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

FOREWORD

FROM PASSION TO ACTION TOWARD THE MAKING OF A LEGACY

As the sun sets on the eight-year administration of Governor Rauf Aregbesola in Osun State (which the administration prefers to call the State of Osun), one thing on which the supporters and opponents of the administration would find common ground, beyond the gulf of divergent rhetoric and strong views vigorously held on the quality and quantum of his achievement in office, is the fact that the Governor was never a bench warmer or somebody given to letting feathers be without ruffling them. Right from 27 November 2010 when he assumed office, Governor Aregbesola was passion personified as he drove his administration to commit itself to a set of actions meant to transform the state. In style and substance, in the high drama of office and the grassroots approach to content/programme delivery, he made it clear to all that his administration was not going to do business as usual but draw on unusual sources and practices in fashioning out a comprehensive, people-oriented agenda of development for the state.

This publication acknowledges, reflects and celebrates this passion and actions as it addresses elements of the legacy of this iconoclastic figure who found himself in the exalted office of state governor. To be sure, a governor by definition is required to settle down to a routine fashioned by settled beliefs, practices and institutions. Interesting times are, therefore, guaranteed when all this is put at the disposal of a helmsman strongly committed to breaking out of conventional matrix in an urgent bid to move his people and land toward development for all. Understandably, therefore, the contents of the publication reflect the interesting times that they seek to document.

To be sure, what we get in the pages ahead are largely the official accounts of the records of the goverhor in office. By their very nature, official accounts can provide only one set of narratives; namely, the nametives that detail the work-a-day achievements of their sponsors. That is the way these things get done, and to expect otherwise is perhaps to expect too much. What impresses me in what this publication offers to the discerning public is how amazingly detailed its contents are in terms of the statistics, graphics, tables, pictures, comments, narratives, assessments, interviews and other dimensions of the records of the eight years of rule that it captures for the record. We encounter the voices of officials of government in these pages. In addition, however, we also encounter the voices, faces and spaces of the people.

The book is as ambitious and unusual in its conception as it is in the breadth and depth of the subjects that it covers. In a sense, it offers an insight into the intellectual robustness and commitment to record-keeping of the Aregbesola administration and yet again underscores the government's commitment to business unusual, even in its last weeks in office, and with an eye to the future – what other administration would see the benefit of splashing so much information on its actions in office on paper (and on electronic platforms, perhaps?) for public consumption in this age of secrecy in the governance of the public sphere?! At yet another level,

it is a positive commentary on the capacity of the public bureaucracy, working in cooperation with other experts, to deliver such rich material in times such as this when the effectiveness and efficiency of public bureaucracies in Nigeria have become a source of great concern.

In terms of its subjects, the publication covers issues of general interest in the Aregbesola legacy in such areas as the economic, fiscal and welfare realities of the state in the period 2010-2018, the state's relationship with development partners, as well as an interesting analysis that locates the state in regional and national contexts. Beyond such issues, the bulk of the publication focuses on the legacy of the administration in the running of government business. including education; infrastructure (roads and renewal projects); rural development; social investments; youth empowerment; finance and the economy: trade, industry and investments; security; enviromment and sanitation; water resources; culture and tourism; agriculture; public service efficiency; health; emoluable policies; sport, and civic engagement, among others. In this regard, it is not surprising that, given the administration's commitment to human development, the subjects that took more than average space in the book include rural development, education, and infrastructure (roads and renewal projects).


I commend this publication to Osun State indigenes and all those interested in the rich official accounts of the legacy of the Aregbesola administration in the state either as partisans or as objective observers. Surely, the quality of public discourse on governance at the sub-national and national levels in Nigeria stands to be further enriched by publications such as this one – and especially more so when such publications encourage others to write similar accounts of stewardship, or pen critical response to such accounts.

The bottom line, of course, should be how such publications serve the urgent needs of the people, not the ephemeral egos of those who find themselves temporarily in office. The overall message at the

recent launch of the 2018 Ibrahim Index of African Governance (IIAG) related to the tendency for the benefits of recent economic gains, among others, not translating into sustainable economic (and other) opportunities for the people, including better job opportunities, improving quality education, addressing longstanding neglect of rural areas and the urban poor, among others, with the warning that "the worry is that we are going to lose out on the incredible opportunity that is our people".

We have before us a publication that provides a narrative of an attempt to address this worry, among others, at the subnational level of a state within the putative Nigerian federation. That location itself has offered special challenges, but equally wonderful opportunities. Only very recently, a report by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) of Nigeria and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) indicated that Osun State has the lowest poverty rate in Nigeria, despite public discourse on challenges arising from payment of salaries to public servants in the state. Can this achievement in regard of poverty rate be traced principally to the legacy of Aregbesola and his government, or principally to something beyond the legacy of the administration, or to both?


The result? On this, the jury is out, but it does help to have on record this account of what transpired under the Aregbesola administration in Osun State, Nigeria. SYNOPSIS OF THE PERFORMANCE OF OGBENI RAUF AREGBESOLA'S ADMINISTRATION (2010-2018)

In Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's first term inauguration speech after he was sworn in as the Governor of Osun on the 27th of November, 2010, he proclaimed that he would run an unusual government, and he indeed hit the ground running through the implementation of well-thought-out policies, programmes and projects that put human development at their nucleus. These policies, programmes and projects had been earlier elucidated in a Six-Point Integral Action Plan which was well documented in "The Green Book" titled My Pact with the People of Osun - widely distributed during his campaign to seek election as Governor. The highlights of the Six-Point Integral Action Plan are to: banish hunger, banish poverty, banish unemployment, promote healthy living, promote functional education and promote communal peace and progress. By the end of the first term in office, he had practically fulfilled each and every promise he made.

This book is a broad-ranging account of the phenomenal achievements of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration in key sectors of the State Government between 2010 and 2018. Importantly, innovations that underpinned many of the initiatives that were conceptualized and implemented by the administration are highlighted and brought to the fore. The following sectors are covered: Education, Infrastructure, Rural Development, Social Investments, Health, Finance & Economy, Sports, Omoluabi Policies, Public Service, Agriculture & Food Security, Culture and Tourism, Water Resources, Environment & Sanitation, Security, Trade, Industry & Investment.

ithout mincing words, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola has ted the State of Osun from an obscure State in terms development, to an all-time high level amongst the omity of States in Nigeria. The radical educational rerms undertaken during his tenure caught the attenon of international organizations (UNDP, UNICEF, NESCO among others). Before Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesa's administration in 2010, Osun students' perforance in WAEC - percentage of students with minium 5 credits including Mathematics and English was .6%; by 2017, the percentage has risen to 44.59%. This as not just happenstance, this change was brought out through series of deliberate, radical and compreensive policies and programmes that turned around e status quo of education in the State. The starting finit was an adjucation summit chaired by Professor ole Soyinka held between 7th and 8th February, 2011 th many education veterans and experts in attenince, where a comprehensive review of the status of lucation in the State was done, and a radical way forand to reposition education for good was agreed

egbesola's intervention in education is centred largeon major policy reforms; teacher training and huge hool infrastructure development. In 8 years, Osun ined over 30,000 teachers, delivered over 3,685 new assrooms, and built over 120 new world-class schools: elementary schools, 43 middle schools and 11 high hools. The latter has 792 standard classrooms and faties capable of accommodating 3,000 pupils per nool. The revision and rejuvenation of Osun Elemen-School Feeding and Health Programme -MEALS) in 2012 enabled the state government to ed well above 254,000 pupils in elementary 1-4 every nool day. Since 2012, the programme has served over million plates of nutritious meals, profitably enged 3,007 female community food vendors and ousands of farmers, and ultimately inspired the Nanal Home-Grown School Feeding Programme with a neficiary coverage of 9.2 million children. O-MEALS seived commendation from the UNDP, Partnership Child Development, Imperial College London, Brit-Parliament among other notable organizations.

The introduction of calisthenics programme is a initiative that helped to infuse the virtues of tear resilience, cooperation and tenacity among the Moreover, the introduction of Edu-Marshall curl menace of truancy and street-wandering as schoolchildren. Another area of unprecedented impact by the actration is road infrastructure. Between 2011 and the administration constructed over 1136.44 kilosof roads: 381.89 kilometres of inter-city roads, 25 lometres of township roads, 180.92 kilometres of highway roads, 87.40 kilometres of highway roads 231.06 kilometres of council roads. This figure is colossal. In addition to this, 5 major bridges, 500 verts and two interchange points were constructed.

The Aregbesola administration also has a parfocus on rural roads under its broad rural ent strategy of opening up as many farming commas possible to markets. Osun Rural Access Mobili gramme (O-RAMP) supported by the World Barrench Development Agency equally impacted communities by an additional construction of 50 metres rural roads connecting culverts and be across rivers for inter-community and market a Dosun was the first pilot intervention, and it remains the performer as a World Bank pilot study ready been delivered through O-RAMP while more struction is opposited.

With respect to community and rural development, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola fulfilled his manifesto promise through the instrumentality of Rural Water and Environmental Sanitation Agency (RUWESA), Community and Social Development Programme Agency (CSDP) and European Union-Water Supply and Sanitation Sector. Through this, his administration was able to provide access to rural roads, electricity, water through hand-pump and motorized boreholes, primary health centres, town halls, civic centres, recreational centres, oil palm processing centres among others across rural communities of the state as detailed in this book.

Youth Empowerment was a major focus of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola who strategically established the Osun Youth Empowerment Scheme (O-YES). The scheme engaged 20,000 unemployed youths within 100 days of his administration in 2010 to provide community service across the state in exchange for a monthly stipend. O-YES sought to tackle the menace of unemployment under the multifaceted focus of social welfare, community service, training and exit. The programme has two years' lifespan and each volunteer is entitled to a N10,000.00 monthly stipend. OYES has engaged 60,000 youths so far. In 2010, unemployment rate was at soaring rate of 17.2% - 27th highest in the country, but by 2017, it had reduced drastically to 5.30% being the second lowest in Nigeria according to the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS).

Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola instituted many other social protection programmes, one of which is Agba Osun, through which the most financially vulnerable elderly in the State could draw on regular cash transfer. Over 1,000 critically vulnerable veterans were supported. The Osun Broilers Out-grower Production Scheme (O-BOPS), Goat Fattening Scheme, Cassava Out-grower Programme, O-YES and the World Bank supported YESSO are prominent programmes deployed to banish unemployment among others. To promote healthy living, functional education and communal peace and progress, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola delivered Osun's first state-wide 24-hour free ambulance service (O-AMBULANCE) which has saved over 14,695 lives.

The administration also established the Osun Destitute Rehabilitation Programme (O-REHAB), Public Defenders and Citizens' rights (OPD), Agriculture Land Holding & Development Authority (Osun Land Bank) amongst others as part of the measures to protect vulnerable groups in Osun. Most of the Osun innovative Social Protection Programmes have served as template for similar programmes at the federal level.

In 2010, internally generated revenue (IGR) from Osun was around N3.4billion per annum; by 2017, it stood at N13.7 billion. The Omoluabi Conservation Fund saved and invested N5 billion into sundry infrastructure projects and other exigencies. Omoluabi Holdings Limited (OHL), the primary investment vehicle of government grew its assets from N730 million to over N7 billion over 8 years.

Under trade, indiustry and investments, as at 2010, State GDP stood at NI91 Joillion. This grew to N398 billion by 2017. What accounted for this rise is largely due to major investments in urban, rural and education Infrastructure over the last 7 years and the strategic bottom-up approach through investments in the grassroots economy via the various Social and MSME investments. The State committed over N4.5 billion to support 1,366 cooperative groups (with average members of 15 persons per group), 321 SMEs and 27, 352 individuals across the State. PPPs also flourished, The Bola Ige Mechatronic Institute Esa-Oke (BIMI) is a case in point, where Nigerians across the country have been coming to receive training. RLG Adulawo Technology City was established in partnership with RLG Ghana. The company won a 30-million-dollar project in 2017 to produce 1 million set-top boxes for the National Digital Switch Over project.

The boost in the economy resulted in major increase in the number of, micro, medium and small enterprises (MSMEs) in Osun from 481, 451 in 2010 to 1,358,446 in 2018. Osun, under Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola, also revived through a public-private partnership (PPP), the Ede Cocoa Processing Factory which had been comatose for over 30 years, but now produces cocoa liquor,

ocoa cake, cocoa powder and cocoa butter for both omestic and international markets.

he State through its standardization of school uniform olicy, also attracted investments to set up in partner-nip with SAM & SARA, the largest garment factory in lest Africa, the Omoluabi Garment Factory. The initiave has engaged 3,000 tailors, and boosted the garent/uniform value chain, supporting thousands of niform resellers.

ne rail station in Osogbo has been modernized by the overnment and a rail line leased from the Nigerian ailway Corporation to move goods and people between Lagos and Osogbo.

e NBS rates Osun as the safest, most crime-free ate in the whole of Nigeria with 0.94 incidence rate BS, 2018). Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration is able to score a record high in security owing to unacedented investments in security assets: 25 sophisated armoured personnel carriers (APC) and 100 trol vehicles. The State also procured a French e-plus-one 355N helicopter for 24 hours' aerial surlance as well as 30 security vans for 10 security encies within the State.

beni Rauf Aregbesola embarked on a well-planned ste management initiative (O-CLEAN) programme, well as the dredging and de-silting of over 350km work of streams, rivers and tributaries through ich over 1000 jobs were created, and catastrophic oding, which hitherto was a usual occurrence avert-

peni Rauf Aregbesola's administration equally nonstrated commitment in the area of water reces management when he intervened in the clean er production at Ede waterworks when the productapacity of the waterworks was increased from 17% (2011) to about 50% in 2016. The daily production rs also increased from 2 hours per day to 4 hours day while the coverage areas of water supply were expanded.

In the area of culture and tourism, Ogbeni Rasola has invested heavily in the popular Ossela Festival, Olojo Festival among others. These have attracted interest across the globe, parternational organization such as UNESCO. During the tenure of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesol ment sacked no worker even amidst tight fina ditions, but rather created a work environme proved service delivery. In 2010, prior to the ing of the State's monthly allocation, Aregebs ernment pioneered pro-worker policies like ment of 13th month salary to workers of all ca car allowances, amongst others. The admir also boosted the capacity of workers at through continuous training within and outside Osun was also one of the first States to in N19,000 new minimum wage for the State workers. During this tenure, there were increase payment of pensions (by 46.6%) and, of gratu-45.8%) as well as settlement of huge unpaid g inherited from the previous administration.

The health sector experienced a dynamic turnaround under the administration of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola, which invested to improve of access to quality health-care services to over 2 million rural dwellers. The administration constructed and equipped 80 new primary healthcare centres (PHCs) across the State while the 30 pre-existing PHCs were upgraded. Apart from the earlier mentioned O-AMBULANCE initiative, the construction of ultra-modern drug warehouses in 4 LGAs and distribution of 15,000 mama kits (delivery kits) to pregnant women across communities in the State were also some notable achievements.

The administration of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola also invested resources into imbuing the virtue of good and godly character into the people of Osun. This informed the branding of the State, as Ipinle Omoluabi (State of the Virtuous), the initiation of Osunwon Omoluabi (Standard Weights and Scales), composition and singing of the State Anthem during State functions, amongst others. Governor Rauf Aregbesola also adopted the more plebeian title of Ogbeni (Mister) instead of His Excellency to identify more with the people.

In the area of sports, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola achieved giant strides by improving the sporting activities of the State. Osun teams in local, national and international sport competitions have won an unprecedented number of laurels – over 40 gold, 80 silver and 30 bronze medals during his tenure. Osogbo Township Stadium was upgraded to international standard and modern sporting facilities and equipment were installed in the newly constructed model elementary, middle and high schools to deepen student and community participation in sports.

Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's commitment to civil engagement has been demonstrated by his availability for live broadcasts on television through the programme "Ogbeni Till Daybreak" where he entertained and responded to all questions pertaining to his administration directly from residents all over the State and beyond. Gbangadekun was also pioneered to openly discuss political issues. Osun has also been at the



re-front of using new media for civic engagement, nerein a new online portal, www.osun.gov.ng was deered. Till date, the portal has produced over 1500 w digests on Osun activities over the last 5 years. The overnor has also built an interactive social profile, nere he regularly engages the public.




Schools Infrasctructural Renewal Project




School Uniform Policy

The new School Uniform Policy was introduced to create a unique identity for teeming Osun students. Since its introduction, the policy has stimulated deep sense of belonging and uniformity among students in the State. It has also helped in boosting commercial activities as private investors, tailors, and other businessmen and women have keyed into the production of school uniforms sold at controlled prices at designated shops across the State. Also, the establishment of the 'Omoluabi Garment Factory' has helped in empowering several indigenes and residents alike.

Osun Elementary School Feeding and Health Programme (O-MEALS)

Through the Osun Elementary School Feeding and Health Programme (O-MEALS), the State Government provides free meals for over 254,000 pupils in Elementary 1-4 every school day. Through the programme, malnutrition in pupils has reduced drastically and school enrolment rate improved significantly.



The Tablet of Knowledge ('Opon Imo') is one of the many innovations of the current administration to revamp the education sector. This unique academic device is targeted at improving the teaching and learning experience of Osun students.

The State through the Opon Imo Technology Enhanced Learning System (OTELS) has developed a learning tool that could revolutionize learning in developing states around the world. The Opon Imo or Tablet of Knowledge is a standalone e-learning tablet that provides the senior secondary students with the contents required to prepare for school leaving examinations. It provides 3 major content categories; Text Books, Tutorials and Practice Questions. 150,000 of these tablets are being distributed to all Senior Secondary students across state schools in a move that is expected to radically democratize 'access' to learning, regardless of means, location or status.

Aware of the truism that true education transcends the classroom; the administration has introduced Calisthenics in Osun schools. The attraction of Calisthenics is in its incorporation of such time-honoured virtues of team spirit, unity, resilience, cooperation, tenacity, among others, which are needed to survive and succeed in life. The initiative has been introduced to further stimulate complete 'Omoluabi' ethos among Osun students.

The passion for improved education in Osun has made it possible to keep teachers abreast of new techniques in teaching. In line with this vision, a 3-week intensive training workshop was organised for 150 School Principals and 50 Vice Principals from each of the three Senatorial Operates of the State

As part of the various efforts to curb immoral behaviours and indiscipline among students in schools, Education marshals (Edu Marshals) were introduced to enforce rules and regulations. The administration also resuscitated the Guidance and Counselling Units in schools to facilitate sound mental health and excellent academic performance among students, teachers and parents. Professional counsellors were posted to schools to assist students in the choice of their careers, social adjustments, proper peer group relationships, societal rehabilitation, amongst other relevant themes.

Other interventions of the Aregbesola-led government in the education sector include: school reclassification into Elementary, Middle and High School System to aid easy teaching and learning; provision of 'Omoluabi' School Buses to assist children of the poor, amongst others.

Further more, in a bid to enhance human capacity development of professional in the sector, the Aregbesola-led government invested massively in the employment, training, re-training and promotion of teachers. Indeed, all these have yielded much gains and strenthened the sector





Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's Administration - (2010 - 2018)

Contrary to the reality prior to the Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration where the State recorded an annual average of 11.6% as successful candidates with at least 5 credit passes in WASSCE, the State of Osun under Aregbesola's first term demonstrated sustained improvement with an annual average of 21%, indicating 81% improvement over a period of four years.









STUDENTS ADORNED IN THEIR UNIFORM







Training of Teachers for Public School Teachers in Osun

The State Government of Osun under the Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola administration has demonstrated commitments to the promotion of innovative teaching/learning in public schools through periodic training and retraining of public school teachers. This is being done to enhance teachers' skills and productive capabilities to meet high educational standards.

