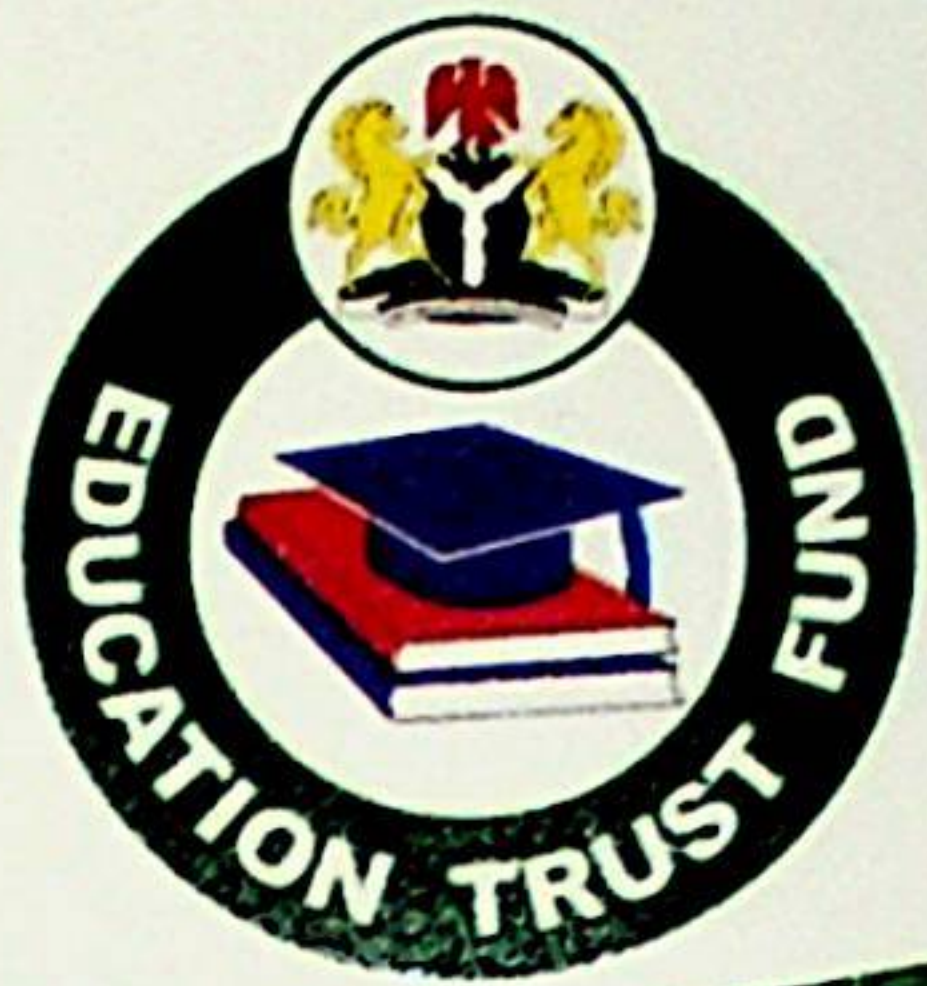

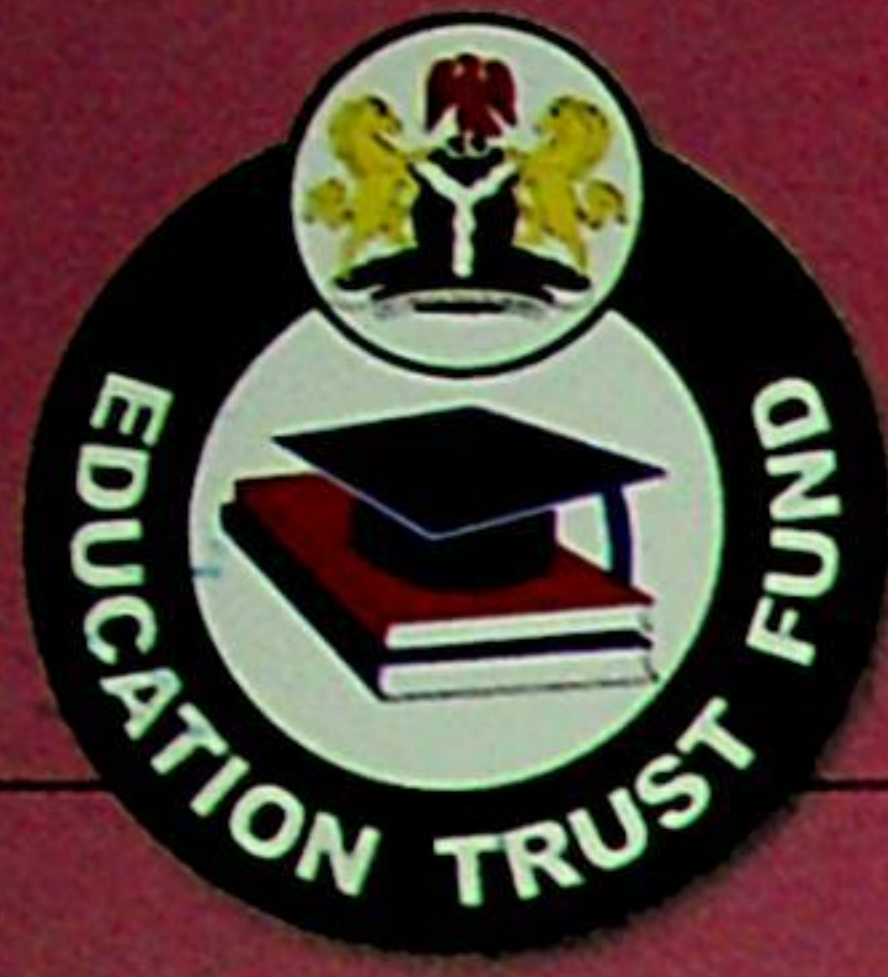

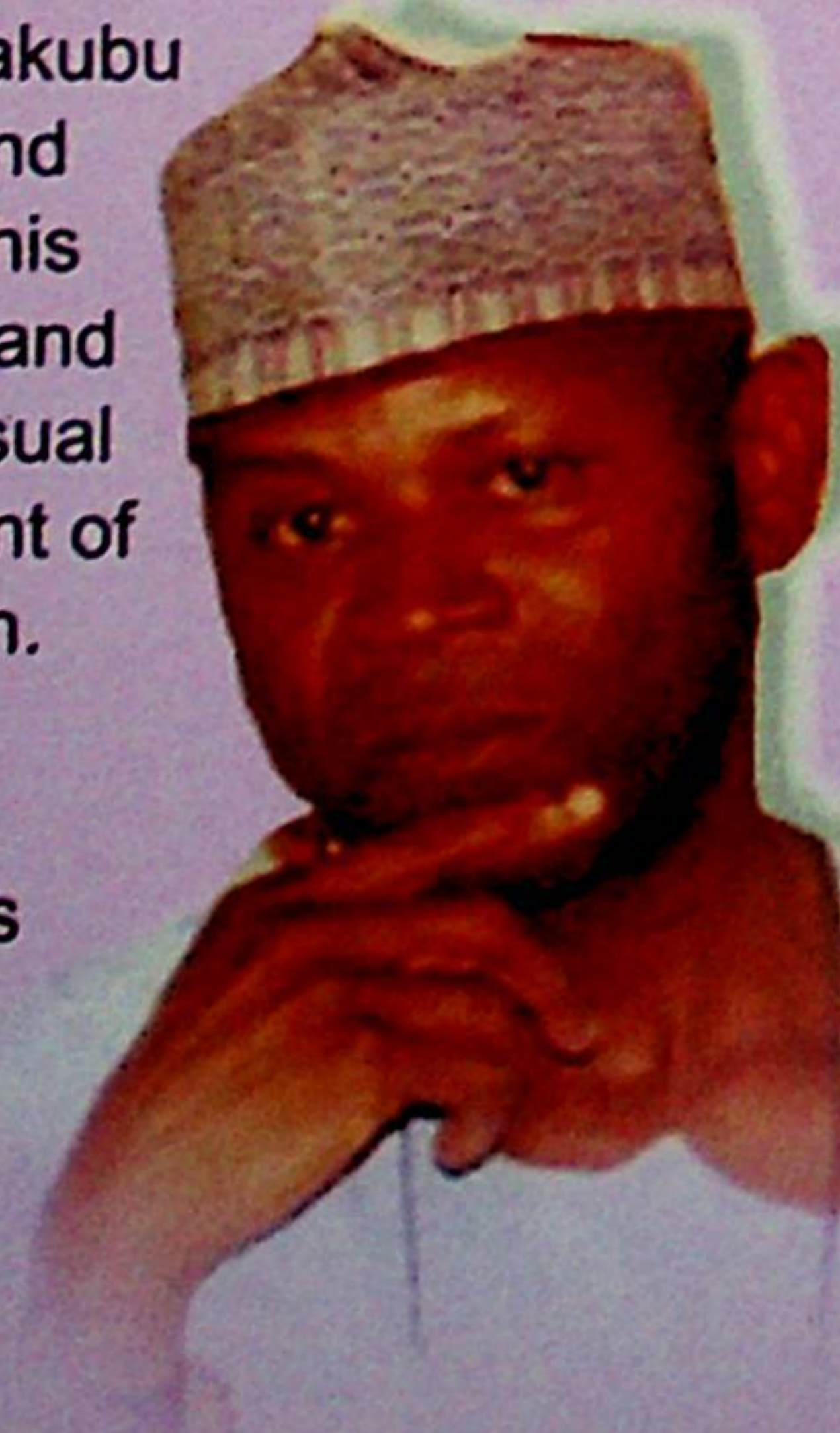
From time to time it comes up with special editions which focus on specific intervention areas undertaken by the Fund.

