

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#### INTRODUCTION

The main thrust of the Shekarau administration has been human capital development. Since young people aged between 10 to 24 years constitute one third of the nation's population according to the National Policy on Youth, the administration has accorded the highest priority to education, further training and skills acquisition, including generous scholarships to this target group. Between the years 2003 to 2007, the Office of the Special Adviser Youth Development trained and empowered over 4,000 youths. To build on this foundation, after his re-election of the Executive governor of Kano State, Malam Ibrahim Shekarau created the Directorate of Youth Development (DYD) under the Special Adviser, Gambo Ado, who also doubles as Director-General, to be a focused and result oriented intervention agency. The directorate is expected to target 40,000 youths state, who would benefit from entrepreneurial, vocational and skills acquisition programmes, between the years 2007 to 2011. Key target groups for the DYD have already been identified in both the State Economic Road Map or Kano State Development Plan and the Program and Action Plan 2007-2011 of the DYD.

For the year 2009 a total of 10,000 youth were targeted for skills training and empowerment. However in line with the lessons learnt in previous years, a new model of youth empowerment is being piloted in Kano state. To further strengthen the resolve of youths who have been given value reorientation, entrepreneurial and vocational skills training to make a success of their chosen professions, and to resist

societal pressure to sell off their trade-tools with which they are usually empowered, the DYD is now introducing the idea of clustering as many related micro, small and medium scale enterprises in a "business park", as possible, in the locality of the beneficiaries. This achieves synergy for the related enterprises, ensures sustainability by attracting customers for all the enterprises by anyone who chooses to patronize a single one, makes monitoring easier and improves security.

The idea is that for each occupational cluster, government will acquire or provide physical and other supporting infrastructures, as well as start up capital. The beneficiaries after undergoing training will then run their enterprises jointly in small groups of two to ten for profit. Government will lease the facilities for each production cycle, six months to a year for agriculture related vocations. After harvesting their products, beneficiaries might wish to lease for another cycle, because they are entitled to use them continuously on lease. Maintenance of the facilities is shared jointly with the government.

For vocations that can be viable without clustering, they will be allowed to be at their varied locations. Other sub-groups like graduate beneficiaries will be trained and linked to selected financial institutions for access to financial resources to actualize their business dreams.

This booklet has been prepared to give an overview of the Directorate as well as summary if its activities in the last five years and its future plans.

#### VISION

Youths of Kano State will be highly motivated and engaged in productive activities through acquisition of morally sound and qualitative education, alongside technical and vocational skills.

#### MISSION

To empower the youth through access to technical and vocational skills as well as leadership training.

#### **GOALS**

- \* To strengthen the capacity of the youths to become productive and disciplined members of the society who can contribute to its sustainable development.
- To encourage youths to acquire education to the highest level possible with skills needed for economic self-reliance.
- \* To strengthen partnership with all levels of government, private sector, NGOs and development partners towards successful implementation of youth empowerment programs.
- To anchor all training programs on a moral rearmament foundation, based on Islamic values reorientation and leadership principles.
- To foster and help implement initiatives that would curb idleness, delinquency and spread of diseases (sexually transmitted diseases, STDs / HIV-AIDS) or substance abuse amongst the youths.

#### STRUCTURE OF THE DIRECTORATE

While the Director-general answers to the Office of the Executive Governor, the Directorate is structured into different departments and units under the DG. Each of them is headed by an administrative head:

- Youth Development Department
- Training & Skills Acquisition Department
- \* Administration and General Services Department
- Guidance and Counselling Unit
- Documentation and Research
- Islamic re-orientation Unit

DYD mandate covers the National Youth Service Scheme, with the Director-General being Chairman State Governing Board of the NYSC; all ex-service, para-military and Youth organisations (Nigerian Legion, Scout Movement, National Youth Council of Nigeria, Kano Chapter etc), as well as, Voluntary Organisations, Associations and Clubs in the state.

