1.0	Opening Prayer The Inauguration Ceremony commenced with an opening prayer offered by Auwal, Mohammed at 11.13am.		
2.0	Opening Statement by Mr. Tunde Lawal, Director, Macro, NPC In his opening statement, Mr. Tunde Lawal, Director, Macroeconomic Analysis Department, National Planning Commission/Co-Chair of the Summit, formally welcomed all to the event. He stated that the Nigerian Economic Summit is an annual event organized by the Nigerian Economic Summit Group in partnership with the National Planning Commission (NPC) for the past 20 years. He went further to note that this was the first time an NPC Secretary is flagging the event as Executive Secretary; the first time the summit is been flagged under Mr. Jaiyeola as the Chief Executive Officer of NESG and the first Summit to be organize under the current administration of President Mohammadu Buhari. The Director, Macro expressed optimism that the Summit this year will be well organized and successful. He then called on all stakeholders to use the Summit platform to offer solutions that can move the Nigerian economy forward.		
3.0	Remarks by the CEO, Nigerian Economic Summit Group (NESG) The Chief Executive Officer, Nigerian Economic Summit Group, Mr. Laoye Jaiyeola used the forum to formally congratulate the Secretary to the Commission, Mr. Bassey Akpanyung on his appointment as the Secretary to the National Planning Commission. He pointed out the fact that the partnership between NESG and NPC which dates back to 20 years has been rewarding and should be sustained. The CEO noted that this year's Summit is very unique considering the Change Agenda of the present administration which is expected to impact on the society.		
	He said that unlike the last two summits which were sector specific in focus, NES#21 will have a broader look into key sectors of the Nigerian economy in order to achieve competitiveness, inclusive growth and sustainable development. The NESG CEO thanked the National Planning Commission for all the support and hope to receive more support and cooperation in the planning and hosting of the 21st Nigerian Economic Summit.		
4.0	Formal Inauguration of NES#21 Joint Planning Committee In his address to inaugurate the Joint Planning Committee of NES#21, the Secretary to the National Planning Commission, Mr. Bassey Akpanyung noted that the Nigerian Economic Summit has become the largest and most prestigious annual economic forum for policy makers and captains of industry from the public and private sectors of the Nigerian economy, as well as representatives of the academia, civil society organizations and development partners. That the Summit provides a unique opportunity for the participants to interact and share thoughts on key issues and challenges facing the Nigerian economy, with a view to evolving a common strategy and policy framework for addressing the observed challenges.		

He formally inaugurated the Joint Planning Committee (JPC) for the 21st Nigerian Economic Summit (NES#21).

4.0.3 Response:

Responding to the above questions, the Secretary to the National Planning Commission, Mr. Bassey O. Akpanyung and the CEO NESG Mr. Laoye Jaiyeola explained that conclusions of the Summit are usually public documents which are included in the report of the Summit and the Green Book.

5.0.1 Remarks by Public Sector Co-Chair, JPC

The Director Macro of NPC, Mr. Tunde Lawal welcomed members to the meeting and commended the leadership of the NESG and members of the Private Sector JPC for the background work already done preparatory to NES#21. He requested the Co-Chair, Private Sector to brief the Committee on what has been done so far.

The Co-Chair, Private Sector, Dr. Biodun Adedipe remarks was centred on the need and how to deliver a successful NES#21. He pointed out that it is a huge responsibility on the JPC to deliver a Summit that is more successful and implored members to be committed all through the planning process.

8.0 NES#21 Rationale & Theme

Mr. Laoye Jaiyeola, CEO, NESG informed the meeting that the key thrust of NES#21 would be to facilitate stakeholders' discussions/ agreements about how best to achieve competitiveness and inclusive growth in a sustainable way, through measurable outcomes. He noted that, key outcomes will include current national scorecard in addition to specific recommendations on how to create jobs; dismantle the pillars of corruption; establish and build upon pillars of sustainable growth and development; and align Nigeria's long term development agenda with the UN Sustainable Development Goals that will take effect in January 2016.

He maintained that the Summit must emphasize the need for strong will to execute on the part of all stakeholders, particularly the Government hence appropriate accountability framework on how to ensure the emergence of a truly prosperous nation will be adequately addressed during the Summit.

