to the enormous benefits realized under the pilot scheme, His Excellency the Governor of Kano State, at the closing ceremony of the final phase, gave directive to all Local Government Areas to ensure full implementation of the programme in their respective domains. In this regard, the state

Committee for this programme is going round all the 44 Local Government Areas to facilitate proper planning and implementation of the programme.

The programme also partners with Unilevers Nigeria Plc on Nutrition and Dental Health School campaign which was conducted in primary schools and collities in the state.

E CONTROL OF ONCHOCERCIASIS

(CDTA) Programme The programme is

currently being conducted in 18 Local Government Areas. Drugs are supplied free to the affected individuals on house-to-house basis from the various designated centres in the state. The programme is being run in collaboration with WHO, Christofel Blinden Mission (CBM) of Germany and other Donor Agencies.

F. MALARIA CONTROL/ROLL-BACK MALARIA: The focus of this service is to ensure mosquito control, prevention of contact between man and mosquito and treatment. Activities carried out during the period under review include 3 rounds of annual Child Health Week during which 37,000 pieces of Insecticide Treated Nets were distributed to 533

health facilities in the state. Two trainings were also conducted in conjunction with COMPASS to provide skills in the use of long lasting ITNs and Intermittent rophylactic Treatment (IPT) for pregnant women. COMPASS also assisted with 8,000 insecticide treated nets which were distributed in 10 health facilities within 5 Local Government A r e a s. Similarly, kid care and other anti malarial drugs were made available to various facilities.

In continuous effort to fight malaria, Kano State was selected as one of the seven states to benefit from the World Bank loan secured by the Federal Ministry of Health for Malaria Control Booster Project. The project took off in 2007. Lot Quality Assurance Survey (LQAS) on malaria work plans have been developed for the state and the 44 Local Government Areas and application letter signed by His Excellency the Governor of Kano State. Arrangements are being concluded for commencement of the project, which is worth \$17.5 million US dollar.

G. CONTROL OF DIARRHOEAL DISEASES: The focus of this programme is the control of diarrhoeal diseases particularly out break of cholera epidemics. There is a National Diarrhoea Training Centre sited within MMSH which caters for training needs while IDH serves as the treatment centre during epidemics. Within the period under review, there were four serious cholera outbreaks.

The epidemics were successfully contained and patients were treated free of charge.

Prior to 2003 a major threats to the programme is the seasonal occurrence of cholera epidemic which pose a heavy burden on the health system and associated human suffering and deaths. This seasonal occurance of epidemics has been eliminated/controlled in the past two years which is not unconnected with the massive sensition and mobilization efforts for all some derivation of the state as well as strengtonic of the stock of epidemic drugs.

H. PARTICIPATORY LEAR IN AND ACTION FOR COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP (PLACO) Plus: This is a programme that is focuses on sustained community mobilization and empowerment in PHC so as to continuously raise demand for immunization, nutrition and malaria control services plus Integrated Village Health Services (IVHS) and Medical Field Unit (MFU). The Medical Field Unit (MFU), which was dormant before the coming of this Government, has been reactivated recently with its strengthening in 30 major hospitals. The major function of MFU is daily collection, collation and analysis and reporting of hospital data with a view to detecting epidemics or worsening situation and implementing local action/intervention collaboration with community and Local Government PHC departments. These units are also expected to perform public relation functions in the hospitals. FVHS on the other hand seeks to extend health care services to all communities through provision of Basic Health Post, water sources, ventilated improved pit-latrine (VIP latrine) and capacity building for Local Village Volunteer Health Workers (VVHW) and Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs).

INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT OF CHILDHOOD ILLNESS (IMCI): This a programme which aims to ote Child Survival, Growth and opment. It was introduced in State as a pilot in Kano in 2 cipal Local Government area in 2 actities i.e. Marmara and Sharada. This strategy addresses the overarching burden of childhood illnesses in the state. During the period under review community component of IMCI was implemented which promotes household practices. State Government and PATHS have made giant effort in strengthening and expansion of IMCI to other facilities in the State through training and provision of drugs.

The State also has a Community IMCI working group which works toward promoting Key Household Practices in the communities.

J. HEALTH EDUCATION AND SOCIAL MOBILIZATION: The main objective of this programme is to create awareness on health programmes and educating communities on best practices. The programme also runs a training centre for personnel in providing Health Education in Health facilities and programme managers at Local Government Area level.

# Health Care Training Institutions Under the Department

There are two health care training institutions in the state that are under the department of Primary Health Care and Disease Control: namely School of Hygiene and Health Technology with an enrolment of students once annually. The schools award Diploma and certificates to students in various health related disciplines. Students are recruited from all the 44 Local Government Areas of the state.

Recently, new courses have been introduced and others were accredited for School of Health Technology. These include:-

- 1. Dental Technician Course
- 2. Dental Surgery Assistant Course
- 3. Pharmacy Technician Course
- 4. Medical Lab Technician Course
- Health Information Technician Course
- 6. Dental Therapist (HND four years)

The school also saw an increase in its manpower with 5 lecturers and 4 junior staff.

Due to the recent transfer of Environmental Health Officers (EHOs) to Ministry of Environment, control and supervision of the School of Hygiene has been transferred to the Ministry of Environment.

#### Committees:-

i. Kano State Emergency Preparedness and Response to Epidemics (EPR) Committee:-

This committee responds to human affiction which may arise from assters, disease out-breaks, and other emergencies.

State committee is apt to all cases opidemics in the state. It is a 22 member committee with the Hon.

Commissioner for Health as Chairman. The membership is drawn from relevant Ministries, Parastatals, NGOs, Health related civil societies, associations, traditional institutions and the council of ULAMA. Similar committees exist in all the LGAs with the state committee providing supervisory role. The successes recorded by the committee include reduction in mortality rate during cerebro spinal meningitis, measles and cholera outbreaks.

The committee has also intensified its activities especially in the current face of CSM situation which calls for strengthening surveillance and preparedness efforts.

# ii. Task Force Committee on Avian

With the first reported case of avian flu in Kano State in February 2005, after it was reported in Kaduna, the Ministry has established a taskforce in March 2005 to co-ordinate the State Health Sector response and preparedness under the chair of Professor Sadiq S. Wali with membership drawn from Ministry of Health, Ministry of Agric, Hospitals Management Board, Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital and other relevant stakeholders.

Major activities carried out by the committee include radio and TV programmes to enlighten the general public, training of doctors and other health workers, identification of treatment centre, conduct of surveillance on several occasions to look for human suspects and development work plan. So far no human case has been reported in the state.

### iii. Donor Co-ordination Forum (DCF)

This forum was set up to co-ordinates donor inputs of resources and services in the health sector and to continuously attract resources from donors to support State Government in health and social development.

Some of the key international/donor agencies in the forum include:-

 Department for International Development (DFID)/Partnership for Transforming Health Systems (PATHS): This project focuses on all health services, especially for the very poor through demand creation in priority issues, rights and responsibilities to good health. Other focus areas include budget reform, capacity building of health workers and institutions/organizations among others.

- 2. United State Agency for International Development (USAD)/Community Participation and Asion in Social Sector (COMPASS): his ocuses on child survival with special emphasis on community participation and ownership of programmes is well as capacity building.
- 3. USAID/Global HIV/AIDs Initiative Nigeria (GHAIN): This targets comprehensive HIV/AIDS intervention in the state.
- 4. European Union: Implementing Support to Routine Immunization in Kano State (SRIK) project. The project has a total budget of N2.7 billion Naira to be applied in 4 years with possible extension to 7 years. Though the project was initially designed for Routine Immunization, of recent and following the impressive posture of the State Government in transparency and accountability (good governance), Water and Environmental Sanitation was added.

Other Agencies represented in the DCF include: World Health Organization (WHO), United Nations Children's Fund

(UNICEF), Netherlands Leprosy Relief (NLR) Organization, Society for Family Health (DFH), Rotary International, National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA), National Programme on Immunization Agency (NPI), John Snow Incorporated JS1 (Making Medical Injection Safer (MMIS), Institute of Human Virology Nigeria (IHVN), Coalition of Community Based Organizations, Ministry of Budget and Planning and Ministry for Local The forum is under the Government. Chairmanship of Honourable Comissioner for Health.

primarily charged with the responsibility of managing all state-owned hospitals and other health facilities. The management ranges from dealing with staff matters, maintenance of health facilities, machineries and other equipment. It also covers the area of purchase of mattresses and beddings, cleansing and cleaning materials as well as procurement and distribution of free maternal/child care, accident and emergency drugs and medicaments.

Broadly speaking the vision, mission and activities of the Board are as follows:

#### **Our Vision**

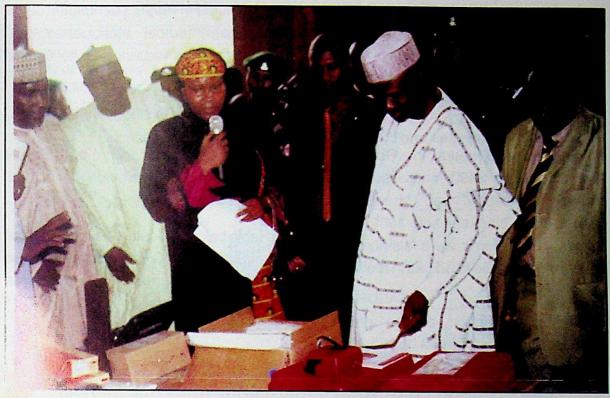

Free Maternal and Child Health Care and Accident and Emergency Programmes. The programmes of free maternal/child health care and accident and emergency have received a boast from the present administration. The quarterly release of funds for the programmes was enhanced to accommodate the need of a substantial percentage of the populace. As a result

this initiative, the number of beneficiaries has drastically increased. Patients from the states and neighboring countries are equally reaping the benefits of the programmes. The improvement of the maternal and child health care service has culminated into the reduction of maternal and child mortality and morbidity.

Accident and emergency programme also assisted in saving the lives of thousands of people (Accident Victims and patients needing urgent medical attention).

## Purchase of Cleaning and Cleansing Materials

In an effort to enhance the sanitary condition of health facilities in the state, government has over the years being providing for the purchased of cleaning and cleansing materials on quarterly basis. The effort has greatly reduced the poor sanitary condition of our hospitals, which ultimately assisted in reducing the spread of communicable diseases.

**Purchase of Mattresses and Beddings** 

Within the last 6 years, the Board was able to procure 2430 mattresses, 5004 pieces of hospital bed sheets/pillow cases, 2000 blankets and 1000 jumbo pillows. The items were distributed to government owned hospitals in the state.

#### **Free Hospital Cards**

Within the inception of the present administration government has abolished

fees collected in respect of hospital cards and other medical stationeries and directed for their issuance at no cost to patients.

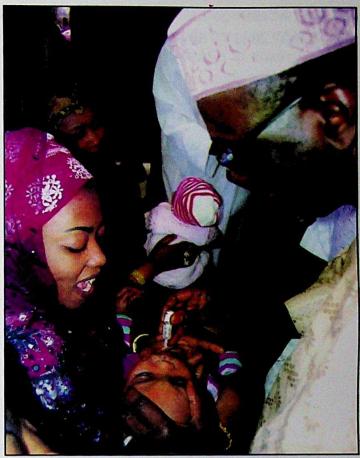
#### DRUG MANAGEMENT AGENCY

#### Introduction

The Drugs Management Agency was established by the State Government in December 1996 vide EXCO conclusion No. 11 (96) of 10th October, 1996 to produce, distribute and sell essential drugs and medicament of high quality to Government owne Hose at affordable prices The good objective of setting up the ency is to satisfy the Dags rement of the it is the only state organiation marged with the responsibility of procuring and distributing drugs and other medicaments through a "Drugs Revolving Fund Scheme". This policy objective was strictly followed in carrying out the assigned functions and

responsbilities with a view to achieving maximum results. The agency has a total No. of forty-five (45) staff out of which six (6) are Casual; comprising cadres deployed from the Ministries of Health/Finance, Hospitals Management Board, and Office of the Head of Civil Service.

The objectives of the Agency, at the initial stage, could not be realized to the fullest due to insufficient funding until the advent of this Administration backed by its philosophy towards quality health care services for the teaming populace. For instance, in the year 2004, the administration provided N7.8 million;

N20 million in 2005; N20.65 million in 2006; N20 million in 2007; N8 million in 2008 and approved N18 million in the year 2009 which collectively marked the turning point for the Agency's achievements as itemized below:

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES**

The functions and responsibilities of the Agency are carried out through the office of the Managing Director and two respective Departments i.e. Admin. And General Service and Drugs, both are headed by substantive Directors. Each of these departments is now manned with moderate and right caliber of personnel in order to ensure rapid growth.

# MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS RECORDED FROM MAY 2003 TO MAY 2009

- As a result of overhauling the DMU, semi automation of the production processes was achieved. This has enabled the Unit to increase two additional products into its line, namely, Kanotrim, and Kanovite. Other products manufactured by the DMU includes:

  - In Addition to introducing additional products, the valume of output of the Unit's products had also increased several folds.
  - 3. The quality control laboratories were provided with additional modern equipment and analytical Chemicals and tools, which has also contributed in enhancing the production output.
  - 4. The DMU laboratories have in addition, become a referral centers for chemical analysis for Drugs suspected to be fake and/or substandard. This is in addition to routine chemical and quality analysis carried out on all pharmaceutical products that come to the Agency before supplying same to State Hospitals and Facilities.

- 5. Recognition as training and research center. Many Tertiary Educational Institutions, notably, BUK, ABUK, Sokoto University, Kano Polytechnic, Abuja, and Benin Universities etc. have been sending their Science students for mandatory industrial attachment and research works. 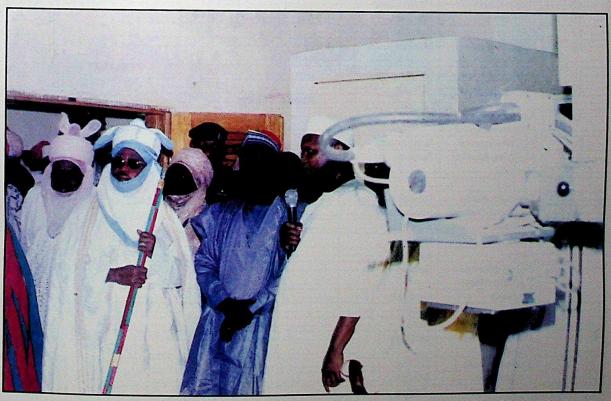

### MINISTRY FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

### PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF SETTING UP THE MINISTRY

- k) Drafted 5 year strategic planning for all the tertiary institutions of the State.
- Enhanced scholarship awards to indigenous students at various schools/institutions of Nigeria and abroad.

#### **TERTIARY EDUCATION**

Tertiary education in Kano state is directly managed by the authorities of such institutions under the direct supervision of the Ministry of Higher Education.

Kano State at the moment has 6 Tertiary

Educational institutions. They include; Kano University of Science and Technology, Kano State Polytechnic, Sa'adatu Rimi College of Education, Aminu Kano College of Islamic Legal Studies,. Audu Bako College of Agriculture and College of Arts, Science and Remedial Studies. These tertiary institutions were established within the span of 20 years and they have more than justified the objectives of their establishment. The present Government has accorded top priority in adequately solving most of the problems bedevilling Higher Education.

### KANO STATE UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY:

The KUT is the highest institution of higher learning owned by the State. It was established with a view to provide Kano state with alternative outlets for the training of highly skilled manpower especially in the field of science and technology. Since it came into being in April 2001 up to September 2004, Kano State Government has expended N480 million on capital projects. Perhaps one can assess the rising profile of the University when one looks up its achievements between 2003 and 2004.

#### INTRODUCTION

Kano State University of Technology took up academic activities in April 2001 with two faculties consisting of six programmes as listed below:-

- I. Faculty of Science and Education;
- 1. B. Sc. Pure Mathematics
- 2. B. Sc. Applied Mathematics
- 3. B. Sc. Statistics
- 4. B. Sc. Computer Science
- II. Faculty of Agriculture and Agricultural Technology
- 1. B. Sc. Agriculture

#### 2. B. Tech. Food Science

The University has accordingly provided employment to several people around the area and has provided basis for new economic activities to the people in several forms. The coming of the University of Technology has provided admission to several qualified students of Kano and other states of the nation. The university has institutional inkages with several academic staff or salbatical, visiting and part time.

When the University meenced Garba operation in April, 2001 Dr. nar icility of Dambatta from the Engineering, Bayero University Killio was appointed Deputy and Actin Chancellor of the University. In August 2301, a substantive Vice-Chancellor was appointed in person of Professor Abdul-Hadey Abu Shawki from Egypt for two years. After the expiration of his tenure, the Executive Governor of State, Mallam Ibrahim Shekarau appointed Professor Ibrahim Shehu Diso as the acting Vice Chancellor. The Governor also appointed the first University Governing Council under the Cjhairmanship of Architect Musa Tanko Waziri. The University is located at Wudil, a medium sized town, 40 km away from Kano on Kano-Maiduguri road.

#### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

The University Campus occupies the former site of three schools, i.e. Teachers College Wudil, Technical College Wudil and Commercial Secondary School Wudil. These schools had physical and structural facilities in terms of land, dormitories, classes, laboratories, workshops, toilets, buses etc. These facilities were in serious state of

dilapidation. In order to rehabilitate the existing structures a technical committee consisting of Architects, Quantity Surveyors, Engineers etc from various states, ministries, parastatals were appointed and an implementation committee formed. The Committee was chaired by Dr. U.G. Dambatta and Professor Abdu Salihi Kibiya as the Head of a Technical Team. Some of the works executed up the implementation Committee are follows:-

- 1. Rehalitation of Electrical Supply:
  The time there College site was bein serve with 333KV, NEPA main line using 200KVA 33/0.415KV transformer. Being a University of Technology, reliable power supply is very essential.
- Water Supply: The Kano State Water Board has one of its supply schemes in Wudil town. There is a main line to Gaya passing right in front of the University campus.
- Restoring the main water supply to the campus, this permitted access of the supply from the Water Board.
- Rehabilitate/replace the existing underground and over-head tanks and boaster pump as well as rehabilitate the three existing boreholes on the campus.
- Rehabilitate/replace the wiring system, borehole pumps and connect boreholes to the surface tanks where feasible

- 3. Rehabilitation and renovation of:
- a. Students Hostels
- b. Classes
- c. Toilets
- d. Administrative Blocks
- e. Conversion of Dinning Hall to the University Library etc.

When the University took off it continued with the work the implementation Committee started. These include:-

- Conversion of Junior Staff Quarters to Nurses and Health Centre;
- Renovation of some Senior Staff
  Quarters and conversion of some
  Student Hostels to Departmental
  Offices;
- Renovation of some Senior Staff Quarters;
- Conversion of Engine Room to Office of the University Librarian.
- Landscape of some areas like surrounding of classes, male and female hostels, administrative blocks, mosque premises, carports, engine room etc.

Remarkable achievements were made within the last six years with regards to infrastructural development in the University which consumed between May 2003 March 2009, the sum of N1,349,390,457.88 as shown below:

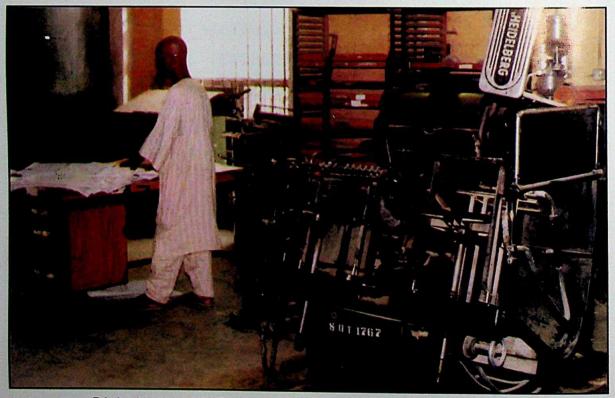

# PHILOSOPHY OF THE KANO UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY

The guiding philosophy of the University shall be the provision of community basic education which facilitate the production graging es who not only meet the soula requirement in learning and arac graduate in their various field speciation but are also groomed in so h a nner that they will be able to fect function in the community within the context of the needs and resources to the community.

Programmes of study will be student centered and faculty based with inter-departmental and inter-faculty inputs where necessary. At the end of studies, the Kano University graduate would have acquired sufficient knowledge, skill and attitude to be able to:

- Practice the profession for which training was obtained in any urban or rural setting.
- Perform professional services within the concept of the needs and requirements of the community.
- 3. Develop personal characteristics required of a professional in the relevant field of training.
- 4. Undertake post-graduate or

continuous education in any chosen specialty in field of training.

# SA'ADATU RIMI COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Sa'adatu Rimi College of Education, Kumbotso was established following the setting up of an 11 man committee set up by the then Commissioner of Education, Alhaji Abdul-Hamid Hassan, The committee was to study the plight of primary and secondary schools staffing problems and recommend possible ways of solving those problems. The need to have more trained teachers to man the ever-increasing primary and secondary education levels in the state was very obvious. The implementation of the new National Policy on Education (6-3-3-4) and the Government policy on NCE as the minimum teaching qualification in the country galvanized Kano State Government to seek solution to the staffing problems the schools were facing. The committee, therefore, strongly recommended the establishment of another Advanced Teachers College, in addition to the Advanced Teachers College, Gumel. In 1981, the Advanced Teachers College Waje was established at the Pivotal Teacher's College, near the Pilgrims Camp, Kano.

In 1983, the college was moved to the present site of Kumbotso Teacher's College, along Kano-Zaria road and renamed College of Education. In the same year, it was merged with the

Institute for Higher Education and became one of its units. In 1987, the Institute for Higher Education was decentralized into 3 main independent educational bodies including Kano State Polytechnic, Kano State College of Education and College of Arts and Remedial Studies.

The creation of Jigawa state from Kano state in 1991 marked the split of the college into separate institutions to their respective states.

Thus Gumel campus became the Jigawa State College of Education, while the Kumbotso Campus became the Kano State College of Education.

# OBJECTIVES AND FUNCTIONS OF THE COLLEGE

The College was established to primarily help the State achieve the following educational objectives:

 a. Offer courses of study, training and research in Arts, languages and science leading to the NCE or such equivalent or professional courses allowed by law which on successful completion candidates qualify as teachers in primary schools, post-primary schools or other institutions of higher learning.

- b. Promote through teaching, research and other means, the advancement of knowledge and its present application to the needs of the state.
- c. Organize from time to time in service vacation courses, emmars, conference and workshop to erving and educational administrators
- d. Create facilities for research and dissemination of know adge with respect to the teaching procession.

In discharging its primary responsibility of producing academically and professionally qualified NCE teachers for primary and post-primary schools and improving facilities for effective teaching and learning, the college offers as at 2003/2004 academic sessions the following:

### **AUDU BAKO COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE THOMAS, DAMBATTA**

Audu Bako College of Agriculture is one of the 6 Higher Institutions established by State Government in 1977 following the edict establishing the Kano State Institute for Higher Education. In spite of decentralization of Institute for Higher Education in July, 1987 which split the institute into 3 separate tertiary institutions viz Kano State Polytechnic, Kano State College of Arts Science and Remedial Studies, the College remained under the Kano State Polytechnic. Presently, the college is an autonomous

entity operating as an independent tertiary institution. Among other things, the college is given the responsibility of training middle level manpower for the development of Agriculture which is the main stay of the economy of Kano state.

Since the year 2002, when the college became a separate entity from the Polytechnic it has redoubled its efforts in attaining the objectives for which it was set up. The Government on its part has been forthcoming with adequate financial

support to enable it meet the new challenges.

#### **Brief History of the College**

Audu Bako College of Agriculture was established as Audu Bako School of Agriculture, Tomas Danbatta in October, 1978 by Kano State Ministry of Agriculture and Natural Resources (MANR) on a temporary site. The students of the College were mostly drawn from MANR. Local Governments and other Agricultural organizations.

The College was named after late Alhaji Audu Bako (1924-1980) the first Military Governor of Kano State (1967-1975).

The college with other independently existing Schools were brought together to form Kano State Institute for Higher Education in 1980, and later 1987 together with four other tertiary institutions brought to form Kano State Polytechnic.

In 2002 the Kano State Polytechnic was split into three giving birth to Autonomous Audu Bako College of Agriculture Dambatta (ABCOA)

ACHIEVEMENTS FROM 02 DATE The college has witnes do m the granting of autonomy to deep) a period of accelerated development in sirms of infrastructure and manpower courtesy of the Kano State Government and the Education Trust Fund (ETF). Four Higher National Diploma programmes and thirteen (13) certificate courses have been introduced. Steady increase in enrolment figures over the years e.g. last session (2006-2007) the newly admitted students figures stood at 416 but in the current session (2007-2008) about 914 are matriculating. The state government has been consistent in funding the college, this enabled the College to scale through the June, 2008 NBTE Accreditation and re-accreditation of some of its ND and HND Programmes.