The Administration and General services Department has the Staff Officer and Chief Accountant under it. Youth Development department also has a Deputy Director for Youth Development and an Assistant Director Youth and all the 44 LG Youth Development Officers are under the unit. They are divided into four zones, each managing 11 local government development officers.

#### KEY STAFF OF THE DIRECTORATE

The Directorate has a total staff strength of 65: 30 senior staff and 35 junior staff at Kano. There are also 44 LG Youth Officers, one in each local government and some in the 4 zonal offices. (see full list of staff in Appendix I).

#### **ACTIVITIES OF THE DIRECTORATE**


Summary of Youth Empowerment Programme 2004-2008:

Some of the activities during this period included provision of tools and equipment for the first batch of 2,000 youth trained in various vocations (half of the 4,000 trained in the period) at a cost of N96m. The sum of N40m was also expended as grants of N10,000 to each beneficiary for rent of their new business premises and another N10,000 to each as working capital. Therefore total cost of post training empowerment came to over N136m.

Another programme was the Youth Empowerment through Irrigated Agriculture, where beneficiaries were trained in crop production, livestock farming, water pump maintenance and farm management. Post training empowerment including agricultural tools and equipment and working capital grants total N32m.

Some 500 youths underwent three months Computer Literacy and Competency training and were given grants of complete set of computers with accessories and N25,000 each to rent business premises, resulting in total expenditure of over N68m. To bring to an end political thuggery by misguided youth groups and wean them off substance abuse as well, a Jagaliya Youth Rehabilitation programme was successfully implemented to the tune of N65m. These youths, numbering 500 were given basic technical/ vocational skills and entrepreneurial education to make them self-employed. Other youths who constituted

themselves into a nuisance especially at major roads and motor parks (street youths), about 235, were enrolled in a Special Youth empowerment programme, consisting of intensive tarbiyya (moral) education, Qur'anic recitation, muamalat (social relations) and ibadat (worship); coupled with physical, health and business education for self reliance. Over N28 million was expended on training and empowerment of this group. Over N15m was also expended as government contribution to joint programmes on youth empowerment in collaboration with local NGOs, federal government agencies and MDG office.

# INTERNATIONAL AND NATIONAL YOUTH WEEK


International Youth Week is an annual event that youths all over the world celebrate, for a period of seven days. Activities carried out include symposiums, exchange visits, debates, quiz and sports competitions. It is commemorated in the month of August and celebrated in each country as the National Youth Week, with activities reflecting the cultural values and realities of the local communities in the nations.

The aims of the National Youth Week was to bring the positive achievement of young people to the forefront of society's consciousness. The theme of the 2009 National Youth Week was: Environment: Sustainability, Our Challenge, Our Future.

Highlight of the week celebrated in Kano State was the National Youth Day activities on 12 August 2009, where His Excellency the Governor of Kano State ably represented by the Head of Civil Service Kano Alhaji Rabiu Zakariya took the salute, at a parade by youth uniformed organizations in the state, in the SaniAbacha Stadium, Kano: Boy Scout, Cadets, Red Cross, Man O'War, WAI Brigade, Muslim Uniformed Organisations and members of the Youth Council from the local governments. Youths also participated in Quranic recitation competition, Quiz competition and Debates. There were also visits to other states by selected youths, while

youth delegations visited some Islamic Scholars, as part of the activities.

The Directorate also participated at the national level events, such as visits to Zamfara, Sokoto, Kebbi and Katsina states; Dance Drama (The Awakening) and Carnival float depicting the values and culture of the people of the state; and a forum attended by the Hon Minister of Youth.



# NIGERIAN NATIONAL YOUTH AWARD (NNYA)

The Nigerian National Youth Award is also an input of the Duke of Edinburg International Award, London. The nine days camp held at Kusalla Camp, Karaye, in Kano state, was aimed at equipping the 400 participants in areas of information, education, peace, unity and skills acquisition for better tomorrow.