We therefore, expect comments and reactions from you which will help in improving our service delivery.

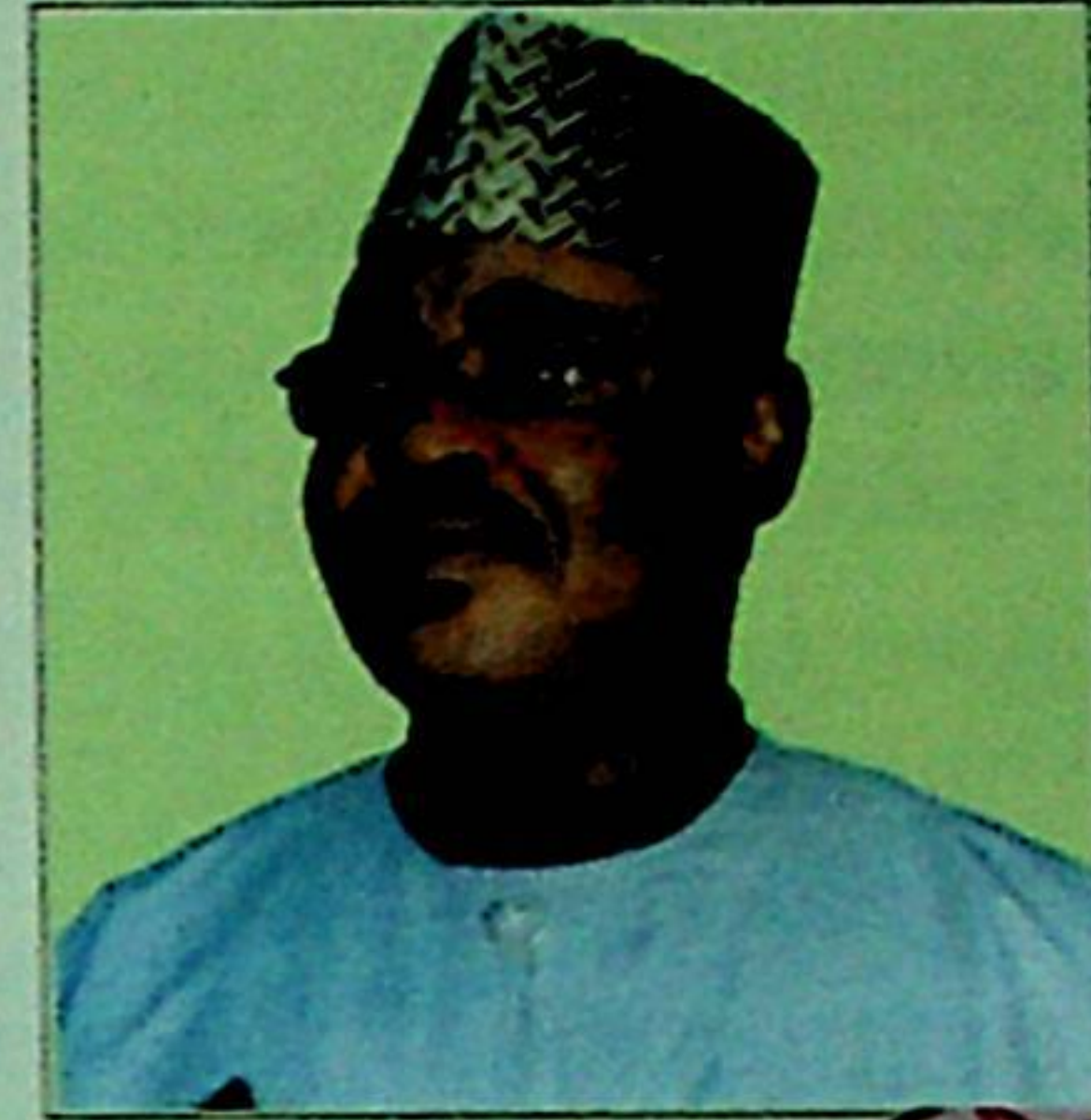

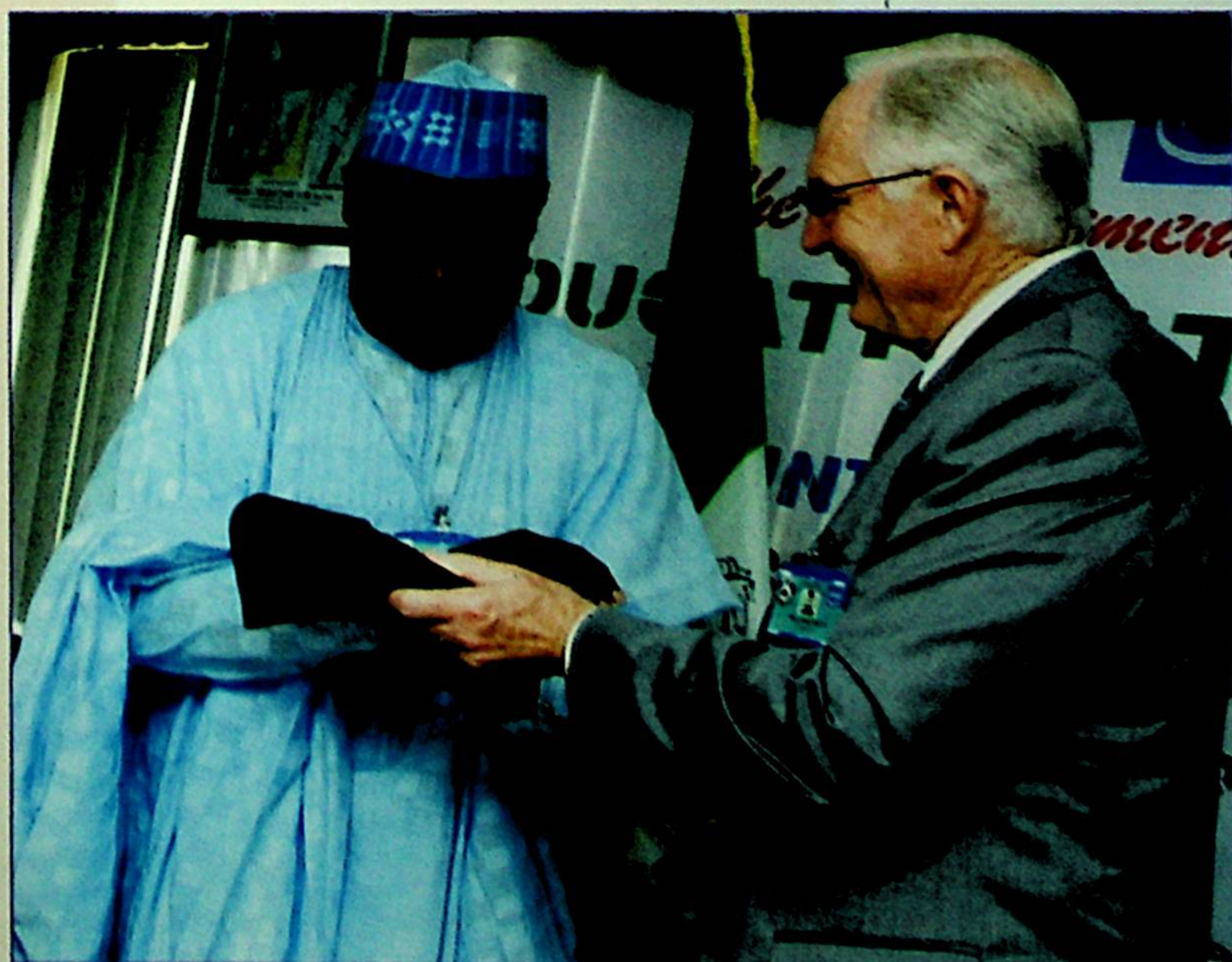
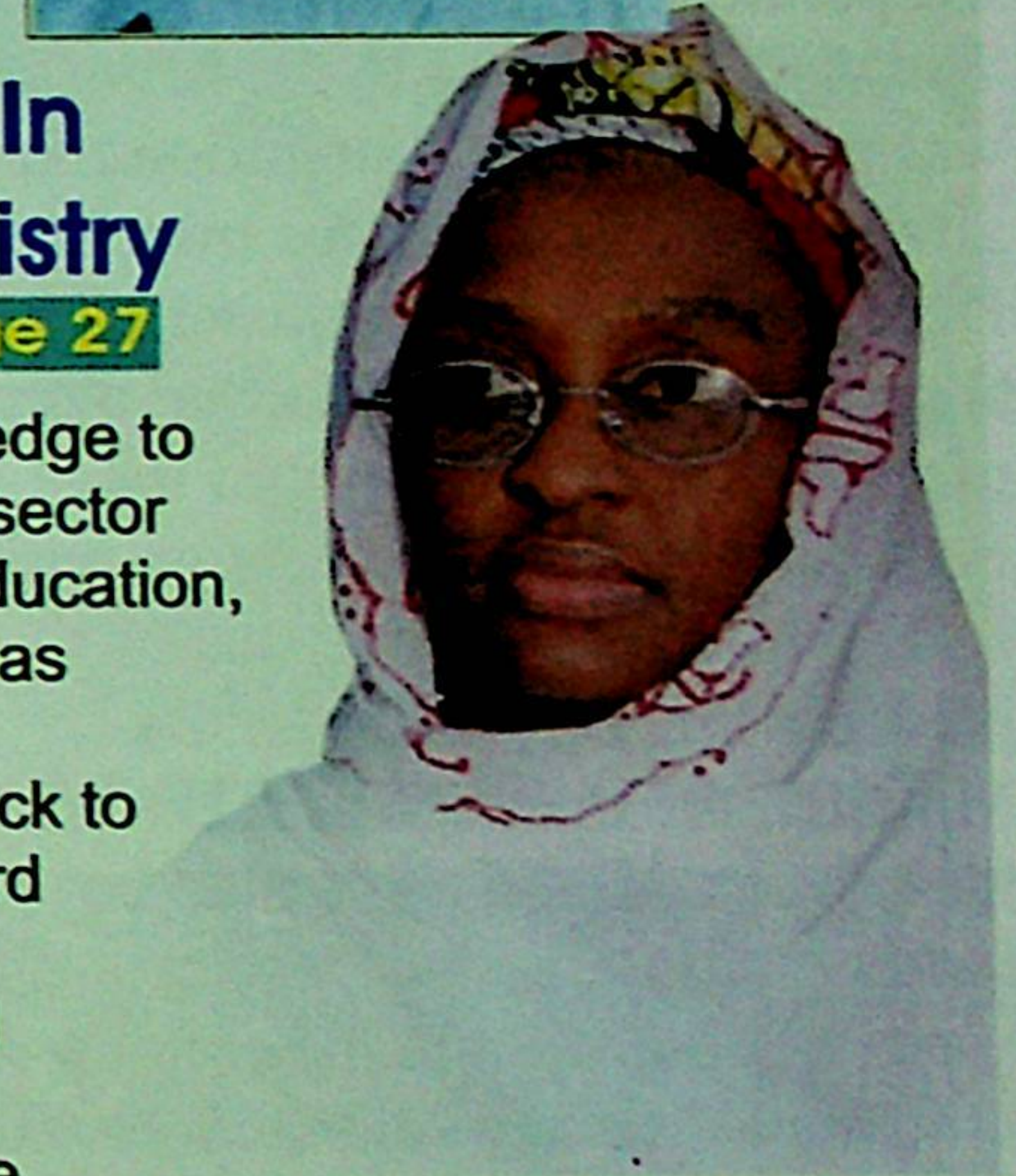