Between May 2003 May 2006, the sum of N62,666,064.64 was expended to improve educational facilities as follows:

#### AMINU KANO COLLEGE OF ISLAMIC LEGAL STUDIES, KANO

Aminu Kano College of Islamic Legal Studies was established in 1976 as training centre under the Kano State Judiciary to particularly train middle level manpower personnel for the Area Courts. In 1978, it was brought under the Kano

State Institute for Higher Education, which comprises other five institutions namely; The College of Education, the College of Advanced Studies, the Staff Development Centre and the Cooperative Centre.

#### **ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT 2003 TO DATE**

#### INTRODUCTION

The college was established in 1976 as a Training Centre under Kano State Judiciary in order to train middle level personnel for the Area Courts (now Sharia Courts). It was located within the School for Arabic Studies (SAS),Kano as its temporary site with only four teaching Staff and twenty students.

In 1973, following the submission of the Aminu Kano Education Review Committee, the Government merged the State owned tertiary Institution under a single umbrella named Aminu State Institute for Hihgher Education (IHE).

In 1987, the Institution for Higher Education was broken into three autonomous bodies viz: Kano State Polytechnic; Kano State College of Arts, Science and Remedial Studies and Kano State College of Education with campuses at Gumel and Kumbotso. Under that dispensation the College found itself under the Kano State Polytechnic with the name of Aminu School of Islamic Legal Studies.

In the year 2002 Aminu School of Islamic Legal Studies (AKCILS) was axided from the Kano State Polytechnic and named Aminu Kano College of Islamic tudies (AKCILS).

In the year 2005 a new law was enacted by the State Government with a slight change in the name of the College that is, Aminu Kano College of Islamic and Legal Studies. The autonomy enjoyed AKCILS came along with unprecedented pubic high demand for Islamic education as a result of the high number of secondary school graduates and in view of the cocktail certificate worse designed to cut across and address various categories of formal and informal education levels being offered by the college. For example, the students intake doubled from 3000 to 2003 to 6000 in 2005.

# ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT (COURSE OFFERED)

The college which hitherto operated under 6 departments and offered 6 courses responded to the high student's intake and carved out 3 school, each

headed by a dean and expended into 12 department within 5 years.

With the period under discussion, the College developed from seven Academic Departments and five programmes to a Collegial System as follows: -

  - i. Department of Shari'a
  - ii. Departm of Law
- 2. SCHOOL ANGUAGES
  - i. Doar of Arabic
  - ii. Depart of English
  - iii. Coart of Hausa
- 3. SCHOOL OF ISLAMIC AND QUE ANIC STUDIES
  - i. Department of Islamic Studies
  - ii. Department of Qur'anic Studies
- 4. SCHOOL OF GENERAL STUDIES
  - Department of Pre-Diploma Programmes
  - ii. Department of Remedial and Continuing Education
  - iii. Department of Education

The academic programme particularly those that are aimed ast training of teachers were restructured from Diploma in Arabic, Hausa and Islamic Studies and Diploma in English, Hausa Islamic Studies to the following:-

- Diploma in Arabic/Islamic Studies/Education
- 2. Diploma in Arabic/ Hausa/ Education
- 3. Diploma in English /Arabic/
  Education
- 4. Diploma in Islamic Studies/
  Education

- 5. Diploma in Hausa/ English/
  Education
- 6. Diploma in Hausa/Islamic Studies/
  Education

The Diploma in Shari'a and Civil Law and that of Civil Law were left to remain as they were but their curricula were updated to accommodate new developments in the field particularly with the current administration emphasis on Shari'a Compliance.

The Diploma in Qur'anic Science and Hadith Science Students are now required to offer courses in Arabic and Education in line with the objectives of their training as teachers.

Furthermore, Advanced Diploma Programmes were introduced in Sharia, Civil Law, Arabic Education, and English Education to afford further training to the judicial personnel and teachers who could not gain admission into University.

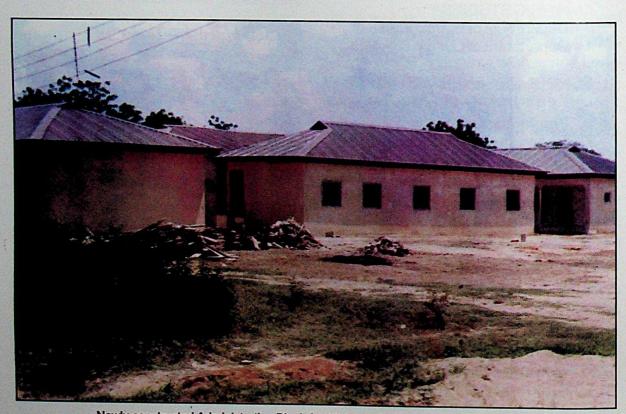
All these programmes restructuring were among the new innovations, which were initiated by the Management to improve the quality of products of the College and make their training a functional one. Other areas of innovation created by the College with the support of and finance by Shekarau Administration included the establishement of standaed Language Laboratory for the College language based courses.

Furthermore, students of the college pursuing any programme are required to undergo a compulsory one-year

computer in computer appreciation either in English or Arabic Language Medium. The course is meant to provide training in order to enable products of the College to be self reliant after graduation.

The College has also joined the rest of the world in tapping the benefits of Information and Communication Technology (ICT). The College has secured a V-SAT Internet Facility; which is connected to 30 computer sets. There is an internet Laboratory for research and learning by staff and students. The College intends to computerize its Examination and Students Registration soon.

Moreover, the college intends to mount a Degree programme in Qur'anic Science, the first in its kind in West African region. It has already started making contacts with relevant agencies in this direction. The state government has already welcomed the ideas and had set up a committee to recommend on the modalities of implementation. Recently the government sponsored a negotion team under the leadership of the coecial Adviser on Higher Edcuation the sited the University of Qur'anic Science Jmm Durman, Sudan.

#### IMPACT OF SHEKARAU'S ADMINISTRATION

The first three years of Shekarau in office has made indelible marks in the provision of the infrastructural facilities much needed by the College. It has been three years of remarkable transformation with an enviable record of over fifteen projects.

Most of these projects were funded by the State Government, some through internally generated revenue by the College, others by the Education Trust Fund (ETF) and the rest by philanthropic organizations/individuals. Some of these projects are as follows:-

In the past quarter of the year 2004 and 2005 the Shekarau administration remitted a magnificent budgetary allocation of N55 million to the College for the construction of a 550 seating capacity lecture theatre. The theatre is the first of its kind provided to any State owned institution of learning since the creation of Kano state in 1967. Construction work was completed and the structure commissioned.

The State Government had earlier on accorded the College a special grant of N5 million in the first quarter of the year

2004 to construct a twin lecture hall that could accommodate a total of three hundred students. The project was successfully completed in the last quarter of the year and the lecture halls are already in use.

The year 2004 and 2005 also witnessed Shekarau's untiring commitment to the development of the College when the government funded the construction of a block of Administrative Block at the sum of N14.2 million. The construction started in the last quarter and this project has also been successfully completed.

Shekarau imprints more indelible marks when the government approved the sum of N4 million for the establishment of a language laboratory. The language

laboratory project with a 40 student capacity leads all other language laboratories (State and Federal Institutions in Kano) and has become part of the chain of successfully completed projects by the College management.

The College, courtesy of the constituency project from Hon. Aminu A. Jingau also enjoyed the provision of borosole to augment water supparate the construction of a Bus Stop for the construction.

In addition, N4.1 million was provided for the procurement of Assemble Hall Conference, furniture, resources complex at N13.94 million and the twin theatre at the cost of N8 million.

The Kano State College of Arts, Science and Remedial Studies is one of the tertiary Institution under the state government. It was the first tertiary institutions established by Kano state.

The college was initially established thorough Edict No 6 of 1972 as the college of advanced studies with the sole objective of upgrading the level of students leaving our secondary school to

the level of appropriate preparation for University admission. Since then the College has undergone a number of metamorphosis in name with its major objectives remaining the same in 1978, it was renamed the school of preliminary studies, under the then institution for higher education through Edict No. 11 of 1987 the college regained full autonomy as the college of Arts, Science and Remedial studies.

The College is de up of two schools namely the Source of Prelimary Studies (SPS) and the continuing Education Centre (CC) has school is headed by a Vice Principal.

The School of Preliminary Studies (SPS) offers mainly of advanced level courses, the <a href="Interim Joint Matriculation Board">Interim Joint Matriculation Board</a> of (ABU) (IJMB) and Diploma courses in affiliation with Ahmadu Bello University and Bayero University Kano respectively.

The CEC offers mainly remedial programmes in Arts and Science for SSCE students. As well as teachers grade

#### Year 2005

The sum of two y million Naira

(20,000,000.00) was approved for the college for the capital projects in the year 2005. Three projects were executed. The projects include: Purchase of five hundred students armchairs, construction of new chemistry, laboratory and re-roofing and general renovation of the college auditorium.

### NEW INNOVATION/INITIATIVE MADE BY THE COLLEGE TO PROMOTE/ENHANCE LEARNING FROM MAY 2003 TO MAY 2009

The college in uced new Diploma courses for the land of the Students as well as eman the development of knowledge at the ate. This effort on the other had vide more skilled manpowe in he areas of their specialization as leachers in primary and junior secondary schools. As the world is turning into computer age, the college made its contribution towards this direction by introducing a Diploma in Mathematics computer education course to provide computer/mathematics teachers to primary and junior secondary schools to lay the basic foundation for the computer knowledge and ICT.

# IMPACT OF THE COLLEGE ACTIVITIES ON THE SOCIETY

All the projects executed by the college are centered on the provision of a better atmosphere for teaching and learning to take place, from the side of students the college has provided enough students furniture, renovated classrooms, lecture halls, laboratories and the college auditorium. An internet Café equipped with computer is also provided. In addition a new chemistry laboratory has been constructed and is being equipped.

On the side of staff, offices were renovated and furnished staff houses were also renovated. These projects contributed a lot in improving staff welfare vis-à-vis providing the services required by the society at large.

From records available 75% of the IJMB students who graduated from the College from May 29, 2003 to May, 2009 are eligible for direct university admission. Quite a number of them are undergoing degree courses in different Institutions while others are assisted in securing admissions into ABU in the year 2004 and 2005. This will in near future increase the number of qualified manpower required to boost the living standard.

The state teachers board and State Universal Basic Education Board now employ many Diploma graduates. The diploma programme is assisting the state in providing teachers in the most pressing areas of English and Mathematics.

The remedial programme is contributing immensely in reducing secondary school drop-outs in the society. In addition most of the remedial students who passed out

within the period under review have secured admissions into post secondary institutions as well as universities through UME.

The college has offered employment to many people thereby accomplishing the present administration zeal of reducing unemployment in the society.

### EXAMINATIONS IJMB EXAMINATION:

The College graduated a total of 3,666 IJMB Students within May 29, 2003 to May 20, 2006. Out of the number 2,859 were eligible for direct admission into Nigerian Universities.

As the performance of the College, it is rated among the top three out of 26 IJMB affiliated institutions. Below is the breakdown of the College performance within the period under review.

The Kano State Scholarships Board, as an autonomous body under the State Ministry for Higher Education is charged with the responsibilities of awarding scholarships and improving the welfare of the State sponsored students. In line with its specified functions enshrined in and provided by the edict establishing it in 1987, the board has successfully covered some significant activities and remarkable believements in respect of state sponsored beneficiaries.

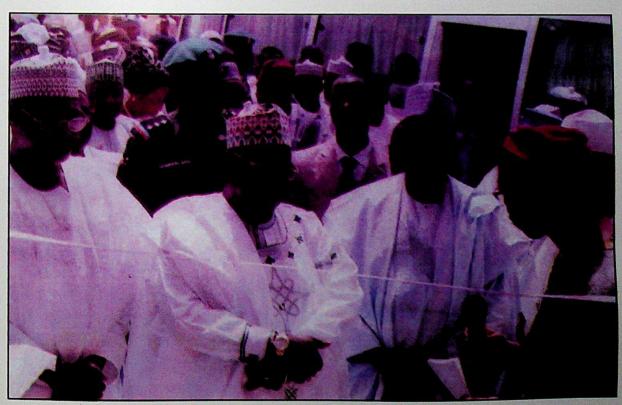
### INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL SCHOOLS

The atia and commitment of Government higher education is out of the conviction that all citizens of the state irrespective of their personal disposition

have right to good quality education.

In an effort to realize that the State Government has increased student's scholarship allowances by 25% to 50% with effect from the 2004/2005 session; and has revitalized scholarship awards to 29 courses of study that were earlier been rationalized by the previous governments.

It has also so far expended One Billion, One Hundred and Eighty Million, Eighty Seven Thousand and Sixty Four Naira, and Sixty Kobo (N1,180,087,064.60) as scholarships/assistance in respect of One Hundred and Nine Thousand, Two Hundred and Seven. Students both internally and abroad as specified here under:

It is worth noting that the above mentioned figures in respect of 2006/2007 session did not include the 21,662 potential scholars who were interviewed in March 2008, and the amount expected to spend on them is N231,156,600.00

However, as indicated in the above table, the board has 60 beneficiaries studying abroad on full scholarship/assistance at fourteen countries across the world. To mention but a few are; UK, Malaysia, US, South Africa, Sudan, Russia, Egypt, Algeria, Canada, Germany, China, Netherland etc.

#### INTRODUCTION OF BANK PAYMENTS

The State Government has also introduced Bank payments of students allowances in order to increase efficiency and eliminate the potential risks faced by officers conducting cash payments to students at various institutions across the country, and for meeting global changes of computer age.

#### **ACTIVITIES/ACHIEVEMENTS:**

The Kano State Scholarships Board during the period under discussion had:

- expended the sum of Formula red and ninety three million, two number and seventeen thousand, number and seventeen thousand, number and seventy six aira ally (N493,217,476.00) being interest allowance against 2007/208 academic session in respect of forty six thousand, three hundred and eighty four (46,384) Kano State Sponsored students at tertiary institution across the nation.
- Externally awarded scholarship to ninety four (94) bona-fide indigenes of Kano to study at various countries of the world which include United Kingdom, United States of America, China, Netherlands, France, Canada, Malaysia, etc.
- Made million advanced payment of special grant to the tune of thirty million naira (N30,000,000.00) at three h u n d r e d t h o u s a n d n a i r a (N300,000.00) per student to 100 newly admitted students in to Nigerian law School against 2008/2009 academic session whom without the exigent Government's indulgence can not do their registration as scheduled.

- \* In liaison with State Government made a provison of twenty (20) lap-tops, five at each campus of the Nigerian law School in Kano, Abuja, Enugu and Lagos, as a trial for the use of our beneficiaries at various campuses.
- \* In conjunction with Office of the Adviser on Students Affairs, witnessed the allocation of twenty four (24) 18 sealer buses to National and local Charles of Kano State Students A ciation at tertiary institutions as the country.
  - Government sponsorship of six (6) officials, drawn from Ministry for Higher Education, Office of the Secretary to the State Government, Scholarship Board, Kano State House of Assembly and Office of the Adviser on Students Affairs, on monitoring tour of Kano State Students Studying in United Kingdom, Russia, Malaysia, South Africa and Sudan.
- \* In the course of the tour, noted that five (5) Kano State students under the Bilateral Education Agreement in Russia were, at that time, in serious financial problem due to non-payment of their alloances/health insurance by the Federal Government of Nigeria via Federal Scholarship Board owing to delay in signing the 2008 budget. It was for this reason, the Kano State

- Scholarship Board, prior to Committee's report, made special submission to the Government in their favour for exigent assistance. Thus, N2,100,000.00 was released for subsequent disbursement of \$15,000.00 to them at \$3,000.00 per head which was successfully carried out.
- \* Following Government approval for the release of the sum of Eighty two million, one hundred and fifty nine thousand and three hundred naira only (N82,159,300.00) to the Board being educational assistance to four hundred and sixty three (463) Kano State students in Malaysia, Egypt and Sudan, 4 officers were sponsored to conduct further screening and effect physical disbursement of the assistance to the beneficiaries.
- \* In an effort to provide a very conducive environment for the entire staff of the Board, a general renovation, construction of additional office blocks and computer centre are now in progress within its premises. Already the sum of N12,800.00 was spent for the expansion, repair and renovation of 23 offices and toilets, procurement of furniture and equipment and refurbishing of the conference hall.

### MINISTRY OF INFORMATION, INTERNAL AFFAIRS, SPORTS & CULTURE

The Ministry of Information, Internal Affairs, Sports and Culture as the name implies is charged with the broad responsibility of information dissemination, management of internal affairs of the state, and promotion of cultural and sports development.

In practical sense, majority of the staff of the ministry (53%) and the bulk of the job (60%) performed by the ministry pertains to information dissemination and general coordination of information related activities especially as it affects supervising and giving policy direction to the 3 state owned media outfits (Triumph, Radio Kano and CTV) and coordinating on behalf of the State Government, the Federal controlled NTA Kano and Pyramid Radio Madobi as well as 2 private radio broadcasting stations i.e. Ray Power and Freedom Radio. It also falls under the purview of the department of information to liaise and coordinate on behalf of the state, with all other national and international print and electronic medium for the purpose of harmonization.

**Key Departments/Functions** 

As earlier stated the mandate of the ministry is quite broad, as they are executed through the 5 core departments of the Ministry namely:

- a. Information
- b. Internal Affairs
- c. Public Enlightenment
- d. Administration and General Services, and e. Research, Planning and



Statistics.

In addition to the departments through which it executes its functions, the Ministry also supervises and overseas the activities of 8 Parastatals which include:

#### **Information Department**

As the name suggests, the Information Department is the nucleus of Information, publicity and enlightenment activities of Government. It serves as the chief image maker of the state and foremost adviser to the government on Information related

policies in the state. It also coordinates all public enlightenment, sensitization and mobilization efforts (now handled by the newly created public enlightenment department) of government. Through units such as publication, radio, graphics, video and photo section as well as the various information operatives in the ministries, parastatals and Agencies, the ministry has been publicizing and promoting government's programmes as well as ensuring sustained enlightenment of the masses on the government policies and programmes as well as providing timely, credible feedback on government policies, programmes and activities.

The Information Department also undertakes on the behalf of the ministry duties such as:

- a. Coordinating all publicity, publication and all public relations aspect of government.
- b. Organizing ad hoc and regular press briefings on monthly or quarterly basis during which ministries and their parastatals give account of their activities and achievements.
- c. Production of state diaries and calendars, including posters and leaflets.
- d. Production of radio and TV programmes for airing on state electronic medium.
- e. Production and distribution of pictures and photographs,
- f. Liaison with the National Media-Electronic and print.
- g. Liaison with media related organizations/unions such as NUT,

#### RATTAWU, NIPR, APCON.

- h. Organizing works hops and seminars for improvement of skills of PROs.
- Representing the Ministry in the VVIP committee during visits to the state by important dignitaries.
- Issuance of rejoinders, press releases condolences, obituaries and their placement in Newspapers or airing on Radio/TV.
- k. Liaison with all Federal and State Ministries of Information.
- I. Posting/deployment of PRO's in Ministries and parastatals.
- m. Coordinating and serving as the Secretariat of media consultative committee and media implementation committee.
- n. Drafting of memos at the National Council on Information meetings.
- Representing the state on all media related activities of UNICEF as well as chairing the publicity aspect of BIRD FLU control under the Federal Government.

In concrete terms the activities of the units under the information department are translated through regular dissemination of Information of activities of Government Ministries, parastatals and Agencies through the State Electronic and print media, publication of books, calendars, diaries, posters and leaflets; production and distribution of pictures and photographs as well as undertaking various graphic designs.

During the period under review i.e. May 2004 to date, the Information Department

was able to accomplish the following programmes:-

#### New Innovation and Future Plans

Although, the Information department has een and doing in charting new strategies for the attainment of desired objectives, the conception and implementation of DANDALIN TATTAUNAMA a novel programme in which the Executive Governor meets with the grassroot on interactive session is very unique. For the moment, the Ministry is to adopt a new focus and sense of direction which is aimed not only at restoring its old glory but to reposition it for better results, efficiency and productivity. In line with the new thinking and bold initiatives towards re-invigorating the general operations of the Information Department, new strategies to be adopted by the Ministry will include among others, the following:-

- a. That the Ministry will assume its onerous responsibility by remaining as the Chief spokesperson and mouthpiece of the Government;
- b. That in ensuring 'a' above, it will undertake all publicity, publication and public relations aspects of government activities, thereby enabling a more co-ordinated and

- purpose oriented information management strategy in the state;
- c. That for the purpose of countering bad-press against the government and for the Department to become more pro-active, two very important Committees will now be put in place i.e. Media Consultative Committee, and Media Implementation Committee:
- d. That in collaboration with the Office of the Head of Service, the Ministry intends to embark on more regular/intensive training for its staff geared towards ensuring improved productivity in the discharge of its assignments/responsibilities.

#### **Public Enlightenment Department**

Owing to huge responsibilities shouldered by the Information Directorate and the need to create more space for efficiency and effectiveness in the business of information dissemination, the Ministry sought and got Government's approval for the creation of a separate department to be called Public Enlightenment Department. It's basic responsibility is to take charge of Public Enlightenment and general mass mobilization of the people towards understanding the policies, programmes and achievements of the Government.

Thus the Local Government Information unit under which all Local Government Information Officers report came directly under this unit, which is manned effectively by an experienced Director.

Under this department also, are the TV unit, Radio unit, Graphics unit, Public enlightenment and Technical unit.

The Department which took off in September, 2007 has already started making dramatic impact in the State information sector. Among other things, the Department has charted plans for the re-invigoration of public enlightenment and mass mobilization in addition to the re-introduction of Zonal Information Offices which will on zonal basis monitor how the Local Government Information Officers are faring.

The Public enlightenment unit has also proposed to the Government the takeover of TV Viewing Centres from the Agency for Mass Education, as part of its long-term plan of reviving film shows especially in the rural areas.

In appreciation of the role of this department, Government has made 3 financial releases to the department to enhance its activities:

- a) N9,720,000.00 released for purchase of 100 LIFAN motor cycles for PRO's and Information Officers;
- b) N7 million released for mass mobilization exercises;
- c) N4,854,500.00 for purchase of Public Enlightenment Vans.

#### **Internal Affairs Department**

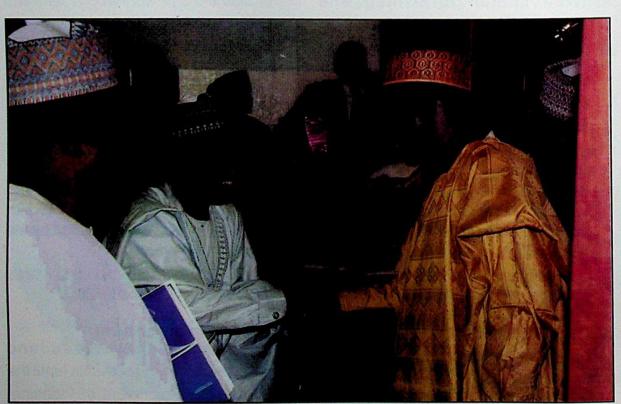
This Department oversees and coordinates all sporting activities (until the creation of the department of Planning, Research and Statistics in September, 2005) as well as the day to day activities of

the Nigerian Security and Civil Defence Corps. It also receive, process and recommend all application on Naturalization and Citizenship by expatriates as well as plan and organize the annual independence anniversary celebrations. Although other functions such as issuance of telephone lines and payment, allocation of Government Quarters as well as issuance of licenses to hotels, clubs and cinema houses for noise making have either been transferred to other Government bodies or completely abrogated due to commencement of Sharia implementation, the Internal Affairs department performs other Ad-hoc functions as assigned it by the Hon.

Commissioner.

During the period under review, the department has worked hard to execute its mandate with success as indicated below:-

- a. It coordinated several meetings of the State Advisory Committee on Citizenship and Naturalization and recommended names of the Executive Government of citizenship y the Federal Government;
- b. Coordinated the actiones of the Nigeria Security and Coril Defence Corps and got approval for subvention increase from N500,000.00 in 2003 to N1 million in 2004 and to N2 million in

- k. Served as a data bank and research collation centre for the Ministry.

# Planning, Research and Statistics Department

Though the Department has been in existence for a long period of time, it has however been inactive with most of its responsibilities were being performed by other departments. With the dogged commitment of the present Commissioner to revitalize the Ministry to ensure efficient discharge of its mandate, however, a new Director for the Department was appointed, following the retirement from service of the former. Competent staff were identified and redeployed, while some were newly recruited. Some of the staff are to man the newly created State Information Data Bank which is under the supervision and coordination of the Department. Computer hardware and accessories and furniture work worth N4.9 million were procured late last year for the take-off of the I.D.B. while another N1.4 million have been approved by the Government for the purchase of the anticipated huge data processing, analysis, storage and

#### retrieval.

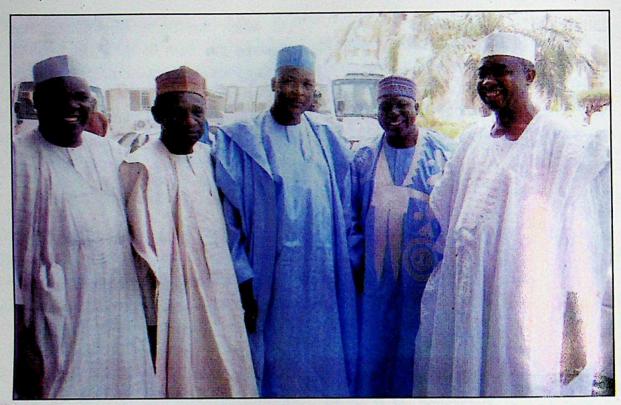

Similarly, Government released the sum of N128,340.576.00 for the purchase of 1x10 KW transmitter at Tudun Wada Local Government and N13,200,000.00 for the purchased of 6 HDV camera/Fiber optic link.