On the theme for NES#21, the CEO, NESG recalled that NES#20 focused on the theme "Transforming Education Through Partnership for Global Competitiveness" which was sector specific. However, in consideration of the present realities and focus of the present Government, the Summit Group is proposing the theme "Tough Choices: Achieving Competitiveness, Inclusive Growth and Sustainability" for the 21st Nigerian Economic Summit. He charged the JPC to identify and come up with what really are the key issues in making Tough Choices for Nigeria.

The meeting agreed on the proposed date of 13th - 15th October, 2015 for the 21st Nigerian Economic Summit. Venue: Transcorp Hilton, Abuja. Also, the meeting agreed on the proposed Summit Theme and Sub-Committees were directed to meet and come up with alternative Sub-Themes for discussion and consideration by the JPC/Central Organizing Committee.

Plenary IV: Reforming Public Institutions

According to the Presidential Committee on the Rationalization and Restructuring of Federal Government Parastatals, Commissions and Agencies; inaugurated by the former administration and headed by Mr. Steve Oronsaye, there are 541 federal statutory agencies operating across all sectors of the Nigerian economy.

Collectively referred to as Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs); several of these institutions have either vague or overlapping areas of responsibilities; and have therefore become ineffective and redundant – in several cases, they actually constitute bottlenecks that breed corruption and stifle private enterprise. These myriad institutions are also major contributors to the increasing cost of governance (as annual budgetary allocations have to be made to meet their recurrent expenditures). In addition to the adverse impact on national competitiveness, there is no mechanism for effective coordination amongst the MDAs; which results in policy/regulatory inconsistencies and poor implementation of plans. The Federal Government has consequently become a massive and unwieldy bureaucracy.

This session starts with a background presentation on a summary of recommendations from recent attempts at reforming public institutions and laws or institutional processes that inhibit competitiveness.

The session will also facilitate experience-sharing by a leader who has successfully spearheaded reforms in the public sector; with the objective of suggesting practical 'howtos'; providing examples of necessary tough choices; and inspiring visions of a new Nigeria with efficiently-run public institutions.

Through subsequent panel discussions and delegates' interaction, the session will seek to drive an agenda for the implementation of much needed reforms of public institutions. Beyond achieving a lean public service, the session will also make strong recommendations on tools/best practices for achieving efficiency, including mandatory use of ICT to integrate/coordinate the activities of various agencies e.g the Nigeria Customs Service, Nigeria Immigration Service, National Identity Management Commission, etc.

electorate. An effective legislature is one that fully utilizes sitting time and passes high impact legislation whilst in session. Various indicators have been developed to assess the individual legislators in different democracies to adjudge which legislators are effective and which are not (known as legislators effectiveness scores). Whilst this workshop is not aimed at assessing individual legislators, given that the NASS was only recently convened and went on recess almost immediately, this workshop is designed to determine what practices and changes are required to ensure that the 8th NASS is more effective than the previous one and that during this assembly, Nigerians will benefit from lawmaking that impacts development positively. The workshop will examine synergies between the National Assembly and the private sector.

Design Workshop III: Sustainable Solutions for Peace and Threats to Human Security

There is need for concerted solutions to threats to human security influenced by triggers set off by impacts of climate change (eg desertification) and business practices (eg. oil exploration and offshore deep-water trawling), which have increasingly become drivers of conflict. These practices cause human displacements, high inequality, imbalance in social benefits, fragility, resentment and latent or actual conflict, resulting in significant decrease in economic productivity.

Various approaches to mitigate impacts have been explored including amnesty, formal and informal security to safeguard human lives, baseline studies for best practice in remediation (eg recharging Lake Chad or restoration of Niger delta degraded areas), promotion of conflict sensitivity due diligence and the strengthening of civil society engagement with businesses and government. However, success has been elusive despite huge investment of resources thus adversely impacting GDP and FDIs, significantly.

This session will present options for bridging the gaps in current approaches; suggest mitigation measures and best practice for conflict sensitive business practices that would improve security in such areas. The sessions will also seek ways of improving early warning signals and response to environmental triggers; integrating conflict sensitivity into business risk management and corporate responsibility programmes, in order to facilitate a sustainable business environment.