Chairman, Intel Worldwide, Visits ETF

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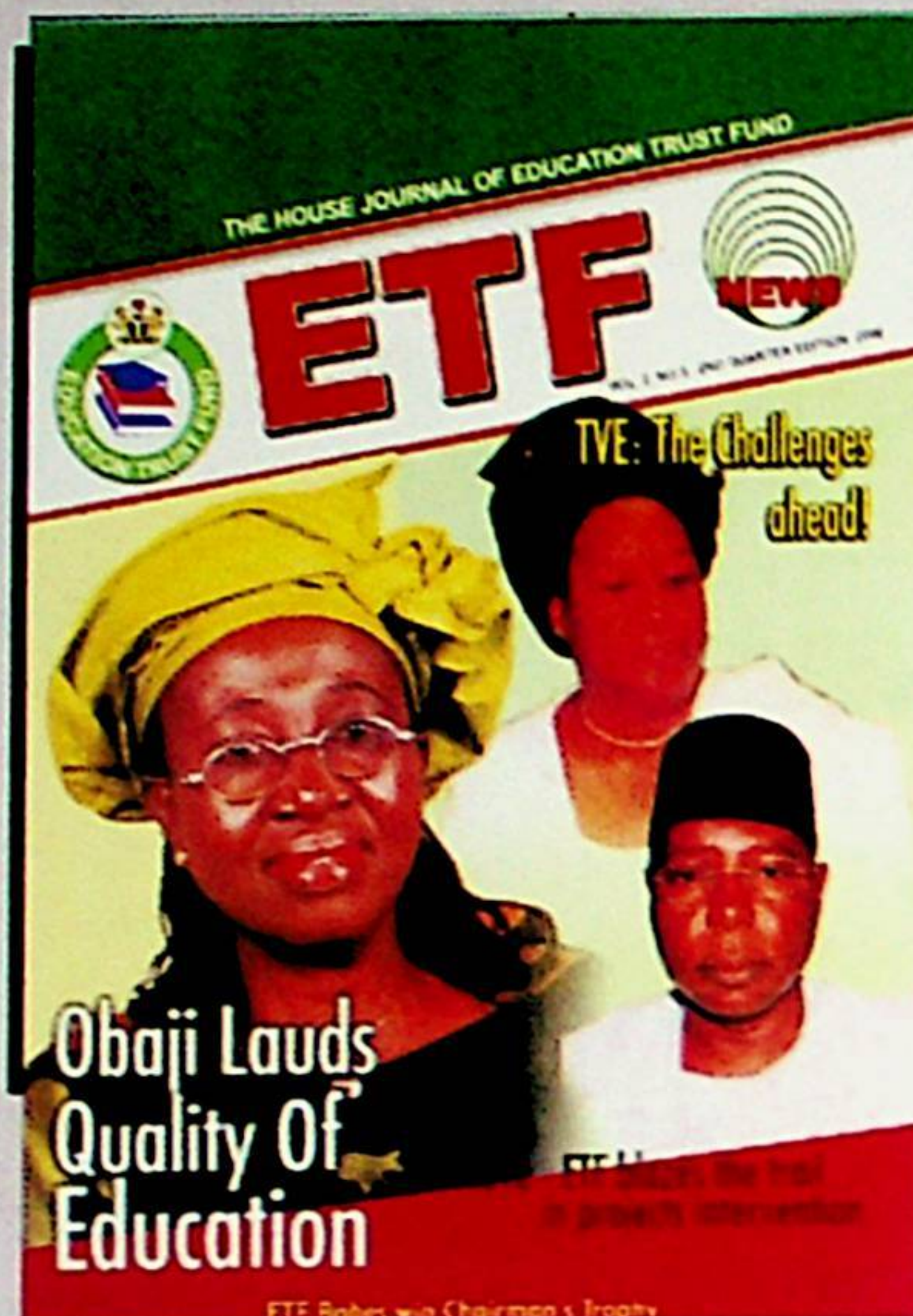

Education Ministers Visit ETF

The Honourable Minister of Education, Dr. Igwe Aja-Nwachuku, accompanied by Minister of State 1, Dr. Jerry Anthony Agada and Minister of State II, Hajiya Aishatu Dukku paid a visit to the Corporate Headquarters of the Fund. The visit, according to the Minister, was part of the familiarization tour of all the agencies under his ministry. During the visit, the Minister announced the reversal of the merger of the Scholarship Board of the Federal Ministry of Education with the ETF, which was done by his predecessor. According to the Minister, the mandate of ETF did not include award of Scholarship but funding of intervention projects at all levels of education in the country. The Minister expressed satisfaction with the Operation and Management of the ETF and pledged to offer assistance to it whenever the need arose with a view to further improving its service delivery.

Chairman, INTEL Worldwide, Visits ETF

Chairman of Intel Corporation of The United States of America, Dr Craig Barrett has assured that Nigerians would continue to benefit from the \$100 million being invested by the US-based company to improve education in Nigeria

Dr. Barrett gave the assurance when he visited the Education Trust Fund where he signed a multi-million-dollar contract agreement with the Fund. The agreement was sequel to a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) earlier signed between the ETF and Intel in 2005. It is built around a programme called "Technology Enabled Learning (TEL)", a specialized technology adoption programme for the education sector. Already, Intel, a world renown information and communication technology (ICT) company for development and promotion of ICT in education, has funded a pilot scheme at the FCT Junior Secondary School, Jabi in Abuja while Education Trust Fund financed the original deployment of the content (the digital curriculum) to the tune of \$100,000. Intel provided the portal at a total cost of \$10 million. Dr. Barrett said, there is an initiative being proposed called World Ahead Programme in which Nigeria will benefit through training of 150,000 of its teachers over the next five years in collaboration with the Federal Ministry of Education, donation of 3,000 Personal Computers (PCs) to Nigerian schools in collaboration with the Education Ministry and that of the Federal Capital Territory and adapting a \$10 million Digital Library of digital content to the Nigerian Secondary Schools

curriculum. In his response, Professor Mahmood Yakubu said Education Trust Fund was determined to maintain collaboration with Intel but appealed to Intel to expand and localise its "World Ahead Programme" in line with Current needs of ICT development in Nigeria. He suggested some key areas for consideration which included expanding the existing education curriculum, software development and the need for Intel to provide research and development support for sustained impact in the curriculum software development.

country, including the FCT, is aimed at meeting the challenges of providing adequate educational Laboratory facilities in all schools in Nigeria.

Executed at the cost of 100 million naira each, the seven ETF-funded Education Resource Centres sited in Abuja, Minna, Kano, Akure, Awka, Calabar and Gombe are designed to have the following facilities for use by both in and out-of-school students: Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Integrated Science, Home Economics and Library, Administrative block, Bus, Borehole, Generator, Equipment and Furniture.