Specifically, the State has creatively worked with various reputable teachers training organizations such as the National Institute for Educational Planning and Administration (NIEPA), the National Teachers Institute and a number of tertiary institutions such as the Osun State University (UNIOSUN), Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife (OAU), among others in delivering relevant capacity building programmes to the over 29,695 teachers in public schools in the state. These trainings are bespoke programmes to update teachers' knowledge in the light of recent advances in specific subject areas. The programmes did not only update their skills, attitudes, but also attuned them to the acquisition of new and relevant teaching techniques.

Presently, over 30, 145 public school teachers have been trained in 26 workshops between 2011 and 2018. Worthy of mention among the trainings organised for the teachers, is the Priming Underutilized Mathematical Pumps (PUMP) programme conceived to faunch this rebirth of mathematics learning in the State. Under this programme, the State Government facilitated the visit of Professor Adeniran Adeboye, a globally renowned mathematician and an indigens of Ghongan, from the Howard University, Washington DC, USA to the State of Osus Over 200 mathematics teachers and over 100 students in High Schools across the state were trained and introduced to modern methods of teaching and learning mathematics. The training programme provided an opportunity for Professor Adeboye to provide mathematics teachers in the state with modern insights on how best to pass on their mathematical knowledge to the students.



RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Toll us about RAME?

RAMP stands for Rural Access and Mobility Project. It is a project assisted by both the World Bank and the French Development Agency. The main objective of RAMP is to provide sustainable access into rural areas in a number of states. We have about seven states participating in RAMP across Nigeria. The first phase of RAMP comprises of Kaduna and Cross-River States. Kaduna is funded by the World Bank while Cross-River is funded by the African Development Bank.

How has RAMP fared In Osun?

In the State of Osun, we have constructed up to 414km of roads, out of which 214km is through the intervention of the World Bank and the French Development Agency. The remaining 200 is from the State Parallel Fund. Our own counterpart fund is different from other donorsponsored projects. This is because whatever is assigned to the World Bank or the donors will be funded 100% and whatever is assigned to the State and the Federal Government will be done 100%. The motivation here is not to have delayed project implementation either from the Bank or the State. We have completed 214km of roads

INTERVIEW WITH ENGR. ADELERE ORIOLOWO STATE COORDINATOR, OSUN RAMP

Where are these bridges?

We have one between Ila and Oke-Ila, it is called Oye-Aduni River. There is one between UNIOSUN and Ilase, it is called Oyile. We have another one in Opa, around Oyere, and the fourth one is between Orile-Owu and five other Local Governments Areas. It is known as Womonle. Womonle was abandoned by the Federal Government for over 30 years before it was taken up by the State Government. After we had expended N200million on the bridge, the World Bank assisted us with N50 million more, which we used to complete it. The bridge now successfully links 5 Local Governments Areas, namely. Ayedaade, Ife Central, Ife East, Ife North and Irewole.

In order for the durability of the roads, we have agreed with the World Bank to tar every build-up areas to avoid dust and pollution whether its asphalt, chemical treatment or the other technologies that we have developed to make all these areas accessible.

What other things have you done with RAMP?

It is part of our mandate to develop some rural markets. We have used RAMP to assist government in achieving the rehabilitation of some markets, like Olufi Market was moved from the swamp where it was and rehabilitated to make it conducive for trading. Also, RAMP relocated the popular Plank Market from Olaiya Junction to Ido-Osun, so it is for Awosuru and MDS Markets in Osogbo.


What are the impacts of these projects?

One of the economic impacts of these roads is that farmers are able to get their farm inputs on time. Also, their products now get to the market at the right time. With this achieved, the income of farmers in the rural areas have quadrupled.


Further more, we have created a sort of micro-enterprise around the business of road maintenance. It will surprise you that we have some of these roads we have built seven years ago. It was in May 2011 that we started RAMP in Osun, with Iwo-Pataara Farm Settlement Road and up till today, it is still motorable. Before our intervention, people travelling to and fro Esa-Oke to Esa-Odo, which is about 9.2km, had to go through Ijebu Ijesa, which is about 30km, before they connect with each other. With the construction of the road, travelling between the two communities now take only 15 minutes.

It should interest you that because of the constructed roads, the Health Centres in the rural areas now functions effectively because the nurses and health officers of these facilities are able to get through to their work places very quickly.

Also, the political impact is that those who have been disenfranchised before now, are able to participate actively in the political process. This is because it is easy for them to get to their Ward Headquarters. In fact, in the last Voter Registration exercise, we were able to assist the Independent National Electoral Commission in registering about 30,000 new voters in Ife South Local Government because of the new access roads.









No of Government-Supported Borehole Projects in 2010



OGBENI RAUF AREGEESOLAYS APPROACH TOWARDS PULFILLING THE PROMISE

In many ways, the administration has fulfilled its promise, conisdering the realities in many hinterlands today as compared to the past. Across the length and breadth of the State, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola has strengthened the following agencies: Osun Rural Access Mobility Project (RAMP), Rural Water and Environmental Sanitation Agency (RUWESA), Agency for Community and Social Development Programme (CSDP) and European Union-Water Supply and Sanitation Sector for effective and efficient service delivery.

The administration's approach towards rural development centres on the provision of access rural roads, electricity, transformers, water (handpump and motorized boreholes), primary healthcare centres, town halls and civic centres, recreation centres, oil palm processing centres, etc across the rural communities in the State. In order to improve the farm yields of farmers, improved seeds/seedlings are also being distributed to farmers while they are also being introduced to modern techniques in farming.







THE SALARY CONUNDRUM

HOW WE
WEATHERED
THE STORM
BY SOLA FASURE

Salary, though routine, is not a settled matter anywhere in the world. The problem stems from the fact that salaries are paid in arrears on the faith that before the end of the day, week or month (whichever periodical that applies), there would be enough revenue from which to pay the employee.

It does happen however that there may not be enough patronage, sales, productivity or other constraining factors that will not make the expected revenue available could emerge.

In the public sector, in Nigeria in particular, revenues come from the monthly federation account allocation, taxes, rates fines, grants etc in bits, pieces and trickles. However, the major source of revenue is from petrolism resources. The fortunes of all tiers of government is dependent on the prevailing global price of oil and the management of the proceeds by the relevant agencies in Nigeria.

When the Aregbesola administration came on board on November 27, 2010, monthly allocation from the federation account was about N1.8 billion, with internally generated revenue hovering around N300 million. The monthly wage bill then was about N1.6 billion. It meant that the state had about N500 million in excess of salaries to do other things.

This may not be straightforward as it looks. The preceding government had taken loans and had other financial commitments that require the government to take commercial loans to supplement allocation before salaries can be paid, and usually two months in arrears.

One of the first acts of the Aregbesola Administration was to restructure the loans from short term to long term in generous terms. This freed a lot of the state's revenue from the stricture of monthly repayment. With this, outstanding salaries were not only cleared, a standing policy was put in place for the payment of salaries on or before the 25th of every month.

From then on, salaries were not only paid regularly, starting from December of 2010 till 2013, workers were receiving 13th month salary bonus.

By 2011, oil price was steadily increasing, bringing more revenues into the federation account and to the states and things were running smoothly until agitation for an to press for this demand. By the time the dust settled

While negotiation was going on, Osun offered N19,000 to levels 1-7 and a graduated increase for other categories, but the senior staff rejected this offer, asked for nothing less than 100 per cent increase in their salaries and proceeded on industrial action until the government caved in.

Since workers are promoted to the next level every year; pensions and gratuities payment increased from N50 million to N500 million; and with over 100 per cent increase in salaries occasioned by the increase in minimum wage, Osun's wage bill jumped to N3.6 billion from N1.6 billion.

However, the state government was still able to pay because oil was selling above \$100 per barrel with monthly allocation to Osun at about N3.8 billion and the IGR having risen above N600 million per month.

The bubble began to burst by late 2014 when allocation began to shrink allegedly on account of the theft of 400,000 barrels of crude oil per day. This dovetailed into a fall in crude oil demand and then a precipitous fall in oil price altogether, will price falling to as low as \$22 in 2015. By this time allocation to Osun has dipped to less than N1 billion and occasionally lapsing into negative. The state was already heavily strained in paying salaries, even after taking loans to the tune of N25 billion to be able to pay salaries.

It is one of the administrative ingenuities of Governor Rauf Aregbesola that he was able to propose to and get the workers to agree on modulated salary scheme. This is an arrangement in which workers on levels 1-7 get full salary, levels 8-12 get 75 per cent while level 13 and above get 50 per cent.

In addition, the state government also suspended promotion and conversion. These measures not only drastically reduced the monthly wage bill to about N1.7 billion, it froze the wage bill as well, halting the annual rise occasioned by promotion to the next level. These measures were however temporary, and the workers were not left in doubt that they will be revisited as soon as the situation improves.

These policies were implemented without much hazzles because the state government carried along the stakeholders. Immediately the crisis began, the government set up a committee on revenue allocation made up of workers and possioners leader government offi-



apportionment. Indeed, it was at the committee that it was decided to spread the available revenue through modulation, in order to avoid laying off workers. So, modulation became a win-win for government and the workers.

When the state got N25.6 billion in August 2016 as concessionary loan to offset arrears of salaries, the government resisted pressures to pay it all in one fell swoop but was able to spread it in a very reasonable way as it lasted for most of 2016.

However, with increased revenue as a result of rise in oil price, Osun discarded modulation in July of 2018 and has been paying full salaries to all categories of workers. This ushered a new era of peace and industrial harmony between workers and the government in the state.



Development economics is a branch of economics that focuses on the elemental forces that raise per capita income. A key factor in this process is the growth-generating reallocation of labor and capital among sectors, an aspect missed completely by all versions of the neoclassical growth theory. This paper examines the growth effects of infrastructure stock and quality in the state of Osun.

According to the World Bank, all empirical data have clearly shown that modern economies cannot function without infrastructure. It is infrastructure that provides a variety of critical services in determining any economy's production and consumption possibilities.

Infrastructure can affect growth through many channels and many of these channels have been tested empirically. (Agénor and Moreno-Dodson 2006). However, in addition to the conventional productivity effect, infrastructure is likely to affect the costs of investment adjustment, the durability of private capital, and both demand for and supply of health and education services among others. Some economist even maintain there is a high impact of infrastructure on growth and suggest its impact seems higher at lower levels of income (Romp and de Haan 2005). Hence, we can safely say it is key to banishing hunger, unemployment and poverty.