The award programme was interested in initiating attendants to become "change drivers", from dependents to producers of goods and services or owners of self-run enterprises. It was hoped that at the end of the camp, participants would be able to affect a change in their lives and that of their immediate communities, and the country at large.

Activities at the Camp included: skill acquisition, adventure, navigation lecture, games, quiz, debates, poetry recital and drama. This year skill acquisition focused on tie-and-die; interior decoration; manufacture of liquid soap, detergent, antiseptic soap; sesame cake (*kantu* in Hausa language). Her Excellency, the Wife of the State Governor, Hajia Amina Ibrahim Shekarau was the host of the nine day event. She was also decorated as a patron of the Nigerian Girls Guide Kano State chapter. Although unavoidably absent, she was represented by the wife of the Deputy Governor.

The sum of about N10million naira was collected in an appeal fund, by 15<sup>th</sup> January, 2009, the actual remembrance day activities took place. As usual they consist of a parade by Veteran and members of the Nigerian Legion and an address by the Executive Governor.





#### NYSC ACTIVITIES

The National Youth Service Scheme is a national program that introduce and orient our graduates from Tertiary Institutions into national service to our country. Student graduates, male and female, below the age of 30 years are posted to different states throughout the federation to serve the nation in their respective fields of studies for a period of one year. Directorate of Youth Development supervises the NYSC Kano State, the Director General is the Chairman Governing Board of the NYSC. Kano State Government built the best NYSC orientation camp in the country. It also provides support for holding all the NYSC orientation program. This year government gave a contribution of N15m naira for various NYSC orientation programs.

# 2009 YOUTH EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMME

The 2009 Youth Empowerment Programme as approved by the state government started at the beginning of the year.

15, 000 Youth Empowerment Programme (YEP) forms were distributed to youths needing training and empowerment in various trades all over the state through local government youth development officers of the Directorate. All completed forms were returned to the Directorate.

- Applicants were screened and counseled in relation to their chosen areas of training and Empowerment.
- A total of 6,397 candidates were selected by the Directorate for the 2009 Youth Empowerment Programme, first batch.
- 2,540 youths (males) have completed round-one of the Islamic Reorientation Camping at Kusalla NYSC Orientation Camp, Karaye (2<sup>nd</sup> - 4<sup>th</sup> December, 2009) and have been enlisted for training and empowerment in various agricultural trades.
- 1,088 youths (females) have also completed Islamic Reorientation Camping in 5 different centers in Kano and were also registered to participate in agricultural trades.
- 2,765 youths (males and females) would undergo Islamic Reorientation at Kusalla and Kano, and would complete their vocational training by 25<sup>th</sup>


December, 2009. Their empowerment would be in January, 2010.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF FORMS AND SCREENING


Purpose designed forms were printed, each with a unique serial number for the purpose of starting the Kano State Youth Database (KSYDB). The forms distributed were circulated by three methods through the office of the Coordinator, Youth Empowerment Program: applicants could collect forms in person from the DYD; Youth and Volunteer organizations applied for the number of forms their members require; and Local Government and other appointed and elected public officials were given a certain number of forms for distribution to the grassroots. Thus the forms spread to the 44 local governments of the state. About 15,000 forms were distributed. Data collected will be seed of a database to be fully developed later on.

Collection of the forms was done by the staff of the Coordinator, Youth Empowerment program.


Staff of the DYD screened the forms to ensure they were filled correctly. A file was opened for each respondent and an ID card issued out, with a passport picture, their name, form number, LG of birth and chosen trade. The forms were used in collation of essential list in a tabular form, with one table (Appendix II) showing Distribution of Vocation for post-primary Graduates. The forms for Tertiary Institution Graduates were similarly sorted out.