In addition to providing the funds

for the projects, the ETF has an arrangement with the management of these centres for joint funding in the first five years of their operation after which each centre will be responsible for its maintenance and funding through the state government. So far, the resource centres in Abuja, Minna, Kano and Gombe have been commissioned while those of Akure, Awka and Calabar are at various stages of completion. Other dignitaries who graced the commissioning ceremony include the Executive Secretary of ETF, Professor Mahmood Yakubu; Executive Secretary, Nigerian Education Research and Development Council (NERDC)

ETF Appoints C'ttee On Reconciliation Of Revenue Collection, Disbursement

A Committee on Reconciliation of Financial Records on Revenue Collection and Disbursement on the Administrative/Intervention Project of the ETF has been constituted by Management Fund.

The Committee is to be chaired by the Director of Finance and Accounts, Mr. Charles Ejike Onyeador while other members are: Jacob Alada, Steve Ohue, Matthew Abu, Ifiok Ukim, Gloria Olotu, Gbenga

Arolosafe and Yahaya Yakubu who serves as Secretary. The Committee is mandated to ascertain how much has been received by the ETF as revenue collections (internally generated, government subvention and education tax) from January 1999 to date and determine how much has been allocated and disbursed by the Fund. It is also to ascertain the balances on the Fund's various expenditure sub-heads from 1999 to date.

Furthermore, the committee will reconcile the figures from the relevant Departments/Units on revenues received or generated, allocations made by the Board of Trustees and disbursements made during the period under review it is also expected to clearly show on a year by year basis commencing from January 1999 to date, the revenue and expenditure profile of the Fund which would enable Management and stakeholders have a complete and accurate picture of the financial situation of the Fund.

The Committee will, at the end of the exercise recommend any methods that will enable the Fund update its accounting records on a regular basis and help in ensuring openness, transparency and accountability in the Management of Funds in the ETF. The Committee has since been inaugurated by the Executive Secretary, Professor Mahmood Yakubu.

Speaking during her courtesy visit to the Fund, the

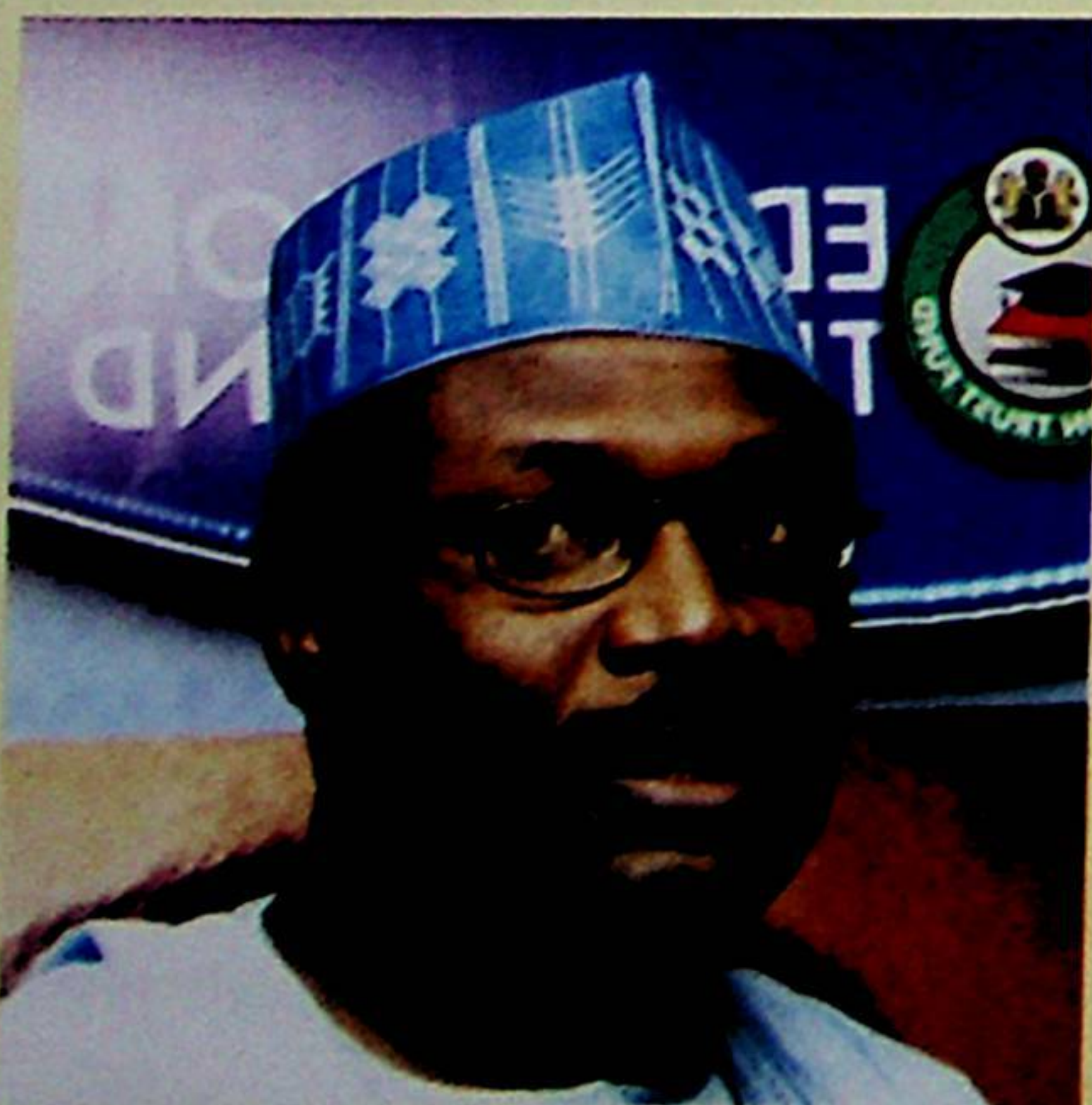

MacArthur Foundation, Carnegie Corporation Representatives Visit Executive Secretary

The Director (Africa), MacArthur Foundation, Mal. Kole Ahmed Shettima and a representative of Carnegie Corporation of New York, Ms Andrea Johnson, recently paid a courtesy call on the Executive Secretary of ETF, Professor Mahmood Yakubu.

The purpose of the call was to share experiences with the ETF to improve Higher Education in Nigeria through funding of projects, research, manpower development and provision of other facilities that would enhance teaching and learning. MacArthur Foundation & Carnegie Corporation, both US-based agencies, carry out interventions in Africa in conjunction with the partnership for Higher Education in Africa which was launched in April 2000. The initiative is designed to support efforts by leading African institutions to expand and improve Higher Education in such areas as the provision of cheaper and more reliable internet access, promotion of e-learning and enhancing access and equity in higher education. At present, MacArthur is funding a number of initiatives in four (4) Nigerian Universities: the

University of Ibadan (\$13-14 m), Ahmadu Bello University Zaria (\$8 m), Bayero University Kano (\$12 m) and the University of Port Harcourt (\$6m). Carnegie, on the other hand, is investing \$3m for three years renewable twice in two universities: the Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife and the University of Jos. In his response, the Executive Secretary of ETF, Professor Mahmood Yakubu stated that ETF appreciates the efforts of the MacArthur Foundation & Carnegie Corporation in trying to improve the Higher Education Sub-sector in Nigeria. The Fund, he said, now insists that at the tertiary level, ETF intervention MUST be deployed exclusively in projects that promote the core activities of teaching, research and the upgrading of physical

infrastructure and provision of instructional materials such as laboratories, workshops, studios, libraries, classrooms/lecture theatres and academic staff training and development. To this end, the Fund has been discouraging the application of its interventions for the construction of perimeter fence, car parks, drainages etc. The Executive Secretary strongly believes that it is only through such a re-orientation that the nation's higher institutions can be empowered to produce the world class manpower necessary for the realization of the vision and agenda of the present Administration, which are firmly rooted in Vision 20-2020 and the 7-Point Agenda. The Executive Secretary expressed appreciation to both MacArthur Foundation and Carnegie Corporation for the visit and the opportunity to

ETF Trains Teachers On Use Of Labless Science Kits

The Education Trust Fund has organized training workshops for Secondary School Teachers on the use of Labless Micro Science Kits, a project it financed.

The workshops which were held in 13 centres spread across the six-geo-political zones of the country and the FCT, commenced on Monday 16th June, 2008 at the Akwa Ibom Polytechnic, Osurua and Auchi Polytechnic, Auchi respectively.

The participants for this training, mainly science teachers were drawn from 740 schools across the country and FCT that benefited from this ETF funded Labless Micro Science Kits Intervention ie. (20 schools per state and the FCT benefited from this project).

Each state of the country and the FCT nominated 60 (sixty) participants for the training with each school providing 3 (three) teachers of Biology, Physics and Chemistry.

About 180 participants attended the training programme in each of the 13 ETF-designated training centres across the country and the FCT with the exception of the centres in Zuba FCT and Umudike Abia had 120 participants each.

The ETF committed the sum of N1.48 billion for the acquisition of the Labless Micro Science Kit and the training of Science teachers on the use of the equipment. The Labless Micro Science Kit is an innovation that would facilitate teaching and learning of sciences in our secondary schools. The kits which have 8 boxes in a set could be used for 100 different types of experiments in Physics, Chemistry and Biology anywhere ie in classrooms, homes etc without restricting such activity to Laboratories. The ETF is committed to introducing innovations and improvements in its interventions in science and technology which will enable the realization of Vision 2020.

ETF Executive Secretary Briefs Financial Consultants

The Education Trust Fund has commenced the 2nd phase of Year 2008 verification of accounts of its beneficiaries across the country. The verification exercise is one of the strategies used by the Fund to ensure best practises by its beneficiaries across the country.