The Triumph Publishing Company was incorporated in 1980 as a limited liability company with the manifold objectives of:-

- Seeking to enlighten its readers on governmental policies at local, state and federal levels;
- b. To constructively criticize the performance of public institutions and officers as well as seek the education of the teeming members of the people who have no sources of reference other than the legally sanctioned machinery of

interested and incumbent political groups;

c. Upholding as its guiding principle the maintenance of unity and territorial integrity of Nigeria and Africa as a whole.

Given the stated objectives of the paper, a great deal has been achieved in fulfilling the dreams of the founders of the company. Between May 2004 to June 2008 the State Government incurred the expenditure of N85,839,284.00 on capital and recurrent expenditure as follows:-

In 2004, the government released the sum of N8,843,900.00 for the reactivation of the company's machineries and the purchase of two circulation vehicles, which were

successfully accomplished;

- Ø Similarly, in September 2004, the State Government released the sum of N15,793,200.00 for the procurement of tons of newsprints and newspapers printing consumables, and part of the money was spent on the installation of Internet facilities and general renovation of the company's structures among others;
- Ø In the same gesture, when the company witnessed erratic power supply from the then NEPA, the government graciously approved the release of complements of power supply to the company.
- Ø In November 2004 the State

Government approved the release of N9, 709,484.00 from the company's capital grant of N25 million. The money was expended on the following: - Industrial Printer (Black & White), Computer UPS and backups, repair of Guillotine and Kord machines and over-hauling of some other commercial printing machines.

Government Printing Press is the permit State Printing and Publishing whose responsibility include under king all printing and publishing works are State Government, its agencies and the 44 Local Governments in the State Apar from the traditional role of printing office stationeries, tax receipts, revenue receipts, the Government Press is also saddled with additional tasks of printing Government Laws in forms of gazettes, reports, white papers etc. In addition, the press serves as an avenue of creating awareness on Government's programmes by means of posters, books, hand-bills etc.

Since the assumption of the present administration, efforts are geared principally towards fulfilling its corporate responsibility as well as restoring its old glory as the oldest and the best known printing house in the whole Northern Nigeria.

The Shekarau administration has supported the Government Printing Press in the following ways:-

- Reversion of the press to its former status of Government Printing Press from the nearly crippled Kano Printing Corporation;
- Restoration of the right to handle all confidential Government printing jobs such as gazettes, reports, white papers etc;

- e. Allocation of N1.7 million in August

- 2003 to settle salary arrears and repair generator;

All in all the Printing Press expended the sum of N292,717,882.35 from May 2003 to June 2008 for its commitments.

Due to the improved working atmosphere, a more aggressive commercial drive and the resultant increased patronage which the printing press is enjoying, there has been remarkable rise in revenue receipts. For the first time in more than 15 years, the Government Printing Press is not only self sustaining but has remitted revenues totaling over N5,650,000.00 from January 2004 to August 2005 to the State Treasury This no doubt is a major feat and a mark assesses recorded.

To feather and the improved financial buoyancy of the organization, the Printing Press expended N861,720.00 for the procurement of working tools and equipment as well as welfare package for staff, while another N2,465,350.00 was expended for the refurbishing of machine and rehabilitation of office, toilets and mosque.

#### **Achievements:**

In view of the new lease of life at Government Printing Press and the successes it is recording, it is gradually regaining its status as training centre for printers. Within the last 6 years, many NDE trainees, industrial training students from various institutions of higher learning within and outside Kano have undergone various trainings and acquisition skills.

Beneficiaries include FCE Kano, FCE (Tech) Bichi, BUK, University of Maiduguri, College of Education

Kumbotso, Sani Abacha Youth Centre and Kano State Polytechnic.

New Initiatives and Innovations: In order to meet the new challenges posed by increased patronage, the press made conscious efforts to educate and enlighten its workers to be more security conscious in handling printing jobs, especially printing of security documents. The organization also employed 14 casual workers and additional operators thus reducing the time frame of completing jobs. Similarly, the bulk purchase of working materials by the present management has reduced the cost of production as well as profit margins.

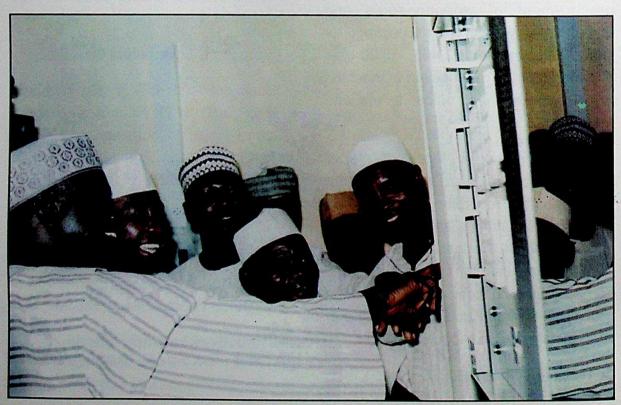
#### **HISTORY AND CULTURE BUREAU**

During the period under focus, the State Government has strived to create a conducive atmosphere by wa su port and financial assistance as enabled the Bureau to meet tat orv obligations. Major accomplis of the Bureau within the period under reverse include as follows:-

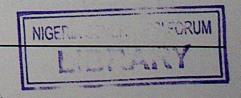

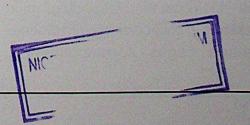

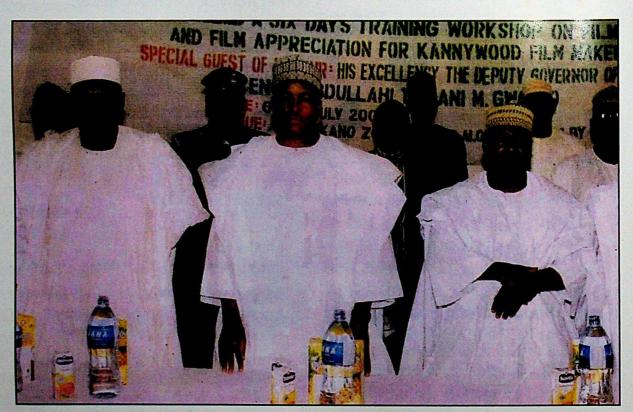

#### KANO STATE SPORTS COUNCIL

The Kano State Sports Council is largely responsible for organizing, managing, promoting and developing sports competitions in Kano State. It also falls within its preserve to raise the standard of sports performance as well as to coordinate and harmonize the activities of sports Associations, Clubs and other sports organizations in the State.

The functions of the Council as provided in the revised Edict 1991 are:-

- a. To promote and develop sports in the state;
- b. To organize, encourage and manage sports competitions, games and other activities;
- c. To use its best endeavour to raise the standard of performance on sports, and:
- d. To coordinate the activities of sports associations, clubs and other sports organizations.

### SPORTS ORGANIZATIONS /PARTICIPATION

Since the inception of the present administration, a great deal has been achieved in both sports organization and development of facilities.

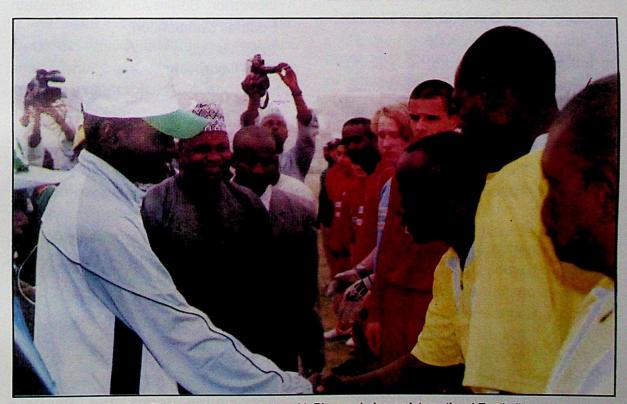
Under Sports Organizations, the Council has over 20 Sports Associations through which it organizes and participates in Local, National and International Competitions. These associations and index amongst others Football, Weight Taekwando, Basketball, Judo, Ball, Chess, Athletics etc.

Associations are managed by Lantary bodies and largely funded by

the Government, though the Associations secure sponsorship from other private organizations for taking care of their local activities.

Kano State is noted in it's consistency in participating in most of the National Sports Associations organized Championships. And this has been made possible through the steady release of funds from the present Government as compared with other former Administration. This gesture is one of the contributory factors in making Kano excel in National Competitions and hosting of National and International engagements as enumerated below:

Handball National Championship which gave its team the mandate to represent Nigeria in Sweden in June, 2004. Kano hosted National Premier Basketball final Eight and the team emerged the 3rd in the country.

- Organized Inter-Local Government Football, Volley-Ball and Cycling Competition for Sports talent hunt;
- Volley-Ball Championship for Male and Female and performed averagely by taking the Seventh (7th) position out of the Fourteen (14) States team that competed for honours in Damaturu, Yobe State;
- Handball. The Council sponsored the Female team to the national Handball Championship for under 15 and 20 Boys and Girls at Idah, Kogi State from 5th to 15th August, 2004;
  - Lawn Tennis. The Council sponsored the Tennis team to participate in Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) Championship from 12th to 21st August, 2004 in Lagos. The players performed well with the best amongst them eliminated at the quarter-finals;
  - Karate. The Council with the help of the Government staged the 7th Homologation and grading Championship at the multi-purpose Indoor Sports Hall, Kofar Mata from 30th of August, to 4th September, 2004. sixteen (16) Karate players who participated in the exercise were promoted to their higher belt ranks;

The Table Tennis Association has also been sponsored by the Council to organize Youth Championship locally while the Football Association has organized the Premier League amongst 18 clubs as well as Division II League involving Fourty Nine (49) Football Clubs in the State;

Kano State Executive Governor, MALAM IBRAHIM SHEKARAU has been awarded with an honour of the most encouraging Governor in the field of sports in Sokoto State during Governor Bafarawa National Youth Football Competition;

Lawn Tennis. The Annual 18<sup>th</sup> Dala Hard Court Tennis Championship was staged in Kano from 20th to 27th November, 2004 where Kano athletes performed remarkably well;

In December, 2004 as had been the tradition, the Annual Lawn Tennis Clinics for children under twelve, cosponsored by the organizers of the Dala Hard-Court and the Lawn Tennis Association was staged at the Kano Club Lawn Tennis section which attracted children from the Metropolis Local Government;

<u>Handball</u>: The Kano State Handball Association team, the Pyramid participated in the National Division II

- Handball Competition held in Ibadan, the Oyo state capital from 17th to 28th November, 2004;
- The Final Ramadan Cup Football Competition was held on 15th November, 2004, in honour of the Honourable Commissioner of Information, Internal Affairs, Youth, Sports and Culture, Alh. Garba Yusuf Abubakar;
- The State Government extended its hand of assistance to 13 Voluntary Owned) National Professional and ateur Football Clubs in the State th N2,750,000.00 Sports pment including N100,000.00 ash gift was given to each Club in the year 2003;
- In the subsequent year (2004/2005), the State Government released the sum of N6,630,000.00 as assistance to 13 Football Clubs representing the State in the professional and National amateur division;
- The State Government sponsored a Golfer with N2 million to participate in International Golf Competition in London in the year 2004 and 2005 respectively;
- The Government provided the sum of N920,000.00 for the participation of Shekarau Babes Football Club at the 1st Dalhatu Bafarawa National Youth Soccer Competition where the team emerged the 3rd best in Nigeria;
- The sum of N700,000.00 was also

- approved by the Government for the hosting of West-West Zonal under 18 Boys Basketball Championship tagged Gamji Cup 2005 and Kano emerged the 1<sup>st</sup>;
- Upon the request from the Nigeria Football Association (NFA), the Government sponsored the hosting of World Youth U-23 Football Qualifier between Nigeria and Senegal of which the sum of N3,000,000.00 was expended in the year 2004;
- Similarly, the State hosted World Cup qualifier in Kano involving Super Eagles and their Angolan counterpart with an expenditure of over N18,000,000.00
- Kano participated at the North-West State Zonal Elimination prior to the Festival proper and attained the 1<sup>st</sup> position in team games. The sum of N3,000,000.00 was provided for this purpose;
  - In the same vein, the sum of N9,000,000.00 was expended for the preparation and participation of the State at the 14th National Sports Festival held in Abuja in the year 2004, Kano won 31 Medals made up of 3 Golds, 13 Silvers and 15 Bronze.;

#### **YEAR 2005**

Shekarau Babes F.C. 2005 was sponsored with N1,920,000.00 to participate in an International friendly football matches in Niger Republic;

- The State Taekwondo team participated at the just concluded National Championship in Lagos from 6th to 16th September, 2005 where they emerged 2nd best having won 2 Golds, 2 Silvers, 2 Bronze and a Trophy for the best fighter;
- The Government graciously released the sum of N600,000.00 to Sports Writers Association of Nigeria (SWAN, Kano Chapter) for the organization of Shekarau Media Football Tournament in September, 2005;
- The sum of about N450,000.00 was spent for the hosting of NFA/Coca-Cola National Challenge Cup Semi-Final between Enyimba Football Club and Sharks Football Club in October, 2005;
- In 2005 the National Dala Hard-Court Tennis Championship was staged in Kano in November, 2005 and Kano State Government donated N1,000,000.00 to the organizers for the renovation of Tennis Court at Kano Club;
- Other National Competitions attended by the State from the month of October to Dec. 2005 were Judo, Hockey, Golf, Boxing, Chess as well as National Milo Basketball Competition for Secondary Schools for which Kano came first in Lagos;
- The Government also released the sum of N4,500,000.00 for the hosting of North-West Zonal Sports

Elimination in Kano from 5th to 9th December, 2005. Kano State won the 1<sup>st</sup> position out of the 7 States that participated at the Zonal elimination;

- In the same vein, the sum of N15,00,000.00 was expended for the preparation of the State at the 15th National Sports Festival held in Abeokuta, Ogun State April 2006, Kano State won 21 Med mach up of 9 Golds, 7 Silvers and Stoles and placed 16th among 30 State and Abuja;
- Sponsorship of a Football Coacle for a coaching course in Bazil N750,000.00;

#### **YEAR 2006**

- In the year 2006, the Sports Council was able to participate at various National Sports competitions under the sponsorship of the State Government as follows:
  - At the National Handball championship for Division II category held in Katsina, in February 2006, the State team participated and won 1st position thereby promoted to Division I;
  - The State Junior team U-12 Boys and Girls participated at the National Handball team at Idah, Kogi State and won the 4<sup>th</sup> position on the overall results;
  - At the 2nd Local Government sponsored National Taekwondo

championship held in September 2006 in Lagos, the State team dominated the championship by winning 5 Gold, 2 Silver and 2 Bronze medals as overall winners:

- The Government provided N600,000.00 for the sponsorship of One Touch and Donkolt Football teams that participated at the National Challenge Cup. They were all eliminated at the second round:
- The State Karate team was sponsored participate at North-Central Zone Karate championship held in Makurdi, Baue State. The team performed agely well by placing 4th position;
- State teams, the Government also extended financial assistance to some voluntary organizations for the promotion of sports as follows:
- The sum of N500,000.00 was donated to SWAN, Kano state branch for the organization of Media Football Cup in honour of Governor Mallam Ibrahim Shekarau;
- The sum of N3,750,000.00 was donated to 14 Amateur Clubs with each receiving some amount as Government contribution for the sustenance of the clubs:
- The sum of N1,000,000.00 was granted to the organizers of the National Dala Hard Court Tennis Championship in Kano as Government's assistance for a

successful tournament in Kano:

- The sum of N2,000,000.00 was also provided by the State Government for the hosting of NFA congress for the election of the Chairman, Ibrahim Galadima thus retaining his chairmanship of the Nigeria Football Association;
- The sum of N3,000,000.00 was provided for the procurement of Sports equipment for the use of athletes to enhance their performances;
- Kofar Nassarawa Basketball centre was renovated at the cost of N4,500,602.00 which was later reviewed to N6,000,000.00 because of some additional works in the area of wall fencing of the entire centre. The project has been completed;
- The sum of N393,860.00 was provided for the continuous maintenance of Sani Abacha Stadium, Kofar Mata;

The sum of N2,344,969.00 was approved and released for the construction of boundary wall at the former Sports Club situated at Kano Race Course, and the project has since been completed in preparation of establishing a befitting sports complex and gymnasium.

### 2007 SPORTING ACTIVITIES:

National Volley-Ball Championship:

The State team (Male) participated at Governor Bukar Abba Ibrahim National Volley-Ball Championship held in Damaturu, Yobe State, in May 2007. Kano

won 4th position out of 15 States that participated:

In December, the State team took part at the National Volley-Ball League at Makurdi, Benue State where the State emerged 4th out of 22 teams that participated. With this result the team qualified to play in Division I.

- ii. Nestle Milo Basketball: In the National play-off, North-West Milo Inter-Secondary Basketball finals for Male and Female held in Kano, in May 2007, Kano won first position in both categories;
- iii. In January, 2007 Malam Ibrahim Yusuf, a Kano State Basketball player was among the National team players that participated in the African Junior Basketball Championships held in South Africa and was crowned the best valuable player of the tournament;

The same player also represented Nigeria at the Basketball Africa Nations Cup held in Angola, in August 2007.

Kano State Basketball Association secured sponsorship and organized "FAKI CITY", State Basketball League.

iv. Taekwondo: The State team participated in the National trials for the preparation of the 9th All Africa Games. 3 players including 1 female player qualified and represented the country at the Continental Games held in Algiers, in the year 2007. The female player from Kano won a silver medal

for Nigeria.

- v. Similarly, the State Taekwondo team participated at the Gateway National Open Championship in Abeokuta, in September 2007, where they emerged 2nd best having won 3 Gold, 1 Silver and 1 Bronze medal.
- vi. In the same manner the State Taekwondo team participated at the Annual L.G. Electronic sponsored National Competition where the team emerged the 3rd best among 36 teams.
- vii. In appreciation of the ano state outstanding performance of Taekwondo team in all the National Taekwondo Championships for the last five years, the National Taekwondo Federation nominated the State Coach, Malam Ibrahim Yahuza to attend International coaching course in South Korea for which the State Government sponsored at the cost of N1,940,620.00
- viii. Football: Upon the request from the Youth Sports Federation of Nigeria, the Kano State Government sponsored the hosting of Ramat Youth International Soccer Tournament in Kano for which the sum of N6 million was expended.
- ix. Shekarau Babes Football team which represented the State won the first position and represented the country at Dubai International Soccer tournament which was also

sponsored by the State Government.

- x. Similarly, the Government College Football team, the winners of Shell Cup 2007 was also sponsored by the State Government for a football tournament in Dubai United Arab Emirate where the team won the first position.
- xi. In order to encourage teeming youth for the promotion of football in the State, the State Government sponsored U-17 and 23 Youth Soccer Competitions amongst Local Government Areas in the State with the sum of N3 million.
- 14 Amateur Football Clubs that are representing the State in the National Amateur Football League at the total amount of N6,500,000.00
- viii. Kano Pillars FC as Kano State representative in the National Premier Football League was solely financed and sponsored by the State Government with the sum of N100 million in the year 2007.
- xiv. The Government has sponsored Shekarau Babes FC to U-17 National Football Championships with N400,000.00 that took place at Benin, Edo State where the team took the 2nd position.
- xv. In its efforts to extend financial assistance to other sector for the

- promotion and development of sports, Government provided N500,000.00 to SWAN for the organization of Governor Shekarau Media Cup in football.
- xvi.The sum of N500,000.00 was given to Kano State PHE Students of FGC Goron Dutse to undertake study tour of National Institute for Sports (NIS) Lagos.
- xvii. The Government also provided N1,000,000.00 to Kano State Youth Foundation for the organization of 1st Edition of His Royal Highness, the Emir of Kano,Alh. (Dr.) Ado Bayero Football Club Competition amongst Local Government Areas.
- xviii. The sum of N300,000.00 was made available for the furnishing of Kano Pillars Fans Club office which is located at Kano Pillars Stadium, Sabon Gari.
- xix. Basketball: The State Basketball team participated in the National Premier Basketball tournament (Savannah Conference) held in Kaduna. Out of the seven teams that participated, the State team took the 2nd position.

- xxiii. Kano State's Volleyball Coach accompanied the male team as the National coach. In addition the State Government sponsored State contingents in a number of sporting activities to witness and support Nigerian team at the games.
- xxiv. As part of state's efforts to support the activities of our Zonal Sports Office in Kaduna, the State hosted a meeting of the North-West Zonal Directors of Sports in Kano where very vital issues were discussed for the development of sports in the zone. N500,000.00 was spent for the meeting.

## 2. <u>2007 Development of Sporting Facilities</u>:

Within the year 2007, the State Government in its effort to provide adequate and standard facilities provided substantial amount of fund with which we were able to carry out the renovation of the

following facilities:-

- M- Basketball Sports Complex at Kofar Nassarawa consumed about N7 million:
- N- Maintenance of Sani Abacha Stadium for which the sum of N5 million was expended.

- Q- The general rehabilitation of Kano Race Course which started in December 2004 with an estimated cost of N85,702,079.86 is nearing completion. Already the project has consumed N72,806,793.97 representing 85% completion.
- R- In order to improve the Basketball facilities in the State to the required standard, Government has provided the sum of N2,651,325.75 for the wire fencing of Kofar Nassarawa Basketball Centre, provision of 2 pairs of upright as well as modern electronic score board at multi-purpose Indoor Sports Hall, Kofar Mata.
- S- N7,102,647.00 was provided for the official trip of Kano delegation to Africa Cup of Nations in Ghana, 31/12/2007.

T- N5,270,010.00 - Attendance of the All Africa Games at Algiers 4/7/2007.

Kano State has witnessed tremendous sports achievement both in sporting activities and facilities development. And this achievement has been made possible through many and financial supports of the Garage which is highly commended.

In the last 6 years. Kano State has witnessed the highest number of participation in National competitions and other relevant activities as compared with the past. This has been made possible through the financial support of the Government.

In its expected promote sports at the grassroots level, the sports council established two departments, viz:-

- a) Zonal Sports Which deals with organization of sports in Local Government Areas. All the 44 Local Government Areas are zoned with 10 centres and manned by the staff of the council;
- b) School Sports- Which is the bed-rock for talent hunt is also given attention in the council as there is coordination between the council and the Ministry of Education.

#### **DEVELOPMENT OF FACILITIES:**

To further improve on the performances and consolidate on the past gains, the State Government within the last 6 years has invested colossal sum of money in the development of sporting facilities. More than N43 million between 2003 and 2006 has been spent in this regard as follows-

Also Orlu United and Admiral United Football Clubs have gained promotion to National Amateur League Division one and two from Division two and three respectively.

Similarly, Government has set up a Continental Match Committee under the Chairmanship of a seasoned football administrator, Ibrahim Galadima to handle all matters pertaining to participation of the club at the continental outing, Government has already approved and released the sum of #100 million for the reinforcement of the club with best players for better result.

In addition, Ahmed Nasiru and Isma'il Muhammad of Army Day Secondary School have won the Most Valuable Player and Best 3 Pointer Shooter awards of the competition respectively.

## North-West Zonal Elimination of the 16<sup>th</sup> National Sports Festival

At the North-West zonal Elimination of teams games of the 16<sup>th</sup> National Sports Festival held at Gusau, Zamfara State in September, 2008, Kano State emerged the overall winners, having won seven trophies with 7 Gold and 2 Silver medals in 7 team games competed by Jigawa, Kebbi, Kaduna, Katsina, Sokoto, Zamfara and Kano States. Isa Adamu Muhd represented the country state teams. The Government also Extended financial assistance to some voluntary organizations for the promotion of sports as follows:

#### KANO PILLARS FOOTBALL CLUB

Kano Pillars Football Club was founded by Kano state Government in 1991. The club is among the twenty clubs in the elite premier division of the Nigerian Football League vying for the honour.

The first management under this administration was inaugurated on 12th June 2003 by His Excellency, the Executive Governor of Kano state, Mallam Ibrahim Shekarau. The appointment and inauguration of the management committee of Kano Pillars football club was the third major appointment made by His Excellency on assumption of office. This shows the level of interest and commitment of His Excellency towards the development of Sports and Football in particular in the State.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE**

The management of the club is made up of seven appointed members. It comprises the chairman, members, secretary, and five other members. In addition, there are other supporting staff which includes an Accountant, two drivers and a cleaner at the secretariat.

#### PLAYERS/TECHNICAL CREW

Presently, there are thirty nine (39) players in the team. In addition there is a

technical crew, made up of the Chief Coach, three (3) Assistant Coaches, Team Manager, Assistant Team Manager, Welfare Officer, a Nurse and Attendant.