In understanding the issue for discourse, it is imperative to attempt a little exploration of key concepts which are pivotal to evaluating the economy of the State of Osun in the last seven years. This paper, will try to do justice to the topic in the best layman perspective possible without violating the fundamental principles of development economics. These key concepts include Infrastructure and Economic Development.

WHAT IS INFRASTRUCTURE?

Infrastructure is the fundamental facilities and systems serving a country, city, or other area, including the services and facilities necessary for its economy to function. It typically characterises technical structures such as roads, bridges, tunnels, water supply, sewers, electrical grids, telecommunications(including Internet connectivity and broadband speeds), and so forth, and can be defined as "the physical components of interrelated systems providing commodities and services essential to enable, sustain, or enhance societal living conditions." (Wikipedia).

services, risk mitigation and the dynamics of innovation and entrepreneurship. Furthermore, economic development is a policy intervention endeavour with aims of economic and social well-being of the people. Thus, for any economic development to be meaningful, the growth has to be inclusive, broad-based and transformational.

THE NEXUS

The true essence of infrastructure is "to release the latent productivity in the factors of production singly and in coordination and bring about not only an increase in the output of individual factors and units of production but also mutually additive effect through coordination in inputs, output, space and time and thus maximize the overall rate of economic growth".

The pace at which the economic development of a society takes place depends mainly on the level of infrastructure. It is a well established fact in development economics studies that there is a very strong positive correlation between the level of infrastructure and the economic development. In Keynesian macro economic model, the income or output in the economy is also a function of the level of investment made in the economy. Since the model is based on the notion that there is a direct positive correlation between income and investment, investment in infrastructure is therefore economically justified. So, the expansion and improvement of infrastructure is a necessary pre-condition for capital formation and increase in production and productivity.

THE OSUN MODEL

It is an aggregate standpoint among the World Bank, international development partners and development experts, that a formidable infrastructure is the pillar of any economic development and sustainable growth. If we critically look around us, Osun has evidently convincing proof of growth indicated in the increasing numbers of conventional and super markets, vehicles and vehicular activities, emergence of fuel and gas stations, eateries and hotels, influx of major electronic products and Fast Moving Consumer Goods distributors etc. Can we then in like manner confidently say we have developed or developing at geometric rate?

To evaluate our development therefore, let me use the prism of Gerald Meier which the late sage, Obafemi Awolowo used in evaluating Nigeria's economic development during a presentation in 1980. Gerald denominates the objectives of economic development as "better nourishment, better health, better education, better living conditions and an expand range of opportunities in work and leisure for the poor".

Jacob Viner submits in the book 'The Progress of Underdeveloped Areas 'edited by B. F Hoselitz as cited by Obafemi Awolowo that, "it must be recognized that the objective of development should be not only to raise the level of per capita real income, but also to reduce the absolute number of individuals and the percentage of total population below a minimum level of real income." That is why any growth 3or development assessment of a developing economy that leaves out impact on the informal sector, where over 80% of the workforce operates, is not only non-empirical but also a gross violation of the basic principles of economics. Despite the theory of interdependence or interconnectivity of sectors, no valid or permissible inference can be drawn using a 20% sampling of any statistical population.

Judging in the light of these development criteria and with reference to available data and obvious evidences, It can be confidently inferred, that Osun is progressing and on the path of a steady economic development. I shall attempt to enumerate little of the aforementioned microeconomic indices for further justification, so that It does not appear that my inference was coloured by partisan political prejudices.

IN THE BEGINNING

The geographical and political area tagged Osun State has been on the Nigeria map as early as the country itself with different tag under different optical arrangement from the colonial Administration to the Western Region, Oyo state and now Osun State since 1991. The state's access to rail transportation as a major transit arena opened up its Trade and commerce with the introduction of railway in Nigeria in the early 1920s. This led to the emergence of multinational warehouses.

During the western Region administration, the Osun area, particularly its southern domain of Ife and Ilesa local councils contributed immensely to the Agro Cocoa business, which was the mainstay of the regional economy with which the free universal primary Education and other pacesetting infrastructure and social amenities were financed. The attendant political crisis and its concomitant military interregnum truncated the development of the economy in the progressive fronts. For instance, some of the multinational companies ware houses earlier referred to were either abandoned or became spaces for secular and social engagements. Nonetheless, it will be a historical summersault if we deny that there was relative progress made under military rule before and after the creation of the state.

Upon creation in 1991, we were ushered into statehood by military leadership which also made little effort at changing the infrastructural face of the then idyllic agrarian state. What the military did was to ensure that the state got running, an agenda I tag as "sustaining the survival of the state, but not necessarily to live". However, the military established the Osun State broadcasting corporation and also intervened in few other significant areas.

In 1992, the state had its first democratically elected government. Albeit, that administration was short lived, apparently due to the obstinacy of the military to hold on to power. Nonetheless, the administration of Late Dr. Isiaka Adetunji Adeleke also made s landmark that attempted to change the economic variations of the state. One of the most significant was the expansion of the civil service to create what economists refer to as capital intensive workforce, not necessarily on the basis of needs and productivity as at then, but more of a social safety net for government to keep her citizens well and moving.

RETURN TO CIVIL RULE.

In 1999, upon return to democracy, the state was lucky to have elected the candidate of the progressive block as a Governor, Chief Bisi Abdulkareem Akande. We are all witnesses to history as to the magic wand of that administration between 1999 and 2003. Construction of the State Secretariat; which ranked as the best of such facility in Nigeria upon completion and one of the best till date, construction of many major roads, particularly rural roads which significantly impacted on the agro economy of the state.

2003 - 2010. The PDP led government of Prince Olagunsoye Oyinlola also came in within this period and made appreciable efforts that added value to the economic development of the state. The establishment of the Osun State University and the construction of the National Youth Service Corp (NYSC) orientation camp at Ede were achieved during this period.

2010- till date. Upon reclaiming his mandate on the 27th day of November 2010, the Governor, Ogbeni Rauf Adesoji Aregbesola, went back to the Green book, which contains his social contract with the Osun people. The aggregate position of the paper is to 'banish poverty'. In lieu of the theoretical perspective I had created abinitio, it's trite that economic development can be measured by the quality of life the people have vis-à-vis education, health, job, security, food and social security and other basics of life.

Let me begin to examine the specifics now.

TRADE AND COMMERCE.

Infrastructure facilities play a vital role in the development of trade and commerce. In fact they act as a platform for the expansion of trade and other commercial activities at a rapid speed. In Osun, development along this variant can be measured through the active engagement of her people and the attendant creation of jobs. Between 2010 and now, Osun has invested massively in the construction of ultra-modern markets, rehabilitation of existing ones, provision of good road network within and between major economic centers of the state etc. Consequently, countless number of micro and small scale businesses have sprung up across all the local councils of the state.

Let me be more practical, Osogbo before 2010 could only boast of few washermen and not standard dry cleaning outfits. I could recall that the major washerman in Osogbo was a Ghanaian who operated from a rented apartment in front of Olorunda Local Government. But today, over thirty dry cleaning outlets now dot the State capital alone.

Again before 2009 or thereabout, there were no accredited major electronics distributor in Osogbo, thereby inevitably compelling the people to travel as far as Ibadan and Lagos. However, the story has changed as we now have virtually all the major electronic products outlets in the State. Similar scenario is observable in fast food sector as well as the hospitality industry. Today in Osogbo, you have hotels that compete reasonably with their three and four star contemporaries in Abuja and Lagos.

If we also take a modest look into the physical markets in Osogbo, Ikirun, Ile Ife, Ilesha, Iwo, there is unprecedented increase in the volume of trade in these markets, ditto for influx of Supermarkets, grocery stores and malls. These are all incontrovertible evidences of our economic development within the period under review.

Apart from trading, there's also a significant growth in the area of industry. A national Industrial growth survey conducted by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) confirms that despite the dearth of industry in Nigeria, Osun state tarries above the scale. Example of this assessment is manifest in the emergence of two Iron and Steel companied, that is the Iron and Steel company and Phoenix Steel Mill along ikirun road. Resuscitation of moribund and ailing companies like, the Cocoa Industry Limited in Ede, International Breweries in Ilesha, etc.

EDUCATION SECTOR

A student's learning environment equates the teacher's working condition. It is an important condition precedent to improving the quality of education and the economic performance of a modern society. To this end, the State government committed about 20% of its infrastructural spending on the provision of world class elementary, middle and High School facilities in the last seven (7) years.

Similarly, the State has also witnessed the influx of private service providers from elementary to Tertiary levels of education. The implication is that more than fifty primary and secondary schools have been registered across the state within the last seven years, while private universities rose to eight as well as polytechnics ranking in almost this order. It is relevant at this point to examine the economic development impact of the Osun school feeding project tagged O'meal so as not to breach the order of alignment. The O'meal project where about two hundred and fifty thousand pupils are being fed five(5) days a week translating into the highest school enrollment in Nigeria, is the most scientifically managed school feeding scheme in the country. The Economic value chain of this investment is eminently evident in the food and Agriculture as well as trade sectors. More than five thousand women are daily engaged in the preparation of the meal. Supplies of other compliments are also being done by some vendors. Currently, the Orange fleshed sweet potato, a new image food crop with numerous nutrition values added into the meal has empowered more than one hundred farmers in about fifteen local governments, ditto Cocoyam and others. The poultry and fish famers, bakers and traders, just to mention a few, also have positive stories to tell on the impact of the school feeding program. So far, about N10billion has so far been spent on feeding pupils in Osun and this simply translates into capital

ROAD AND TRANSPORTATION

Banerjee, Duflo, and Qian (2012) used historical data from cities and counties in the People's Republic of China on transportation networks to estimate the effect of access to transportation networks on regional economic outcomes in the People's Republic of China over a 20-year period of rapid income growth. The paper shows that proximity to transportation networks have a positive causal effect on per capita GDP levels across sectors. Based on a simple theory, the authors argue that their results are consistent, with factor mobility playing an important role in determining the economic benefits of infrastructure development. Gonzalez-Navarro and Quintana-Domeque (2012) used a first-time street asphalting randomized experiment to provide experimental evidences on the role of infrastructure in reducing poverty for the urban poor. Within two (2) years of the intervention, households whose streets were finally paved, and who were present both before and after its implementation, increased their consumption of durable goods and even acquired more motor vehicles. These impacts were driven in part by street pavement boosting housing wealth and increasing productivity.

in the last eight (8) years of the present. Administration, Osun has experienced injection of about sixty billion Naira into various critical capital projects across the State. This represents approximately 29.85% of the amount spent on payment of salaries and wages within the same period. Expectedly, the massive capital investment has translated into a significant boost in the state's GDP and human capital development as captured in the reports of various credible local and international independent organisations. It became a great enabler of job creation and wealth distribution.