The Executive Secretary of the Fund Prof. Mahmood Yakubu who was represented by the Director of Operations Mr. Emmanuel Manasa while speaking at the briefing with the Financial Consultants engaged by the Fund to undertake the verification

exercise, said that funds disbursed to ETF beneficiaries must be monitored to ensure proper utilization, transparency and accountability. He told the Financial Consultants that the Fund places high premium on this exercise in line with its commitment to efficient service delivery, transparency and accountability. He challenged them to ensure that the assignment is executed with all sense of professionalism and seriousness.

Speaking during the session, the Head, Internal Audit Unit,

Mrs Gloria Olotu, stated that the Financial Consultants engaged are expected to embark on the verification of all the account books of the Funds beneficiaries and other relevant documents such as payment vouchers, bank teller, cheque registers, store receipts/issue records vouchers, tenders board minutes, advance payment guarantees etc in order to ascertain that the beneficiaries have judiciously applied and properly accounted for the Funds disbursed to them.

The audit verification exercise is primarily aimed at achieving a better system of accounting and internal control for the funds released to ETF beneficiary institutions.

Kebbi State Governor Commends ETF

COMMANDANT EXTOLS ETF FOR PROJECTS IN ARMY SCHOOL

The Commandant of the Army school of Military Engineering, Makurdi, Brigadier General Adebayo Ashimiu Olaniyi extoled the ETF for its intervention in his school, without which he said the school could not have attained its present heights. Speaking when he paid a courtesy call on the Executive Secretary of the ETF, Professor Mahmood Yakubu, Olaniyi contended that through the support of ETF, 7 OND and 3 HND courses have been accredited by the National Board for Technical Education (NBTE). He said the school is the youngest of all the polytechnics in Nigeria which is yet to

reach its full potential. This therefore means that more courses would be introduced in the school

and it requires the support of the ETF to successfully implement these. Olaniyi, also stated that ETF is the only Government Agency that has

assisted his school since its inception. According to him, the ETF has provided the funds for the execution of 26 projects

in his school among which are; Construction of laboratories, purchase of 18 seater bus, renovation of auditorium, purchase of text books for the school library and reconstruction of a collapsed

19 meter overhead water tank. In his response the Executive Secretary of the Fund, Prof. Mahmood Yakubu said the ETF feels satisfied when its beneficiaries use funds disbursed to them judiciously. The Fund he continued, has from 2003 to date disbursed the sum of N107million to the school for various projects including staff training and development. The Fund according to him would continue to intervene in all Public schools in Nigeria in accordance with its enabling laws.

ETF Pays Final Entitlements To Staff

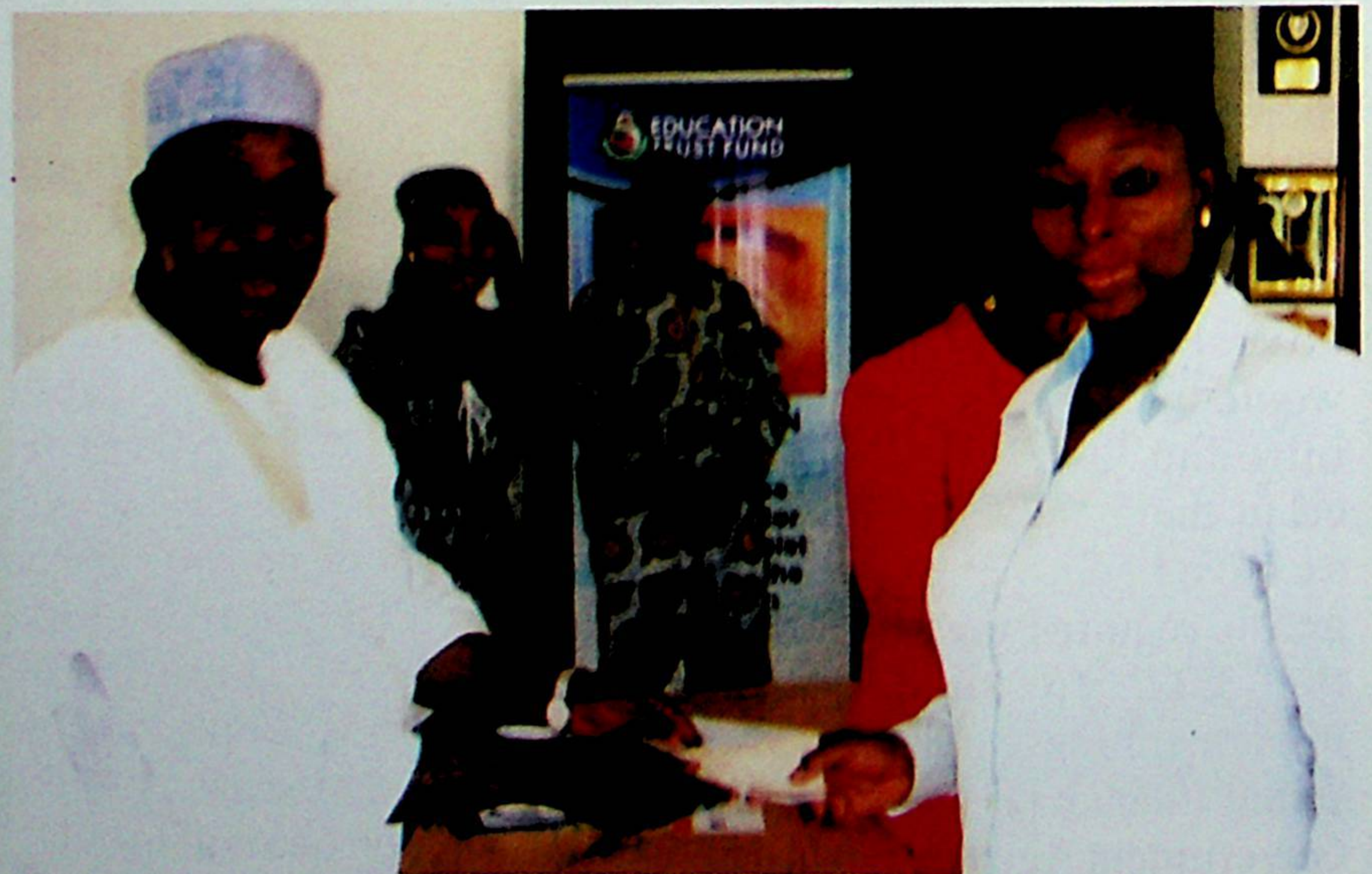

The Chairman of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) Hon. Justice (rtd) Emmanuel Ayoola recently inaugurated ETF-Anti-Corruption Unit. Speaking during the inauguration, the representative of the Chairman, Mr. Kayode Ashorobi said corruption is derived from the Latin word "Corrupt" which means to break or destroy. Literally, corruption means to break away or depart from morality, ethics, tradition, law and civic virtues. He said, one

central thread that cut across the definition of corruption is that corruption is detestable, despicable and absolutely condemnable. It is a crime in every language and cankerworm that has eaten into the fabric of our society at every level. Corruption has been responsible for the instability of successive governments in Nigeria since the First Republic.

It is an issue of great concern and a vice in our society.

Consciously, the subject of corruption has come to the front burner in our everyday discourse and subsequently agitated the minds of Patriots, Anti-Corruption Crusaders and Statesmen as to how to curb this monster. He added that from Independence in October 1960 to the establishment of the ICPC in September 2000, previous administrations have taken giant strides and established several laws aimed at fighting corruption. He said that attempts to sanitize the system did not yield the expected results since they lacked the institutional framework to combat corruption. These became worse than the

disease and Nigeria has been the worse for it. Nigeria's external image took a serious bashing, as our beloved country began to feature on top of every corruption index. He observed how Nigeria was rated the most corrupt country in the world before Chief Olusegun Obasanjo took over the mantle of leadership in 1999.

Obviously, many thorny and challenging issues stared him in the face economic, social, political, education, etc. But he could not stand the stench of corruption in the system that was bequeathed to him.

That explains the speed, vigour and flurry with which he put together the Anti-Corruption law and set up a Commission to fight the hydra-headed monster.

The government established the ICPC to implement the provisions of the Act 2000.

In response, the Executive Secretary, ETF, Professor Mahmood Yakubu thanked the Hon. Chairman ICPC and said that accountability and transparency are very crucial to the existence of ETF as an agency of government.

ETF Funded Workshop INTEL Classmate PC

The ETF recently organised a one day Workshop for some of its Stakeholders i.e. officials of Universal Basic Education, the Permanent Secretaries in States Ministry of Education and Representatives of States Commissioners of Education, on the ETF-Intel Classmate PC. The ETF-Intel Classmate PC project is meant to deliver a pedagogical educational solution using technology which ensures overall enhancement. It is a package designed by Intel and tagged "Technology Enabled Learning" programme which is geared towards

The Intel PC is a small mobile learning device assistant and educational solution designed for students in emerging market; which provides affordable and collaborative learning environments. Speaking during the opening of the workshop, the Executive Secretary, Prof. Mahmood Yakubu stated that the purpose of the interaction workshop was for working out modalities for the implementation of the project in 64 selected schools from across the Geo-Political Zones in the Country and the FCT. He therefore urged the participants to come up with their observations and recommendations. The project which is estimated to cost N433.3 million involves the engagement and deployment of IT, Project Managers, who are expected to train 4 (four) teachers in each of the selected Schools, providing each of the selected schools with 75 Classmate PCs to be used in 3 Classes (25 per Class) and 5 laptops for the Head Teachers, Teachers and Engaging Programme Implementers (Technical Support Services TSC). For the project implementation, each of the benefiting schools must ensure the provision of 1 No 5 KVA generator, 75 sets of furniture, storage facilities with burglary proofs and 3 dedicated classrooms for the project According to David Ibawah the Intel Corporation Business Development Manager the pillars of this programme which is tagged Technology Enabled Learning (TEL) include education content, connectivity and accessibility. Also, speaking at the occasion, the Permanent Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Education, who was represented by Mrs. U. E. Asomugha stated that her presence at the workshop was to observe and ensure that the programme was in line with the Policy Focus of her Ministry. According to her, the project is in line with the One-Child-One PC programme of the Federal Ministry of Education and therefore called on all the Stakeholders to ensure a successful implementation of the project in their various states in the interest of the Nigerian child.