## ISLAMIC RE-ORIENTATION / CAMPING OF UNEMPLOYED YOUTHS (MALES) ROUND ONE

For the purpose of setting the selected youths on a track of success with their chosen professions and to ensure that they resist the negative forces that may seek to retard their progress, it has been found necessary to subject the youths to a value re-orientation course. This is meant to inspire them to become models and to live by the highest standards of a Muslim society as individuals and as corporate leaders in the business world. The plan was to camp ten thousand YEP beneficiaries for 2009 in batches, at a suitable sites in the state.


Between 2<sup>nd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> December, 2009, Kusalla, Karaye NYSC Permanent Orientation Camp hosted the round one of the male unemployed youths for a three day Islamic Reorientation course. The objective is to focus the mind of the selected youths on their self-employment objective and make concrete linkages between, soon to be embarked upon skill acquisition and viable self-employment.

As part of lessons learnt from previous exercises, it has been found crucial to impress on the youth the need to imbibe the virtues of hardwork, dignity of labour, honesty, remaining sober and keeping away from bad company. With the wind of positive ethical re-orientation already sweeping through the society, the lectures delivered in classes, talks in the assembly hall, physical exercises in the sports fields and spiritual exercises along with sermons in the mosque, all draw upon the learning traditions of Islam, with its rich lore on self-reliance, care for one's neighbor, commitment to the well

being of the community and faith in an All-Seeing but Most Compassionate Divine Lord.

As earlier mentioned, 2,540 youths (males) have completed Islamic Reorientation Camping at Kusalla NYSC Orientation Camp, Karaye (2nd - 4th December, 2009) and have been enlisted for training and empowerment in various agricultural trades.





# ISLAMIC RE-ORIENTATION / CAMPING FOR UNEMPLOYED GRADUATES OF TERTIARY INSTITUTIONS

Prior to the distribution of the final ID card to the participants, Screening and verification exercise were conducted. The Directorate gave the participants a temporary ID card which was replaced by the final ID card between 17th 19th November, 2009. The 1,000 no participants (1st batch) were asked to report to the Orientation/Camping exercise on Friday 20th November, 2009.

The Islamic Orientation of the Entrepreneurship training for the 1,000 no tertiary institutions participants (1st batch) took place between Friday 20th Sunday 22nd November, 2009. The participants were distributed into five centers namely:

Sa'adatu Rimi College of Education Kumbotso, School of Management Studies Kano, School of Technology Kano, OIC International, Murtala Muhammed Library and female participants at Islamic Center Tarauni.

Registration began in these centers on Friday 20th November, 2009 by 10:00am, lectures and other programmes immediately followed. Different Resource persons delivered persuasive lectures on the following topics: Kano State Government's Policy on Empowerment, Agric Loan Package, Tertiary Institutions Graduates and the need for being Entrepreneurs in Kano State, Agricultural vocations for self-Reliance, problems and prospects of non-Agricultural vocations and Tarbiyya/Qur'anic teachings. Other programmes were career forum/interactive session, and Physical Health Education (PHE) and sports. All these topics were well presented. The resource persons were drawn from KNARDA, Ministry for Higher Education Kano State, the Academic Community and Business individuals (Entrepreneurs). Certificates were distributed to the participants at the end of the Islamic re-orientation/camping.

### ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING FOR UNEMPLOYED GRADUATES OF TERTIARY INSTITUTIONS

For numerous reasons that need not detain us, Nigeria has been turning out more graduates than the economy can absorb. The result is graduate unemployment. The

intervention required is to re-align the skills of the graduates to the gaps in the market for goods and services, and to ensure that they take advantage of the societal needs for such services and goods to make themselves economically independent.

Entrepreneurship training is an aspect of education that teaches entrepreneurial skills, qualities and functions to persons, who wish to become active players in the economy, either in the Small and Medium Enterprises(SMEs) or in other sectors. It could also be training given to persons to enable them identify their potentials and harness them to become commercial ventures and generate income. It is

about skills, aptitudes and attitudes to turn opportunities into reality. At the end of their training, candidates of the training will be innovative, creative and skillful enough to manage business enterprises on a sustainable basis for self reliance.