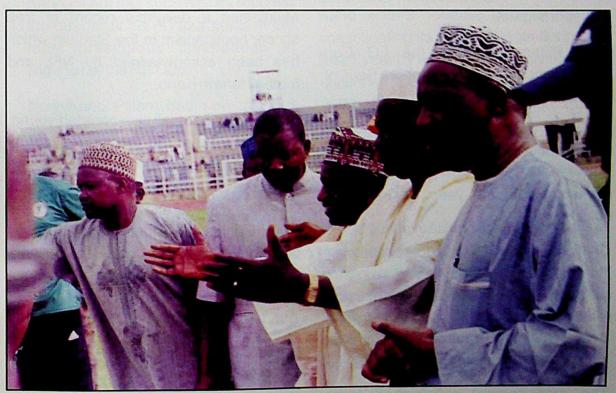

## KANO STATE CENSORSHIP BOARD PROGRESS REPORT

 The Structure of The Board: Kano Censorship Board was established in the year 2001 for the purpose of sanitizing the activities of film and publication industries. The higher decision making body of the Board is the Board of Directors

The Board has director General, as the head and assisted by three serving Directors who formed the policy implementation body (Management Committee). These three Directors are in charge of three operational departments namely:

- a. Administration and General Services
- b. Film Production and Development
- c. Publication Department
- 2. Staff Strength: The board as total staff strength of 46. To of which 27 staffs are employees of the Board where as the remaining staffs comprise of both staff on possing from various organizations and casual appointees.
- 3. Familiarization Visits/Courtesy Calls:
  These were conducted to various individuals and organizations with a view to establishing a cordial working relationship such as:
  - a. CTV & NTA Kano
  - b. Emir Palace
  - c. History & Culture Bureau
  - d. Moppan
  - e. AIG (Police) Zone 1
  - f. Commissioner of Police Kano State
  - g. Mass Communication Dept. BUK
  - h. Director SS Kano
  - i Copyright Commission
  - j. National Film Corporation Kano

Zonal Office.

- 4. The board was able to sensitize publishers/authors over its legal stake in literacy works at the last zonal exhibition of educational materials held at RUMFA COLLEGE organized by KERD Kano.
- 5. The Department of Publication has conducted market surveillance on Hausa Literature popularly known as "Adabin Kasuwa Kano" aimed at sanitizing all illicit publications especially Hausa Soyayya novels.
- 6. Executive reception (Dinner): In its worts to sanitize the activities of the akeholders of film industry coupled with the need to tap more ideas and advice with regards to Hausa film roductions, to be in conformity with Hausa rich culture and Islamic ideals, the Board, in collaboration with the deputy Governor's office organized a reception in honour of some notable/pioneers of Hausa film (stars and actresses) at the Government House, on the 20th December, 2008.
- 7. Website: In its bid to boost enlightenment packages as it relates to its activities and functions, the board has developed a website <a href="www.kanocensorsboards.com">www.kanocensorsboards.com</a> for easy accessibility by clients, stakeholders, researchers and the general public. The Board has also connected links with other sister organizations who have operational website.
- Porn/Video Game Items: The Board in collaboration with the Censorship Mobile courts has confiscated and

- burned hundreds of pornographic CDs/VCDs, DVD, VHS Cassettes, Posters and Video game machines during which His Royal Highness the Emir of Kano attended one of the events and served as the special Guest of Honour. The event was the 5<sup>th</sup> of its kind conducted by the Board.
- Model Films: In its effort to right track the film makers on the production of films/movies to conform with the Hausa rich culture and Islamic values. Seven (7) number of model films were produced by the Board.
- 10. Soft Loan Facility: The Board has secured from the Government the approval of the total sum of N10m which will serve as soft loans for the teaming stakeholders. Preparations are underway for the administration of said facility.
- 11. Registration and Revalidation: The Board in its various meetings with Stakeholders has urged their leadership to draw the attention of their respective members to register or revalidate their permits with the Board and other constituted authorities before operating. In this regard quite a number of the Board's client have responded to this advice with the exception of some few who have been referred to the Censorship Board's mobile court for possible prosecution.
- 12. Guidance and Crises Management:
  The well known sour relationship
  between the Stakeholders of film
  industry and management of this
  Board has now been tackled following
  series of dialogues the Board had with

- their representatives in the state aimed at improving the relationship between the two parties. All this has been achieved through strict adherence to rules and regulations governing the conduct of the Board.
- 13. Local Government Tour: In its effort to sanitize the activities of the Stakeholders the Management of the Board undertook an enlightenment campaign tour to the 44 Local Government Areas of the State. That was in collaboration with ministry of local government, Emirate Council and the local government councils.
- 14. Tour to Neighboring States: To Improve existing cordial relationship with its counterparts in the neighboring states and exchange ideas towards sanitizing the activities of film makers and publishers, the Management paid courtesy visits to neighboring sister agencies in Kaduna, Katsina and Bauchi States.
- 15. Zuma Film Festival: The Board, responded to the invitation of the organizations of Zuma Film Festival held at FCT during which the Board interacted and exchanged ideas with some prominent stakeholders of national and international status.
- 16. Shoot 2008: The Board, Sponsored 10 members of the film industry, for a 5 day workshop tagged shoot 2008 organized by the National Film Institute Jos, Plateau State.
- 17. Previewed Films: A total number of 368 Films were cleared and released for public consumption out of which 8 were banned while 267 were given

corrections.

- 18. Soccer Viewing Centres: Soccer viewing centres were rigorously made to register during period under review, especially those operating without permit for a quite long period.
- 19. Zonal Offices: In an effort to facilitate monitoring exercise the 44 Local Government areas of the state, the Board has divided the State into 3 zones to ensure effection are efficient performances, with hadquarters at Wudil, Gwarzo and Bich
- 20. Internal Workshop the Board organized 2 days Sanitization workshop for members of the preview committee to enable them cope with challenges associated with their assignment.
- 21. Menace of TV Game: Considering the danger being posed by the proliferation of TV Games in our society, the Board ordered its ban in Kano State. More than 1000 suspects were arrested and prosecuted by mobile courts after disregards to call and warning while about 1,500 sets and other equipments were confiscated by the court and kept under their custody as exhibits.
- 22. Pornographic Items: The issues of downloading pornographic pictures or clips into handset was seriously tackled by the Board. About 50 people were arrested together with their equipments and prosecuted accordingly by the mobile court.
- 23. Cleared Scripts: During the period under review, the Board cleared a total

- number of 48 film scripts vetted by accredited consultants and were all issued with clearance/shooting (permit) while more are receiving attention.
- 24. Stake Holders meetings: Series of meetings had been held with different stakeholders i.e. Film practitioners, Lyricists and marketers with a view to streamline their activities to conform with Government's policy on societal re-orientation in addition to ethics and professional requirements.
- 25. Previewed Books: The publication department censored 477 Books in the period under review, of which more than five were banned.

- 27. Film License: Printing of new designed and secure licenses for issuance on Film and other related activities of the Board was undertaken

  - b. New designed Certificates
  - New designed Guidelines, Handbills, (Film Book Preview and Soccer Viewing Centres Guidelines
  - d. Published a book (mission and Vission)
- 29. Immoral Billboards Directed the removal of eight billboard advertisements considered to have contravened (billboards) the moral and religious sensibilities of the people.
- 30. Cinema Liaison Officers: In its effort to closely monitor the operation of Cinema houses with the aim of improving and sanitizing their activities to conform with the laid down rules, regulations and guidelines, the Board appointed 16 Cinema liaison officers.
- 31. Tinapa 2008: The Board has also attended the 2<sup>nd</sup> National Film Forum tagged Tinapa 2008 at Calabar, Cross River State.
- 32. International conference: The Board attended on international conference on Hausa Literature held at Maradi in Niger republic.
- 33. Press Conference/Press Releases:
  Three major press conferences were held and many press releases were issued for the consumption of the

- general public and better understanding of the stakeholders on the Board's mandate.
- 34. Media programmes: Phones-in programmes within and outside Nigeria were severally conducted in order to sensitize and enlighten both immediate localities and the world at large. Similarly sponsored write ups in local and national newspapers were carried.
- 35. Announcements: Announcements and words of warning were issued on the unwholesome activities of both modern and traditional medicine sellers (hawkers) who exhibit pornographic pictures/vulgar materials, in the promotion of their business/products.
- 36. In House Seminar: In furtherance to film sensitization exercise throughout the state and beyond, the Kano State Censorship Board has organized and conducted a one day in-house technical seminar on avoidable mistakes often committed by the practitioners in the area of professionalism and content. This was conducted for the stakeholders of film industry who immensely benefited and urged the Board to maintain the initiative.
- 37. Retreat: Kano State Censorship Board in collaboration with guild of film consultants in the state organized and conducted a 4 day retreat meant for the development of the kannywood industry. The aim is to produce a

reference documents to regulate and provide a code of practice and standardization. It is to the credit of the Board that a new documented guide has been produced for the film industry.

Prominent films stars and the northern professionals acros states were actively volved in the development of the Brights. Ambassador Abular brahim Muhd Ganyawa, Abdul rin (MOPICON) Kassimu Yero Kasagi, Abubakar Sadig Ta wa among others were in attendance. The documents now serves as guide for Hausa filmmaking industry throughout the northern states.

38. Interstate Tour: In an effort to improve the existing cordial relationship and the need to jointly work together in sensitizing the activities of the stakeholders of film and literacy industries across the Northern States of Nigeria, the Board visited the 11 northern states i.e. north west and north east. During such visits the Board met with the Information Commissioners of the affected states, the stakeholders, the traditional rulers. and the leadership of the mass media with the aim of discussing and finding common ways of sanitizing, standardizing and controlling the conduct of film making, literary works, theatretical arts and cinema activities

#### MINISTRY OF JUSTICE

The ministry of Justice came into existence in 1967, when Kano State was created. It is charged with the responsibility of General administration of Justice. At its inception, the Ministry had only 4 law officers which grew to 126 by 1997. out of those, 45 were professional staff while 81 were non professional.

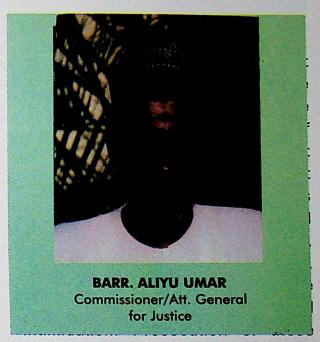
The Attorney-General is a guardian of public interest who performs wide range of constitutional and statutory functions. As the chief law officer of the State, the prosecution and prosecutors are his delecates.

The way stry at the moment has more than double an number of the staff it had in 1997. Here are presently 5 departments making up the Ministry each Headed by a Director. They include public prosecution civil litigation. Legal drafting and citizens rights and general services.

#### **Public Prosecution Department**

The public prosecution department is shouldered with the responsibility of prosecution of criminal offenders. The Director of public prosecution, his deputy and many other counsels have been offering legal advisory services to the police and general public guiding them on the legal implications of their actions in relation to criminal matters on which they conduct investigations.

Lawyers in this department concentrate on the prosecution of cases in the state high court, the court of appeal and the



offences by the department has been in all categories of court at the state and federal levels.

Available records have shown that between 1968 and 1980 the public prosecutions department received an average of 150 cases yearly out of which

a sizeable number were prosecuted, while the rest based on advice to the police and the circumstance of each case were terminated. Between 1980 and 1990 the average number of cases received each year rose to between 250 and 300. Similarly between 1990 to 1997, the cases dropped to an average of 200 annually, Between 1990 to April 2000 however, 1009 cases relating to legal advice and prosecution cases related to armed robbery, culpable, homicide, fraud traffic and other offences were treated, while 40 out 60 cases for appeal to the supreme court, court of appeal, state and upper area court were treated in the same period.

There is little doubt that the tasks performed by the department in discharging its constitutional responsibilities are on the increase. The department in whatever it does is guided by "public interest, the interest of justice and the need to prevent the abuse of legal process" Under the present administration, the ministry has received unprecedented support because of its belief that "law and order are paramount to the well-being of the society and prompt prosecution is the Hall mark of good legal system".

There is the presumption of innocence in all cases. Therefore, the prosecution has

a duty to prove a crime against an accused is not interfered with; the accused can be given bail. However, in instances whereas a person is accused of an offences punishable by death the accused person shall not be released on bail. Furthermore, where the punishment for the offences attracts a prison sentence exceeding 3 years, the cus d shall not be ordinarily released This has ba understandably bround out the existence of a big numb ofi amates in prisons said to be on aw ing lials. This has also brought a situation where there are at least twice more prisoners on awaiting trials than there are convicts. During the last couple of years, the efficiency and effectiveness of the department has been making efforts to reduce the backlog of awaiting trials.

Law and order require vertical and horizontal cooperation, within the tiers of Government and the branches or arms of Government. The department has been working hand in hand with the relevant federal organs such as the prison and the police. Only recently, the Government purchased a number of vehicles for prisons and police and other para-military organizations in addition to other logistic supports.

#### **Civil Litigation Department**

The department has the main function of providing legal advice on extensive range of matters to all ministries, departments

and public bodies. It represents them in court and tribunals in respect of all civil claims and gives legal advices. The Director of Civil Litigation heads the

department and has about 10 other counsels in the department.

The civil Litigation departments has received a total of 548 cases and disposed 195 cases between May 2003 to

April 2008. It has also made available a total of 143 legal advices during the same period. An outline of the cases handled in the department during the last six years are shown below:

The legal drafting department is in charge of producing all Government bills and subsidiary legislation including legal notice. It drafts and vets all contract and commercial transactions entered by Government or public bodies. The department also gives advice to

Government and public bodies. The department is headed by a director and assisted by a couple of counsels. Between May, 2003 to April 2009 the legal drafting department handled 111 bills/laws, gave 85 legal advices, issued 24 legal notices and drafted 463 contact agreements as broken down as follows:

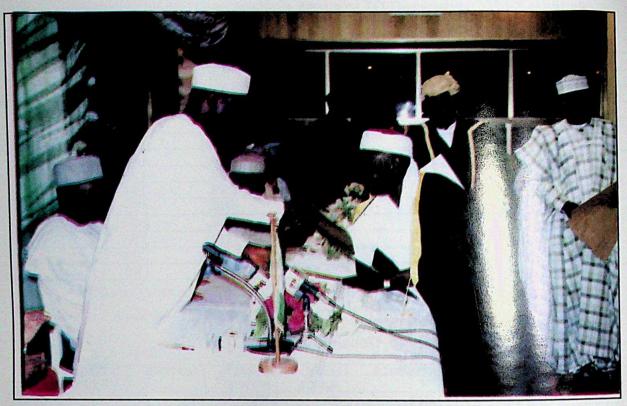

#### **Citizens right Department**

The department is charged with the responsibility of protecting human rights of the citizenry. It investigates all allegations of breaches brought against officials and public bodies. It provides legal counseling and mediation for members of the public and bodies.

Under the constitution, all persons accused of an offence punishable by death and all capital offences must be represented by counsels at their trials. Unfortunately in many cases the accused persons do not have the wherewithal to hire their counsels.

Consequently legal aid was resorted to the department of citizens right that ensures that all cases brought before it are tackled well in form of public defender. The department monitors the progress of the case up to conclusion. Counsel who are given these state briefs are required to sign and abide by certain minimum standards which include that they will no demand for fees or accepts fees from the accused or their relations. They will do their best endevour to dispose the case.

This department also follows up to logical conclusion criminal cases that are reported in the media and those crimes that to go its knowledge however arising. The summary of petitions received and disposed of by the department totaled 635 with 421 disposed between 29th May 2003 to April 2008, while the state briefts assigned totaled 97 out of which 6 have been disposed. They are broken down as follows:

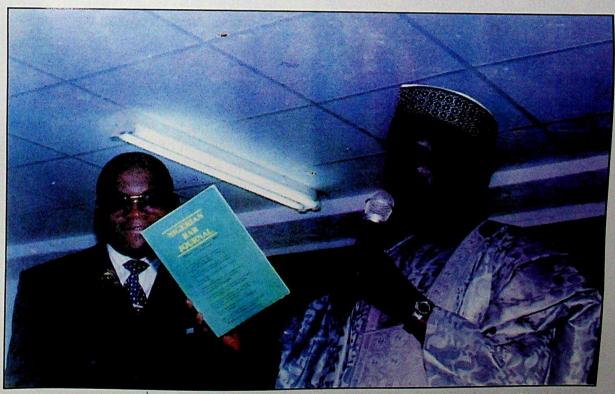

#### **Law Reform Commission**

The Law Reform Commission was established following the promulgation of the Kano State Law Review Commission Edict 1989 cited in Kano State of Nigeria Gazette No. 13, volume 24 of 13<sup>th</sup> December, 1990. The Edict was later amended to read Kano State Law Reform Edict 1991. This amendment is found in Gazette No. 8, Volume 26 of 17<sup>th</sup> December, 1992.

The Edict was further amended as the Kano State Law Reform Commission (Amendment) Law 2001 to enlarge the composition of the Commission.

#### **Function**

The edict provides for the establishment of the commission and charges it with the responsibility of reviewing all laws that affect Kano State with a view to their systematic and progressive development and reform in consonance with the prevailing norms of the people of the state.

The Edict also charges the commission to undertake the following:

- The Codification of the law of the state
- 2. The repeal of obsolete, spent and unnecessary enactment
- 3. the Elimination of anomalies
- 4. The reduction in number of separate enactment
- 5. the reform of procedural Laws so as to bring them in conformity with changes in the machinery of administration of justice and
- 6. the simplification and modernization of the law.

During the period under review, the commission participated actively in having SHARIA Legal System in place.

The commission was fully involved in drafting laws and other instrument that paved way for the implementation SHARIA. The laws instruments include:

- 1. The Sharia Penal Code
- 2. Amendment to the CPC
- 3. Sharia Court Civil Procedure roles

Other achievements recorded by the commission include:

1. February 2006 to December 2006. Sequel to the invitation of Memoranda to review Laws is sed of ministerial Departments, ten (0) oposals for the amendments of some laws and Regulations were received by the Commission.

The commission has amended the following:

- i. Fire Service (Chargeable Service (Amendment) regulations 2006
- ii. Fire Service (protection) (amendment) regulations 2006.
- iii. The commission has undertaken research work and adopted the participatory procedures in the execution of reform proposals by studying the laws and subsidiary legislation of Kano State including the Kano State set of laws 1991 volumes 1-3 and arrived at the following conclusion:
- a. Identified twenty (20) Statutes of General Application applicable to Kano State which need to be reviewed.
- b. The commission has gone through the Shariah Penal Code law and procedure 2006 and has identified a lot of anomalies, as a result of

which the commission arrived at the conclusion to review the laws.

In order to achieve this aim, the commission has resolved to organize a Conference involving all Stakeholders in area of administration of justice so as to come up with better amendment to the Laws.

- c. The commission has appointed subcommittee to consider the review on the Islamic perspective of the following Laws. They are:
  - i. Will laws
  - ii. Defamation law
  - iii. Progription law
- d. The constraints is sion was represented and particular to the following:
  - i. Hind have Committee of Jigawa State eview the final amendment of the sharia Penal Code and Sharia civil procedure rules
  - ii. Resources person in the training of the Sharia Court judge of Kano State organized by the Sharia Court of Appeal, Kano
  - iii. National Conference to Review the Draft Child right Bills for State at Hamdala Hotel Kaduna.
  - iv. National conference on the Reform of criminal justice administration at Abuja.

The commission has further amended the road traffic law cap. 128 laws of Kano State 1991, and the road traffic (Amendment) law 2005, and ready to be submitted to the Hon Attorney General/Commissioner for justice. The commission has also proposed the enactment of the law on control of "hawan Anganchi" and "Kilisa" horse riding in the State, as submitted by the Kano State Emirate Council, and is ready to be submitted to the Hon. Attorney General/Commissioner for Justice or execution.
- Relocation of the Commission to the high court of justice, Miller Road Complex

During the period under review, the State Government was able to supply the much needed funds to the Commission which has made it possible for the Commission to finally relocate to a newly acquired office complex within the high court of justice complex, miller road, Kano.

The acquisition of this new office has greatly enhanced the activities of the Commission to record some of its achievement within the period.

#### MINISTRY OF LAND AND PHYSICAL PLANNING

The ministry of land and physical planning was a directorate under the Governor's office before it was upgraded to a full-fledged ministry in 1999.

The Department, Directorate or Ministry as the case may be, has undergone various structural and Administrative changes from being Ministry at various time to becoming a department and reverting back to its Ministry status.

In Kano state, mounting demand for land for residential, commercial Industrial and Agricultural purposes has continued to make land Administration a very dedicate business. In all Modern societies, (Kano state inclusive) adequate planning for Administration of land matter is very essential. As an important resource, land needs good management for optimum utilization.

The Ministry of land performs its functions by strictly complying with the land use act which came into force following the promulgation in 1978 of land use decree. The land use decree was promulgated to check the soaring of urban land price, land starvation and degradation, land ownership, speculation, expropriation and compensation related problems with the ultimate arm of attaining a National Policy on land and management.

In line with its statutory function of managing land Administration, preparation of layouts, compensation and collection of land charge/fees as well as

revenue, treating applications for conversions of customary titles, assignments, mortgages and sub-lease among others, the Ministry has during the period under review from May 2003 to April 2009 achieved the following.

This department is responsible for processing applications for Land in respect of Residential, Commercial and Industrial purposes. It also process applications for Conversions of Customary titles to Statutory, Re-grants of expired titles and collection of all Ground-Rents due to Government. The Department is also charged with the responsibilities of Compensation, survey of Land and Economic Trees affected by acquisition or re-location for Government Projects and Layouts implementation as well as Preparations and Production of Physical and Topographical Maps for the State. The Department has successfully coordinated the acquisition and surveyed the following sites:

- g. Layouts have been designed at Bagadawa/Kwa and Dan-Gwauro/Gurjiya villages consisting residential, commercial, industrial plots and Ware Houses.

Similarly, the compensation section of the department which is charged with responsibilities of acquisition and compensation analysis has completed compensation survey in respect of those affected by Walalambe, Panisau layout extension, Gano industrial site (Mr. Lee Project), International Market

at Dan-Gwauro, Inland Container Depot at Zawachiki and Unguwa Uku extension as well as those affected by the construction of road from Malumfashi through Mahuta link Karaye Rogo road. Payment of monetary compensation to the farmers affected by Nigeria Air Force Base extension and those affected by the provision of access road for refuse collection by REMASAB officials at Koki and Daurawa quarters of Municipal Council were also made.

It is important to highlight here that, in order to tap the potentials of land resources in Kano and make land accessible to the vast majority for residential, commercial and industrial purposes, the Ministry has adopted workable procedures for land acquisition aimed at ensuring fairness to all. This entails compensating land owners with land instead of monetary compensation as prescribed by the land use decree. In this regard, the sharing formula between the Government and the affected land owners is presently in the rate of 50-50 ratio. This policy has made acquisition easier and at the same time empowered land owners who were hitherto left landless without adequate compensation. Similarly, monetary compensation rate has also been upward reviewed by the present administration which is the highest compared with other neighboring states. The current rates are N100, 000.00 per hectare in urban areas, N60, 000.00 for semi-urban areas while N40, 000.00 is for rural areas

- h. As for the verification section, over 3,000 conversion cases were received by the section with over 2,000 checked and passes
- the newly established Geographic Information System (GIS) which is the first of its kind in Northern Nigeria. The system will ensure up-dated maps a imed at having a well planned/layouts. It is also a source of revenue for Government as the centre is billed to render consultancy services to Government and private organizations.

#### 5. CADASTRAL DEPARTMENT

This Department was established with a view to facilitating the process of issuing certificates of occupancy to title holders. To undertake this, drawing/tracing of all survey plans and preparations of fees, plan and description for certificates of occupancy among other things.

Modest achievements as follows were recovered within the period, thus;

- a) About 15,000 cases were also treated by plan and description unit.
- b) Over 2,500 application files for various purposes were treated and sent to KNUPDA for re-validation and planning advice.

## 6. PHYSICAL PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Prior to May, 1999, the Department was known as the Department of Regional Planning, however, with ever increasing demand for housing and a motorable urban roads to meet the equally increasing vehicles traffic in the Metropolis, the Department was renamed Department of Physical Planning with additional responsibilities such as building both residential and commercial houses and construction/rehabilitations of urban roads in the Urban Renewal Programme. Apart from these functions; the Department is also charged with the planning advice, layout design and development control in areas designated as non-urban, i.e. 40 km radius of Kano Metropolis and 10 km radius of all the 44 Local Government Headquarters. The Department made the following achievements during the period under

review:-

- Co-ordinating the award of c o n t r a c t f o r t h e construction/rehabilitations of over 120 urban roads.
- ii. Co-ordinate the award of contract for the rehabilitations of 10No. Kano Township Roundabouts at the total cost of N249,882,163.48k
- iii. Awarded the construction of SN Lock-up shops at Ibrahim Cur Lousing Estate at the cost N 199,381.06k
- iv. The stry has also under this Department completed the construction of 55 blocks/commercial outfits at different locations such as Zoo Road, Airport Road/Kabarin Raccah, Kofar Kabuga and Malam

- Kato Square. At Ibrahim Kunya Housing Estate, 64 Housing Units were completed while 28 are at various stages of completion.
- Over two hundred applications for planning advices were received and treated accordingly.
- vi. The Department awarded consultancy on the proposed Kano accelerated Metropolitan Area Development Project at the cost of N289,862,000.00k The proposed project will cover the 28 KM Western Bye-Pass with the aim of creating viable layouts for residential and commercial plots for allocation to the general public.
- vii. Construction and commissioning of conference hall and office block.