Newly appointed Executive Secretary the Education Trust Fund (ETF), Prof. Mahmood Yakubu, has described Nigeria's population as its greatest asset, and pledged to make the Fund more responsive to its mandate, especially in the area of nurturing the population. Yakubu said this while assuming duty at the ETF headquarters in Abuja.

COMMUNIQUE

A COMMUNIQUE PRESENTED AT THE END OF A TWO DAY NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON GIRL-CHILD EDUCATION ORGANISED BY THE FEDERAL COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, ZARIA AND SPONSORED BY THE EDUCATION TRUST FUND (ETF) ABUJA HELD AT HAMDALA HOTEL FROM 5TH - 6TH AUGUST 2008

The education of the girl child has remained almost an intractable problem in Nigeria. Despite the immeasurable efforts of government and interventions of many other agencies to improve the situation, enrolment and retention, according to various records, have remained abysmally low, especially in parts of the Northern states. This situation threatens seriously the attainment of the goals of Universal Basic Education (UBE), Education for All (EFA) and the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and by implication the attainment of President Yar'adua's Seven Point Agenda. In order to focus attention on this precarious situation and seek ways of averting a further deterioration of the problem, the College of Education, Zaria with support of the Education Trust Fund (E.T.F.) organized a high level awareness campaign in the most vulnerable areas of Northern Nigeria. As part of the campaign, a two day national conference on Girl Child education that brought together stakeholders in the affected states was held at Hamdala Hotel, Kaduna. The conference was well attended by representatives of the 19 Northern States. Some of the dignitaries that attended the conference include: the Honourable Minister of State for Education II, Hajiya Aishatu Jibril Dukku, the representative of the Governor of Kaduna State, Dr. Bashir Balarabe, and the

Emir of Zazzau, Dr. H.M. Umaru (Maradin Zazzau), Professor Mahmood Yakubu, Executive Secretary ETF, Professor Nuru Yakubu, Executive Secretary N.E.C.E., Dr. Modibbo A. Mohammed, Executive Secretary U.B.E.C. Professor M. I. Juraidu, Executive Secretary NCCE, Abuja, Dr. Nafisa D. Muhammed, Executive Secretary, N.C.N.E. and Dr. M. I. Maccido, Provost Federal College of Education, Zaria. Following numerous heart touched presentations by eminent academics drawn from Universities, relevant agencies and stakeholders, constructive contributions by participants and rigorous discussions, the conference made observations as follows:

- i. There is a need to review government policy on girl child education as it affects their education after marriage. It was observed that early marriage is not necessarily a barrier to girl child education.
- ii. That there is a lot of misconceptions about the position of the Quran and Hadith on the education of the girl-child. The authentic Qur'anic position on girl-child education needs to be publicized to wipe the misconceptions and distortions amongst Muslim communities.
- iii. The conference noted regrettably that the Government at various levels, especially the Local Governments have not lived up to

expectation with respect to their commitments to education generally. Reports in the various media indicate that the local governments spend their allocations on matters other than education.

iv. The conference recognized that poverty is probably the most critical factor of participation of the girl child in education in the affected areas. It also noted the failure of such Governments to invest substantially in education.

