

The Basic Health **Care Provision Fund**

Nigeria has consistently produced some of the worst health outcomes in the world.

58,000

women die each year in Nigeria due to pregnancy and childbirth related causes, making Nigeria the second largest contributor to maternal mortality in the world. 2,300

The National Health Act & the Basic Health Care Provision Fund

- The National Health Act (NHA) No. 8 of 2014 ("2014 NHAct') was enacted to ensure improved health outcomes, to provide a legal framework for the provision of health care services, and to establish an organisational and management structure for the health system in Nigeria.
- It establishes **The Basic Health Care Provision Fund (BHCPF)**. The BHCPF is to be funded through an annual allocation of not less than 1% of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.
- In June, 2018, President Muhammadu Buhari signed the 2018 Budget Appropriation Bill into law, providing N55.15 billion for the BHCPF.
- This will fund the provision of a Basic Minimum Package of Health Services.


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State Governments are essential to the success of the BHCPF.

- The BHCPF is an excellent vehicle with which to achieve this.