## KANO STATE URBAN PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

#### INTRODUCTION

The Kano State Urban Planning and Development Authority (KNUPDA), former KASEPPA, is the sole Planning Authority of Kano State. It was established since 1962 and had gone through numerous changes and names at different times. The current responsibilities of KNUPDA are outlined in Edict No. 15 of 1990 which is currently under review and Circular No. SSG/AGS/S/R/46/T.III/28 of June, 2005

which conveyed the approval for the change of name.

The functions of the Authority include: Provision of Planning Schemes for Urban Centres, Development Control, Provision of Amenities, Conveniences and Infrastructure, Designing of Layouts for various purposes and other functions necessary for healthy growth of the State Urban Centres.

Structure of the Authority

At the apex of the Authority's Organizational hierarchy is the Board of Directors, which is appointed by the State Government. It's role is policy formulation direction and supervision of the authorities activities.

Under the Board is the Management Committee, which sees to the day-to-day running of the Authority and is composed of the Managing Director, the Secretary/Legal Adviser and all Directors/Head of Departments.

Presently, the Authority has a staff strength of Two Hundred and Sixty Seven (267) permanent staff divided into seven (7) departments, i.e:-

- \* Administration and General Services;
- \* Architecture;
- \* Development Control
- \* Engineering;
- \* Finance and Supply
- \* Technical Services; and
- \* Urban Planning

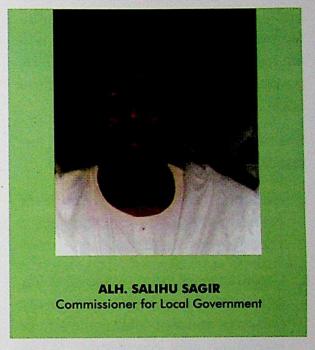

#### MINISTRY FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The Ministry for local Government has undergone so many transformations since the creation of the state in 1967.It started as a Division under the then secretary to the military Government's office (SMG) when the state was created, with the primary responsibility of coordinating the activities of Local nment administrative areas which manned by Divisional officers The local Government Division was su squently upgraded to the ministry for Government in 1976 following the lo Government Reforms. The civil service reform of 1988 saw the abolition of the ministry for local Government and its replacement with the Directorate of Local Government. All local Governments in the state were overseen by the Directorate of Local Government until the last quarter of 2001 when the ministry was created again. Until 2001, the Local Government Directorate and Local Government service commission were working separately.

The Local Government Directorate took charge of Local Government Inspection and matters related to that, while the Local Government service Commission handles staff welfare and establishment matters of the unified Local Government service.

With the re-creation of the Ministry for Local Government in 2001, the Local Government Directorate and Local Government service commission were merged to form the ministry.



The advent of the Shekarau administration in May 2003, saw the excision of the Community Development Department of the Ministry of water Resources to merge with the Ministry for Local Government which was subsequently renamed the Ministry for Local Government and Community Development.

In September, 2005 again, with the realignment of Ministries in the state, anew Ministry of Rural and Community Development was created, thereby removing the community Development department of the Ministry for Local Government to form part of the new Ministry of Rural and Community development.

Presently, the ministry is simply referred to as the Ministry for Local Government.

### **FUNCTIONS OF THE MINISTRY**

The broad functions of the Ministry for Local Government are Inspection/ Monitoring, Coordination, of Staff as well as liaising with the state and federal government's agencies on behalf of the Local Government Councils.

Specifically, the Ministry has the responsibility of;

- i. Handling all personnel matters including staff welfare for the unified Local Government Service.
- ii. Coordination of the activities of all the 44 Local Government councils by ensuring prudent management of resources and compliance to all operational guidelines.
- iii. Handling all manpower Development isues through the usage of 1% training fund
- iv. Supervision of the activities of Kano State Local Government Staff Pension Board
- v. Management of the Local Government staff Housing loan board.

#### **STRUCTURE OF THE MINISTRY**

The Ministry for Local Government has 5 departments viz:

- (a) Administration and General Services
- (b) Local Government Inspection
- (c) Agricultural Services
- (d) Promotion and Discipline.
- (e) Recruitment and Training

# ADMINISTRATION AND GENERAL SERVICE

The department as the name indicates is responsible for the general administration of the Ministry as well as the management of its finances with the exception of Local government finances. During the period under focus, there was a improvement in ma rials and the provision of working general welfare of the order to f. of office address the acute st Id ssitated accommodation which 70 du Bako some officers to operate m. secretariat, the ministry after obtaining the necessary approval converted 2 former stores to 2 blocks of 27 offices and renovated them at the cost of N4, 455,913.13 while furnishings consumed N5, 348,052.00 between 2005 to 2006.

During this period also the Ministry commissioned the Iman Wali Local Government staff Development centre with all the necessary facilities provided. This is aimed to not only to facilitate extending training packages to a large number of Local Government staff, but will also minimize huge amount spent by Local Government councils on training of their staff through ill-equipped private outfits. The Zonal Local Government Inspection offices were also furnished with N2million between 2005 to 2006.

# LOCAL GOVERNMENT INSPECTION DEPARTMENT

The Local Government Inspection Department is central to the operations of state Local Government Councils. It regulates, Coordinates, inspects and monitors the Local Government Councils system in such a way that efficiency and effectiveness in service delivery and responsibility to the yearnings and aspirations of the people are achieved. It also ensures that policy directives given to the Local Government Councils by the Sate and/or Federal government are properly and promptly complied with.

During the period under review, the department had achieved the following:

- Processed and approved various description of projects at a to all vetted cost of N12, 73 550,721.36 as per the details below:
- The Department in collaboration with the state ministry of Health facilitated in each of 44 Local Government Councils a number of programme which included among others, Sub-National Immunization days, National measles control to mention but a few at an estimated cost of N11,283,130,543.00.
- iii. Facilitation of purchase and distributions of 7,480 Units of Motorcycles worth N804,540,000.00 by the 44 Local Government Councils towards reduction of poverty and empowerment of our teeming youths in both urban and rural areas, which is inline with the state Government policy of poverty reduction and employment generation.
- iv. Facilitation of drilling of 1No.solar powered boreholes, in each of 38 Rural Local Government Councils at the total cost of N290million. The projects are being executed by RUWASA and are aimed at providing potable water to the rural populace. As

- at now 15No. of the boreholes were completed and handed over to the Local Government concerned and 23No. are at various levels of execution.
- v. Coordination of purchase of 3No.Agric Loaders and their Trailers at the total cost of N18,912,000.00 in each of the six Metropolitan Local Governments to enhance refuse disposal and revenue generation of Local Government Councils.
- Vi. Coordination of procurement of 91 unit Solar Vaccine Refrigerators for the storage of Vaccine and other Medical products in the 44 Local Governments Councils Cold Stores at the total cost of N101.9 million to ensure the effectiveness of the expanded programme on Immunization and Health Care delivery.
- vii. Facilitation of investment by Local Government Councils through purchase of shares as follow:
- Dala Building Society: N2m worth of share by each of the 44 Local Government Councils.
- b. Tropical Commercial Bank: Share worth N200m.
- c. Ja'iz Islamic bank: N500, 000 worth of shares by each of the44 Local Government Councils.
- viii. Connected to vii above, the Department, on 21st July, 2006 spear-headed the formation of a committee to find out the actual position of shareholdings by the Local Government Councils with a view to

updating hitherto, scanty records in this regard, at the Local Government Councils. The committee has concluded its assignment with remarkable success. It has found out

that as at 3rd October, 2006 Local Government Councils in the sate have purchased shares in 16 Companies valued at N1, 086, 508, 616. 62 as per the details below:

- xv. In line with the cardinal principles of the present administration regarding probity, transparency, prudence and openness, the Ministry ensured the attainment of;
- a. Prompt and correct remittance of all funds accrued to Local Government Councils (Statutory Allocation. VAT. Excess Crude and 100% of locally generated revenue was ensured). This effort was commended even by Revenue Mobilization Allocation and Fiscal Commission (RMFC) and National Headquarters of the Nigeria Union of Local Government Employees (NULGE).
- b. For the first time the department

convened a Stakeholders meeting on project execution which includes contractors and top officials of Local government and discussed issues such as proper planning, prompt execution, minimization of cases of abandoned projects and other related issues.

- xvi. Facilitation of payment of counterpart funding for Rural Housing scheme which will pave way for building of 12 houses in each Local Government area. The project is a joint venture among Local Governments, the State Government Fund (A Donor Agency of the United States of America). The Donor provides 50% of the total while the rest is taken care of by the state Government and Local Government on the ratio of 40% and 60% respectively.
- xvii. Facilitation of compliance with Due Process in Local Government Service as per the directive from the office of the secretary to the state Government V i d e c i r c u l a r N o . SSG/AGS/S/R/46/X/1337 17th August, 2007.
- xviii. Facilitation of Government's approval to the 44 Local Government councils to implement the new approved scheme of service for traditional rulers which now ensures progression of the traditional rulers in service thereby solving the problem of their stagnation on salary grades for a

- number of unnecessary promotions. In the same vein, village and wards heads that were hitherto being paid monthly stipends only, have now been placed on salary grade levels.
- xiv. The Ministry within the period under review, facilitated the purchase and the distribution of befitting official Vehicles (4 wheel jeep) for the usage of the District Head by the Local Government Council at a total cost of #508,601,000.00
- xv. Facilitation of a meeting between the Ministry and the Local Government Chairmen subsequent to which the Council Chairmen, having realized the goodies of the Kano State Economic Rod Map programme, resolved to partake in the scheme billed from 2008 to 2011 and have for contributed #6, 000,215,634.82 as their Local Government Councils' cumulative counter part funding in respect of the year 2008

# RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING DEPARTMENT

This department is responsible for recruitment, training and retirement of all senior staff of the unified Local Government Service.

The following were the major activities/achievements of the recruitment and training department during the period under review:

1. During the period of May 2003 to May 2008, the ministry through this

department was able to give approval for the recruitment of 9120 personnel broken down as follows:

- i. Primary School Teachers 1,300
- ii. Primary Health care Staff 1,380
- iii. Sanitary Workes 5,280
- iv. District Heads poing staff 180
- v. Mainstream Louis Godts Service staff
- 2. The Department organized important retreat to senior and high ranking Local Government functionaries' i.e.
- Commencement retreat June 2005
- ii. Contract administration retreat in September 2005
- iii. Follow-up retreat in December 2005
- iii. Retreat for Local Government Legislative members May 2006, and April 2008.
- v. The Department also organized seminars to the elected Chairman and Supervisory Councilors- March 2008.
- 3. In Service training being an integral part of staff development received a tremendous support as staff from all the 44 Local Government Council were sponsored for many courses across the nation's tertiary institutions by the ministry. In this respect, a systematic and cohesive training programme for the Local Governments staff was embarked upon for lower cadres. Thus over 187 cadres have been identified and are now integrated in to the training

- programme. Prior to the assumption of power by the present administration, there was lack of recognition of law cadres with regards to conduct of seminars.
- This department formalized the appointment 3, 207 unified Local Government staff during the period under review.
- 5. Facilitation of skill acquisition for 4, 359 unemployed youths in various acational training courses at Sani Acata Youth Centre sponsored by the scal Government Council the intervention of this
- Coordination for the resettlement of 3857 youths who graduated in various vocational trades through purchase of working material worth N385 million, during the period under review.
- 7. Naming and commissioning of Imam Wali Local Government Staff development centre is another major achievement by the department during the period under review. As at now, arrangement has already reached an advanced stage to affiliate the fully equipped computer training unit of the centre with one of the tertiary institutions in the state, to provide functional and certificate in computer course to the unified local Government Staff so as to ensure computer literacy in the Local Government Councils in the State.

A part from the computer unit, the centre consists of ultra modern 300 seat capacity conference hall, 32 rooms well furnished hostel accommodation, committee rooms, kitchen and a mosque.

8. Also the department during the period under review processed retirement and death benefits of workers from the primary schools board, Emirate and Local Government councils in conformity with the present administration's policy on fairness, justice and compassion to the retirees and deceased families.

# DEPARTMENT PROMOTION AND DISCIPLINE

- i. The Department is headed by Director with 6No. schedule officers. The department treats all cases of promotion, appeals, disciplinary cases, conversion, change of name and posting. It is also provides ratifications of anomalies made on progressions and nomenclature and other problems.
- ii. A new procedure was introduced by the Director in order to ensure proper interview exercise. Eligibility is used for every promotion interview. For scrutiny also, a Data form which is printed out with details of every staff due for the Exercise was introduced.
- iii. The department has ensured that particular/details of all staff in the 44 Local Government Councils are stored in Computer. This exercise is helping the Ministry in checking the

obnoxious problems of overstay and service by Local Government Staff as it used to be previously.

The department during the period under review has successfully executed the following exercises:

- a. Promotion cases 20,546b. Disciplinary Cases 87
- c. Conversions 1,225
- d. Change of Name 20
- e. Appeals 174
- f. Advancement 2,952

The Department in its efforts to reinvigorate the Unified Local Government Service to its previous glory and greater productivity, has endeavored to ensure prompt vacancies identification of senior staff ranging form the DPM, CPO, SO, Internal Auditor, heads of Department and other sectional Heads existing in the 44 Local Governments in the State. In the light of the above, posting of these vacancies and other adjustment were effected on the 23rd June, 2008 i.e. 18th Jumada Thani, 1429 AH. Similarly posting of normal staff of the 44 Local Government Councils have continued through out the six existing departments in the Local Government Councils namely.

- i. Personnel
- ii. Community
- iii. Treasury
- iv. Agric
- v. Works
- vi. Health

So far the general posting has successfully been effected in 5 department i-v with the movement of

2,513 No of staff.

# AGRICULTURAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Department has been established to provide consultative and coordinative service that could assist the councils to develop their own Agriculture potentials for the ultimate benefit of their respective farmers in particular and the state in general. During the period under review the following achievements were recorded.

#### 1. 2003 Wet Season

N143, 250,000. 00 was spent for the procurement of 3,700 metric tons of NPK fertilizer for 44 Local Governments in the state

#### 2. 2004 Wet Season

N313, 360, 000. 00 was spent for the purchase of 6, 600 metric tones of assorted brands of fertilizer (NPK and Urea for 44 Local Government Councils.

#### 3. 2005 Wet Season

State Government allocated a total of 15,636 metric tones of assorted fertilizer to the 44 Local Government Councils in the state for the sale of farmers at a subsidized rate of N1,000 per bag where a total sum of N30.7 million was spent for the transportation of the commodity from the state capital to 44 Local Government headquarters.

#### 4. 2006 Wet Season

21, 300.3 metric tonnes of assorted femalizer were procured for Local government Coucils at the total cost of N1 264, 237, 000.00.

#### 5. 2007 Wat Season

17, 875 metric tons of assorted fertilizer was purchased for 44 Local Government Council at the total of N1, 222, 844, 00.00

#### **FORESTRY**

The unit was fully established from the end of year 2004 during which a uniform approval was granted to all the L.G.As which costed the Government N 36, 638, 800.00. In same year a committee was set up to assess Local Government performance, where 3 trophies were distributed to D/Tofa being the best, Bagwai and Ajingi emerged 2nd and 3rd in the year 2005. A total of 88 Hectares of land were covered the same as 2004 with total cost of N49, 022, 000.00. In the year 2006/2007 another method of awareness was introduced which include not only planting of trees but establishment of small tree nurseries, campaigns, to stop

bush and forest fire, training of forestry personnel; in collaboration with APCU. The Department in collaboration with African environment is working out a plan to assist Local Governments in the preservation of environment.

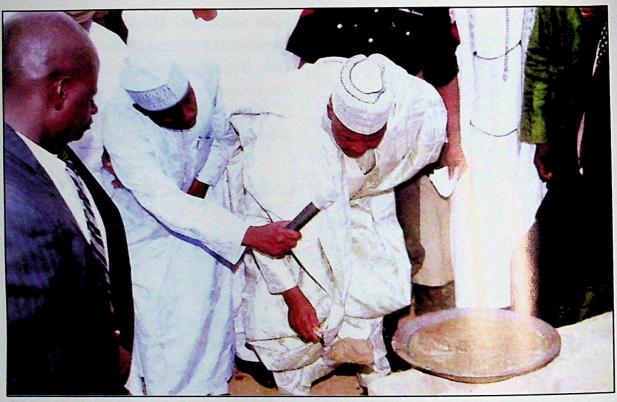
#### LIVESTOCK SERVICE UNIT

The livestock section is one out of four units of the department that is charged with the responsibilities of coordinating with state, Federal and Non Governmental organization in all the Livestock related fields. From 2003, the section has been able to achieve the following results.

 Small ruminant's production loan scheme for women folk:-

The programme is designed to empower women and it is aimed at boosting food production to achieve certain level of self sustenance in which a total sum of one hundred and thirty two million Naira (N132, 000, 000. 00) was approved to purchase a total of 32,000 goats to be distributed to the total of 8, 800 deserving women with each Local Government having a share of 200 beneficiaries.

The above programme recorded about 80% success. About 36 Local Governments implemented the project with about 28, 800 goats disbursed to a total of 7, 200.00 women at a total value of N108, 000,000 .00 ie one hundred and eight million Naira only. Fifteen thousand naira worth of small ruminants (goats) (N15, 000) were disbursed to every

beneficiary, payable over a period of 4 years on a condition of a down payment of 5% of the package of Loan.

- 2. National Loan Scheme on Animal Traction and Hand tools. This a project initiated by the federal government in which Loan package of N100, 000.00 is to be disbursed to each of six selected farmers from each of the 44 Local Governments in the state. The first set of selected farmers has already benefited from the loan. It is a joint efforts among Federal, State and local Governments in which a Contributory funds with a ratio of 50:30:20 were made.
- The Unit however, is actively partaking in all aspect of workshops framings

- being provided by I.I.T.A/Gals by Crop-Livestock programmes.
- 4. There is also a Collaborative work with Ministry of Agri & Natural Resources, Ministry of information, National Orientation Agency (N.O.A) ministry of Women Affairs, Ministry of education and Cabinet office with assistance from Unicef in Conducting Mass awareness Campaign following the out break of Avian Influenza I.Zavizal disease of HSNI origin in2005 and 2006.

#### **Recent Achievements:**

The Agricultural Services Department within the last one year recorded the following achievements:

### Agricultural Extension Unit

- 1. 2008 Fertilizer Procurement
  The Ministry on behalf of the 44 Local
  Government Councils of the State
  procured 10,619 metric tones of
  Fertilizer during the 2008 west season
  farming at the total sum of
  #1,226,334,600.00
- 2. Purchase of Grains for Buffer Reserve Programme
- In compliance with the state Executive Council approval, the Ministry has directed all the 44 Local Governments to regintain a grain buffer reserve of at leas 1000 metric tones using Maize, Mille and Sorghum.
- 3. No seed and III Development Project 20Nos. Local Governments are participating in the Third National Fadama development project which is co-funded by Federal, State and participating Local Governments, where each of the participating Local Government contributed 2 million naira annually.
- 4. National Programme on Food Security Nine Local Government are participating in the programme which is also financed jointly by Federal, State and participating Local Governments. Each of the nine participating Local Government Areas contributes N3.6 annually.
- 5. Economic Empowerment
  During the period under review, Local
  Government Councils were directed to
  assist graduates from Universities and

other tertiary Institutions with improved seeds, sprayers, agro chemicals and #10,000.00 for them to embark in agricultural production and become self-employed Farmers Cooperative groups were assisted with same above at subsidized prices.

6. Doubling Maize Production
Programme
Thirty Eight (38) Local Governments
participated in the programme. Maize
farmer groups were formed and

participated in the programme. Maize farmer groups were formed and registered through Agric department of the Local Government while the Ministry of Agric provided them with improved seeds of Maize, Fertilizer and Agro chemical. In addition to this, sixty (60) metric tones of fertilizer have been allocated to Maize farmers groups by each participating Local Government Council.

- 7. National Agricultural Show
- Ten local Government Councils participated in year the 2008 National Agricultural Show which took place at Tudun Wada village, Karu Local Government Areas in Nassarawa State, during which Dawakin Kudu Local Government emerged the 1st position out of all the participated Local Governments that participated through out the Country.
- 8. 1st Global Agric Exhibition (Kano 2009)
  Almost all the 44 Local Governments have participated in the 1st Global Agric Exhibition organized by KACCIMA

and hosted by the Kano State Government where Dawakin Kudu again emerged 1<sup>st</sup> among the participating LGAs.

VETERINARY/LIVESTOCK SECTION

To enhance production of animal protein and prevent animals diseases outbreaks within animals and between animals and human beings, the Ministry coordinates animal vaccination programmes in collaboration with the State Ministry of Agriculture. Types of vaccination exercises carried out were CBPP (Ciwon huhu) vaccination in cattle, PPR (ciwon gishu) vaccination in sheep and Goats and Antirabies vaccination in Dogs.

In consideration he Strategic of importance of Local Goldmanners being the third tier of Government closest to the generality of the to nine populace and conscious of the roll given to the local government councils by the constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria (1999) to participate in the economic planning and development the state, the Government has approved the creation of the new department of planning research and statistics responsible for coordinating all matters on economic planning headed by a Director for all the 44 Local Government councils in the state.

Accordingly, the function/schedule of duties of the department include the following:

Responsible for formulating plans and policies and devising methods for periodic reviews and examination of all such plans & policies at the sectoral and sub sectoral level. These include among others the preparation of medium term development plans and other policy documents such as the local government economic empowerment and development strategy and any derivative of it (such as pilot and issue based project).

- C o o r d i n a t e s t h e preparation/implementation of annual budget of the 44 local government councils in the state.
- 3. Responsible for project/programme, development, monitoring and evaluation in the overall socio economic planning and development.
- 4. The monitoring evaluation and eporting project and programme applemation in the 44 local every every event.
- 5. department responsible for entangled due process in the 44 Local amment affairs especially as treated to contract procedure for project and procurement.
- 6. Liase with other state and national agencies responsible for economic planning matters through the ministry for local Government (this include among others the Ministry of planning and Budget, national planning commission, national bureau for statistics (including its state office) etc.
- Constant collection and processing of data and statistics related to the socioeconomic planning in the Local Government.
- 8. Management of the Local Government information resources (such as data bank, computer services and libraries).
- Attend Local Government Council/executives and finance or general purpose committee meetings.

The department is one of the most important in the ministry with regards to monitoring, coordinating & evaluating capital projects execution in the 44 Local Government councils in the state.

Although it is a newly created department it was able to effectively discharge its responsibilities by facilitating laudable projects within the period under review. The department facilitated a seminar on due process to the

- i. 44 Local Government Hod works
- ii. 44 Local Government deputys Hod works
- iii. 44 Local Government sectional head

In addition it also coordinated another seminar very imperative to the local Government treasurers on the financial fiscal operation with the collaboration of central bank of Nigeria.

The department also took part in a vigorous exercise to ascertain the quality of projects and their level of completion in the 44 Local Government councils. It also initiated the validation of Local Government staff records to ensure the accurate figure of staff salary control measures.

Accordingly the ministry issued due process compliance review certificates in respect of 368 various capital projects to the 44 Local Government council at a total cost of 14,737,518,617.15.

In the same vein, the Local Government have so far made payment in respect of the project to sum of 6,827,767,715.13 and the projects were at various level of completion. The balance due to 44 Local Government council when the project are completed is 7,909,750,956.02 And this was taken care in the 2009 Local Government fiscal estimate.

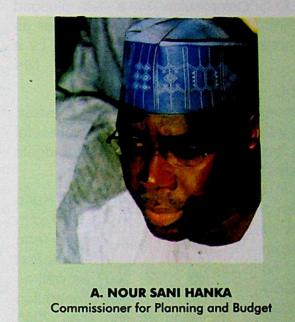

The ministry is equally involved in the implementation of Roadmap for Economic Development of the State.

### **Progress**

- Integrated Agriculture which kicked up with the Rice production initiative has reached a significant

- milestone with the effective participation and leadership of the Ministry in the Rice Committee. Pilot Programmes have taken off and draft policy is ready.
- Another Committee on Urban Renewal and CBD programme being chaired by the Ministry and has successfully appraised and coordinated the implementation of urban renewal inititatives in the area of roads development, refuse disposal, CBD planning etc. apart from these State Government's commitments, negotiation with potential investors in the CBD will soon pick up with the completion of the master plan/model.

## PROJECTS MONITORING AND EVALUATION DIRECTORATE, KANO STATE

# (A) PURPOSE(S) AND OBJECTIVES OF SETTING UP THE DIRECTORATE

The Projects Monitoring Bureau (upgraded to a directorate in 2007 headed by Alhaji Ibrahim Garba as its pioneer Hon. Commissioner) was set up in 2004 as a parastatal headed by a permanent secretary under the supervision of the Kano Ministry of Planning and Budget. The Governor Malam Ibrahim Shekarau approved the setting up of the Bureau as part of his administration's commitment to the entrenchment of honesty, probity, openness, transparency and accountability in contract awards, projects execution and public service part of the basic principles of the Shari'a legal system.