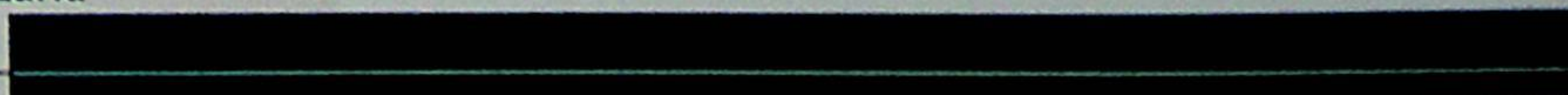


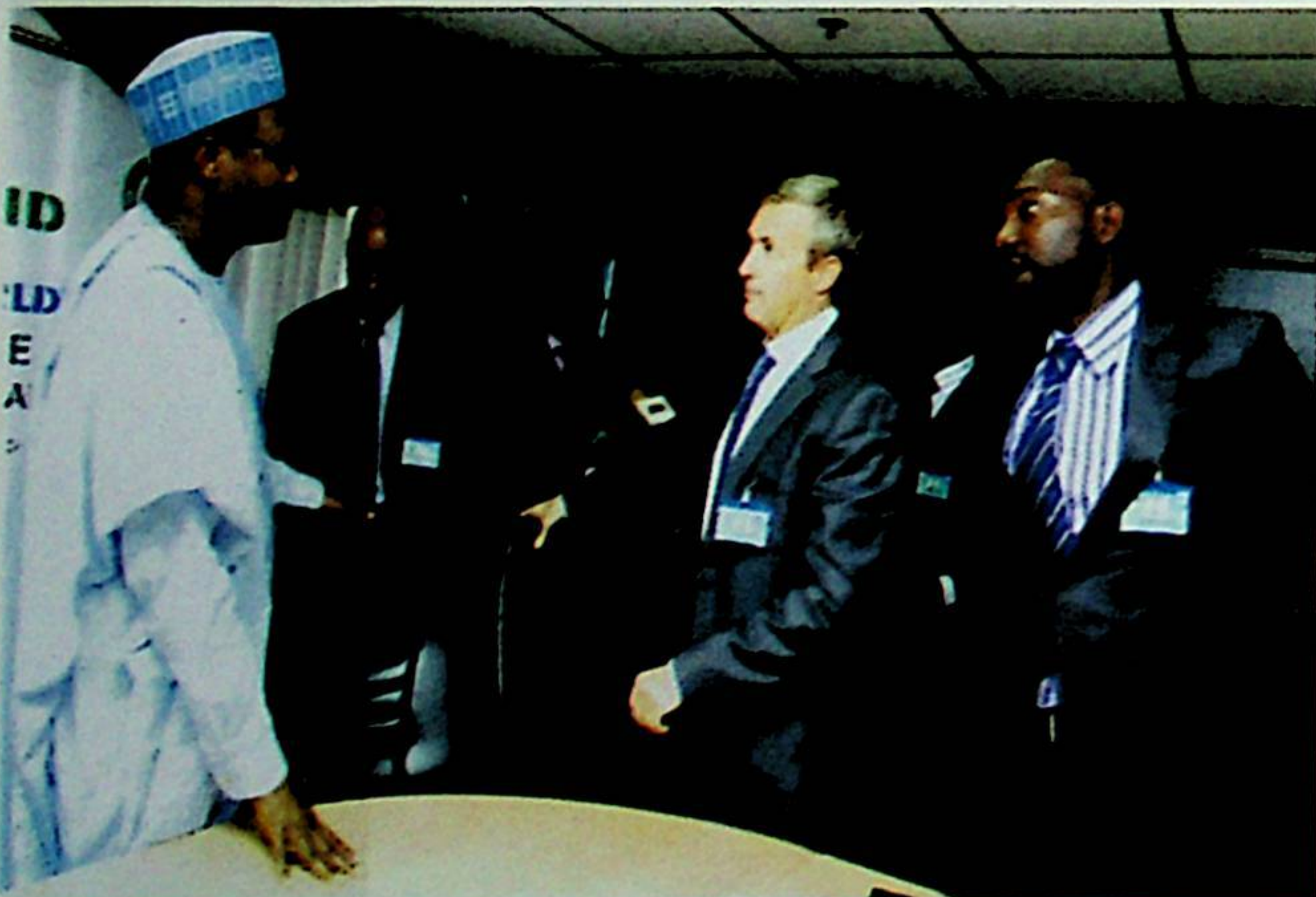

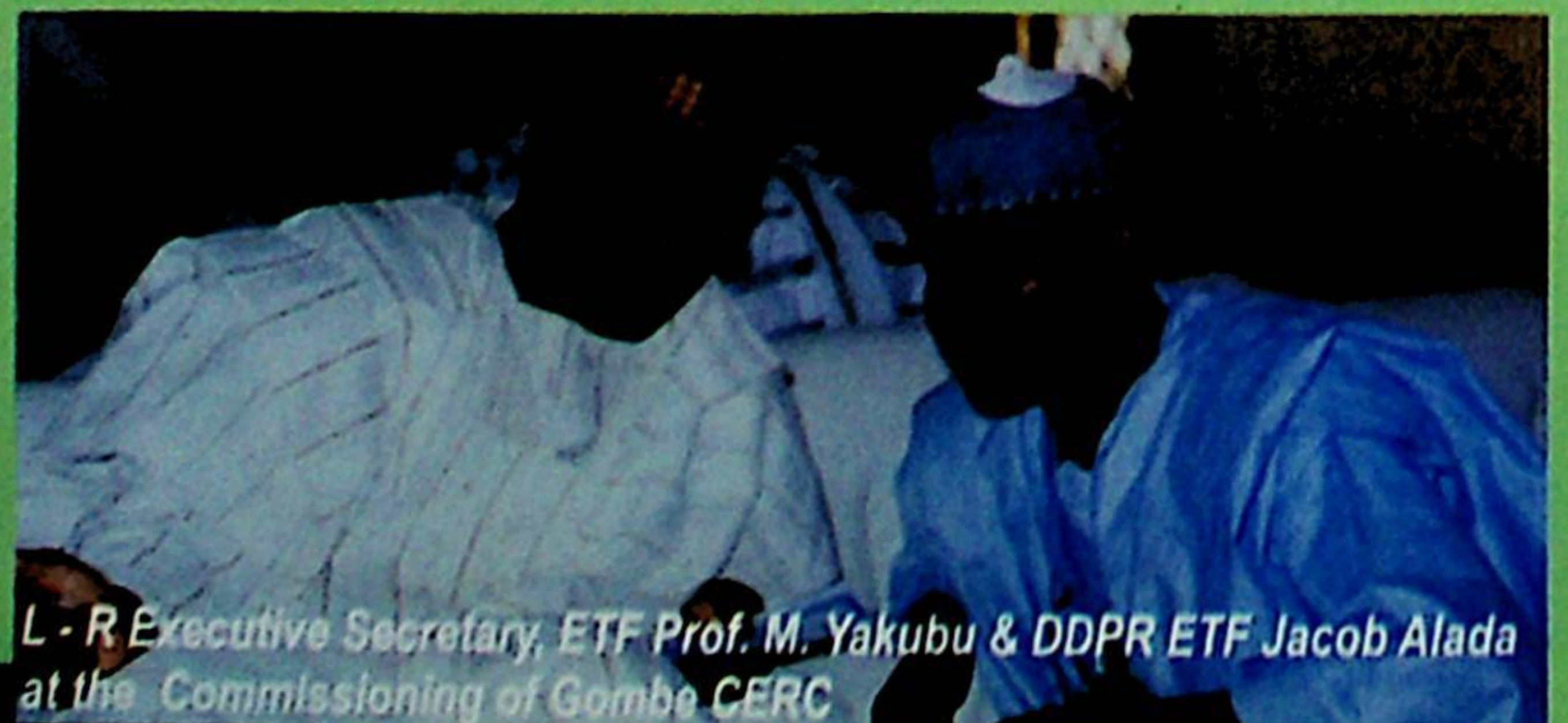

Based on the foregoing observations, the conference recommends as follows:

Ulamas on the authentic Qur'anic position of girl child education.

iii. State Governments in the most affected States should avail themselves of the special UBE funds allocated to UBEC

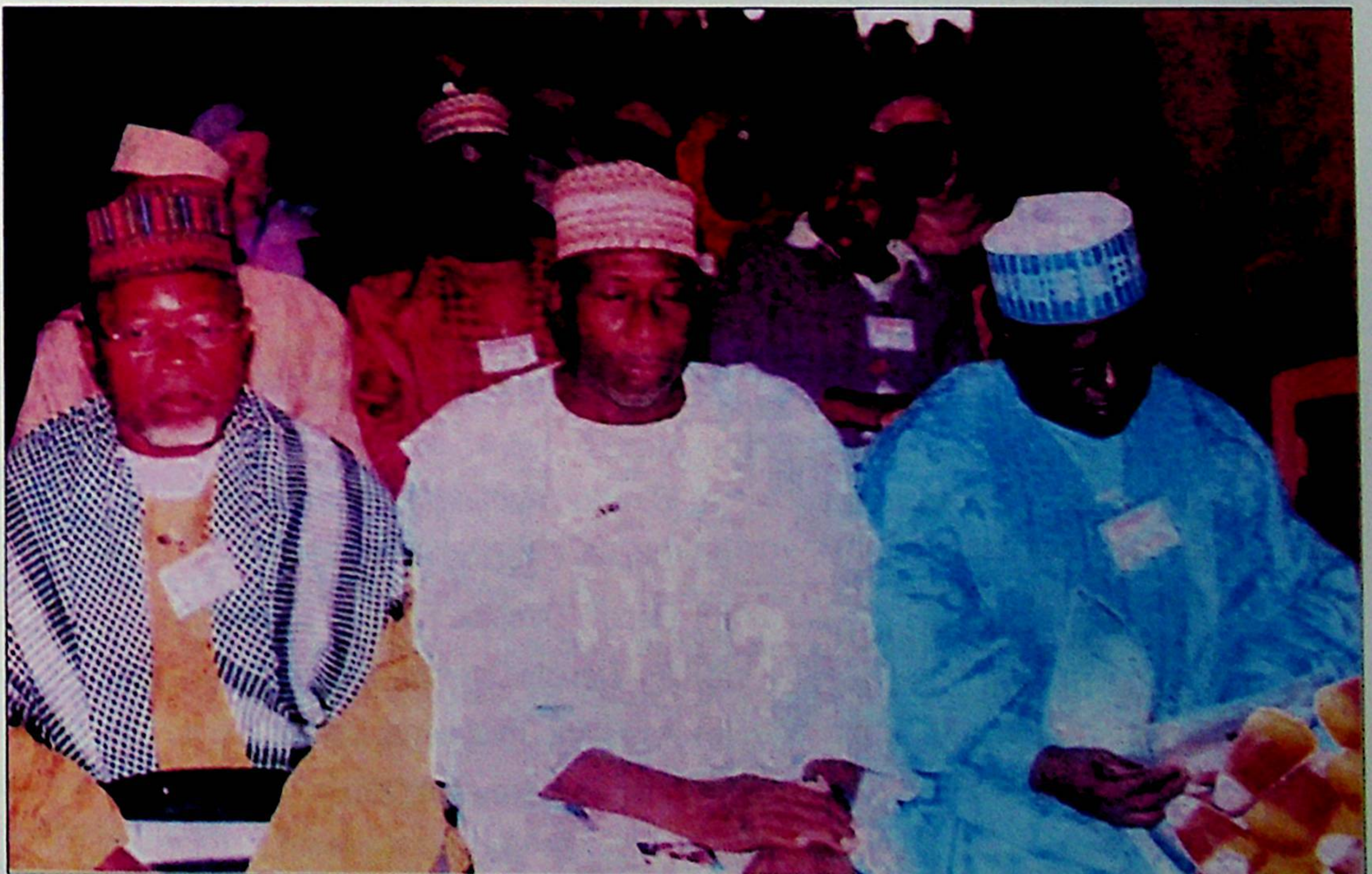

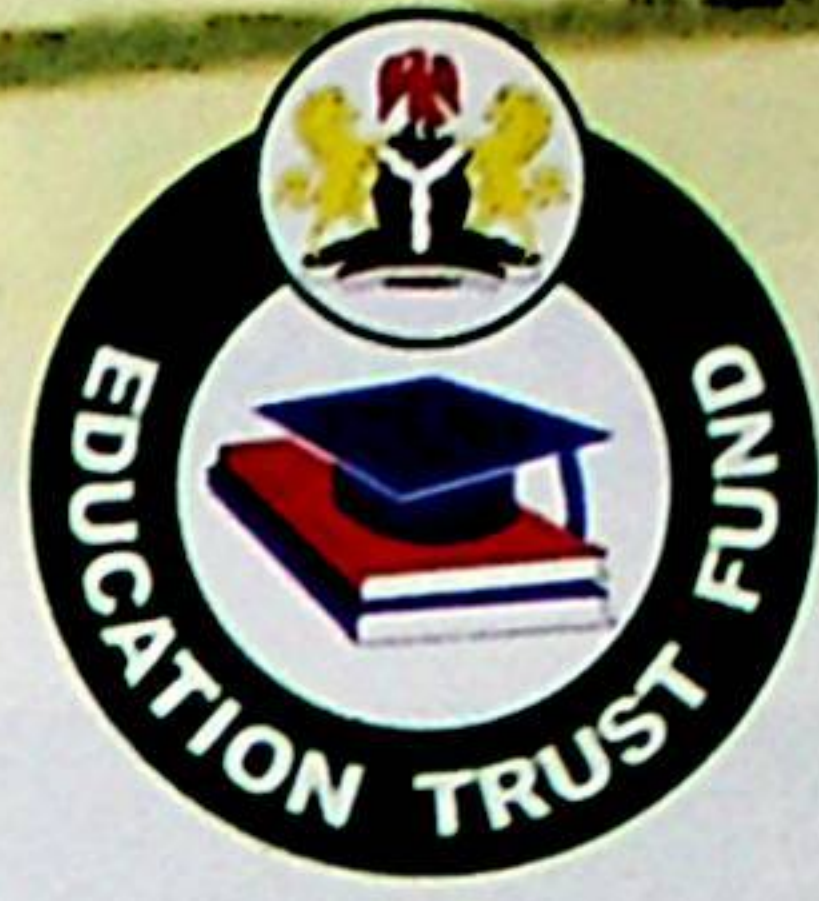

The beneficiary institutions are Kaduna Polytechnic, Yaba College of Technology, Federal Polytechnic Auchi, Akanu Ibiam Polytechnic.