For example, in the State of Osun today, the dualisation of Oba Adesoji Aderemi road (Ona Baba Ona) has boosted the housing wealth of land owners who were mostly subsistence farmers, artisans and civil servants significantly. A plot of land along Oba Aderemi road that sold for five Hundred thousand Naira (#500,000) prior to the construction of the dual carriage road currently sell at an average of Five Million Naira (#5,000,000.00). This translates into capital appreciation of 900% in less than 5-years and arguably one of the highest return on land investment in Nigeria today!

In transport sector which is one of the highest employer of Labour, without further analysis, we can attest to the number of taxis or commercial mini buses and the sanity of such vehicles on our roads prior 2010. One can confidently say that Osogbo and other major cities in Osun has one of the most functional and decent transport system in the south west of Nigeria. In addition, government injected well over half a billion Naira into the transport sector through the purchase of brand new buses, minibuses and saloon cars to assist commercial transport workers.

BANKING AND FINANCE

The resultant effects of all other sectoral growth is the massive increase in Bank branches across the state. Improved purchasing power of the people, put pressure on the banks, consequently compelling them to expand their scope of operation. Before 2008, only very few Banks have more than one business unit in a singular location owning to the non profitability of such adventure. Of course, it is needless to say that the volume of engagement in the public and private sector determines the customer traffic experienced in Banks.

Today, banks now operate multiple branches in same location within Osun. Not only that, the number of Automated Teller Machines (ATM) in the State has grown form less than 50 in the year 2010 to about 200 today. Thus enabling the state to have its own fair share of the National ATM transaction volume, which according to the National Bureau of Statistics(NBS) stood at N38.11 trillion in year 2016 alone. Both customer and deposit base have grown and banking operation in the state is now more viable as there is an increase in the number of banks making profit than what was obtainable pre 2010.

The Insurance sector which had been hitterto sleepy received a push within this period. From less than six major players, Osun now host a good number of registered insurance companies.

AGRICULTURE

The development of agriculture to a considerable extent depends on infrastructure. Development of rural roads to the farms, Agricultural support credits, education and training of farmers, research and development and other facilities contribute a lot to the development of agriculture. They improve mobility, productivity and efficiency of labour.

Pre 2010, a farmer can access up to 10 Acres of land in any of the government farm settlements. The settlements were largely abandoned owing to lack of good access roads and other basic amenities. Today, the story has changed; roads have been constructed into major farm settlements and villages across the State. Through initiatives like the Osun Rural Access and Mobility Project (RAMP), a World Bank and French Development Agency assisted Project, with the objective of "improving transport conditions and bring sustained access to the rural population through rehabilitating and maintaining key rural transport infrastructure in a sustainable manner" well over a 100km of rural ^{roads} have been developed. In short, Osun government has succeeded in connecting farms to the markets, inject life into the rural communities, increased farmer's access to basic amenities like schools and hospitals and so on . This has incentivised farming activities in the State, boost food production and improve the living conditions of the rural dwellers. Most of the hitherto abandoned farm lands had been taken up and 90vernment has to establish an Agricultural Land Holding and Development Authority to manage the increasing demand for farm land and other related matters.

CONCLUSION

Infrastructure deficit remains one of the greatest impediments to economic growth in developing economies. With a massive population of over a billion and infrastructure deficit spending requirement of about \$93Billion per annum (World bank), Africa could only contribute a meager \$1.49Trillion (World bank) to the global GDP in 2016. Compared to, for instance, Germany's less than 85Million population contributing approximately \$3.46 Trillion (world bank) in the same period.

This evidenced based assessment of the Osun model has clearly proven how a little, using global standard, yet massive and unprecedented in the Nigerian context, a \$171.42Million capital project investment (using N350/\$1) resulted in,:

- 1. Increased GDP over 100% boost in 8years.
- 2. Poverty Index Lowest Poverty Rate in Nigeria. (UNDP-N8S).
- 3. Unemployment Reduction second lowest in Nigeria (NBS).
- 4. improved School enrollment the highest in Nigeria.
- 5. Shared prosperity, wealth creation and redistribution
- 6 Significant reductions in crime rate one of the safest state in Nigeria.
- 7. Better living condition


All the aforementioned are some of the positive indicators of development in an economy and in conformity with the basic principles of development economics. Since infrastructure refers to the basic facilities without which primary, secondary and tertiary productive activities cannot function. The Osun model has therefore clearly shown the nexus between infrastructure and economic development and a sufficient proof that infrastructure is a sine-qua-non of economic growth and development.

TRADE, INDUSTRY AND INVESTMENTS

NUMBERS BEHIND THE GROWTH EXPLAINED

The integrated approach to development adopted in Osun by Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration focuses on developing all sectors of the economy at the same rate; every sector is given required maximal attention by leveraging on existing resources while it solicit supports where necessary. This is aimed at jump-starting the economy by radically diverting resources to meet the State's core needs.

Trade is the lifeline of any economy. This sector is made of small and medium scale enterprises, employing numerous hands at the same time, keeping money in circulation, and creating multiplying effects aimed at oiling commercial activities geared towards productive and profitable environment needed to meet both individual and cooperate goals. This administration, like no other, is notable for providing needed impetus for boosting trading activities in Southwestern Nigeria. In this regard, over N5, 601,669,532 worth of support have been given to various registered groups and cooperatives in forms of loans and micro credits. This includes 47,996 newly registered farmers' cooperatives, 16,000 Women under the Grooming Initiative, while Osun Micro Credit Agency has extended interest-free loans to 133 SMEs, 800 Cooperative Societies, and 9,955 Individuals across the 30 Local Government Councils and the Area Office in Modakeke.



The trade sector was further boosted with the construction and commissioning of the First and Second Phases of Ayegbaju International Market estimated at over N2billion. Other ultra modern Markets being developed through the public-Private-Partnership include: Aje International Market, Atakunmosa International Market etc. Another visible effort at promoting commercial activities was the massive upgrade of the Railway Terminus at MDS Osogbo. It is estimated that no fewer than 12,000 passengers pass through this route on a monthly basis. Furthermore, the State government facilitated the distribution of 70 "Hummer" Buses, 40 Mini Buses (Korope) and 24 Brand New Nissan Saloon Cars to various cooperative groups to further consolidate its efforts at increasing trading activities within the State.

In the construction industry, over 200 contractors have been engaged in road construction projects all over the state. This has led to appreciable increase in the number of micro and small enterprises in the State of Osun especially in the services sector from less than 5,000 in 2010 to about 12,500 MSMEs in 2016. The socio- economic impacts of the new roads are enormous; at least about 3,960 unskilled workers were engaged from the local communities. With a N2,500.00 wages per day per worker, about N10M was being injected into the local economy daily. With these projects, average travel time and cost of transportation have been reduced by more than 75%, many new border-communities and settlements have emerged, participation of villagers and rural dwellers in commercial activities around major markets have also increased.

In an unprecedented manner, several new industries have been attracted to Osun. The state government has attracted investment worth billions of naira in the garment industry with the establishment of Omoluabi Garment Industry which has created over 3,000 jobs; Osun owns 14% equity in this investment. Also, about 5,000 entrepreneurs have been empowered across the state. Adulawo Technology City, Ilesa was inaugurated in 2014 in partnership with RLG Ghana with 10,000 youths trained in ICT application across the state. Specially, 100 youths were sent to Ghana for further training while more than 150 of the trainees employed mainly from the state. Recently, Adulawo secured a contract worth \$31.5M to manufacture TV set-up boxes for Nigeria's digital switch-over programme.

Bola Ige Mechatronics Institute, Ilesha is the first of its kind in Nigeria; it was established to improve and promote artisans' skills in the automotive sector within and outside the state. Over 40 Osun Indigenes trained in Germany for a 2-month in-plant-end-users' training from 5th of May to 30th of June, 2014 were employed to run the centre upon their return. On the institute, over 800 Million Naira was expended through the help of the National Automotive Council to support the initiative. One cannot but mention the revitalization of the moribund Cocoa Processing Industry, Ede with the injection of needed capital by Golden Monkey Company, China. The Industry processes tones of Cocoa to powder for export.

Osun Investment Company Limited (OSICOL) now Omoluabi Holdings balance sheet was increased from N300 in 2010 to about N7B as at 2017. The company recently became a big player in the Real Estate sector with Estates in Abuja, Ikeja GRA and Ikoyi, Lagos. Under this administration, OSICOL has won several awards including Best Distributor of the Year, Best Structured Distributor (Nestle) etc. OSICOL water, a subsidiary of the company was awarded NIS award within six months of application, the first of its kind in Osun. Its leading brand, Essence Water, is a leader among bottled water brands in the country. Other investments include the establishment of a Mega Gas Station; the biggest in the State of Osun and cultivation of 526Htrs of cocoa farm in Obokun.

As at 2017, this government has grown the number of individual taxpayers to 609,000 and 27,000 Cooperate bodies against pre-Aregbesola era which was 62,000 individuals and 12,000 Cooperate bodies. Internally generated revenue increased from N300m monthly to over N700m monthly. Osun now has about 77 bank branches, more than 1,074 private educational institutions including universities, secondary and primary schools; over 400 petrol stations and 500 privately-run hospitals. We must not also fail to mention some social investments initiatives like the engagement of 42,000 Youths under the Osun Youth Empowerment Scheme, 3,007 Caterers for the School Feeding Programme, distribution of 750,000 free Uniforms to School Students

These and many more are what have placed Osun as the 2nd State with least poverty prevalence for the 3rd consecutive year and 7th largest economy as at 2018 among other notable human development rankings in Nigeria.