### **FUNCTIONS OF THE DIRECTORATE**

The functions of the Directorate are as follows:

- Monitoring the various stages of implementation of all projects, Programmes and services with a view to ensuring compliance with laid down procedures of executing Government projects.
- ii. Evaluating all proposals on projects, Programmes and service with a view to advising Government accordingly on their feasibility and relevance to the community concerned and the State in general;



- lii. Preparing periodic situation on projects, programmes and service for the State Government:
- iv. Advising the Chief Executive of Ministries and Parastatals, in advance on any observed lapses which may constitute impediments to effective attainment of set out goals, and recommending appropriate remedies;
- v. Monitoring the implementations of Programmes and services by Local Government Councils with a view to harmonizing the efforts of the two tiers of government, eliminating duplications, and engendering speedy realization of the overall goals of development;
- vi. Monitoring the stage of projects implementation by the Federal

- Government Agencies in the State with a view to providing the Government with an update report on the suitability, execution, quality and other issues considered relevant to the corporate interest of the State.
- vii. Monitoring the status/conditions of existing Federal Projects, services and infrastructure in the state with a view to advising the State Government on observed lapses that may require measures to ensure timal benefit to the citizens of the

store.

- with Research and Commentation Unit (Government Commentation of research mindings to guide policy advocacy or programme formulation;
- ix. Carrying out any duties that the State Government may assign.

### STRUCTURE OF THE DIRECTORATE

The Directorate has two departments, viz: Administration and General Services and Monitoring and Evaluation. Each department with the exception of the PRS, is headed by a director.

# ADMINISTRATION AND GENERAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Administration and General Services Department also consists of three other sections namely: Personnel, Accounts and Stores sections.

The Department is responsible for the coordination of the activities of the Directorate and discharges the following:

- i. Coordination and supervision of administration and attending to all financial matters;
- ii. Performing the role of adviser to the Hon. Commissioner on all areas related to policy matters and general administration;
- iii. Processing, analyzing and putting up submissions and memorandum on matters requiring the attention of the Hon. Commissioner of the Directorate;
- iv. Preparation/supervision of Annual Budget of the Directorate;
- Providing guidance on staff matters especially in the areas of welfare and disciple;
- vi. Supervision of stores for effective utilization of resources;
- vii. Treating any other official assignments from the Hon. Commissioner.

# MONITORING AND EVALUATION DEPARTMENT

This is the technical department of the Directorate. Its schedule includes all monitoring and evaluation duties relating to the implementation of approved projects, programmes and services of Government in Kano State. It prompts the policy arm on any observed lapses with a view to quickly rectifying them.

The Department has four (4) units as follows:

- (a) Essential Services Unit:- The unit monitors activities of organizations executing projects covering infrastructures like roads, buildings, water supply, etc. The unit also serves as the secretariat of the Due Process Unit of the Directorate.
- (b) Economic Services Unit:- The unit monitors activities of organizations responsible for the implementation of economic services covering finance, agriculture, revenue generation, commerce, industry, tourism, etc.
- (c) Human Service Unit:- This unit monitors activities of organizations covering Education, Information, Health, Social Services, Social Reorientation, Shari'ah, Zakkat and

Hubsi and the general administration.

(d) Allied Services Unit:- The unit monitors activities in the 44 local government councils of the state and federal projects to facilitate synergy/harmony in the development efforts by the three tiers of government. This is with a view to minimizing duplication/cost and to ensure effective coordination of development efforts. The unit similarly coordinates/monitors activities of donor agencies and/or development partners in the state.

#### **TECHNICAL ADVISORY UNIT**

The Directorate has a Technical Advisory Unit which is professionally manned by

engineers and other professionals who are mostly retired and tested civil servants. They offer professional and expert advice to the Directorate with regards to contract award, projects execution and implementation and procurement.

There are now seven (7) Technical Advisers with specialization on agriculture, mechanical engineering, water resources, electrical/electronics, road and building construction, health care delivery, auditing, etc. They are paid months allowances for their invaluable services.

The decided Advisers undertake among other praisal of projects designs where required, evaluation of prepared designs, vetting of Bills of Quantity, costing and inspection of project sites as well as inspection of supplies/deliveries on specialized machinery and equipment.

They also undertake appraisal of proposals on new projects, programmes and services by Ministries, Agencies and Departments particularly those with technical content. It is also within their mandate to monitor the progress of projects, programmes and services to ensure that they conform to the approved standard/quality as specified in the contract agreements, project designs and Bill of Quantity.

They also vet certificates of payments submitted by the implementing agencies based on the technical data and s u b s e q u e n t p h y s i c a l

inspection/assessment of the project. The certificate by the Advisers is a necessary prerequisite to the payment of such certificate by the Ministry of Finance.

# ACHIEVEMENTS RECORDED SINCE INCEPTION

From inception in 2004, the Directorate has recorded modest accomplishments which among others, include

- Production of a total of eighteen (18)
   Monitoring Reports covering quarterly,
   bi-annual, annual and summaries for
   the attention of Government. The
   Directorate has similarly maintained
   contacts with ministries and agencies
   at regular intervals for updates and
   appraisal of projects and services.
- ii. Conducted sensitization/briefing sessions with various segments of the civil service, including the Executive Council to discuss Public Sector reform on project implementation.
- iii. Appraisal of various project being undertaken by organizations by the Technical Advisory Unit of the Directorate. Many Government Organisations are realigning their operations to comply with the administration's initiative on best practices on project and service implementation. This was largely due to the Government's directive not to release more funds on any project without the Directorate's verification of certificate.

- iv. Provision of regular update to Ministries of Planning and finance on revenue performance, projects implementation and overall budget performance.
- v. Liaison/collaborative efforts with the Directorate of Research and Documentation to provide data/statistics on/Government activities for record dissemination to the public in support of democracy, transparency and openness.
- vi. Collaborative efforts with the State Directorate of Public Complaints and Anti-Corruption to ascertain/investigate cases of alleged fraud or irregularities arising from complaints by members of the public in keeping with the administration's goal of transparency.
- vii. Coordinated, in collaboration with the Ministry of Planning, the national benchmarking exercise on the State Economic Empowerment and Development Strategy (SEEDS).
- viii. Collaborative efforts/partnership with the State Ministry of Planning and Budget and development partners such as USAID and DFID on the ongoing Public Sector Reform and Chart of Accounts.
- ix. Budget implementation meetings, at regular intervals, with key project implementing ministries/agencies presided over by His Excellency, the Governor to appraise budget and

- projects implementation. The initiative/forum had immensely contributed to resolving problems often constraining the implementation of budget and projects.

The sum of N36,145,043,102.02 (including supplementary estimate) was budgeted for a variety of capital and recurrent undertakings by government in the 2004 fiscal year. Out of this amount, the sum N17,990,410,303 was budgeted for current services while N9,868,888.41 was budgeted for capital development activities. One hundred and eighty three (183) projects/programmes were completed/budgeted within the financial year including spill over from 2003. As at December, 2004 over 120 projects were completed and about .59 were ongoing. The category that are still on going include some projects which were haphazardly bundled and

contracted out by the immediate past administration most of which ran into several implementation problems, thus causing delays in their completion. Similarly, those that are on going and others that are at take-off stage consist mainly of projects that were approved for implementation at the tail end of the financial year. A detailed summary of each of the individual projects compiled by Bureau is contained in the year 2004 projects summary.

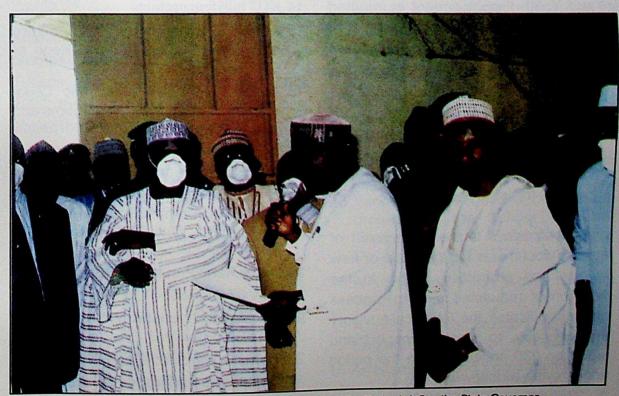

Five Hundred and Sixty-two (562) projects/programmes and services were at various levels of implementation within the financial year. A detailed summary of each of the individual projects is contained in the year 2006 projects summary.

### d. Technical Advisory Unit:

The Technical Advisory Unit of the Directorate started operation in later part of the year 2004. During the period under review, this unit was involved in the conception of some vital projects such as the new 150 MLD Tamburawa Water Works, Gani Dam, and Youth Empowerment in irrigated agriculture sub-sector and designs of various urban road projects and erosion control projects. Similarly, the unit was involved in the development of Urban Mass Transit Programme. In the implementation aspect of Government projects, the unit certifies interim payments on some on-going projects (roads in particular).

In spite of delays in the submission of required documents for appraisal of new projects and protracted delays in the provision of requested data to process interim certificates, the Technical Advisory Unit was able to process, inspect and report on 230 projects within the period under review as follows:-

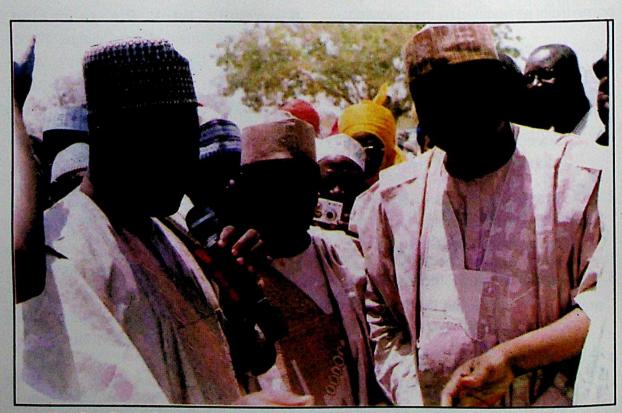

#### MINISTRY OF RURAL AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

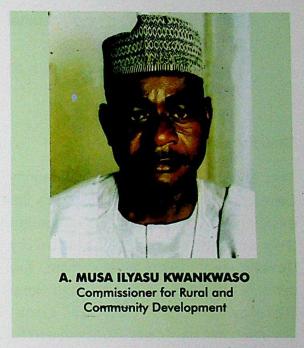
The Ministry of Rural and Community Development was created in September 19th, 2005 by the present Administration in line with its ten cardinal principles which include accelerated rural development and the provision of necessary infrastructure aimed at improving the standard of lines of the rural populace.

Bringing range evelopment to the rural dweller so the cardinal intentions of this Government and to make this a reality; ever ent is adopting a multi-dimension approach to rural development through the adoption of various programmes.

The proposed development would be an integrated approach within the regional planning concept. It is envisaged that the development vision of the ministry would focus attention on the most crucial areas of human needs such as water supply, roads, electricity agriculture, Agroforestry, health, tourism, natural resources and education.

For the people of the rural areas to feel the impact of the new ministry within the shortest possible time, the following programmes are the top priorities to be tackled:-

- i. Provision of more roads
- ii. Rural electrification to more towns and villages
- iii. Supply of water to more towns and villages



iv. Creation of growth centres or development areas and the production of structure plans to guide their physical development to the desired goals.

Aims and Goals of the Ministry

The Ministry of rural and Community Development was established to discharge the following responsibilities:-

- To formulate viable policies for rural development
- To evolve strategies for implementation of the formulated policies
- To improve the standard of living of rural dwellers through the provision of infrastructure (road, drainages) and facilities such as water, electricity, health and educational institutions

- To develop agricultural potentials of the rural areas of the state
- To develop human and material potentials of the rural areas
- To create development areas or centres for the state

#### Structure of the Ministry

The Ministry of Rural and Community Development was created following the excision of the Rural Development Department and Community Development respectively from the ministries of Water Resources and Rural Development as well as Local Government and Community Development.

There are at the moment 4 departments, viz, Administration and General Services, Planning, Research and Statistics, Integrated Rural Development and Community Development. There are also 2 Parastatals under the ministry viz: Rural Electricity Board and Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Agency.

#### **Achievements**

Since the ministry came on stream in September, 2005, most of the achievements recorded within the last 4 years were recorded under the two ministries from which it was carved out.

Thus most of the enlevements recorded under Rural Water upp and Sanitation (RUWASA) Rural declication Board (REB) and Commission Development projects were real down before the creation of the minimum.

#### **Achievements of the Ministry 2006**

It is a known fact that access/feeder roads afford communities to come together for their mutual economic benefits as well as bringing them closer to government. The ministry had, therefore, constructed one feeder road in each of the existing senatorial districts at a total cost of N108,132,576.00 as per details below:-

Within the last 5 years, the Community Development Department of the Ministry has registered more than 5,000

Community Development Associations. The idea behind such associations is to promote self-help efforts and to improve activities of vigilante groups to enhance security around the state. The government is collaborating with these associations and the vigilante groups in order to harmonize and streamline their activities to achieve the common objectives of spreading development and reach out to as many communities as practicable.

There is little doubt that the ministry has been up and doing in providing social amenities and improving the quality of lives of the rural populace. It is on records that over N5 billion was spent on the provision of social amenities between June 2007 to May 2008. The priority attention in this regard is the provision of

rural roads, water, electricity and other amenities that have direct bearing on the lives of the people.

Out of this amount, rural roads alone consumed over N2 billion, provision of water to rural communities consumed more than N700 million. On this, 370 boreholes of different types have solar powered, mechanized and hand pumped boreholes are being sunk in all over the state.

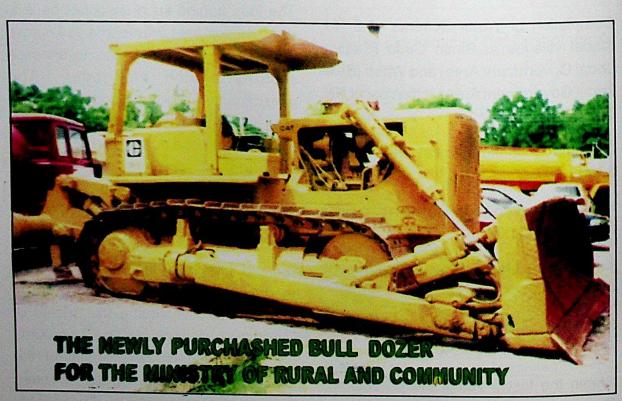
To make rural water supply more accessible, the Government had entered into partnership with the Japanese international cooperation agency to provide potable water for the people. Under this joint borehole project, the Japanese agency has brought equipment

worth N500 million as part of their contribution while the government paid N50 million for logistics to construct additional 240 boreholes in the state.

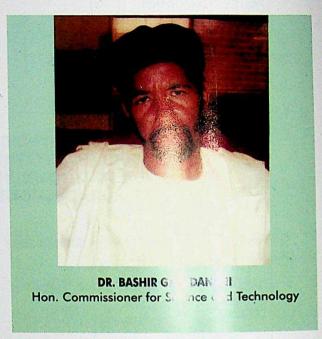
# MINISTRY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

#### INTRODUCTION

Recognizing the ever increasing importance of Science and Technology in improving the lives of the citizens and eager to strengthen the already existing efforts on the promotion and use of Science and Technology by various ministries and agencies, the present Administration established the ministry of Science and Technology on January 9<sup>th</sup> 2009.

Aware of the cross cutting nature of Science and Technology the State government gave the Ministry a wide range of functions including the formulation and implementation of policies, popularization and publicity, encouragement of research and innovation activities, development of KT and promotion of local technology.

Owing to the human development focus of the state government and its desire to see that as many people as possible benefit from the activities of the ministry, the state Government directed the ministry to give special attention to the development of local and appropriate technologies. Already, the Ministry within 6 months of its establishment has not only come out with a well conceived appropriate technology but has developed a detailed work plan that will guide and direct its implantation. Government's directive to the ministry to pay special emphasis on appropriate technology in view of its potential of benefiting a very large number of citizens of the state.



Accordingly the ministry developed a comprehensive appropriate technology programme with the following set of activities:

- a. Organizing research to identify areas requiring appropriate technology.
- b. Promoting the development of appropriate technologies
- Sensitizing the populace on the use of products of appropriate technology.

To achieve the desire objectives the ministry appointed a competent consultant SAMARIB ventures Ltd. To work in collaboration with it, to produce a work plan, an overview of appropriate technology and discussing some problems requiring adoption in Kano State as well as the description of the

methodology and procedure for addressing them.

# **Functions of the ministry**

The new ministry of Science and Technology was established in January 2009, with Dr. Bashir Galadanchi and Alhaji Yusuf Ahmad as its first commissioner and permanent Secretary, respectively. The functions of the Ministry include the following:

- i. To promote the formulation implementation policies in Science and implementation policies in State.
- ii. To the and popularize public aw the season and support for Science and Technology as tools for the elopment.
- iii. To promote and harness scientific and technological research as well as their practical application for the state's socio-economic advancement.

The overall goal of this programme is to research, develop and sensitize people in the state to apply appropriate technologies in their chosen professions, solve problems and achieve sustainable development. The specific objectives of this programme are as follows:

- To undertake researches a related to needs, status and potentials of appropriate technology in the state.
- To build a database on appropriate technology potentials in the state, which include human, materials and financial resources.

- c. To work with relevant bodies and talented individuals in the area of developing appropriate technology products.
- d. To liaise with the public and private concerns for the purposes of commercial production of appropriate technology product.
- e. To promote the adoption and utilization of appropriate technology products.
- f. To continue to inform, sensitize and advise the general public and decision makers in government on the role of appropriate technology in the development in Kano State.
- g. To encourage and support initiatives for innovation in the creation of new products and technologies especially in areas such as Agriculture, industry, science and technology, education, health, environment construction etc.
- h. To promote, support and sustain the spread of ICT knowledge and skills throughout the state particularly among the work force, youth and schools.
- To establish, promote and maintain m u t u a l a n d l a s t i n g synergy/linkages with appropriate state, federal and international agencies in Science and Technology.
- j. To harness and nurture potentialities for local technologies as vehicles for socio-economic development.

Nothing the focus on local technology in the functions envisaged for the ministry,

and realizing the critical importance of appropriate technology in bringing about rapid socio-economic development all over the state, the ministry has come up with a special programme in appropriate technology.

The activities to be conducted under this programme include:

- a. Organizing research to identify areas requiring appropriate technology.
- b. Promoting the development of appropriate technologies
- Sensitizing the populace in the use of products of appropriate technology.

As a mark of success on that lofty appropriate technology programme of the Shekarau Administration, a work plan providing a detailed breakdown of activities, and detailed overview of appropriate technology of its products have been provided.

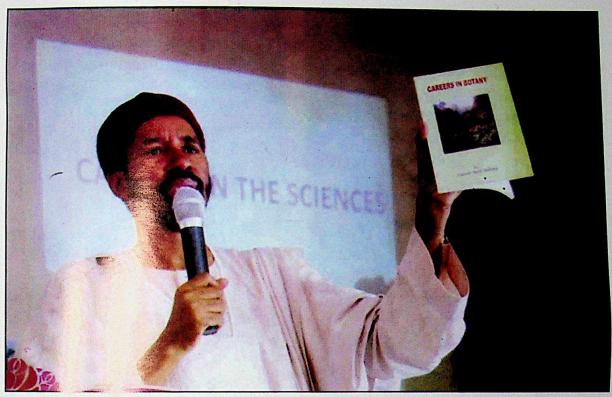
In addition the methodology and procedure for addressing problems requiring appropriate technology solutions as well as 3 years work plan implementations for the benefit of the people has been provided.

Following a research carried out by the consultant it was discovered that Kano State is dire need of adopting appropriate or modern technologies in traditional occupations such as dye works, tanning, farming, wearing, traditional bread making (Gurasa).

According to the report "The rate at which appropriate or modern technologies are adopted in carrying out occupations or solving problems facing the people of Kano State is significantly low when we observe how things are done in the State---- people still rely on the traditional technologies used by their forefather. For instance, majority of farmers still use the hoe in tilling the large we vers use their traditional wearing as a file women in Kano city still use and lik in baking traditional bread (as instead of adopting modern to an enthods used by the people".

Factors responsible for technological, Stagnation in the state cannot be unconnected with poverty, conservatism, lack of education and exposure to modern technologies as well as inadequate government support and subsides. It is for this reason that the state government in an unprecedented move is forging ahead to tackle the issue of technological stagnations in the state, knowing fully well that "The good thing about the adoption of appropriate technologies is that they facilitate efficiency in the use of resources", they make large scale production easier and subsequently lead to the reaping of economics of scale.

Another mark of success already recorded by the ministry is in the areas of identifying problems requiring appropriate technology in Kano State. A look at the way people do things in Kano State leads to the identification of a number of

problems bedeviling their occupation, live hood and even leisure. Some of these problems include:

- a. Cooking with firewood
- b. Lighting our streets and our homes
- c. Refrigeration
- d. Food processing
- e. Control of mosquitoes
- f. Use of unhygienic methods in disposing human feces drying of vegetables on bare ground, roosting meat or frying fish beside gutters and refuse.
- g. Charging of telephone handsets.

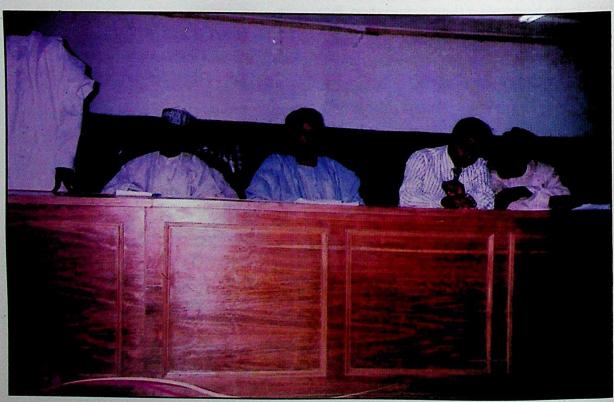

## **MINISTRY OF WATER RESOURCES**

The Ministry of ware Resources was created in 1990 but changed to Ministry of Rural and Community Development in 1999 and reverted to ministry of Water resources and Rural development in 2003 with additional responsibilities. With the creation of the Ministry of Rural Development in September, 2005, The Ministry is now simply referred to as the Ministry of water resources.

The Ministry has 4 departments with a total of over 500 staff. The Departments are:

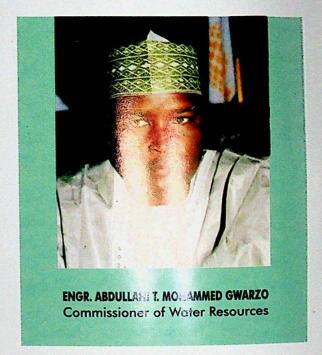
- a). Administration and General Services
- b). Hydrology and Hydro-geology
- c). Planning, Research and Statistics
- d). Irrigation engineering

### **FUNCTIONS**

The Ministry is charged with the responsibilities of:

- i. Harnessing and developing the water resources potentialities of State:
- ii. Providing potable water
  - iii. Development of Irrigation
  - iv. Provision support service to Livestock production, Fisheries and other economic activities; and
  - v. Advising Government on policy matters of water, Irrigation and electricity development in the state.

The Ministry is responsible for policy formulation, implementation and



monitoring of all programmes and project under its jurisdiction. Hydrometereological investigation/provision and maintenance of irrigation infrastructure etc, are directly implemented by the responsible departments. However, water supply provision (operation and maintenance of all regional schemes) in both urban and semi urban areas, are responsibilities of the relevant parastatals, namely

- a) Kano State Water Board
- b) Water Resource and Engineering Construction agency, which operates as a commercial out fit.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

The present administration before its inauguration in May 29, 2003 set up a transition committee, which was saddled with the responsibility of drawing up of action plan for the state covering all sectors.

The target set for the water supply sector is the provision of normal and steady supply of potable water to Kano metropolis and rural areas in a sustainable manner. Programes of action as indicated in the committee's report include:-

- The immediate restoration of steady and sustainable water supply to Kano and environs
- The completion of Challawa 3rd phase treatment plant, intake and transmissione.
- The sustained mobilization and reorienation the public to appreciate the value officient utilization of water and cutival their cooperation to pay for water oills/levy to complement Government efforts.

The Government swung into action immediately by releasing funds to implement programmes adopted for the water section.

Billions of Naira was expended for the rehabilitation works at Challawa, Tamburawa water works as well as Kusalla, Tiga, Rano, Magaga and Kafin Chiri water schemes' as well as laying of pipes and reticulation improvement of water works in some selected areas, supply and installation of meteorological and Hydrological equipment at various locations.