The plan was that about 1000 Tertiary Institutions graduates underwent entrepreneurship training by three selected organizations, after which they will be linked to two financial institutions with whom DYD has a working relationship, namely, UBA Plc and Integrated Microfinace Bank. This is to give the youths access to financial resources to enable them put their skills to create viable and sustainable enterprises, that will hopefully employ many others as they grow.

The objective of training unemployed graduates in entrepreneurship is to prepare the youth to be responsible, enterprising and for them to become entrepreneurial thinkers who can take risks, manage results and utilize the business opportunities that exist in the world. To achieve this, DYD engaged competent institutions to deliver this training. The entrepreneurship training was provided at four different training centers:: School of Rural Technology and Enterpreneurship Development (SORTED) Rano, Sa'adatu Rimi College of Education (SRCOE) Kumbotso, School of Technology (SOT) Kano and OIC International Kano.

Prior to the training, the training institutions harmonized the content of what to be taught to the participants. Thus, apart from the Entrepreneurship Development Skills, Vocational Skill Acquisition was incorporated in the training. Further,

Mentoring, Leadership, Business Development Services, Excursion, Community Service, Sports/Physical Exercises and Islamic reorientation (Qur'an and Tarbiyya) were incorporated in the overall training skills.

In the Skill Acquisition the young Entrepreneur's (participants) were exposed to the Skills of Poultry, Hatchery, Fish farming, Bee keeping, Animal Husbandry, and Fattening. There was also mentoring on Borehole, Automechanic, Business Centers, Bakery, Art work and Printing, Snacks/Drink making and Business opportunities in Agricultural and non-Agricultural vocations. The participants were also taken to Incubation Centre at Farm-centre Kano as part of the excursion programme. Similarly, they were engaged in community service at the end of each week. They visited the Orphanage-house at Nassarawa and conducted sanitation exercises at various locations in the state.

The 1,000 participants drawn from all the 44 Local Government Areas of Kano State had 878 male participants (88%) and 122 female participants (12%). 565 participants have a National Diploma, 356 have Nigeria Certificate in Education (NCE), 47 have a Degree Certificate, 13 have Higher National Diploma (HND) and 19 have Advanced-Diploma in various disciplines. Further analysis has shown that 82% of the participants intend to pursue business in Agricultural Sector and 18% intend to go non-Agricultural business. SORTED Rano had 400 participants, SRCOE Kumbotso trained 300 participants, OIC International Kano State trained 200 participants and School of Technology

#### (SOT) Kano trained 100 participants

As he did for all camping sites and training venues involved in the Youth Empowerment Programme, the Director-General (DG) Gambo Ado visited all the centers during Islamic orientation/camping and training. At each centre, the DG stresses the Kano state Government's commitment to Youth Development with emphasis on education, empowerment Islamic-reorientation. He appealed to the also and entrepreneurship training participants to become models and never misuse the opportunities provided to them by the Executive Governor of Kano State, Sardaunan Kano, Malam Ibrahim Shekarau. At the end of the training, many of the participants openly praised the DYD Kano State for this initiative and prayed that this exercise be continued so that others can also benefit.


#### **VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR YOUTHS AND WOMEN**

Beyond the mere neutralisation of negative socio-economic fallouts of unemployment and poverty reduction, vocation training to diverse youths throughout the state will help lay the foundation for a self-sustaining economy. Because the beneficiaries in many cases are infusing new skills into traditional / guild and family vocations, that are being transmitted from generation to generation. Lack of modern technical skills and competition from better managed competitors had been a threat to some of the traditional vocations.

The 2,540 youths (males) that have completed roundone of the Islamic Reorientation and 2,765 youths (males and females) would undergo Islamic Reorientation at Kusalla and Kano, and would complete their vocational training by 25<sup>th</sup> December, 2009 are scheduled for training and empowerment in various vocations and trades.