OSUN'S TRANSITION FROM A VIOLENT STATE TO A TRANQUIL STATE

Safety and security are important because both affect individual well-being. Safety is freedom from physical or emotional harm while security is freedom from threat or fear of harm or danger.

Conscious of his promise to the people in line with his Action Plan, Governor Rauf Aregbesola has left no stone unturned in ensuring that State of Osun remains one of the safest and most secured states in Nigeria. Topmost among measures taken by the administration was the establishment of the Swift Anti-Robbery Squad (SAS) in 2012 to serve as a decisive security response to a state that had many unsafe urban settlements, pre-Aregbesola administration. Government also procured 125 Patrol Vans, 25 Armored Personnel Carriers (APC), crash helmets and a helicopter to strengthen security agencies in the state. Till date, regular financial and moral supports are being given to security personnel on duty, as well as to local vigilante volunteers within the state.

Other areas of intervention include: public sensitization through grass-roots engagement and the mass media, appointment of more judges for quick dispensation of justice, construction of more court rooms and the injection of more energy and ideas into the Ministry of Women and Children affairs to address domestic security. The establishment of Osun Citizens Mediation Center

(O' Mediation) was part of efforts at resolving communal disputes. An ultra-modern multi-force security control center and a statewide distress management system to allow a maximum response time of less than 40 minutes to emergencies were also put in place to boost security.

Globally, unemployed and idle youth constitute the greatest security risk and challenge to the societies in which they dwell. To curtail this ugly trend, over-40,000 youth have so far been gainfully employed under the Osun Youth Empowerment Scheme (O'YES) in a manner unprecedented in any part of sub-Saharan Africa. Preparations for the employment of the last batch of 20,000 for this administration have already reached an advanced stage. Osun Sheriff Corps and Traffic Marshals were also created to further strengthen Osun's security network.

Thanks to the present administration, residents of Osun now go about their normal businesses without fear; and they are now sleeping with their two eyes closed. Only recently, Osun was adjudged as one of the safest states in Nigeria. This is because Governor Aregbesola as the state's Chief Security Officer, has already secured the state in line with his government's major reason for existence in the first place.



In a bid to ensure improved water supply across the Osun, the State government has embarked on general repairs and rehabilitation of water facilities at all the water works and dams in the state. The state government has also procured some water facilities such as pipes and other equipment to replace the old ones to ensure efficiency in water supply in the state.

Impacts

- The production capacity of Ede waterworks increased from 17% in 2011 to about 50% in 2016
- Increased daily production hours from 2 hours per to over 4 hours per day
- Increased coverage areas of water supply.
- **Reduction of water borne diseases.**



Innovations for Sustainable Agriculture in the State of Osum

All over the world, Agriculture constitutes the fulcrum of economic development and transformation. Little wonder the Rauf Aregbesola-led administration's Six-Point Integral Action Plan was largely anchored on the sector.

From the beginning, Governor Aregbesola's vision was to get at least 10% of the N3.3billion daily food exchange bill in Lagos as well as setting Nigeria on a genuine path to rural and national development. In a bid to drive its economy with technology-driven agriculture therefore, the State of Osun inaugurated Osun Rural Enterprise and Agricultural Programme (O-REAP) as a comprehensive agricultural development initiative for the all-encompassing purpose of making Osun the food basket of Nigeria. Government resuscitated Farm Settlements, located in nine different parts of the state while storage facilities and high yield fertilizers (at 50% subsidized rates) were also provided.

While collaborations with FADAMA and International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA), etc, led to massive production of food crops and increase in wealth creation activities, more than 7,000 farmers from 500 cooperative societies also benefited from the state's low interest loans under the Quick Impact Intervention Programme (QIIP). With over-400 kilometres rural roads to its credit, Osun remains the most effective government on the Rural Access and

Mobility Programme (RAMP). Besides, 100,000 small holder farmers have so far benefitted from the Land Bank programme.

Through Osun Broilers Outgrowers Production Scheme (OBOPS), Osun is not only 2nd only to Oyo in broiler production, about 2,500 farmers and over-3,000 vendors have also been gainfully employed. Similarly, Osun Fisheries Outgrowers Production Scheme (O-FOPS) has helped in multiplying fish production.

Next is the Agriculture-in-Schools Programme through which 92 secondary schools were assisted in fisheries, arable crops and livestock production. Pig farmers got government support through Osun Pig Improvement Scheme while centralization of modern abattoirs, in addition to professional veterinary activities has also brought about a boost in meat production.

Indeed, Governor Aregbesola's efforts at harnessing hitherto untapped vast agricultural resources have removed doubts from his commitment to moving the state from a public service economy back to its rightful place as an Agricultural state. Now, Osun is Nigeria's 2nd richest state and 5th largest economy. Its forestry sub-sector is also 5th in the country.



Towards fulfilling his promise of banishing hunger, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola designed the Osun Rural Enterprise and Agriculture Programme (O-REAP) which is aimed at achieving food security, wealth and job creation, youth empowerment, economic transformation and making the state the hub of agriculture and an emporium of commerce in the South-West. Some of the strategies adopted by Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration in this sector include land acquisition, land clearing, tractorisation and private public partnership as well as provision of enabling environment for farmers to maximize their potential. 0-REAP programme also focused on different agricultural initiatives that include Osun Broilers Out-growers' production scheme. The Beef Chain Development Programme, O-REAP Fish Farm Estates, Osun Fisheries Out-growers production scheme, O-REAP Youth Academy, Agricultural credit, Farm Service Centres, Provision of storage facilities and seedling Production as well as farm settlement scheme.

Impacts of Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's Agricultural Initiatives In Osun

Over, 28,000 farmers have been supported and empowered through various agricultural support programmes carried by the administration and now earning their livelihoods from farms.





Quick Impact Intervention Program (QIIP)

Novel in the development of agriculture sector is the implementation of Quick Impact Intervention Programme for farmers (QIIP) designed to promote agriculture financing by granting soft loan to practicing farmers. This programme has been implemented under the thriving cooperative societies. This programme has created a number of direct and indirect jobs for the people of Osun.

Achievements

- A total of two hundred and sixty-one (261) farmers' cooperative groups with a combined membership of four thousand, nine-hundred and fifteen (4,915) had been granted credit facilities to the tune of five hundred and thirty million, nine hundred and fifty-four thousand, one hundred and seventy six naira and thirty kobo (530, 954,176.30). 

There is no gainsaying that a responsible government must create and maintain conditions under which members of the public can be healthy.

Although the responsibility for maintaining and improving Public Health lies with all sectors of the society, its tasks are carried out primarily by governmental health and environmental protection agencies at the local, state, and national levels.

Public Health agencies meet obligations to their communities by fostering a wide range of policy-guided community initiatives to promote health and improve health conditions. They are also play important roles in regulating sources of risk and promotion of healthy and safety practices such as licensing restaurants and Heath facilities, in addition to regulating water and air quality.

The feat achieved by Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola in restoring healthy living and ensuring public health functions is unprecedented in the history of the State of Osun. For instance, before this administration came on board, the state was home to high prevalence and incidence of childhood malnutrition. However, with various nutrition interventions and strong political will, coupled with highly-trained and skilled health personnel, the state has recorded a modest drop in childhood malnutrition.

Recent data by the National Bureau of Statistics showing a significant drop in incidence of underweight, nutritional stunting and wasting among under-5 children in the state has also gone a long way in confirming this administration's giant strides in the sector. This feat, without doubt, was an indication of


improved socio-economic condition. No doubt, it was the outcome of mass awareness on appropriate nutrition for different age groups. In order to boost access to health services, especially in rural and remote areas, government constructed new Primary Healthcare Centers (PHCs) across the state to complement existing ones. Most of the new PHCs are fully equipped as part of efforts to reduce child malnutrition, morbidity and mortality.

One significant innovation of the present administration which also underscores its value for life is the establishment of Osun Ambulance Services, aka O'AMBULANCE. This initative has shot Osun to limelight as one of the two states in the country with 24 hours emergency ambulance services are available for indigenes and residents alike. In all, no fewer than 50 ambulances, fitted with state-of-the-art equipment, have been procured and deployed to all Local Governments across the state to attend to emergency situations. Also, more than 400 Paramedics have been employed, trained and deployed with dedicated phone lines to make the ambulance service efficient. So far, so impressive: No fewer than 13,000 persons have accessed the Free AMBULANCE services. In 2016 alone, the Service responded to over-2,000 road traffic accident emergencies involving over-5,000 casualties where over-1,900 lives were snatched from the cruel jaws of death.

To aid prompt healthcare delivery, supplies were made to all the various Primary Health Centers, Comprehensive Health Centers and State Hospitals. These include essential drugs, hospital and equipment of different sizes and functions, generators etc. It is also worthy of mention that the state has been able to reduce and reverse the prevailence of HIV/AIDS through the State of Osun Agency for the Control of AIDS(O-SACA) from 2.7% to 16%.

In a bid to boost healthcare provision, promote hygiene and prevent water-borne diseases, the Aregbesola-led government drilled, installed and fitted 48 functional boreholes to the Primary Healthcare Centers in the state. Government also pursued aggressive renovation and rehabilitation works on 18 Health facilities in Ede, Ikirun, Osogbo, Ikire, Ila-Orangun, Ejigbo and Iwo, among others. Indeed, it was a complete overhaul! It should be noted that, prior to this administration's intervention, no major works had been carried out on these facilities since they were built by the Chief Bola Ige-led administration.