When the present administration was elected for the second time in 2007, the Deputy Governor was appointed to take charge of the Ministry of water resources. This is to emphasize the importance Kano

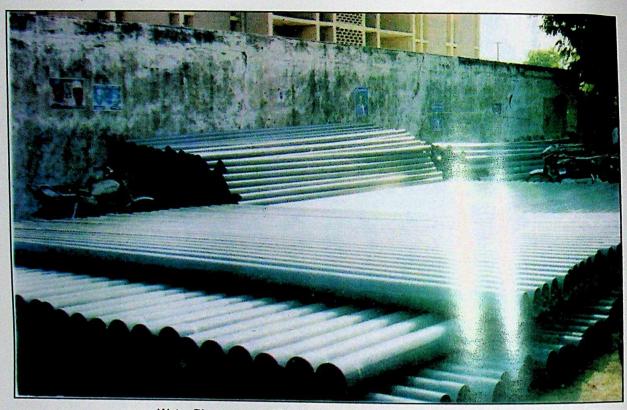
state government attaches to water provision throughout the state.

Since the assumption of office of the Deputy Governor, Engineer Abdullahi T. Mohammad Gwarzo, his major concern was to improve the situation of the state's regional water schemes Tamburawa and Chalawa water works and the measures taken to address the problems affecting them in order to improve water supply generally in the state.

The Deputy Governor discovered on assumption of duty that all the water works in the state have been operating below capacity while some were grounded due to either dilapidated machines or lack of generating sets which is the only source of power to move the engines. Some were even abandoned for many years without functioning for lack of equipment. Such affected regional water works included Gari in Kunchi, which provided water to Kunchi, Makoda and Dambatta, Tomas and Tiga regional water works which were completely grounded.

#### **Measures Taken**

In a bid to address the problems bedeviling all the water works, the state Government provided all the 13 regional water works with brand new generators to the tune of N136 million, while Gari, Magaga, Joda, Tiga and Tomas water works were completely rehabilitated. Another innovation to make the regional water works functional was the formation of Regional water management committees with members drawn from the catchments local Government areas to oversee the operation of their respective

water works. This arrangement entails contribution from local Government based on percentage of their water consumption.

The monies contributed are being used for the procurement of diesel and general maintenance. In addition to that, 10 vehicles haven been purchased at the total cost of N32 million and distributed to the committees for effective monitoring and easy movement of equipment to central workshop in time of repairs. With the inauguration of management committees for all the regional water works, water provision has improved dramatically.

In realization of the desire to provide such areas where water pipes have not been laid, a borehole based scheme was adopted with a view to meeting up their

water demand. Under the scheme, about 22 hand pump boreholes, 3 motorised and 3 solar system boreholes have been fabricated across the state at a total sum of N44, 700, 000.00

The multi-billion naira Tamburawa water works conceived and executed by the present administration is also operational. To make it fully operational and ensure more community participation, the ministry has decided to form 3 committees saddled with the responsibility of ensuring smooth water production, distribution and Technical maintenance as they effect the water works (Chalawa and Tamburawa).

The committees are as follows:-

- a. Water Production Monitoring Committee.
- b. Water Distribution Monitoring

Committee.

c. Technical/Maintenance Monitoring Committee.

The committees have already been inaugurated by the Government and provided with vehicles to ease the mobility of members and equipment.

To ensure the sustainability of water supply in the rural areas and the Metropolitan local Governments the ministry has planned the following:-

- i) Provision generators sets

  Dedicted amburawa water

  works
- ii) Expansion gaga Water Works;
- iii) Expension Vatari Works at a cost of Nabillica Naira as provided in 2008 budgets;
- iv) Permanent re-constructions on Nos. 8, 9, 11 and 12 Water intakes at Challawa;
- v) Expansion of Joda Water Works;
- vi) Expansion of kafin Chiri Water Works;
- vii) Construction of Fada Water Works at the cost of N217 million Naira (ongoing);
- viii) Regular provision of Water Chemicals to all Water Works in the state;
- ix) Construction of Access road from main road to Panshekara Police Station to No.11 Challawa water intake.
- x) Construction of Gani Earth Dam in,

Sumaila Local government;

- xi) Laying of 1000mm ductile iron pipes dedicated to Challawa to Goron Dutse reservoir in order to boost Water Supply to greater Kano.
- xii) The repairs of all electrical/mechanical faults at Watari and Challawa water Works;
- Xiii) Laying of 1000mm ductile iron pipes from lyaka road to sliver Jubilee in order to boost water supply to many areas on the outskirts of the city.
- xiv) Provision of standard and dedicated line of electricity supply from Kumbotso to Tamburawa Water Works;
- xv) Provision of small pipes for reticulation within the greater Kano.
- xvi) Steady Supply of diesel to all the water Works in the state with contribution by the Local Government.

On the whole, the Ministry under water supply projects executed projects worth, N 2 6, 1 2 1, 1 9 8.50 and another N377,960,114.61 under construction and maintenance of dams, N49,667,069.00 for irrigation development services and N414,500,000.00 for Borehole projects in rural areas.

Similarly, the sums of N70,900,000.00 was expended under the second constituency projects, while the sums of N35,857,425.00 was released to Ruwasa for the rehabilitation of rigs, utility vehicles and procurement of compressor.

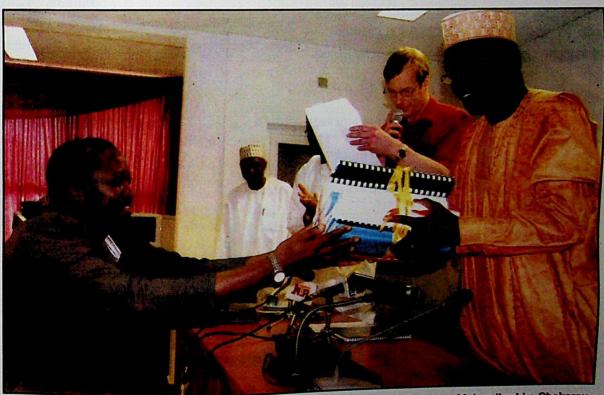


PADA newly constructed Regional Water Scheme in Gwarzo Local Government Area

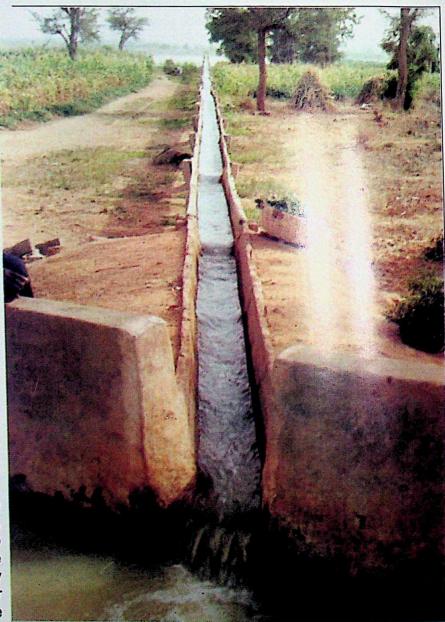
# Boreholes Project (Rural Areas)

Before the creation of the new Ministry of Rural Development borehole construction was under the supervision of this Ministry. The Government had provided the sum of N414, 500,000.00 for **Borehole Water Supply** projects, which include 187No. Hand pumps under the first Constituency/other projects for the 2003/2004. Others include 4No. Motorized and 52No. Solar Powered Boreholes spread across all the Local Governments in the State

In addition to the above, the sum of N70, 900,000.00 was also expended under the second constituency project of the year which leads to the construction of 59No.

Hand pumps, 4No, Motorized and 3No, Solar powered boreholes.

Accordingly, to improve the performance of the implementation Agency, RUWASA, the sum of N35, 857,425.00 has been released for rehabilitation of rigs, utility vehicles and procurement of compressor etc.

# DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING AND STATISTICS

Started as a unit in 2004, and upgraded to full pledged Department in 2006. The department has a staff strength of 13, consisting of 5 in the planning unit, 3 technical staff and 5 craftsmen, operates within 5 units namely;

- · Planning and Budget
- · Monitoring and valuation
- · Statistic
- · Resear an rary
- Buildin and tenance

The Department's schedule was approved in a just 2008, include preparation of edget proposals and project execution.

#### 2008:

The present Administration awarded a contract for the construction of additional offices at the Headquarters. The Magnititude of the work include the extension of 2 blocks (phase 1 & 2) which include the Honorable Commissioner and that of the permanent secretary attached to the conference room. Similarly, some other offices at the ground floor of both phase 1 & 2 were constructed. Other activities performed by the Department in 2008 includes:

- Construction of Kitchen at Children Home Nassarawa with 99% completed
- Renovation works at Torry Home T/Maliki with 99% completed **2009**:

Phase I of office construction completed and handed over to the Ministry on 22<sup>nd</sup> April 2009.

- Wall fencing of Kiru Reformatory school
- Construction of staff quarters at Kiru Reformatory school
- Renovation Works at Nassarawa Children's Home

#### DEPARTMENT OF WOMEN AFFAIRS

The department of women affairs is charged with the responsibility of improving the lives of women folk in the spheres of politics, economy, moral and social development as well as to free them out of all forms of discrimination that may degrade their status as human beings.

#### Women organization

In line with policy target on gender which stipulates the double productivity of women in agricultural sector by the year 2007, The Kano state Government through the Ministry of Women Affairs & social Development participated positively in the disbursement of women fund for economic empowerment.

# WOFEE Loan Scheme WOFEE loan scheme is a programme

whereby Federal Ministry of Women Affairs through NACRDB releases the sum of N6m to Kano State women. In supporting the programme, the state Government released N2m as its counterpart funding totaling to N8m to be disbursed to women. Similarly, the Ministry liaises with the NACRDB Kwari branch and disbursed the first batch of the scheme to 18 women cooperative societies on 6th March 2008 with a disbursement total of N.18m.

Similarly, the ministry has facilitated the attendance of the North-East, North-West and North-Central zones workshops at Benue state on 30<sup>th</sup> January to February 2008. The workshop was aimed to acquaint and mobilize rural women to participate fully into the micro credit (WOFEE) Loan scheme.

The ministry also facilitated the attendance of a 4 days workshop on the

food processing machines and farm equipments sponsored by the FMWA of FCT Abuja. After the workshop, a total of 21No. food processing machines and farm equipments were supplied by the FMWA to the State Ministry towards boosting and increasing the production and processing of farm product. The machines were distributed to 21 women cooperative groups to be set.

**Skills Acquisition** 

In line with Kano Star Gormment's aim to integrate women in declopment and economic structures, the State Government has released over N43.2 million for various women. Economic empowerment programmes such as skills acquisition materials distributed to encourage them be self reliant. The distribution was conducted in 5 batches as per details below:

This unit stated and aration in 2005 and is headed by leg afficer. The unit offers legal counsing women, children and men who have presented assistance, and assists them.

#### Women in Development

This unit organized the celebration of

international Women's day on the 8<sup>th</sup> of March of every year and family day on the 15 of May. The days are usually commemorated with of workshops organized by the department in conjunction with the wives of His Excellency the Governor with two men representatives from various organization all over the State in attendance.

During these occasions, symposium, radio discussion, questions and answer, radio jingles are organized. Similarly gifts and prizes are being extended to HIV/AIDS patients and deserving most peaceful family in the State.

# THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

The department is responsible for

Similarly, it has 2 homes, namely REMAND HOME G/DUTSE and VVF Hostel Kwalli under its Control.

#### F. REMAND HOME G/DUTSE

This is a social home under the supervision of the social welfare Dept. The home admitted children who are in conflict with the law by court mandate. It offers literacy lessons, religious services and skill training to the in mates.

#### 2003-2007:

- A total of 1,030 criminally minded children were accommodated.

2008: - 575 cases were admitted on various offences, 503 discharged and handled to their parents while 69 were retained in the home and 3 escaped.

2009: 273 juveniles were admitted, 16 are on trial, 10 on correction while 11 were repatriated. A total of 259 juveniles were discharged, and at the end of the month 85 juveniles remained in the home.

## G. VVF HOSTEL KWALLI

Vesico Vaginal Fistula (VVF) and return Vaginal Fistula) RVF are some serious

disabilities associated with women during delivery time. Kano State has over 2000 VVF victims with an average of 10 every week. There are two hostels namely Kwalli and Zoo Road Hostels. The ministry presently has only the kwalli hostel, while zoo road has been transferred to the ministry of Health for conversion into a pediatric hospital. The Ministry is responsible for the provision of accommodation, feeding, transportation of patients to hospital, clothing during stay at hostel and empowerment on discharge. In the year 2008, 200 women leaving with HIV had enjoyed various empowerment materials such as grinding, knitting and pasta machines. The activity was sponsored by the federal and state governments Plans are also in the pipeline, to empower 150 women this year during the VVF fortnight campaign. From 2003 to date, a total number of 3,363

patients were accommodated.

#### H. REPATRIATION EXERCISE

The programme is to reunite the lost and found persons, victims of circumstances. stranded persons and released prison in mates etc with their families.

During the year 2003-2007, a total number of 309 persons were reunited with their families within and outside the state. 2008: 72 cases were handled successfully.

- Ø 25 repatriations
- Ø 43 lost & found children reunited

#### with families

The ministry's relationship with Hisbah Board, Shari'a and other stakeholders has remained cordial. 41 cases were referred to the ministry from these organizations and all were amicably resolved.

#### **ASSISTANCE TO THE NEEDY**

The programme was designed to offer a timely financial assistance to men and women. The programme facilitates clients to address their pressing problems. Each month, the state Government releases substantial amount of money with the sole aim of granting support to the needy in areas of medical, and rent, assistance, Marital and educational empowerment and other needs.

Between 2003-2007 a total of 1,494 beneficiaries were catered for under this programme.

2008: a total number of 1,347 people had so far benefited from the support for the needy programme amounting to the sum of N8.8m

2009: a total of 468 beneficiaries consisting of 65 persons on medical, 54 for rent, 105 for marriage assistance, 34 each for empowerment and educational and 174 for other miscellaneous assistance were recorded.

# THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The department was established with the mandate to handle matters relating to survival, protection and development of children in the state. It has three units and

look after four homes, as follows:

1. FOSTERING UNIT: This unit helps disengage the children from the social home and find them a family to enable them grow in a family setting, in order to give them a sense of belonging, moral discipline so that they can be integrated into the larger society.

rember committee was established by the state government to

- Screen appliedts, interview applicants wising of foster children and recommend them for further action. The ministry, then processes successful applicants and forward to juvenile court for fostering order.
- Organize home visits before and after fostering recommendation to access the parents performance and welfare of the children.
- Receive, compile and process applications on transfer to custody accordingly.
- Compile reports and organize committee's meeting.
- 2. ORPHANAND VULNERABLE UNIT This unit deals with children that are made vulnerable by the society due to one reason or another, especially children whose parents affected/infected by HIV/AIDS. Such children are being assisted by the ministry. The unit also does the following:

- Coordinate the activities of the unit with relevant stakeholders.
- Liase and coordinate with international organizations UNICEF, DHD, USAID etc on children participation and protection services.
- Preside over meetings of the working committees and NGOs

## HOMES UNDER THE DEPARTMENT

## Nassarawa Children Home

The Home keeps different categories of children including, abandoned children, lost and found as well as for safe keeping. Presently, there are 4 males and 18 females. There are also grown ups, in the

home, as well as well those who have not been fostered out, while some of the imamates returned by their foster parents due to one reason or the other.

# MEDICAL NURSERY UNIT MURTALA MUHD SPECIALIST HOSPITAL

This Unit is situated at MMH. Abandoned children, children of accident victims who are on admission or dead are being kept for 6 weeks intensive medical after which they are transferred to Nassarawa children's home for safe keeping, There are presently 10 of such children.

#### **Torrey home**

It is situated at Tudun Maliki and is the home for the mentally retarded and physically disabled children. Some of them are found roaming about and some are brought for admission by their parents and other related organizations. Presently, there are 30 children in the home.

#### **Mariri Center VI**

Mariri Centre VI was established with the aim of protecting and rescuing the children who happen to be victims of child trafficking.

In 2008, 104 children believe to be trafficked from Kano to Niger state were apprehended and kept at the center before re-uniting them with their parents. The ministry feeds, clothe and transport them to their respective Local Government. There are no immates at the moment.

## Gyadi-gyadi day Care

The center is yet to take off.

- Received a donation of 14 seater bus from the executive governor to the children home Nassarawa to ease their transportation problems.
- Feeding of 4 social homes and nursery wards of MMSH.

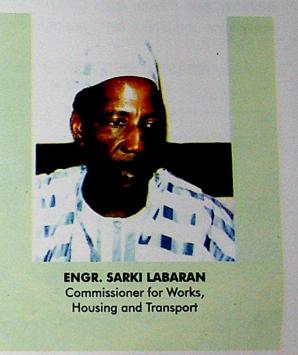
## MINISTRY OF WORKS, HOUSING AND TRANSPORT

The Ministry of Works, Housing and Transport is a service oriented Ministry saddled with the responsibility of constructing or supervising the construction of various projects as they pertain to public building, roads, offices and houses as well as maintaining them. It is also the duty of the ministry to maintain all public buildings, streets and traffic lights and bodge. If over the state. It also has the responsibility of providing public transportation that gh the state transport agency, Kano sate Transport Authority (KASTA) otherwise known as Kano Line.

With the above functions, the Ministry is thus involved directly in the execution and/or supervising the execution of various development projects geared towards the social and Economic improvement of the lives of the people.

It is to the credit of the Ministry, since the creation of the state, that majority of religious, traditional buildings, agricultural and cooperative buildings, sport development facilities, housing accommodation/estates were constructed.

Generally, Ministry of Works, Housing and Transport is responsible for the construction and maintenance of public buildings (Offices and Houses), Roads and Bridges, Street Light/Traffic light as well as Fire prevention, rescue and protection. Other responsibilities involves implementation of transportation master plan and provision of mass program.



The ministry consists of Seven Departments, namely; Admin & General Services, Building, Civil Engineering, Mechanical & Electrical Engineering, Planning, Research & Statistics, Road Traffic and Transport Department.

# CREATION OF TRANSPORT DEPARTMENT

When this administration took over in 2003, there is no section or unit that handles transport matters in the Ministry of Works, Housing and Transport. Only the vehicle inspection Unit that handles the issuance of driving license and driving school which is just a sub-sector of the transport sector existed in the ministry. However, this has led to a lot of problem in the sector as there is no section which will have an overview of the whole sector, help government in development of policies, regulations and co-ordinating support and investment in this very strategic sector. To address this institutional problem, a separate department of Transport was created staffed and equipped to coordinate, regulate and implement

government policies and programmes in the transport sector.

# TRANSPORT MASTER PLAN FOR KANOSTATE

Since the creation of Kano State, transport policies and programme with the successive Governments were implemented without a guiding plan. This resulted in programmes and strategies that aggravate the problems of the transport sector, harm the environment, ignore the changing needs of the users and exceed the capacity of government finance.

Aware of this challenge, the government embarked on the development of Transport Master Plan that will review the past, assess the present and project into the future needs of the transport sector in

the state in terms of infrastructural requirements, operation and service delivery. The new transport Master Plan will take cognizance of demand analysis for each mode of transport in use in the state over a 25 year period; assess the instructional capacity for policy setting, regulation and service provision of each sub-sector. And drawing on the information derived from assessment and the conclusions of the plan, government will consider policy options for public transport systems in the state that will allocate roles and responsibilities between the public and private sector as well as develop regulatory framework for the smooth operation of the sector.

#### **PILOT PROGRAMME**

School Bus Programme: In order to address the problems of the girl child education government has observed the difficulties faced by the girls students of our secondary schools in transporting themselves from the houses to their various schools. They have to struggle with men to get the few available seats in the rickety mini buses operating or opt to use commercial motorcycles with all the attended risks.

The concomitant effect of all these is late coming to schools, psychological trauma, late coming back to home among others.

In order to address the problems, the government is piloting a scheme tagged School Bus Programme for the girl child. Already 7 High capacity buses capable of transporting up to 100 students at a time

have been procured and the programme will take up next academic session.

In the area of project implementation, the department of transport has achieved the following:

A. Guard rails reflectors: Those are needed for guiding traffic and prevent them from spilling into the carriage way. The design of the rail was neat and vandal proof. It is fixed at 6 metres distance on the straight road, while 3 meters are erected on bends.

A total of 6,205 were installed along Zaria Road concrete barriers, 727 at Hadejia Road, with a very good guidance effect in the night. It required regular cleaning due to exhaust at a bends.

B. <u>Lane Dividers</u>: Useful for junctions, they are flexible and the provide an orderly movement of traffic. Lane dividers reduce the frequency of certain types of accidents, especially the right angle type and head on collusion.

- C. <u>Road signs:</u> They are of great help regulating traffic and imparting message to the drivers, about the need to stop, give way or speed limit.
  - § High visibility sign both during the night and day
  - \$ Lettering of symbol of adequate size for being read from far away by a speeding driver without diverting the gaze through too great an angle.
  - § Location at a conspicuous position to be able to be seen by drivers, without being obscured by vehicles or other object.

A total of 159 different signs were installed at various locations and intersection, ranging from stop, pedestrian, speed limit etc.

D. Marking center line: The division of

the carriage way into separate lanes for traffic traveling in the same direction or either side of the center; line or medium, strip help to promote travel in proper lanes and curb the meandering tendency of the driver, thus promoting safety and ensuring maximum capacity.

A total distance of 3Km was marked with centre-line without retro-reflective glass beads on Sani Abacha and some part of Murtala Muhammad way i.e. from CFAO to Bata Roundabout. Reflective only in the night, couldn't use thermoplastic paints due to the bad surface of road and many holes.

E. <u>Stop line</u>: Are thermoplastic white paint provide transversely to the carriageway, used to indicate the point behind which vehicle are required to stop in compliance with a stop sign.

A total of 12 stop lines, thermoplastics were installed at different locations.

- 1. 4 at IBB by Kofar Mazugal junction
- 2. 3 IBB by Katsina Road junction
- 3. 2 at Aminu Kano Way by Gidan Zakka
- 4. 3 at Kofar Ruwa by Kurnar Asabe Junction.
- F. Pedestrian crossing: A standardized design of 6 metres length were installed at various points and intersection. The location of the stop line and the pedestrian cross-walk at the intersection is to ensure safe pedestrian crossing.

A total of 30 Pedestrian Crossings were installed at various locations, with an impressive solar approaching flashing

unit camera and light fixed at Aminu Kano Commercial College gate.

- G. <u>Solar road Studs</u>: A total of 620 were installed at various points the junction they are used to compliment at stop line. Installed at the following junction.
  - § Ahmadu Bello Way
  - § IBB by Kofar Mazugal
  - § Wudil Road
  - § Murtala Muhd by Sani Abacha way
  - § Sabo Bakin-Zuwo Road
- H. <u>Solar street light</u>: This is to enable the road users, motorists, cyclist and pedestrians to see accurately and easily the carriageway and the immediate surroundings in darkness.

The solar is due to constant power shortage and its improved visibility at night

by means of artificial lightening lessens the strain on driving and ensure comfort. A total of 20 solar street lights were installed along Obasanjo road.

- I. <u>Battery back-up traffic control</u> <u>lightning</u>: Use for control of conflicting stream of vehicular and pedestrian traffic. A properly designed controlling lighting was installed at six (5) different intersections within the management.
  - § CFAO junction
  - § Mayanka Junction ar Novugal
  - § Eldorado junction
  - § Gidan Murtala
  - § Sabo Bakin Zuwo junction and
  - § Ibn Abu Talib roundabout.

- Increase the traffic handling capacity of the intersection
- Interrupt heavy traffic at intervals to permit other traffic vehicular or pedestrian to cross.
- Assign right of way impartially to traffic
- Dispense with police control and can thus be economical.

J. School bus bild ogramme: The state government as urchased 7No. High Capacity no n Buses for transporting to and om girls day secondary schools at highly subsidized fees. Each bus can carry more than 100 (both sitting and standing) students at a time.

The Buses were routed strategically for optimum operations with provision of adequate security from state Hisbah Guards. The programme has taken off from the beginning of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Term of the school calendar (11<sup>th</sup> May, 2009)

# KANO STATE HOUSING CORPORATION

Kano State Housing Corporation was established by Kano State Government of Nigeria Official Gazette No. 18, Vo4. XIV of October 1980. Prior to this development, housing development and management were jointly undertaken by various Government organizations.

With the establishment of the Corporation, it was mandated with functions of coordination and implementation of housing programmes in Kano State to meet up with the increasing demand for houses

resulting from urbanization processes and population growth.

The Law establishing the Corporation outlines its major functions:-

- 1) To provide and increase the houses needed by the public.
- From time to time, prepare scheme for the provision of more houses in the State.
- To undertake development, construction and management of housing estates.
- To provide and maintain roads, footways, bridges, drainages and other basic works required in the Estates.

In September 1981, the Corporation formally took over all the Government Housing Estates from the State Investment and Properties company, and has since been evolving effective management system.

The Corporation has so far introduced Owner Occupier Scheme in which over 3000 of its houses spread in 5 Estates were sold to the occupants at subsidized rate to be paid over a period of 15 years.

The Corporation has equally introduced the very low income housing scheme under which about 500 simple and modest houses were built at Sabo Garba Housing Estate and sold to civil servants on grade levels 01-04 at rate, to be repaid over a period of 15 years. Equally introduced is the commercial housing scheme under which categories of

modern houses were constructed and sold to interested members of public on direct sales basis.