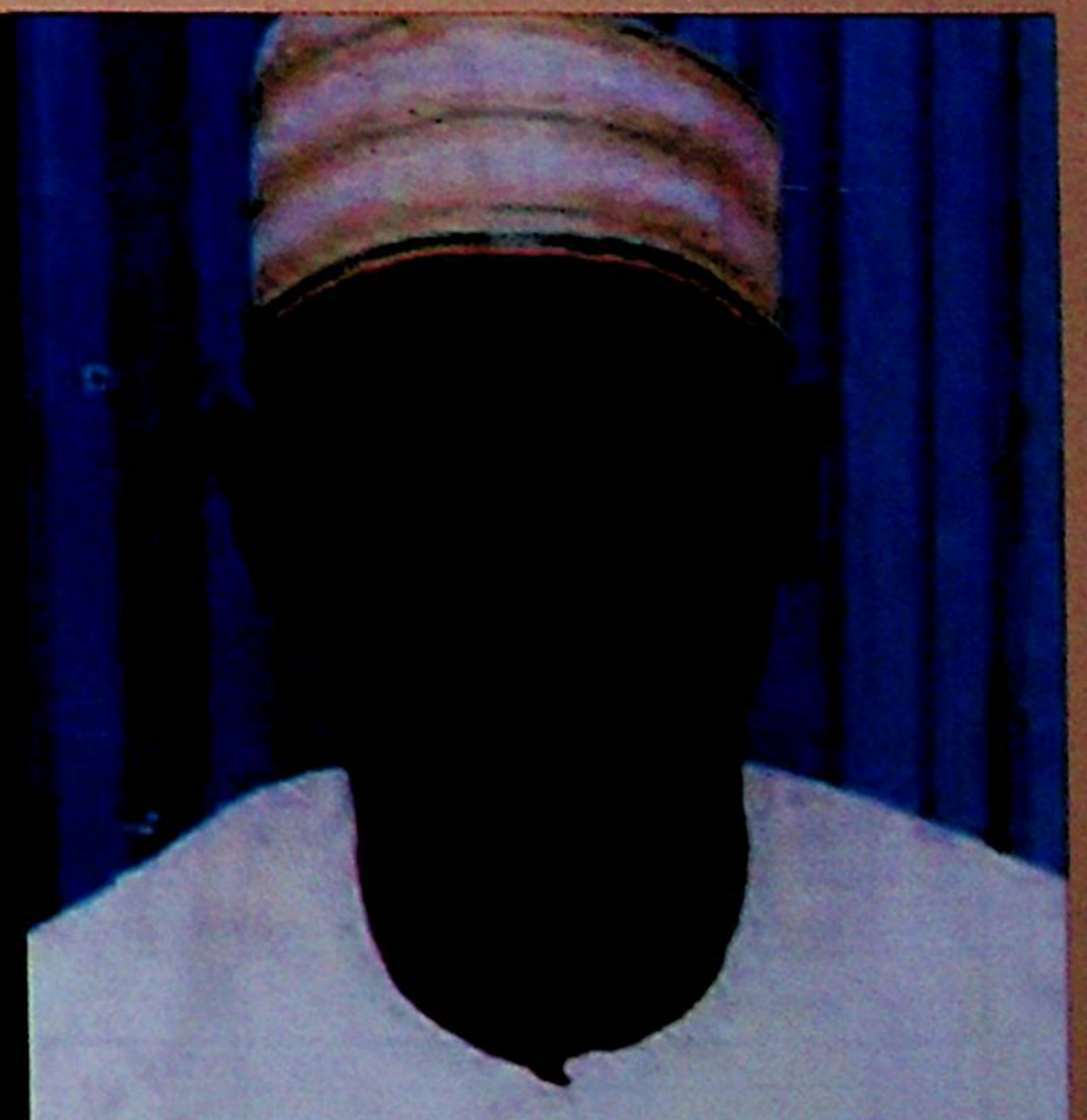
Mr. Odey Patrick Itah

POWER AND ENERGY

The infrastructural reforms in this critical sector through the development of sufficient and adequate power supply be to ensure Nigeria's ability to develop as a modern economy and an industrial nation by the year 2015.

FOOD SECURITY

The reform is primarily agricultural based. The emphasis on the development of modern technology, research, financial injection into research, production and development of agricultural inputs will revolutionize the agricultural sector leading to a 5-10 fold increase in yield and production. This will result in massive domestic and commercial outputs and technological knowledge transfer to farmers.

WEALTH CREATION

By virtue of its reliance on revenue from non-renewal oil, Nigeria has yet to develop industrially. This reform is focused on wealth creation through diversified production especially in the agricultural and solid mineral sector. This requires Nigerians to choose to work, as hard work by all is required to achieve this reform.

TRANSPORT SECTOR

The transportation sector in

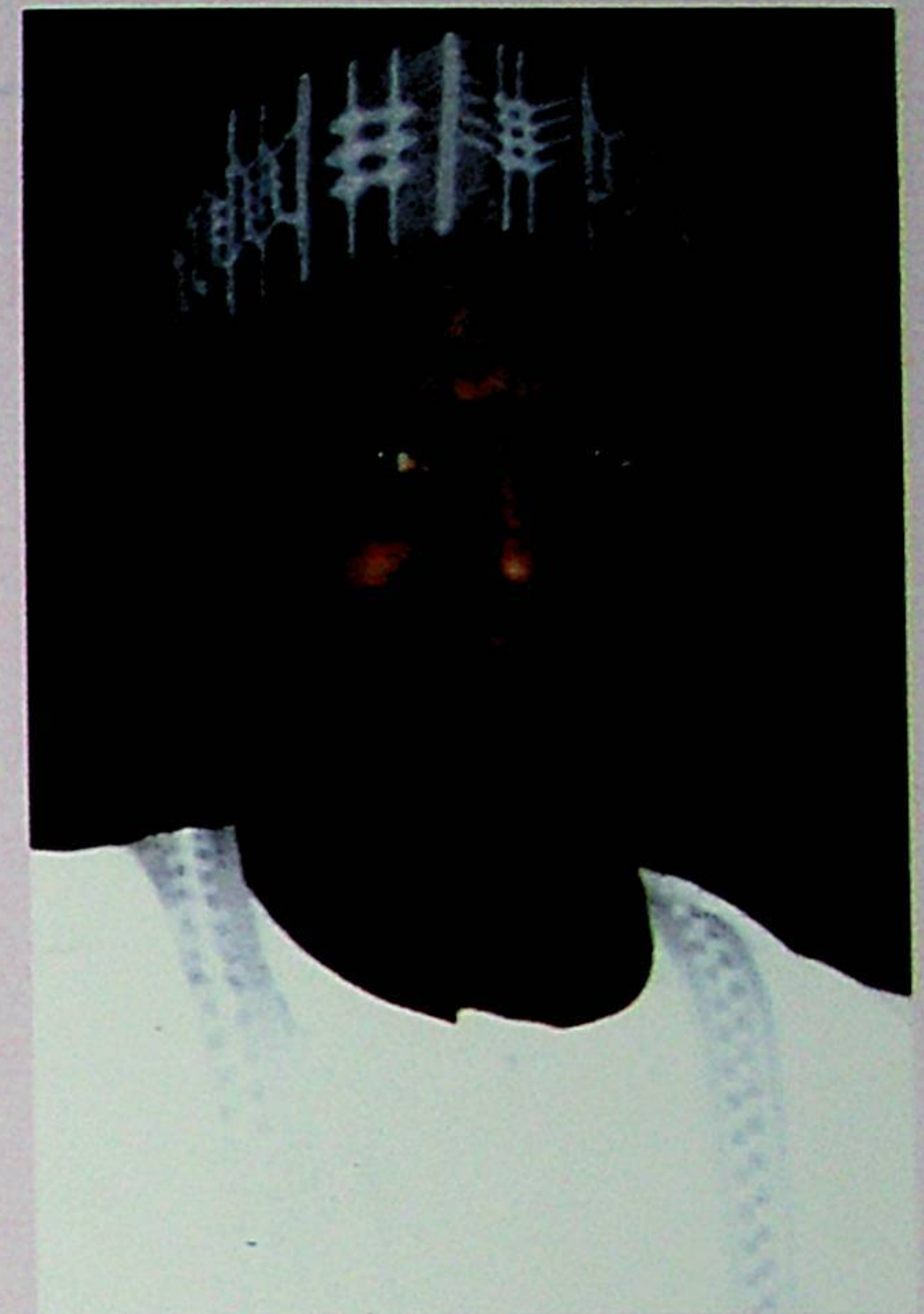
Nigeria with its poor roads networks is an inefficient means of mass transit of people and goods. With a goal of a modernized industrialized Nigeria, it is mandatory that Nigeria develops its transport sector. The PDP government has already started this process by the ongoing rehabilitation and modernization of the railway. While the reforms might take some time to take effect, it is a need that must be addressed.

LAND REFORMS

While hundreds of billions of dollars have been lost through unused government-owned landed asset, changes in the land laws and the emergence of Land reforms will optimize Nigeria's growth through the release of lands for commercialized farming and other large scale business by the private sector. The final result will ensure improvements and boosts to the production and wealth creation initiatives.

SECURITY

An unfriendly security climate precludes both external and internal investment into the nation. Thus, security will be seen as not only a constitutional requirement but also as a necessary infrastructure for the development of a modern Nigerian economy. With its



particular needs, the Niger Delta security issue will be the primary focus, marshaled not with physical policing or military security, but through honest and accurate dialogue between the people and the Federal Government.

EDUCATION

The two-fold reforms in the educational sector will ensure firstly the minimum acceptable international standards of education for all. With that achieved, a strategic educational development plan will ensure excellence in both the tutoring and learning of skills in science and technology by students who will be seen as the future innovators and industrialists of Nigeria. This reform will be achieved through massive injection into the Education sector.