In fairness to posterity, Governor Aregbesola's administration deserves commendation for improving school health services as all schools in the state can now boast of First Aid boxes which are well-equipped with Fashioned along a broader concept of comprehensive healthcare for school children which forms an important part of community healthcare, school health services have been expanded with a view to taking a turn for the better. Consequently, over-N500m worth of drugs have been supplied to hospitals across the state. Primary and secondary healthcare services at public facilities, including anti-retroviral medication, are being rendered free-of-charge. This is in addition to free laboratory services and surgery for pregnant women, children under the age of 5, and elderly persons in 876 Primary Healthcare facilities and 51 Secondary Health facilities across the 67 Local Government Areas, Local Council Development Areas, Area Councils and Area Offices in the state. Most importantly, training of head teachers on how to give First Aid to sick/injured school children has never been treated with levity since this administration took over.

In fulfilling his promise in the healthcare sector, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's administration has demonstrated unprecedented level of commitments in the provision of health infrastructural facilities and modern medical equipment in the State hospitals. Attention was also put on the procurement and free distribution of drugs and medical consumables and capacity building for the health personnel. In order to ensure access to quality health care delivery across the state, the government also constructed and equipped primary healthcare centres across the state.







This led to the world-class Education Summit in 2011, chaired by the Nobel Laureate, Professor Wole Soyinka. It was the Summit that gave birth to the reclassification of the state-owned schools into Elementary, Middle and High School System, the introduction of the single uniform policy and improved school feeding in the state.

The administration also introduced the new school uniform policy in an attempt to create a unique identity for students in Osun as well as enthrone a culture of loyalty between the people and the state government. It is interesting to note that this policy has ensured a deep sense of belonging and uniformity among school children in the state. It has also helped in boosting commercial activities as private investors, tailors, and other businessmen and women have keyed into the production of school uniforms and sold them at controlled prices at designated shops across the state. Above all, the establishment of 'Omoluabi Garment Factory' has helped in empowering indigenes and residents alike.

As part of various efforts to curb immoral behaviours and indiscipline among students in our schools, the outgoing administration resuscitated the school guidance and counselling sector across the state. Professional counsellors were posted to schools to assist students in the choice of their careers, social adjustments, proper peer group relationships and societal rehabilitation. We also had 'Omoluabi' School Buses to assist children of the poor; and Education Marshalls to maintain discipline.

Among others are: decentralization of school administration and management through creation of three education districts, with each district headed by a Tutor-General and the procurement of science laboratory equipments to schools across the state. The governor also appointed nine Headmasters-General which is equivalent to permanent secretaries.

Aware of the fact that education goes beyond teaching and learning in the classroom, the administration introduced Calisthenics display into the school system in Osun. It is interesting to note that, apart from its introduction into Osun schools' curriculum, other states have identified with this laudable initiative. Also worthy of mention is 'Walk-to-live' which is an embodiment of team work, mental alertness and physical exercise that richly adds value to the health of the citizens.

The Tablet of knowledge ('Opon Imo') is another innovation of the outgoing administration to revamp the education sector in the state. Altogether, 17 subjects that students offer during West African Senior Secondary Certificate Examinations (WASSCE) have been included as learning experiences in form of lesson notes, textbooks, mostly provided by Evans Publishers and Master Teacher's inputs. Six extra-curricular subjects in form of Sex Education, Civic Education, Yoruba History, Yoruba Traditional Religion, Computer Education and Entrepreneurship Education are also included in the device. 'Opon Imo' also contains ten years' past questions and answers provided by the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) as well as West African Examinations Council (WAEC).

Through the employment, training, re-training and promotion of teachers, among others, the story has changed for the better. For example, Osun recorded 15.6% in the performance of student in WASSCE in the year 2010, but as at 2017, the performance has improved to 44.59%. This peaked with the 70% pass in the 2018 West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASCE). Similarly, the state has, since 2013, been featuring prominently between the 1st and 3rd positions in the JAMB matriculatable students in Nigeria. Added to these is the higher level of enrolment and retention at the elementary school level which is due, largely, to the positive impact of O'MEAL. The totality of all these interventions has been a consistent increase in school certificate results since 2010 and it is expected to be beneficial to the state for the next 50 years!

It was Aregbesola's government that changed the name, 'Osun State' to 'State of Osun.' He is also the architect of the State of Osun Anthem, Flag and Logo. Apart from pioneering a 'siren-less' regime in the state, the number of vehicles in his entourage at any particular time is also about the least in the country. As a matter of fact, most of those vehicles he still uses as governor were inherited from the Olagunsoye Oyinlola-led administration. Even as the state's First Citizen, Aregbesola's convoy has never been seen to have violated traffic rules.


Aregbesola chose to be addressed simply as 'Ogbeni', a nomenclature which was in sharp contrast to the norm in Nigeria's political landscape. The 'Government Unusual', headed by him, also introduced the 'Omoluabi' ethos as the heart and soul of being human in Yorubaland. Interestingly, the concept has become a philosophical and cultural moral code for which every Nigerian citizen now wants to be associated. The landmark 'Walk-to-live', 'Ogbeni Till Day Break' and the Standard Weighing Scale, aka 'Osunwon Omoluabi' are among other initiatives through which the governor has endeared himself to Nigerians.

Except one wants to be economical with the truth, the story of social protection under the outgoing administration has been one of success, especially, as more than 15 social protection interventions have been implemented with varying scopes and coverage by the Aregbesola-led government. As we speak, no fewer than 14,675 persons have accessed the Free AMBULANCE services and over-250,000 students in 1,382 public primary schools across the state have so far been covered in its one-free-meal-per-day policy. This is in addition to free laboratory services and surgery for pregnant women, children under the age of 5; and elderly persons in 876 Primary Health Care facilities and 51 Secondary Health facilities across the 67 Local Government Areas, Local Council Development Areas and Area Offices of the state.

Under Osun Rehabilitation Programmes (O'REHAB), more than 100 persons with mental disabilities have been treated while no fewer than 1,602 elderly persons of age 65 and above, who met poverty criteria, were receiving N10,000,00 monthly for their upkeep in addition to medical care under the 'Agba Osun' scheme.


The Osun Youth Empowerment Scheme, aka OYES, has seen to the employment and empowerment of more than 60,000 qualified youth and the Agric Land Bank, has provided access to land to over 100,000 smallholder farmers.

Apart from Aregbesola's pioneering the payment of 13th month salary to civil servants in the state in addition to free tuition fees in Osun schools, one is in doubt if those 87 students from Osun State University who were sponsored by this administration in 2013 to study Medicine in Ukraine will forget this gesture in years to come.

Yorubas are renowned for established values and morals. However, a lot of these morals and values have also been lost over the years, especially by the younger generation.

In an exceptional bid to restore these values, one of Governor Rauf Aregbesola's first tasks in office was to educate the people on the virtue of humility which every individual must imbibe and carry along with him in his day-to-day activities. As a way of leading by example, he dropped the title, 'Your Excellency' for 'Mr Governor', translated in Yoruba as 'Ogbeni Gomina.' He also asked to be addressed as 'Governor', no longer 'Executive Governor.' According to him, the title, 'His Excellency' is God's exclusive preserve and he does not want to compete with Him. Also, since a governor's powers are so enormous as to include that of life and death, bragging around as 'Executive Governor' can only amount to an arrogant display of constitutional powers.

This administration rechristened 'Osun State' as 'State of Osun' so as to give the state a new identity. 'State of the Living Spring' also gave way to 'Land of Virtue.' Also, the state now has its own logo and an anthem that preaches values and morals, which is now being rendered in schools and at all official functions in the state.

Governor Aregbesola introduced the 'Measuring Scale', aka 'Osuwon Omoluabi' to bring sanity into buying and selling methods in the state as well as encourage value for money in our markets.

Other areas where this administration has positively impacted the people a la 'Omoluabi ethos' are 'Walk-to-live', designed to keep the people physically fit; and Osun Calisthenics programme, a combination of controlled exercises and gymnastics, marching, singing, folk and modern dance put in place to encourage teamwork. It is also designed to build confidence in the face of challenges, savour the pride of winning as well as show dignity in defeat which is the hallmark of an "Omoluabi." The unification of school uniforms has also created a unique identity for Osun students and enthroned a culture of loyalty between the people and the state government.

Today, Governor Aregbesola's convoy is unarguably the least in Nigeria, with regard to number of vehicles. He also led the campaign for the non-blaring of siren by political office-holders. He is probably the only governor in the country whose convoy obeys the traffic rules and acts in accordance with the rules guiding other road users. Little wonder 'Ogbeni Gomina' is referred to as 'Number One Omoluabi.'


Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's Promise

At the inception of his administration, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola promised to make the people of Osun the centre of his government, as well as genuine agents of development so that they can see themselves as the core of society and drivers of development.

Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's Approach

Towards fulfilling this promise, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola recognized the need for mental re-orientation of the people of the state towards making them catalyst for development in their communities. State Government of Osun also recognized the relevance of efficient identity management to growth and development in the state. In this regard, the state government rebranded the state with the objectives of reviving the cultural ethos of the people, promoting the value of ethical relationship, and using those as springboards for the progress, growth and development of the society.

The State adopted the almost forgotten emblem of Western Region as its own crest. It equally developed an identity; a flag for the state. The crest, the flag and the anthem are an indication of a commitment to motivate, mobilize and motivate the people toward playing their role in society and improving their perception of themselves.

o The two ELEPHANTS symbolize strength, service and prosperity.

o The Cocoa Tree and the two crossed logs of wood where the elephants stand signify our dependence and respect for agriculture and the natural land resources.

o The ORI OLOKUN represents the common origin of Yoruba and our dexterity in technology. The garland surrounding the ORI OLOKUN symbolizes victory and triumph.

o The Earth Colour represents the fertility of our land and the shade of our skin.

o The INDIGO colour in the upper part of the shield symbolizes the common Adire fabric of Yoruba Land.

o The RUBY RED colour of the lower

o The LION symbolizes Yoruba nobility, dignity and royalty while the CUSHION OF FERNS represents the traditional lair of an African lion.

o The rivers Niger and Benue symbolize the connection between Osun and the rest of Nigeria.

o We are a rain forest people; timber represents the vegetation of our region.


o The two symbols of the CHIEF'S SWORD and the MACE are embodiments of our spirit and our commitment to the ideals of Democrate Severnance.