The corporation has also implemented the sustainable plots scheme and site and services scheme under which different categories of plots are sold to members of the public to enable them build houses of their choice.

A block making industry was also established and steady supply of durable. high quality and cheap block is maintained.

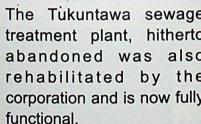
The dilapidated house, at Sabon Gari that handed over to the corporation are being developed in phases. So far, the houses at Enugu Road were demolished and replaced with a shopping centres and residential quarters. The Shopping Centre was completed and allocated to interested members of the public.

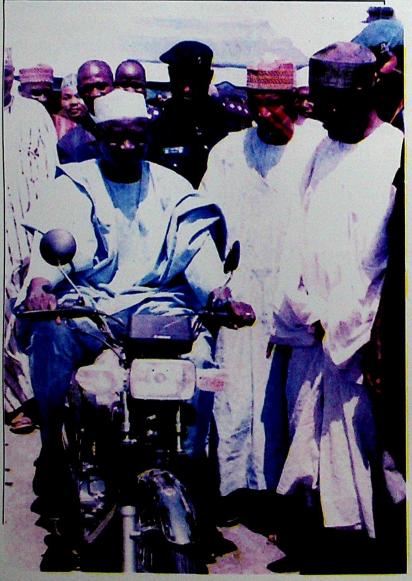

#### ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT

This Department is responsible for the Coordination and supervision of the overall activities of the Corporation as well as personnel/ administrative matters such recruitments, confirmation, promotion, discipline, retirement and staff welfare. The department is also responsible for all legal



matters, press and public relations, auditing and organizing Board meetings.

During the period under review, the department has successfully undertaken the routine administrative matters such as promotion of deserving staff as and when due, discipline where and when cases of misconduct are eported, training whenever the need rises as well as staff welfare programm such as settlement of medical lain granting of loans. allocation of s well as subsidizing ous the houses 20% their total cost.

It is equally orti o note that the State Governme vic **Executive Council** deliberation as ar CON (2005) 33'd meeting of 7th December 2005, has approved declaring the Corporation as a schedule organization. One of the conditions given for such approval was that the contract staff of the Corporation to be reverted to permanent and pensionable appointment should refund contract gratuity/addition enjoyed over the years of service emblock by the relevant rules.

The staff are to collectively refund the sum of =N=29,702,141.54 the contract gratuity/addition they have collected over the years.

Considering the enormous nature of the amount involved, the Management sought for State Government approval to accept part payment of the sum of =N=10,297,954.84 and convert the balance of the sum =N=19,404,186.70 to a soft loan payable over a period of 5

year,. request is vide letter NO. KSHC/A/S/128/II/295 of 2nd May 2006. The sum of =N=10,297,954.84 was subsequently paid.

The State Executive Council during its meeting of 18t" December 2006 noted the above payment and approved the installment refund over a period of (60) months. The installment refund started in January 2007.

Following the commencement of contributory pension scheme in the State the department has arranged for deduction and remittance of 8% of staff salaries to the State Ministry of Finance with effect from November 2007. As the payment of 17% employer contribution, the corporation is constrained to effect such payments due to lack of funds.

This prompted the Corporation to inform the Hon. Commissioner of work, and Housing of its position and requested the State Government to take over payment of its salaries including the 17% employer contribution to enable the Corporation concentrate on its capital project.

The activities of the construction department mainly consist of execution: proper supervision under direct labour, production and sales of different types of blocks and commercialization of gully emptier.

#### Introduction:

The Kano Asphalt and Quarry is a State Government wholly owned corporate company, curved out of the two former Basic Plants of the M.O.W. in 1994 namely the Dawanau Ashalt Plant and the Panisau Quarry Plant, with the following innovative aims and objectives:

- 1. Provide and satisfy Stone chipping and Asphalt mixture requirements for the maintenance and construction of Roads by the Ministry, Local Governments and Individual purchasers.
- 2. General revenue by way of selling the products and embarking on all activities as enshrined in its articles of Association that may lead to profitable venture

- To efficiently and effectively utilize the physical Assets and Plants of the company for optimal and profitable use.
- 4. To eventually transform into a unique Asphalt producing firm-given necessary inputs and equipment to enable the company to enter and meet contractual obligations.

## Site locations and functions:

The company has currently two outfits located within close proximity to centre of Kano metropolis i.e. Panisau behind Mal. Aminu Kano International Airport and at Dawanau 5km Dawakin Tofa Road.

i. The Quarry site at Panisau: This site has one Hazemag Stone Crusher though aged, but in fairly good working

rehabilitation; it is capable, of producing 80 tons of various sizes of stone chippings per day-all things being equal.

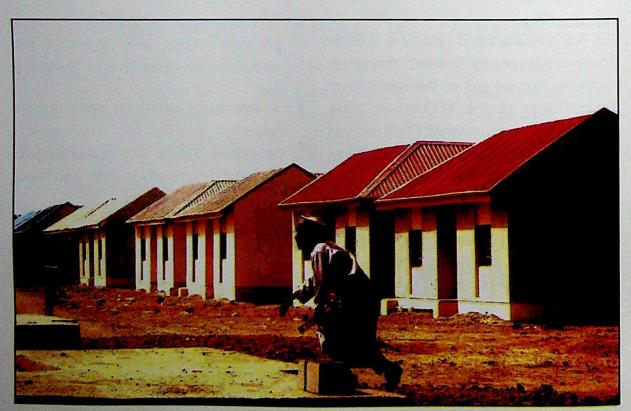
The quarry plant remains the hub of operation of the company and hence its only revenue generation sources. Such revenue is being utilized to meet up with the company's financial commitments such as maintenance of company aged plant and equipment, attending to all administrative expenditure as well as subsidizing to government 25% of the company's staff salary monthly that apart, the company is expected to meet up with government requirement of annual revenue generation targets.

ii. The Asphalt Plant Dawanau: first installed in the late 70's, the Berber Greene Asphalt Plant was extensively used by the ministry for most of the state Asphalt roads, until it suffered a major break-down the plant was left for years un-repaired which led to bastardization of many of the parts.

With the setting up of the company, and after several efforts by the monger and of the company, the plant became rehabilitated, expanded and gard be put use late 2002 and early parts 2003.

The plant, however, has not been used since that time due to lack of enough capital and patronage.

In 2003, the company's budgetary proposal to Government was Fifty Nine Million and Five Hundred Thousand Naira Only. However, Government, through the intervention of the Ministry of Lands and Physical Planning, the then ministry overseeing the affairs of this company, directed the Management to submit requirements for updating e company's Plants and Equipment. sequest for the Thirty Nine Million make immediate needs of the Quary Asphalt Plant was submitted, but ecalled the year 2003 was then close an and, three million naira was approved and the Management used the fund to update its plants mainly **Trucks** 

In the year 2004, the company's supervision was returned to the Ministry of Works and Housing and a budget of Forty Eight Million, Five Hundred Thousand naira was articulated, forwarded and defended however, Five Million Naira was approved.

In the year 2005, a budget proposal of over sixty million naira was forwarded to government and defended. The sum of Ten Million Naira was approved. However, only Seven Million was released to the company.

In the 2006, a budget of over One Hundred and One Million Naira was proposed for updating the company's Plants. The sum of Five Million Naira was approved, but not released.

In the year 2008, the State Government having considered the aged nature of the plants and equipment of these two outfits, in consideration of the vital role that could be played by the company with regards to Government programmes of Road construction & Rehabilitation, graciously granted approval for the release of the sum for twenty five million naira (N25m) via the approved budgetary provision of the Company (2008) for the procurement of some much needed equipment such as Front Loader, Quarry Truck etc in order to enhance and revitalize the Company's performance towards improved output and revenue generation.

In year 2009, in its budgetary estimates for the year 2009, the company presented a proposal to Government for the establishment of two new additional quarries in some local governments, purchase of plants and machinery including Front Loader and Quarry Dumper for the Quarries, Spare Parts and Procurement of a medium mobile Asphalt blending Plant to the tune of fifty six million, five hundred thousand naira only to start the project. This will undoubtedly provide employment to the people of the local government so chosen to have the Quarries.

The company's budget was financially placed on 10t.

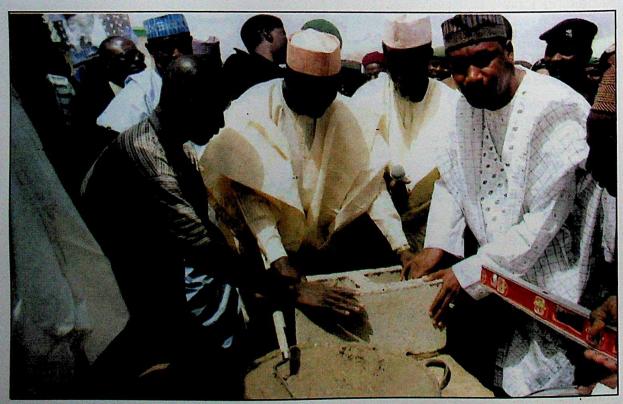
The main functions of the Department is to ensure the safety of lives and properties of the members of public against fire outbreak in the state.

It is also engaged in Rescue operation including Road Accidents, Drowning in open water, Wells and collapsed buildings as well as public enlightenment on fire prevention, inspection of factories, shops, filling stations, Government premises and other places. Others are pumping of flooded areas, supplying of portable drinking water to strategic places when ever the need arises.

More Fire Station will be established in remaining local government areas. In fact our vision is to establish functional Fire Station in all 44 local government areas and the major markets in the state.

# **ACHIEVEMENTS:**

A lot has been achieved by the fire service from 29th May 2003- 30th May, 2009, which include the purchase of more fire fighting vehicles and equipments, repairs of all existing Fire Stations and opening of new office within the Metropolitan and Local Government Areas, sending of personnel to acquire more knowledge and skills within and outside the country, equipping the Fire services training school at Dakata with modern Teaching

Aids which made it possible the school to be receiving trainees from sister fire service organizations in the country and other government and private organizations. Presently the school is ranked the best fire service training school in the country.

On fire prevention, during the period under review, fire prevention enlightenment activities were intensified in the print and electronic media, visit to private and public buildings all aimed at education members of the public on the dangers of fire and its prevention. To achieve the above, equipments were purchased for the prevention division which include 20 motorcycles, complete fire equipments, repairs of lands rover van and Peugeot pick up among others, while the staff are given opportunity to attend courses related to their job.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

The administration and finance division plays a key role in the progress of any organization. Having this in mind, when the present leadership took over the running of the fire services in Kano, a lot of emphasis was placed on the admin/finance division to see that the division has modern office equipment/furniture. The admin instrative staff were motivated to give out their best by purchasing office equipments such as computers, Stationeries, etc. in addition, some admin staff were selected and sent for training. In this direction, from August

Again, out of the monthly over head cost, the management was able to establish a computer business centre at the fire service head quarters. Computers, photocopying and binding machines were purchased and installed at the centre. And since its inception within the last five years, the centre is fully functional and is being supervised by admin division. Another gigantic project executed by the fire department through the monthly over-head is Gym i.e. DR. MALAM IBRAHIM SHEKARAU GYM AND KANO STATE FIRE SERVICE STAFF GYM all at the Fire Services Headquarters Kofar Nassarawa. Dr. Malam Ibrahim Shekarau Gym was commissioned by His Excellency the Deputy Governor of Kano State ENGR. ABDULLAHI
TIJJANI MUHAMMAD GWARZO.

#### **CONTROL ROOM**

The control/Watch Rooms at Fire Service Headquarters and various Division with the Fire Service in Kano State take charge of all the communication equipment in the Brigade.

The Control/Watch Rooms manned by seasoned and discipling Firmen who receive special trains on mobilizing officers, men and opliances to the scene of accidents.

The Control/Watch Room receive emergency calls from members of the public and make necessary entries into the fire service log book.

Before the coming of the present administration of Mal. Ibrahim Shekarau in 2003, the control/Watch Rooms are shadows of their former self with no functional Radio Base, mobile Walkie-Talkie Radios or Telephone. Above all, the Department was crippled as there were no fire fighting equipments like hoses breathing apparatus and servicing spare parts for the fire fighting/rescue vehicles.

However, with the coming of present administration, a request was made to the Government and the sum of N23, 776,098.00 Million was released to the Fire Service Department for the purchase of flame fighter hoses, breathing apparatus, heavy duty batteries, tyres/tubes for fire fighting

vehicles which are provided with mobile bay station Walkie Talkie Radios, while the most senior fire officers have been as a senior fire officers have been to pair mobile handset annunication, while the control Room and Watch Rooms across the state for use by members of the public to report emergency cases to the Brigade.

# WORKSHOP/MAINTENANCE & TRANSPORT DIVISION

The Kano State Fire Service Department has a modern workshop with a maintenance of emergency reads are carried out. Apart from and auto mechanics, the vershop has all types of artisans, i.e. welcars, battery chargers, plumbers, masons, carpenters, bricklayers, painters, Radio & T.V Mechanics and electricians.

The transport unit of the workshop train emergency vehicles drivers and conduct in-house refresher courses for emergency vehicles drivers in conjunction with fire service training school; all aimed at having competent drivers who will drive emergency vehicles to the scene of emergency on time using good topography and at the same time observing road safety regulations etc.

## **TAILORING WORKSHOP**

When the present Government took over the mantle of leadership in the state it inherited a non functional tailoring unit

with I sewing machines and demoralized staff. However, the tailoring division was given a new lease of life when 6 new sewing machines were purchased and 6 others repaired while sewing materials worth over N626, 860.00 were provided.

Presently, the tailoring division is not only sewing uniforms to staff of Kano State Fire Services but other sister Para-Military Organisations, i.e. Immigrations, Prisons, Road Safety, Civil Defense, Traffic Wardens, Vehicles Inspection Officers, Nurses, Hisbah and Road Transport Employees among many others.

#### **OPERATIONS**

The Division that suffers most as a result of lack of professionalism for some years was the operations arm of the Department. The seven (7) Division across the state were reduced to mere fire registry as there was no serviceable fire fighting/rescue vehicles to attend to fires/rescue calls from members of the public.

The only division that has fire fighting vehicle was "A" Division which can boast of only one dilapidated serviceable fire fighting vehicles that leaks. This situation was not only demoralizing to the staff but does not allow for efficiency.

At the inception of this administration the following divisions did not have any serviceable fire engine.

Priority was therefore placed by the new Government on how to get serviceable fire fighting/rescue vehicles and equipments to enable the department operate effectively. Request for funds was therefore made to government and approval was given. The grounded fire fighting, Rescue utility vehicles were repaired, while new fire appliances were purchased.

Staff welfare was given special attention, and within a little time, staff were always out to give their best in terms of attending to emergency calls. Government within a period of five (6) years released N151,400.00m for the purchase of staff uniform. In addition, 5 standby generators, 3nos pumping machines were refurbished and 6nos water tankers were refurbished, complete wall fencing of fire service headquarters and Sharada fire station and over hauling of 2nos heavy duty pumping machines were made. More fire stations were opened at various

local government areas across the state.

banking in April 1998 from its first Headquarters at the Ministry of Works & Housing. DBS currently has an Authorised share capital and paid-up share capital of N200 Million and 181.7 million divided into ordinary shares of N1 each respectively. The ownership structure is as follows:

During the years under review (2003-2009) DBS recorded a phenomenal growth in Gross Earning which climbed from N11.0million in 2003 to N195,917 million in 2008 whereas from a loss of N3.2 million in 2003, DBS recorded an astronomical profit after tax of N53.3 Million in 2008 Audited accounts. Earnings per share too rose from negative position to 28.98k in 2008. It is hoped that the performance of 2009 will surpass that of the preceding years.

## **ACHIEVEMENTS**

Increase in Share Capital: During the period under review DBS was recapitalized and its paid-up Share capital was increased from N20.6 Million in 2003 to N181.7 million in 2008 through rights issue and bonus issue of N151m and

N10.1 million respectively. Currently the second phase of the recapitalization process to N500m is in progress. Already Government has approved N127,120,000 in its 2009 estimate for the payment of rights issue. It is hoped that the share ownership will be open and broadened by way of private placement.

#### Renovation of Audu bako Branch

During the year under review the administration has approved the sum of N3,916,900.00 for the renovation of a section of the state treasury for the relocation of the company from the ministry of works to a befitting office at Audu Bako Secretariat.

# **Building of Corporate Headquarters:**

The Government built a permanent Head

Office for the Company at 1A Abdullahi Bayero Way and the amount was capitalized as additional shares. In addition to existing Audu Bako Secretariat Branch, the company opened new branches at Abdullahi Bayero Way, and B.U.K Road Kano, while additional branches are expected to be opened.

With the support of the Government, DBS

There had been a remarkable crease in gross Earning and profit, and DBS is now adjudged as the most profitable Kano State Government owned company. This is clearly evident from its audited financial performance where it recorded a phenomenal growth in Gross Earning from N11.00m in 2003 to N195.9 million in 2008. It also recorded an astronomical profit after Tax of N53.3 million in 2008 compared to a loss of N3.2 million in 2003.

Dividend Payment: Following the growth in the profit of the Company, a dividend of N17.1 million (or kobo per share) N18.1 million has been paid to the shareholders in 2006 and 2007 respectively. While the sum of N27.2 was slated for payment of 2008, as compared to the previous year where a script dividend of N10.1 million was paid in form of bonus shares in the proportion of one share for every sixteen shares held by the existing shareholders.

Micro-Credits: Introduced a special micro-credit scheme aimed at empowering workers and other salary earners to own major household appliances and other fixed assets through easy monthly payment system towards improvement of the quality and comfort of their dwellings. Already, more than 2,500 workers both in the state and local government services have benefited under the scheme. Indeed, more than 25 Local Governments Education Authorities accessed the facility for their teeming workers.

Loans and Overdrafts: The Company's loans and overdrafts stands at N450.7 million in 2008. This comprises temporary loans and overdraft facility to workers and the general public who wish to meet short term financial needs, including acquisition of building materials. More than 3,000 workers across the Federal, State and Local Government services had enjoyed the facility. DBS remains the first choice of workers, because of the flexible banking facilities provided to salary earners and pensioners.

Subsidiary Company: In line with the CBN guidelines, DBS has incorporated a fully owned subsidiary company DBS Real Estate & Investment Ltd that engages in business of real estate and general investment activities for the purpose of operational synergy and earning superior incomes.

Corporate Governance: Improved the quality of corporate governance both at

the management and the board of Directors levels in accordance with the best practices in the banking industry.

#### **Managing Special Loans**

DBS was entrusted with the management of Special Intervention Fund created by the State government to assist its Federal Civil Servants to pay for Houses offered to them in Abuja under the on-going Federal Government Privatization/Sale of FG Houses in the FCT. Already, the government had paid N983.41 million to the Federal Capital Development Authority (FCDA) and the CBN through Dala Building Society for 447 beneficiaries. The amount represent 50% of the total required for the houses. The amount has been advanced on behalf of the beneficiaries as interest-free Loan recoverable over 5 years.

Government has also appointed Dala Building Society as the banker to its cottage industries scheme. The first release of N30 million has been paid into the account of the special scheme operated by the Ministry of Planning & Budget. The scheme is aimed at boosting the development of cottage industries in the state through resuscitation of the existing industries and promotion of new ones. The loan facility is interest-free.

#### CHALLENGES

With the opening of the new corporate Headquarters at Abdullahi Bayero way and Branch offices at Audu Bako Secretarita and B.U.K Road, DBS is now poised for greater mortgage banking business in the state. It will develop new

products in mortgage and real estate for the benefit of its customers.

The Major challenge facing DBS is recapitalization in accordance with the changing financial landscape and consolidation in the Nigerian banking industry. Accordingly, DBS is expected to increase its paid-up share capital from the current N181.7 million to a mimum of N500 million. Already, DBS oos s to of 500 recapitalize first to a minimum million through rights issue to ing shareholders, and then to N illic by probably broadening the share when qir structure through private plan quick means of achieving the proposed recapitalization of DBS is by incorporating the state pension trust fund into the ownership structure Dala Building Society. It should be allowed to invest in the share capital of the company. The participation of the state pension trust fund in the ownership structure of the company will no doubt provide it with an indigenous vehicle for managing pension funds and assets with a view to monitoring and directing pension resources into good investment with positive socioeconomic multiplier benefits to the state.

Pursuant to the need encourage the private sector to participate in the development of the mortgage company, DBS should raise its share capital base through public offer, i.e. a combination of private placement and rights issue to the existing shareholders. The rights issue will enable the Company to capitalize the State Government Special Intervention

Fund amounting to N983.41 million paid to FCDA and the CBN through DBS on behalf of Federal civil Servants of Kano State origin offered houses in Abuja. The government may later divest its capitalized funds by selling hares to suitable investors, including workers who can pay for their shares through monthly payments from salaries over period of time, e.g. 3 years.

It is no doubt the Dala Building Society could be lize evenue collection for government enue generating agencies ch he Board of Internal Revenue, See N ry of Land, and Water Board. The e anizations should be made to pe accounts with the Company, where revenue could be paid directly by relevant individuals and organizations, based on appropriate arrangements.

## KANO STATE TRANSPORT AUTHORITY

Kano State Transport Authority (KASTA) otherwise known popularly as Kano Line was established vide edict 1990 to carry out the transportation services of the state.

The authority has been epilectic until the year 2005 when the present administration revived its operations.

Accordingly the following achievements were recorded:

- Government extended a Grant of N28 million as assistance in the year 2005.

- Additional staff were recruited to cater for the increase in the volume of operation, 13 Contract and 48 Casual, Totaling 61 from 2005 to date.
- Commissioned the National Institute of Transport Technology, to provide consultancy management services in the year 2005.
- Taken-over and commenced operations with additional one thousand (1000) Tricycles in the year 2007.
- Purchased Two (2), additional Toyota and Mazda Buses for Interstate operations in the year 2007.
- Revived and opened more Interstate routes from the year

#### 2005 to date.

- Taken-over and commenced Interstate operations with Ten (10) new Leyland Buses, under the fleet management arrangement with some private entrepreneurs in 2009
- Improve on the administration sate-up and the revenue generation drive. So far a total sum of N117,673,746.20 has been remitted to the treasury as at March 2009 being 90% proceeds from the operation of the new Tricycles from the year 2007 to date, in line with Government approval on the issue
- Commenced the owner operator scheme for Tricycles, with many riders taking full ownership of the Tricycles to date.
- Commissioned Charted Accounting firm to produce backlog of Audit Accounts from 1994 to 2005 and continued with up-dated Audit reports to date.
- Secured and expanded the Terminus premises along Zaria Road, to accommodate the new

- One Thousand (1000) Tricycles in the year 2007.
- Successfully hosted the meeting of the Mass Transit, Northern Axis Consultative Forum in the year 2008

- Rehabilitation of the Managing Director's offices at Sharada and Terminus

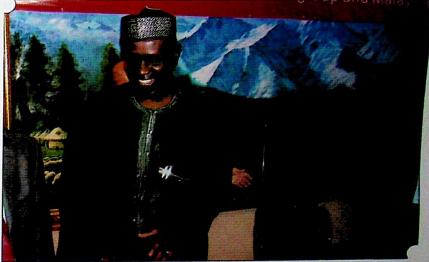

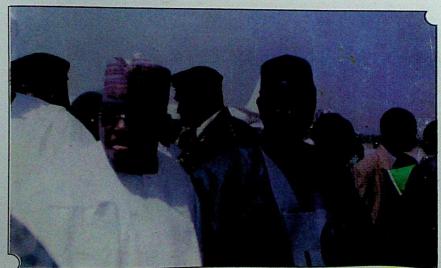

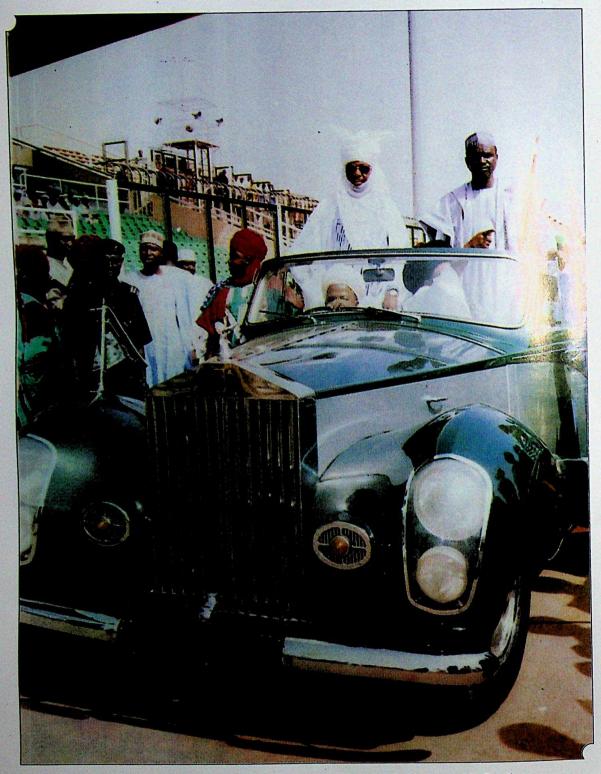