### FEMALE SKILL ACQUISITION IN COSMETICS AND LIVESTOCK

As at the time of going to press, the females registered in the 2009 YEP have already started a one week training in Cosmetics and Livestock, at the IBB Way, Sani Abacha Skill Acquisition Centre. About 510 females were registered. Experienced resource persons were engaged in the training. At the end of the training, the participants are expected to acquire skills in making women bodycare and home hygiene items, like liquid soap, *turaren wuta*, Humra, beeds and toothpaste, with value addition.

#### **EMPOWERMENT**

This is the stage where the final legal steps are taken to handover equipment, tools, premises and other infrastructure, including working capital to deserving beneficiaries. On their part, they are expected to be prompt in payment of leasing fees at the onset of each product cycle, where appropriate, or on an annual basis.

For the unemployed graduates being supported with a bank loan, the Kano State Government would guarantee the loan and also bear the interest burden on the loan. This should ease the burden of repayment and ensure sustainability.

### OUTSTANDING FINANCIAL REQUIREMENT TO COMPLETE YEP 2009

To ensure implementation of YEP for the first batch of 6,397 youths, the Directorate needs funding to the tune of N572, 913,997.01, from the funds already approved but not yet released.

Of the two approvals of N9m each granted to the Directorate for camping of 4000 youths at N18m, N9m was released to the Directorate, and was used for the following:-

- Islamic Reorientation Camping of 2,220 youths at NYSC Orientation camp, Kusalla of Karaye LGA held from 2<sup>nd</sup> - 4<sup>th</sup> December, 2009.
- Islamic Reorientation Camping of 790 female candidates at 5 different centers from 4<sup>th</sup> - 6<sup>th</sup> December, 2009.

 Islamic Reorientation Camping of 1000 Tertiary Institutions participants (youths).

With the completion of Islamic Re-orientation Programme. DYD has already commenced training of 1000 tertiary institutions graduates in entrepreneurship. It has also started training of 500 women in agro-products processing and cosmetics.

In conclusion, it is expected that all the participants (3,628) non-tertiary institutions participants would be ready for empowerment after their vocational training with effect from 25<sup>th</sup> December, 2009

The remaining of 1,765 participants representing other trades would commence their training immediately and their empowerment would take place in January, 2010.

In effect the Directorate requires funds as par approval given to effect the empowerment of 3,628 youths before the end of 2009, while the empowerment of 1765 youths would be required immediately in 2010.

The only problem is from the economic melt down, in the form of a letter letter from the ministry of Planning dated 1<sup>st</sup> December, 2009 indicating a budget cut of 65% of the youth empowerment programme from N700m to N250m.

DYD has already commenced the 2009 youth empowerment Programme and is committed to the participants and willing to execute it to logical conclusion. DYD hopes that Government would allow the Programme to


be concluded so as to proceed into the second phase of the Youth Empowerment Programme in earnest and in good time.

# AN OUTLINE OF ACTIVITIES FOR 2010 YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

- Completion of Empowerment activities: giving out tools and places of vocations. (January - February).
- \* Armed Forces Remembrance Week. (January 15, 2010)
- \* Enmass Registration of all uniformed organisations in kano state, as a means of boosting youth development through training and inculcation of discipline, endurance and spirit of community consciousness. (February-March).
- \* Admission of second set of students for skill acquisition at IBB Way, Sani Abacha Vocation centre. (February-August).
- \* Registration and continuous sensitisation of applicants for 2010 Youth Empowerment Programme (YEP). (April, 2010).
- \* International Youth Week Activities. (March April).
- \* Youth Development Camps at Karaye NYSC permanent orientation camp, for youth organisations from local government areas. (Monthly).

Activities for the year 2010 will be informed by lessons learnt so far, from the preceding years. Infact, international development partners (DFID) have observed that given the magnitude of the youth unemployment situation, with an estimated 3,000,000 (three million) youths in that situation,

there is need to double the target beneficiary population in the coming year, compared to the 2009 target.