State Flag

There is no doubting the fact that sport is a global unifying influence. All over the world, the sector is critical to the development of many countries in the globe. It is one of the things the Restoration of Healthy Living agenda which the Rauf Aregbesola administration seeks to achieve and leave behind as part of its enduring legacies.

First, it was the "Walk to Live Programme" which commenced in 2011 with a mission to have a balanced body, soul and mind. The 10 km exercise was taken round the state with all residents of the towns and villages trooping out en-masse to receive the governor and his entourage. The governor has since walked over 120 km with the people on the streets of Osogbo.

Another legacy the Aregbesola government is leaving behind is the Calisthenics programme. During the routine exercise cum programme, the students grouped into different schemes and positions work in unison to create ideal statements which teach morals, create awareness about the responsibility of citizens to the state as well as mirror the achievements of the present administration.

The Governor with his unrivalled commitment and passion to the development of sports made it imperative for his educational transformation drive to seek school sports as essential.

Every school within the divisions of Elementary, Middle or High School has sport facilities that are of International Standard which helps increase their mental alertness as they engage in a retinue of exercises during school hours. The policy initiatives of the incumbent since assumption of office in 2010 are targeted at building the culture of sports at the grassroots. These interventions and more have helped reshape the sector and hve also endeared it to the grassroots.

Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola's Approach to Sports Development

As part of the measures towards ensuring healthy living for the people of Osun, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola promoted sport development by upgrading some of the sport facilities in the state and providing standard sport facilities in schools. The Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola administration also introduced co-curricular sport activity/trainings for the children, especially in calisthenics. This is a physical gymnastic training exercise, which is the combination of the use of signals with the parade of colours, designs and patterns with body movement, gestures, music rhymes and gesticulations to create impressions and pass messages.


Impacts

Excellent performance of Osun teams in local, national and international sport competitions as evidenced by winning of over 40 gold, 80 silver and 30 bronze medals by Osun teams in different sport competitions between 2010 and 2017.

The benefits of calisthenics to participants include, but are not limited to:

Grassroot community economy boost: Whenever and wherever thousands of athletes are regularly gathered over a length of time, the local economy would experience a boost in consumables that are typical to participants' age grade. During each training session for Calisthenics display, a transport token of N300 is given to each of the participants (chillaton). N300 each for 4,000 participants, for about 90 training days: approximately 108 million naira directly injected into the local economy.

Enhanced organisational capacity and understanding of systems: Participants themselves handle all aspects of logistics deployment before and after training, efficiently and in an orderly manner

Promptness and punctuality: All positions must be filled before the commencement of exercises, this instills 100% attendance and punctuality culture in the children


Discipline: All elements making up discipline are imparted in participants, including increasing their attention span (concentration), precision, exactitude and the like

Team Spirit and Cooperation: Unity of purpose and uniformity in motion are a primal dictat in group calisthenics, without which any beautiful display is impossible. Every individual accepts to play his/her part well as component of a recognised whole, to bring about beauty in all acts and motion.

Enhanced sense of Beauty (obvious development of aesthetics appreciation).

Enhanced positive social interaction: networking among thousands of students with various orientation and background, who may otherwise not have met in life – out of which a life-long bond might form, against the backdrop of a memorable encounter during activities.

Participants are taken away from negative out-of-school activities and even from potential abusive engagement.



Introduction of Calisthenics in Osun


The history of Calisthenics may well be traced to the era of Chief Bola Ige, when he was governor of the old Oyo State. When it was introduced in the Second Republic, it was a toast of all and was well-applauded all over the country. It was, however, discontinued as a result of military incursion into government.

Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola recalibrated Calisthenics in 2012 when experts were brought to Osun, by the Governor Rauf Aregbesola-led administration to instill the exercise in the pupils of public schools in the state.

It started with the assistance of two Cubans, Francis Rodriguez and Raiza Guerra, who trained the first set of children that performed during the 21st anniversary of the creation of Osun.

The two Cuban experts also trained 40 physical education instructors and game masters' trainers who have since taken over from the Cubans and are now engaging Osun state students in the feat.

The training experience culminated in a display at the "Osun at 21" Anniversary Celebration, August 27, 2012; the first ever major calisthenics display in the State of State, coming long after the one put up by the Late Chief Bola Ige, at the Liberty Stadium in the Old Oyo State during the 2nd Republic.



Introduction of Calisthenics in Osun

The first public artistic display of the trained 8,000 pupils on Tuesday, August 28, 2012 at Osogbo City Stadium as part of the 21 years celebration of Osun was indeed a model introduced by the administration to inspire a new generation of leaders with team spirit, collaboration, concentration and commitment. It was a memorable day, as the atmosphere was impressive; the highly elated crowd did not only feel it, they saw practical demonstration and marvelous delivery of coded messages and signs.

The second major display of the public school pupils was in June 3, 2013 when the Osun government hosted the Oodua World Children Day where the pupils again clisplayed at the same Osogbo City Stadium. The display brought out an uncommon gegree of social coordination, which was inculcated into the students through six months of regorous trainings conducted by Culban experts and Osun trainers

The 2016 Callistnemic display at the celebration of the Osun at 25 involved 4,000 pupils between the ages of 9 and 14, drawn from 17 Middle Schools in Osogbo and Olorunda Local Governments.

In 2017, a new Statewide Competition template was adopted, allowing entry from all schools in Osun. More than 40 schools across the State formed themselves into nine teams, training for two school terms, with elimination displays and Senatorial Stage championship and prizes.

The competition was held simultaneously in all the nine federal constituencies and rounded off in Osogbo City Stadium, with winners from each Federal Constituency presented cash gifts. A cheque of N1 million was presented to the Winners in each of the three Senatorial Districts, and N750,000 to the first runner up while the second runner up got N500,000. Ede/Ejigbo Egbedore Federal constituency came first in Osun West, Ikire and Iwo federal constituencies came second and third respectively. In Osun Central, Irepodun zone came first, while Ila and Ikirun zone came second and third respectively. In Osun East, Ilesa came first, ljebu-ljesa came second while Ife came 283third.

The grand finale took place 25th November 2017 between teams representing the 3 Senatorial Districts: the total number of students involved were more than 5,000 and the total prize money, which went into the sports facilities development of the participating schools, was N10, 500,000 apart from trophies and certificates of participation.

At the inception of his administration, Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola promised to run a system of government owned, controlled by the people, and accountable to the people.

OGBENI RAUF AREGBESOLA'S APPROACH

The political space in the seven and half years has been expanded to enhance democracy and civic participation. Civic consciousness, which is a lubricant of democracy, has flourished. This has given rise to unprecedented number of civil society groups in the state. These groups are not only active in advocating for civil rights, but sometimes constitute themselves into political system to further assist in good governance and democratic system in the state. Policies and programmes are being implemented based on public opinions.

Platforms were also designed to promote a conversation and interaction between the people and the government on the dividends of democracy in the state. The platform featured the Governor and his cabinet with presentation of plans and scorecards to the people through the media. Such platforms are as follow:







ASERVICE WORTH THE EFFORT

It has been a great privilege for me to have been at the helm in Osun these past eight years. In the course of time, I have been able to impact the state and the people positively. It has also afforded me the opportunity to exercise leadership at the second highest level of governance, being the governor of Osun for eight years. The task has been very challenging, but it has been worth every effort.

Governor Ogbeni Rauf Aregbesola overview

A SERVICE WORTH THE EFFORT

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After my inauguration on November 27, 2010, we faced a huge challenge of governance. These are mainly in human and infrastructure development. Almost every aspect of governance had suffered neglect and the toll was very high.

Only 15.6 per cent of Osun secondary school leavers had enough pass in five subjects including English and Mathematics, to enable then gain admission into tertiary institutions in the year we came to government. Security was so bad that bandits raid financial institutions for fun, leading to their closure for days and consequent paralysis of economic activities. The youths were disoriented and lacking in purpose. Petty crimes and banditry perpetrated by youths were high in the state. So also was prostitution. The highest form of engagement for the youths was to operate as commercial motorcycle riders. Infrastructure was at the lowest level, with most cities, particularly the state capital, looking like a glorified rural area. These were just a few of the challenges.

However, we noticed also that there are opportunities. We have a young working population; we have arable land; we have educational institutions; we have exotic natural land formation and rich history; and we have about the most experienced civil service in the country. The pioneer civil servants in the state were the finest and best that came from the old Oyo State. Many of them worked with Chief Obafemi Awolowo. They trained the current civil servants.

On education, we promptly held a summit headed by Prof Wole Soyin-ka. The recommendations of the summit guided our policy pursuits in education and the quantum leap in result recorded by our administration. Of course, we came with innovations. The E-learning tablet, Opon Imo, was our invention because it never existed anywhere before. The schools we built have become the reference in education infrastructure. We motivated teachers by appointing them Tutors-General and Headmasters-General, which was the first of its kind in the state.

We were very quick to realise that youth development and engagement is not just for now, but for the future as well. We were able to mop up 20,000 youths and engage them in social work under 100 days of our administration. We have since repeated this twice, with most of them given soft landing in teaching appointments, Information and Communications Technology, Agriculture and other vocations. We were able to source for funds to train and empower youths in various vocations as well. Many of them have written to us and sent evidence of being millionaires, living in their own houses and making a decent living.

We were also able to take care of the aged and infirm, particularly the mentally challenged ones. It is our policy that no one will be left behind by our administration.

With prudent management of scarce resources by our brilliant financial team, we have been able to carry out the most ambitious infrastructure development in Osun. The quality roads we constructed, the schools we built and urban development we carried our have been adjudged unequalled in the annals of the state. The roads in particular were tailored to meet the economic and social needs of our people.

The most fundamental achievement of our administration is that we have equipped the people with the infrastructure of the mind that will enable them to realise their best potential through self-confidence, hard work and other virtues. We awakened the Omoluabi consciousness in them.

If we have not been constrained by the inclement national financial weather, we could have done more; but we are satisfied that we are leaving Osun far better than we met it. The transformation that has taken place in Osun under our watch is phenomenal and I am confident that the verdict of history will be very kind to us.

Governance anywhere is an unfinished business. I am confident therefore that my successor will continue with the good works and take Osun to the next level.
